PREMIUMS TO BULLS, 1958

The above Committee invite applications from farmers in the county who are prepared to purchase Premium Bulls under the conditions of the Cattle Breeding Scheme for 1958.

No two premium bulls of the same breed will be located within less than 2 1/2 statute miles of each other. At least two-fifths of the available premiums must be allocated for bulls of the Registered Dairy Shorthorn type. Each applicant must deposit with his application the sum of £4, such deposit to be refunded in the event of the applicant not being selected by the Committee or that he is selected and has purchased a premium bull.

The annual premium paid in respect of Aberdeen Angus and Hereford bulls is £15. The annual premium paid in respect of Dairy Shorthorn bulls varies from £16 to £31, according to the milk yield record.

Application forms and particulars of the Scheme may be had from the Committee of Agriculture, Courthouse, Dungarvan, with whom completed application forms and deposits must be lodged by the 15th January, 1958.

Late Mr. John P. Terry, U.S.

The death of John P. Terry took place suddenly at his office while working on a finger-print card. He was removed at once to St. Joseph's Hospital where the doctors tried to revive him but after 20 minutes pronounced him dead. He was a former president of the Worcester County Police Assn., the Police Dept. of the Holy Name Society. Besides his father and wife, he is survived by his son John T., three grand-children; his brother William and his sister Josephine, all of Yonkers.

His father Jack Terry, lived at one time at King Street, Abbeyside and his mother, R.I.P., was Mary Curran, Ballinack, Dungarvan, and he was nephew of Bridget Terry, Ballinacourt. He went to Ballinacourt school, Requiem High Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his soul in the Monastery Church and burial took place in the Gate of Heaven Cemetery.

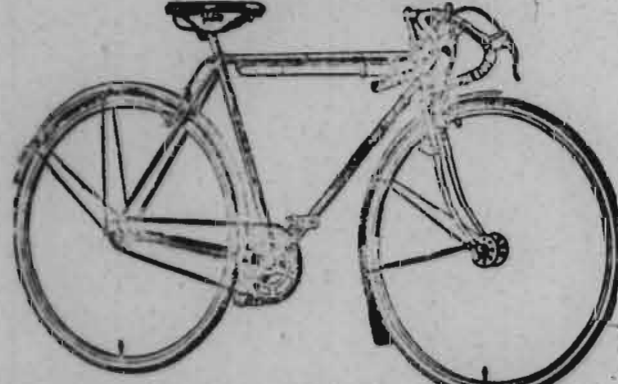

NFA NEWS

ALL IRISH LOAF The report of the Institute for Industrial Research and Standards on the feasibility of an all-Irish loaf has created a great deal of interest throughout the country.

At this stage it is worth remembering that it was in October 1955, that the NFA sent the first composite sample of All-Ireland wheat to the research station in Svalof, Sweden.

TRANSPORT

The restrictions on farmer transport and the CIE monopoly is impeding the efficient operation of many of our Co-operative auction marts.

The situation around Fermoy is particularly bad where we find that private lorries are free to compete within a radius of eighteen miles of Cork City but that they cannot service Fermoy Livestock Mart which is twenty miles outside the city.

It is essential that farmers would be in a position to avail of transport at the lowest possible cost and to use it in the most efficient manner.

RAILWAY CROSSINGS

The fact that Railway Crossings are not sufficiently wide to accommodate modern machinery has been a matter on which the NFA has been making representation to the CIE over a long period.

This harvest a farmer in the Midlands with a field of wheat each side of a railway line decided he could not afford to lose his field of wheat and removed the gate posts to allow his combine through and he consequently appeared in Court recently.

It was a test case and it is interesting to note that CIE claimed £50 damages of which £30-10-0, they declared, was of a punitive nature. In their evidence they declared that there was no onus on them to extend the accommodation which is governed by legislation enacted in 1945. They pointed out, however, that they were prepared to allow such an extension provided the land owners paid the cost and entered into an indemnity bond of £50,000.

Summing up the case the Justice said, that as the NFA had taken up the matter it would probably end up with arbitration. If it did come before a tribunal he was of the opinion that the indemnity conditions laid down by CIE would be strongly opposed by many farmers because it would relieve CIE of any obligation it had in so far as any particular farmer was concerned.

In view of the fact that he had to deal with trespass he awarded £10-11-2 damages which was the cost of re-erecting the posts.

he could never have aspired: it was a share in the life of God himself. Of that wonderful gift of the Holy Spirit, which he called not I, but Christ liveth in me."

Fr. Fitzgerald went on to say: "I have said that it is in Baptism that we receive this share in the life of God. Scarcely are we a few days old when we are taken to the font, and our new dignity is received before we can understand it. When we come to the use of reason at the quoin of both the Church and Sacraments are at hand to us step by step along life's way until we reach the threshold of eternity. It is then that the veil will be drawn aside and beyond the face of the walls."

A BEAUTIFUL ALTAR The general interior finish is smooth plaster, decorated in soft ivory shade. The exposed roof is of Oregon pine left in its natural colour. Oak woodwork has been used in the Sanctuary floor and on the Nave floor where the seats are placed. Mosaic is used on the floors of the Narthex, Baptistry, P.O.R. and the passages in the Nave. All the internal woodwork is oak, including the Altar Rail, seats and Sacristy furniture. The oak has been polished in its natural colour and presents a striking contrast with the Limestone Altar and steps, which are in themselves a feature that is seldom seen in present-day churches. The Altar is, of course, the focal point of the church and is seen without obstruction of any kind. The electric lights are placed on wrought iron brackets on the walls and the Sanctuary Lamp is also on a bracket at the Epistle side of the Chancel Arch.

WHERE MY TREASURE IS. "Where my treasure is, there is my heart also" Matt. VI. 21. Rev. Fr. Fitzgerald stated: "We are assembled this morning, my dear brethren, for the formal opening of your new parish church. His coming was not for the purpose of surrounding Himself with splendour and worldly grandeur; He came, as He stated quite clearly, to the men might "have life, and have it more abundantly." What a grand arrangement it would be if each family in the district were to send one member to daily Mass; what blessings would come down from heaven if each family in the district were to present in the morning at the Sacrifice of Mount Calvary renewed."
