AN ROINN TALMAIOCHTA Livestock Breeding Act, 1925 LICENSING OF BULLS

All bulls calving during the months of January, February, March, April, May and June, 1957, will reach the prescribed age on 31st March, 1958, and must be presented for inspection as to their suitability for licensing purposes before that date.

Applications for licences to keep such bulls (accompanied in each case by the prescribed fee of 5/-) are required under the provisions of the Act to be lodged with the Secretary, Department of Agriculture (Section 9) Dublin, not later than 31st January, 1958. Applications received after that date will be subject to additional fees which will not be refunded.

Bulls in respect of which applications for licences are received will be inspected during the months of February and March at approved local centres (including Show and Sales).

PERSONS KEEPING BULLS OF THE PRESCRIBED AGE WITHOUT LICENCES ARE LIABLE TO PROSECUTION AND ON CONVICTION TO A PENALTY OF £20.

Forms of application may be had at all Post Offices and Garda Síochána stations, from the Secretaries of Committees of Agriculture, or direct from the Department.

WEEDS LISMORE NOTES

Weeds may be considered as plants which are growing out of place. Growing where they are neither required or desirable they use up the plant food, space, light and moisture which should be nourishing profitable crops & grass. Ragwort, thistles, docks, buttercups, coltsfoot, preshag and such like are the outward signs that land is not being farmed as it should. Weeds make harvesting of crops more difficult. Some are poisonous if eaten by stock, while others may play a part in the multiplication of pests and diseases.

THE NOXIOUS WEEDS ACT, 1926

Ragwort, thistle and dock are particularly undesirable because their seed can blow about and infest neighbouring fields. So for the common good, the State steps in with the Noxious Weeds Act to get united action in their destruction. This Act applies to the whole country and schedules as noxious weeds:—

Ragwort.
Thistle.

Any person responsible for lands on which these weeds are found growing is liable, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.

RAGWORT

The Common Ragwort of dry grassland and the Marsh Ragwort of wet ground are the two main species on Irish farms. Ragwort has many local names, such as Ragweed, Benweed, Book-lawn weed, Bulkishawn, etc.

Ragwort is a biennial plant. The first year's growth consists of a rosette of leaves. In the second year, a tough leafy stem grows up from the rosette to a height of a couple of feet and produces golden yellow flowers. The seeds have tufts of fine hairs which make them easily carried along by the wind. Being of biennial growth, ragwort usually dies when it has produced its seed.

RAGWORT IS POISONOUS TO STOCK

Ragwort is a particularly objectionable weed of grassland since the grazing of cattle and horses on infested pastures can lead to ragwort poisoning. This weed is poisonous at all stages of growth. It is often present in hay and when eaten by cattle and horses can cause sickness and death. The weed when cut or pulled, is very dangerous if left lying about on the pasture. The young weed is particularly dangerous to susceptible animals (cattle and horses) because it is at this stage that it is most frequently eaten by them, especially in dry seasons and bare overstocked pastures.

CONTROL MEASURES.

Ragwort spreads readily since the seeds are easily blown about to neighbouring pastures. If it is to be wiped out, it must be allowed to seed. Repeated cutting or pulling, beginning in early July, for a few years is necessary. Grazing with sheep when it is young is also effective. If ragwort is cut or pulled until it is fairly mature, the plants should be collected off the field and destroyed. If left lying about they ripen and produce seed. The ragwort weeds should be cut or pulled during two successive seasons at least. The first cutting or pulling rids the land only of plants in the second year of growth. It will not affect those produced by the seed of the preceding year which are still in the rosette stage but which will develop into flowering plants in the following year.

In no circumstances should ragwort weeds be left scattered about on pastures after cutting. They should be collected and burned immediately.

THISTLES.

The kinds of thistles most plentiful in Ireland are:—

The Creeping Thistle.
The Spear or Horse Thistle.
The Marsh Plume Thistle.

THE CREEPING THISTLE

The Creeping Thistle is one of the worst weeds of our grasslands. It is a perennial plant, the over-ground parts of which die down at the end of each season. The extensive root system remains alive and sends up fresh colonies of thistles each spring. When these thistles are allowed to grow unchecked the roots branch and spread out in all directions underground so that an ever increasing area of land is infested each year. This extensive root system supplies the young thistle plants with water and food until they can fend for themselves.

As the seasons advance the thistles become branched and develop flower heads. Seeds are produced which have tufts of white down that allow them to be wafted about by the wind. These seeds can germinate and produce thistles.

CONTROL MEASURES

The rooting system is actually a reserve of food to enable the plant to send up stems and leaves. If allowed to grow normally these manufacture further reserves of food which are again stored in the roots. If the over-ground parts are kept cut, the reserves of food becomes exhausted and the thistles die from starvation. Seeding is also prevented. Here, then, is the clue to the eradication of thistles.

DOCKS.

Docks are eradicated by sowing or digging them out continually. The root is very apt to break, leaving behind a piece from which it propagates anew. A Docking Iron or digging fork should be used to dig them out and this should be done when the land is damp.

Every effort should be made to prevent dock seeds falling into land. Threshing, mowing, cutting and burning hay containing docks should not be done on the fields. Seeds should not be allowed to get into the manure heap. Seed corn or grass seeds infested with dock seeds should never be sown.

In experiments, selective weed-killer sprays, while damaging the over-ground parts badly, did not eradicate dock plants.

COLTSFOOT.

This is a perennial weed which creeps underground. It is known by such local names as Spoonk, Spunk-leaf and Athin. The flower heads appear in

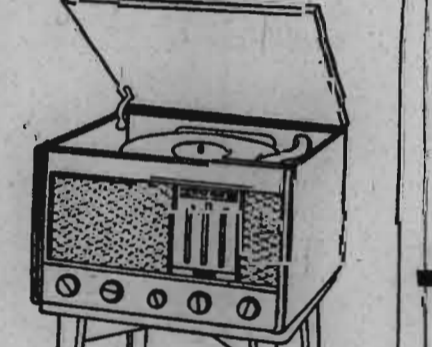

CONTROL OF THISTLES BY HORMONE WEED-KILLER

In experiments conducted in this country, partial control of thistles has been obtained with hormone weed-killers. Although the thistle rooting system is only slightly affected, the over-ground parts are killed. For instance, spraying thistle-infested corn crops means that the over-ground parts are killed, leaving very few thistles to interfere with the growing crop and with harvesting. When hormone weed-killers are used, the instructions set out by the manufacturer should be followed closely if the best results are to be obtained.

February and March some time before the leaves appear. They are rather like dandelion flowers in colour. The seeds produced have tufts of hair so that they are blown about easily.

When the flowers are dying off the coltsfoot leaves appear. The leaves are large, being four to five inches broad. At first both sides of the leaf are covered with a white cottony web which disappears later from the upper surface.

GOOD FARMING KEEPS WEEDS UNDER CONTROL.

Weeds are a nuisance and cause of loss on many of our farms. While the chemical treatment of weeds in tillage crops is often both desirable and necessary, weeds in grassland are controlled, for the most part, by good management. Grassland in a high state of fertility with luxuriant growth of wild white clover and the better grasses, is always clean. Top dressing with fertilizers and rotational grazing accompanied by constant trimming produce close, vigorously growing pastures in which weeds are difficult to gain a footing. Fields that are well manured and cut early in the season for silage or hay also remain reasonably clean. When grassland is taken seriously in hand and properly treated and managed, there is a rapid reduction in weed accompanied more productive swards.

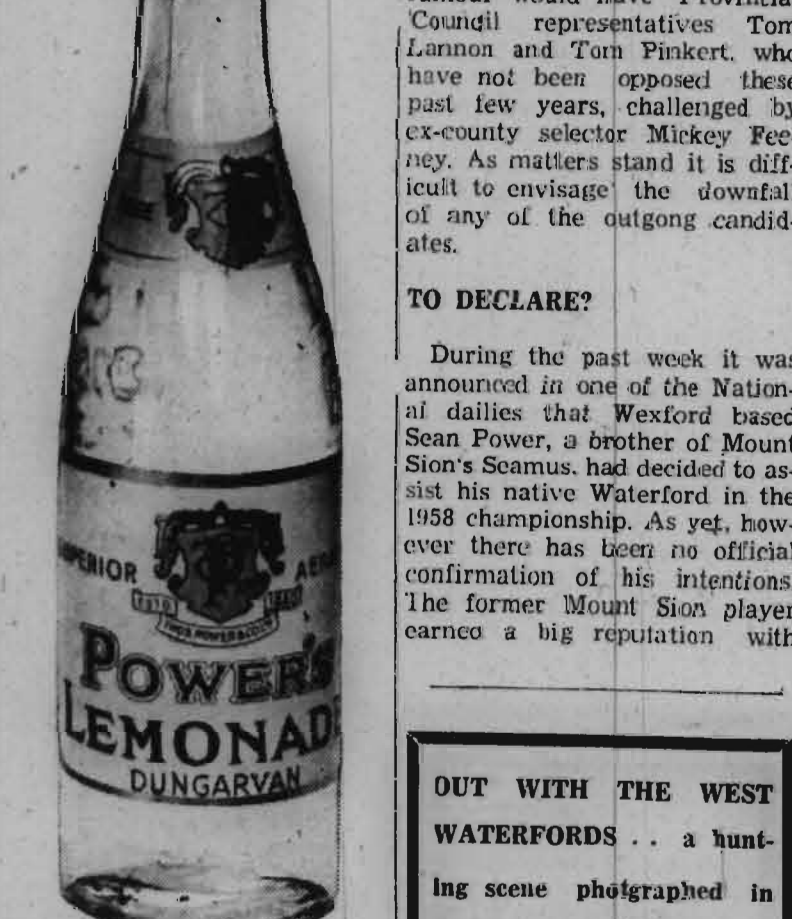

Regulations re Fertilisers

Election of Officers

Under an Order which has been made by the Minister for Agriculture, the Fertiliser, Feeding Stuffs and Mineral Mixtures Act, 1955, were brought into operation on 1st January last. The main purposes of the Act are: (a) to provide more effective safeguards against misrepresentation by sellers as to the quality of composition of fertilisers, feeding stuffs or mineral mixtures.

The Regulations control the sale and manufacture for sale of fertilisers, feeding stuffs and mineral mixtures and provide for sampling and analysis of such articles. They prescribe the form of statement to be given by the seller on the sale of specified fertilisers, feeding stuffs and mineral mixtures.

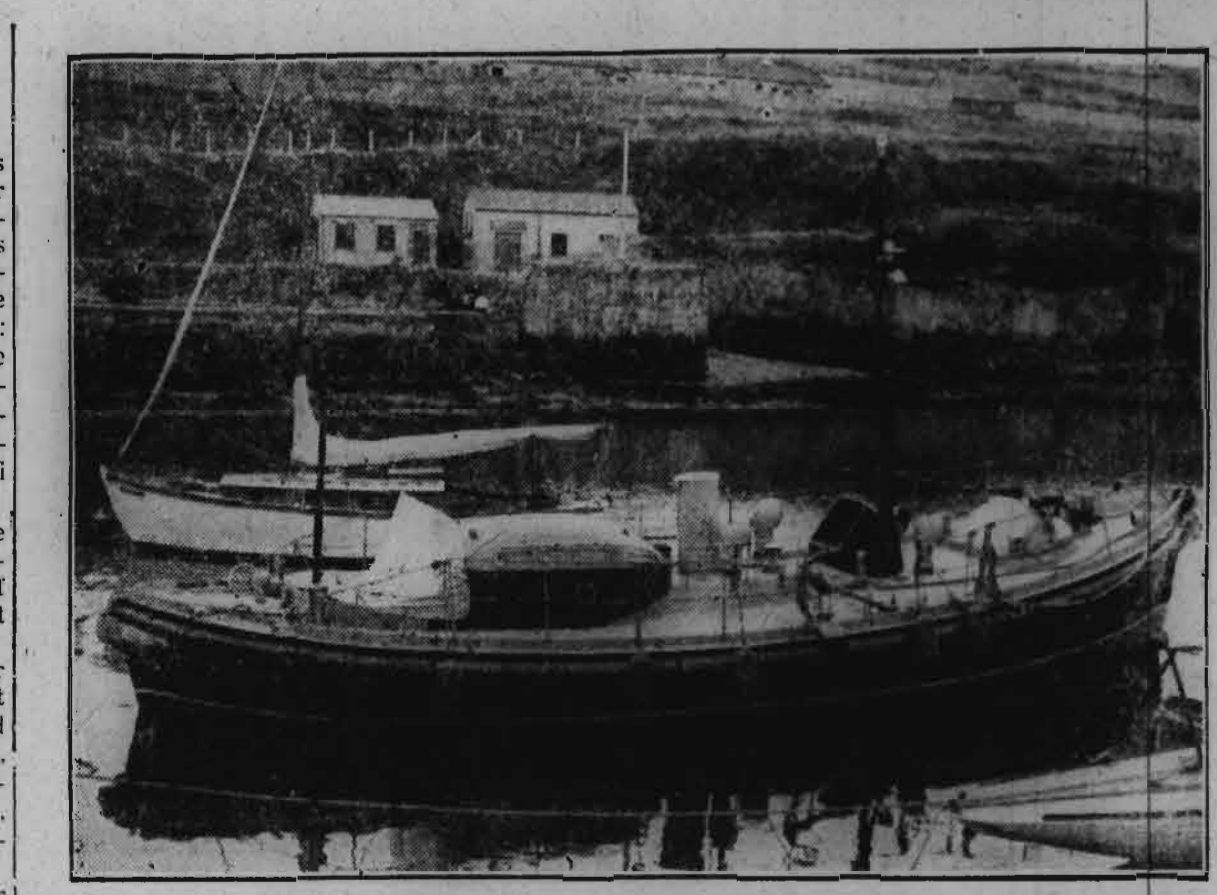
