N. F. A. News

Successive governments have called for increased production. This call has been fully responded to by Irish farmers. Agricultural production has reached a height never reached before. Consequently, we now face the possibility of a total collapse of the national economy due to rapidly falling farmer income. Over 40% of our population is actively engaged in agriculture. The industry is responsible for 85% of our visible exports and logically it is the basis of our economy. The approach of the N.F.A. has always been constructive and reasonable. We regret that this approach has not always been reciprocated. The following is briefly the position regarding the production of our major commodities and the resultant decline in farmer income, as compared with twelve month ago:

WHEAT: Production has increased by approximately 20% as compared with the previous 12 months. Exports have almost doubled, reaching a total of approximately 240,000 tons. A comparison of prices on the 4th February, 1957 and the 3rd February, '58, shows that, taking into account the levy of 5/- which will come into effect in July, income to pig producers on the basis of reduced prices will be down by 22m. this year.

WHEAT: On the basis of the N.F.A. survey, it looks as if wheat production may be up substantially this year. As the Government arrangements stand at the time of writing, the penalty on the farmer may be as much as 12/- per barrel.

GRASS-SEED: Increased production and a price drop of 1/- a cwt. cost farmers in Louth, Monaghan, Cavan and Donegal £50,000.

Production is at its highest level. Total exports are well over the £5m. mark, or an increase of approximately 80%. This effort was made by our dairy farmers, despite the fact that they are in receipt of the lowest price in Europe.

LIVESTOCK: The livestock industry earned £45.75m. in exports this year, or an increase of 25% approximately. This is by far and away our greatest single export, yet the double brent grain, the one incentive to farmers and dairy farmers in particular, to eradicate bovine tuberculosis, has been withdrawn.

While this decision has been taken by the Government, we have not heard that they have considered halving the £50,000 grant payable for the establishment of each factory.

FEEDING BARLEY: Estimate of production from the record 208,000 acres under feeding barley would be approximately 2 million barrels. The price would mean a loss of between £500,000 and £300,000. The acreage is going to be up in 1958, as yet we have no idea of the price.

COST OF PRODUCTION: Largely due to N.F.A. action the increase in rates was less last year than in previous years. However, there was an increase of £10.4m. in the debts incurred by Local Authorities in 1957. As farmers we must remember that taxpayers will have to meet the consequences of this maladministration.

FERTILISERS: The third highest price in Europe. A subsidy has been given to superphosphate manufacturers to make their price equal to imported supplies when they have paid the artificially high price of transport and unloading in Ireland.

MACHINERY LEVIES: In spite of the promise by the then Taoiseach and Minister for Industry and Commerce, levies remain on imported ploughs, mowing machines and other machinery. While an undertaking was given that no burden would be placed on farmers, it is estimated that over £20,000 has been collected in duties. The position was to be reviewed last August but nothing happened. The Committee appointed by the Minister to investigate tariffs never reported because meetings were not called.

Farmers need a gesture of good-will towards Irish industry in the national interest, but they have been completely betrayed. NFA Deputation at Co. Council Meeting

A deputation from the N.F.A. appeared before a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan on Monday to appeal for more economy in local administration.

Before the meeting was an estimate of 40-51 in the £ for the coming year which showed an increase of 1/4.51 on last year's figure. The estimate provides for the expenditure of £2,232,864 in 1958.

"Journey's End" at Mount Melleray

The famous play, "Journey's End" was produced in Mount Melleray College Hall on Tuesday afternoon last. As most people know, it is a play of World War I, based on the dramatic experiences of trench warfare. However, it is one of those plays that can scarcely be called a play because the emotions, and critical situations portrayed there are still realisable under the routine discipline of military life, though not perhaps as acutely in peacetime as during war.

The success of the play was a further tribute to the ability of Mr. Brendan Breen as a producer of drama. He is brother of the distinguished poet, Laurence, a cousin of the bride and a native of Touraneau, performed the ceremony.

In this play, much of the high dramatic quality depends on the superb handling of the dialogue and the intense sincerity of the actors. Bill Connor, from Hill, England, gave it a promising start with his portrayal of the bluff, hearty Capt. Hardy, who sets the pace and tone and glances for good after the first scene. The most difficult character in the play is perhaps that of Lieut. Hibbert, who has been reduced to a mass of nerves by the strains and dangers of the trenches. This part was admirably taken by Aidan Morrison, of Sligo, who achieved the distasteful feat of entering fully into the character of Hibbert.

His fellow county man, J. B. Carroll, also rose to great heights as Capt. Stanhope, a fine officer slowly becoming a victim to alcohol and the consequent unbalanced temper. He finds his suddenly complicated by the arrival of young Lieut. Raleigh, boyish and unspoiled, during college days and who now expects to find him a greater hero than ever. Eddie McNamee, of Leeds, plays his part as Raleigh in the unfolding of the drama between these two. Peter Coleman, of Middlesbrough, is maturely competent as the anti-type Lieut. Osborne, a White, of Cork, as Private Mason, and Leslie Flanagan, of Hull as Trotter, keep up a very successful patter of light comedy. Missions being cooked to the hilt. Sean O'Donnell, of Kerry performed well as Lance-Cpl. Broughton; J. Connolly, of Dublin, as Sergt-Major Tim O'Connell; and the Colonel, and W. Cullinane of Banmahon as a German soldier.

Prolonged applause at the end was a fitting tribute to the manner in which the actors kept the play moving at a high and absorbing pitch.

Former productions at the College include "The First Legion," "Marjorie Harter," "The Whirlwind Boy," "Arsenic and Old Lace," and "The Whip Hand."

Their latest was one that will find its way as one of their most successful and certainly one of their most brilliant dramas to date. My only regret is that this production by the boys of Melleray could not have a wider audience. It is worthy of one.
