Prizewinning Author has Waterford connections

It was an all-Irish affair at Dublin's Shelbourne Hotel when the Minister for Education, Mr. Leo MacBride, presented the Club Leabhar prize of £50 to 23-year-old Risteard de Paor. It was the biggest prize ever won by a writer in Irish—and is the Blue Ribband of Irish writing. It had been only once before and then it was divided between two writers.

Richard de Paor, eldest son of the late J. J. Power, Ulster-born, was the brother of P. J. Power, C.C. Ring, and brother-in-law of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Power, Graingerstown, where he spent his holidays.

The Minister paid tribute to Risteard de Paor and said that he was a young man who has earned all his Irish hard way. He studied at the B.N. Naas and later, when his father died, at C.B.S. Synges St., Dublin. He went to University College Dublin where he took a degree in Commerce and Public Administration. Then he went to Trinity College where he graduated with honours in Modern Languages. While there he even edited the College Magazine. This was not his first ready for an Irish work, the Minister continued. His first story was broadcast when he was 19, and he had already won prizes for his stories and plays. He has had a play performed at the Abbey and another play which won the O'Riachtas last November shortly be performed at the Abbey Theatre.

The prizewinning book "Apple of the Trectop" which you will see in its wrapper as Clil Barran O'Griagain is about a summer and a winter spent in the Irish speaking peoples of the West as seen by the eyes of a Dubliner. Two of the three books which make up the book are the best of some of the best writing and in fact it was better than anything he ever wrote. The cover is designed by a friend of the author's—Michael MacDonnair—the famous Irish painter.

Eight men are kept in regular employment there while a total of 9 lorries and their drivers are engaged in transporting the lime all over the county.

With Rev. John Murphy, C.C., Ballinacoola, and Mr. Eddie Spratt, M.I.A.A., I was invited to look over the industry recently and I would like to place on record that I was very greatly impressed by everything I saw there. The seven years old industry has done much for the district in which it is and for the county as a whole. The only thing I am sorry for is that we have not many more industries of its kind... industries that are in alliance with agriculture... industries in which men are prepared to work with their employers and not just for them. In Whitechurch these days they work from 8 in the morning to 12 at night and turn out approximately 2,000 tons of ground limestone a week.

With an excavator, a 4 dumpers, 2 mills, a powerful breaker and a conveyor system that is fascinating to watch in motion, efficiency is certainly the key-note... and indeed, it is obvious that fully appreciate the great value of ground limestone—which, in a short few years, has done so much for the farmer and the nation as a whole.

There was nothing unusual about all this in the eyes of those working at the quarries of Agricultural Limestone Ltd. in Whitechurch—one of the busiest local industries and certainly one of the best.

Strange as it may seem, that while the directors of this business are kept busy in their Dublin headquarters, the County Waterford enterprise is run by a woman—Miss Margaret Lohy, the secretary who certainly shows what a willingness to work can do for any industry. And it is well worth noting here that this same spirit of taking an interest in one's work is very much to the forefront in Whitechurch. ESSENTIAL FOR WELLBEING OF TOWN Support Local Transport Industry!

At a meeting of the above held on Friday, 21st inst., Mr. T. Tyrrell, joint sec., said in the course of his address: It is an obvious waste of time for the O'Riachtas to enact legislation and then fail to ensure that it is effectively administered.

I refer, continued Mr. Tyrrell, to the proposed new Transport Bill and the failure of the Road Traffic Act of 1933 to curb illegal haulage which has been, to a large extent, the cause of the serious difficulties in which the public transport undertakings find themselves today.

The position has been seriously aggravated in the last two years by the numerous Northern Ireland registered lorries which are consistently hauling livestock from the Republic to Northern Ireland. Obviously much of this haulage to the Border is for reward and therefore illegal. Instances of these lorries operating for reward entirely within the 26 counties have already come to notice.

Unlicensed lorry operators registered within the Republic are freely hauling livestock and goods for reward while the con-

veyance of passengers for reward in commercially taxed goods vehicles appears to be an accepted means of supplementing the earnings of the drivers and owners of such vehicles. Many of these lorries and vans are not covered by insurance for the carriage of passengers and in no case does the law permit of the carriage of fare-paying passengers in them.

If any measure of success is to be achieved in eliminating illegal haulage, continued Mr. Tyrrell, this Association is of opinion that at least two mobile Garda Officers should be appointed in each Chief Garda Superintendent's area whose sole duties would be the enforcement of road transport legislation. To assist them in their work new legislation should provide for the registered owners' names and addresses to be clearly shown on all commercial vehicles.

To allow legislation to be flouted only brings the law into disrepute and is bad for all concerned. While some departments ensure that the law is carried out rigorously, where their finances are affected, transport appears to be left a free for all. Should illegal haulage be allowed to continue on its present scale the country's difficulties will increase in the effort to retain the present co-ordinated public transport system.

Mr. P. Ormond, Stationmaster, Dungarvan, presided and said it was essential for the wellbeing of the town and district of Dungarvan that the rail services should get the support of the traders and firms in order to ensure the maintenance of a public transport service. He further pointed out that labour here was there any financial benefit from them to the town. He concluded by appealing to the townspeople to support their local transport industry—namely C.T.E.

Cappoquin Master Hapless

Avanmore

TO say that defeated Avanmore were big disappointment to more than their own immediate supporters is no disparagement of the hurling that harked Cappoquin's clearcut and very convincing victory in the opening round of the Sargent Cup at the Castle Farm, Lismore, on Sunday last.

The holders of the trophy, even without such customary pillars as Mickey O'Connor, Tom Coffey, Billy Conroy and Mickey Fraher turned in a performance that merited every one of the seven points they had to spare over an Avanmore fifteen that never looked more than a typical everyday selection of individuals.

What good hurling there was—and in the main it was distinctly start-of-the-season farming—was more than made up for by more accomplished winners. Despite the shortcomings of the opposition, Cappoquin's display was still very creditable. The men from the Corcoran played a game that was sound and methodical; they were yards faster to the ball and their ground hurling was much more effective than the lift and strike gambit of the hosts. On the day's play there was no doubt about the better fifteen.

And the contributions of newcomers Meskill and Kelleher must have made victory all the sweeter for Cappoquin folk. The left-handed Meskill had a really capital hour in the half line of action and there was no more effective forward on view than Maurice Kelleher, who must have staged a strong claim for a berth on the minor inter-county team.

Liam Dwyer, ably flanked by Neal Mason and Jimmy Lacey, was a dominate figure at full-back and O'Donoghue once again proved a most effective centre. Around this quartette Cappoquin would appear to have the nucleus of a first-class rearguard.

Further afield Jim Sargent was the key man. In fact when the winners momentarily tended to tangle in the initial stages it was the veteran who showed the way with a masterly and lengthy drives goalwards.

Although by no means the men they can be, Mick Lacey, Tom Longeran and Eddie Contler were also conspicuous in hammering out a Cappoquin victory.

Avanmore's best period was in the opening quarter, during which the half backs and mid-fielders exerted a brief stranglehold on the exchanges. The forwards never combined, however, and the winners' rearguard was not in consequence greatly perturbed to keep in the hunt. When Avanmore, who enjoyed the benefit of a considerable breeze, could show no more than a paltry 2-2 at the break, the result was already a foregone conclusion.

On the change of ends, Cappoquin, as expected forged ahead and though the losers did rally to snatch an opportunist goal ten minutes from time, had retained a commanding position when Tommy Geary, of the Shamrocks' club, called a halt to hostilities.

Both sides deserve a vote of congratulations for the valiant manner in which they endeavoured to overcome the adverse, article-like conditions in which the issue was fought out. The losers—it's unlikely that they will be such a disjointed combination when the championship gets under way—were best served by Tony Dwyer, Roger Ryan, Tom Linnen, Frank Corcoran and Jim Crowley.

Co. Libraries Committee

A meeting of the Co. Waterford Libraries Committee held in the Court House, Dungarvan, on Tuesday 18th inst. Present: Ven. Archdeacon Power, P.P., V.F., chairman; Very Rev. DELEGATE TO CONFERENCE

Appointment of delegate to accompany Co. Librarian to the annual library conference to be held at Tralee, 26th to 30th May, 1958.

There was a very lengthy discussion on this item. Mr. N. Walsh, said that in the interests of economy he was not in favour of sending a delegate, furthermore he was not convinced that such conferences served any very useful purpose.

The Co. Librarian stated that in view of the present over-all situation as effecting library services he thought it was more necessary than ever to send delegates who could give committee's opinions and strive to bring pressure to bear on the Library Council with a view to obtaining grants in aid to expand library services.

Some members of the committee were of opinion that there was no point in recommending that delegate be sent if the County Council afterwards refused to sanction it.

Thomas Breathnach said that Waterford must be a very poor county indeed if they could not afford to send a delegate with the Co. Librarian.

Asked what expenses were involved the Co. Librarian stated £28.49 and remarked that it was an annual affair only and that they had sent a delegate for a long number of years.

It was finally decided not to appoint a delegate to accompany the Co. Librarian.

LIBRARY PROVISION FOR BONMAHON

The Co. Librarian stated that it had been found difficult to meet Library requirements for Bonmahon consequent on the pending transfer of school premises. The main crux was difficulty of administration. It was decided to defer the matter until such time as the financial position was clarified.

PROPOSED CUT IN LIBRARY ESTIMATES

The proposal by the County Council to reduce the estimates, as submitted by the Libraries Committee by the sum of £1,900 (inclusive of £400 already deducted), was considered at a meeting of the Co. Librarian emphasized the grave effect which the adoption of the proposal would have on the efficiency of the service. The amount available for books, should the proposal be adopted would provide only one-fifth of the number of volumes purchased during the current year, which in itself was inadequate to permit required revision of stock.

Mr. N. Walsh asked what effect the lack of adequate funds for book-purchase would have on changes of stock in branches and centres.

The Co. Librarian replied that no new current publications would be available and that all changes would consist of older stock.

In reply to M. J. McCarthy, the Co. Librarian said that the average price of the book was now 9/3 as compared to 8/9 last year.

The Co. Librarian stated that if such a cut were made he would have to adjust his policy accordingly and if borrowers were not satisfied they could then lodge complaints with their county councillors, but he hoped that things would not come to such a pass.

Strictly on form, Dungarvan would appear to have the edge on this occasion. But, then, form can prove a most disconcerting matter at this time of year. Who may, it's unlikely that the issue will be resolved without a tremendous struggle.

The game should certainly provide followers with a definite line on the likely championship prospects of both sides.

There is a distinct senior look about the selections named for the county junior trial. Of the two, the Western side, which will in all probability be built around Kitrossanty and Stradbally, would appear the more formidable.

This game, which will be under the charge of Tom Cunningham, is timed for 3.30 p.m.
