UNITED FRONT NFA MEETING Overlook NFA meetings have already been held in Counties Cork, Mayo and Kerry. The meetings have been orderly and constructive but the attitude of the Government in restricting agricultural production by way of reduced prices has been deplored. The keynote of all meetings to date is that it is now vitally essential to have a united farmer front if we are to succeed in our efforts to maintain a reasonable level of income. This was best expressed by a resolution coming from a very large meeting held in Mullingar, Co. Westmeath on Monday 10th March. The resolution reads: "The farmers of Westmeath realising now more than ever the necessity for unity of purpose and solidarity among farmers, pledge their whole-hearted support to farmers in other counties and particularly to those engaged in the dairy industry in their fight for a just price for their products."

The Government's evasion of its responsibility with regard to the butter subsidy must come as a severe shock to all dairy farmers. It is now quite obvious that, try as they may, the creameries will not be able to carry this burden. Summing up the decision, we can only say that either the present Minister has no faith in the Committee established by his predecessor or else his action is a blatantly obvious effort to restrict further production. In either case it is a thoroughly disreputable and most detrimental to the national economy. LIMESTONE SUBSIDY REDUCTION Among the other bad news that the publication of the year's estimates brought to farmers was the information to the effect that the subsidy on ground limestone is to be reduced by 4s. per ton. While we have since 1951 applied over 5,000 tons of ground limestone in this country there nevertheless are many counties where its application is still a crying need. The ground limestone scheme was one of our best national investments and its worth reflected in the ability of farmers to provide the vital requirements of feeding barley, increased milk yields and the general improvement of our livestock. Against this the January issue of the official Department of Agriculture Bulletin showed that

### N.F.A. News

#### UNITED FRONT AT NFA MEETING

Overflow NFA meetings have recently been held in Counties Wick, Mayo and Kerry. The meetings have been orderly and constructive but the attitude of the Government in regarding agricultural production as a way of reduced prices has been deplored.

The key-note of all meetings is that it is now vitally essential to have a united front if we are to succeed in our efforts to maintain a reasonable level of income. This was best expressed by a resolution passed from a very large meeting held in Mullingar, Co. Westmeath on Monday 10th March. The resolution reads: "The farmers of Westmeath realising more than ever the necessity for unity of purpose and solidarity among farmers, pledge their whole-hearted support to farmers in other counties and particularly to those engaged in the dairy industry in their fight for a just price for their products."

We have never been nearer to a united non-political farmers' front. It would be tragic if farmers in all other counties did not add their voices to this resolution from the Westmeath NFA.

In the meantime, Co. Executives are prepared for the holding of further public meetings. On next Friday, March 14th, Navan in Co. Meath will be the venue for the Meath farmers and farmers from adjoining counties. On Sunday, 16th March, Mass meetings will be held in Nougha, N. Tipp; Ennis, in Co. Clare; Ennis, in Co. Sligo; and in Co. Offaly.

Among the other just news that the publication of the year's accounts brought to farmers was the information to the effect that the subsidy on ground limestone is to be reduced by 4s. per ton.

While we have since 1951 experienced over 3,000 tons ground limestone to this country there nevertheless are many countries where its application is still a thing of the future. The ground limestone is one of our best natural investments and its worth reflected in the ability of farmers to provide the total requirements of feeding for livestock and yields and the general improvement of our livestock.

Against this the January issue of the official Department of Agriculture Bulletin showed that

in 1957 the application of ground limestone in Longford decreased by 27% by 14% in Mayo; 15% in Roscommon; 13% in Westmeath and 7.5% in Wicklow.

Commenting on these figures last January, the NFA declared them to be a reflection of the depressed farming conditions and the consequent lack of farmer purchasing power in those counties.

The reduction of the subsidy will only further aggravate a serious situation regarding soil fertility and acidity in those areas and must bring in its wake a further low ring of standards of farmer income and general husbandry.

Surely this policy is nothing short of national suicide. If the ground limestone scheme has proven to be a worth-while national investment in the past there is no logical reason why it should cease to be in the future.

#### NFA WILL MEET THE TAOISEACH

The Taoiseach will meet the President and Vice-Presidents of the NFA at 11.30 on Thursday, March 13.

The present crisis in agriculture will be discussed with particular reference to the prices of wheat, milk, pigs, the progress of the TB Eradication Scheme and the "double byre grant."

The NFA has prepared a detailed policy for each commodity and hopes that as a result of this meeting, a policy for the agricultural industry will be undertaken by our present administration.

#### NEW ORDER (Transit of Animals Order, 1927 (Swine Fever) (Amendment) Order, 1958)

This provides as from the 10th March, 1958, that

(1) every road vehicle employed for the transport of pigs must be disinfected as soon as practicable after pigs are carried;

(2) pigs must not be placed in a vehicle that has not been disinfected and disinfected beforehand; and

(3) every person who feeds, hauls or carries pigs in the movement of pigs with the order and will be liable to the penalties laid down in the Diseases of Animals Act for non-compliance.

M.B. Railway transport is already covered by existing regulations.

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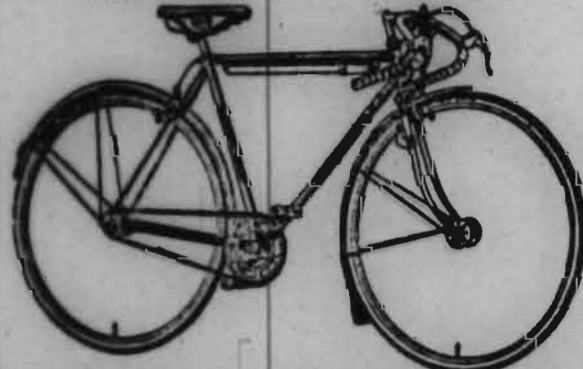

Ground Limestone Transport Subsidy Scheme

The American Grant County Fund allocation from which the Ground Limestone Subsidy Scheme has been financed since March, 1955, has been exhausted, and the full cost of the scheme for the current financial year is £730,000, is now being borne by the Exchequer. In view of the success of the Scheme and the urgent need for restoring the lime status of the soil over a large area of the country, the Minister has decided to continue the Subsidy Scheme but on a modified basis as from the 1st June next.

Accordingly, as from that date, approved limestone producers under the scheme will be required to contribute four shillings a ton towards the cost of transport, representing approximately one-third of the existing cost. The conditions regarding maximum distances in respect of which transport subsidy will be payable will continue as at present.
