Irish Countrywomens Association

THE newly formed Town Guild of the Irish Countrywomens' Association in Dungarvan held its first meeting in Lawlor's Hotel recently. There was a good attendance in spite of inclement weather, and many names were submitted, giving promise of a large membership.

Miss A. Roche of Cappoquin (Area Organizer) welcomed these present and introduced Miss P. O'Connell (Chief Area Organizer) who gave a very interesting talk on the aims, achievements and general activities of the organization. She pointed out the international sisterhood "The Associated Countrywomens of the World" the I.C.A. belongs to, all springing from the courage and initiative of a Canadian woman and her few neighbours who began this now immense universal development among women of every race and creed. Its chief aim is to unite and help women (in the lonely country parts particularly) to have companionship in work and thought and assist them with their problems, and to meet socially at least once a month.

The success of these meetings and functions and the organization in general lies in the informal atmosphere, there are no hard and fast rules; work and crafts, lectures and demonstrations are chosen by the members and there is the inevitable cup of tea over which to discuss views and exchange ideas.

Here in Ireland great strides have been made since the association's foundation in the early part of the century, and now the Government is subsidising some of the expenses, up to £27,000.

A member's pet theory of assistance in improving life for the modern Irish woman can be aired and debated, and if it is good it will be sent through the Association's Council channels even to the Dail if necessary; a great deal has been accomplished through the years in this manner.

Any member who can evoke the interest of a few more in any subject, art or craft can benefit by special lectures or classes, or if they prefer, can just look on.

The member's expenses are negligible, the advantages exceptional, and there are no obligations; for those interested there are wonderful opportunities for short courses in the beautiful up-to-date Training College "An Grianna" at Termonfechin, Co. Louth.

Before terminating a provisional secretary was nominated prior to the election of officers at the next meeting on April 28th.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE MRS. CULLINANE

(INSERTED BY OLD I.R.A.)

It is with much regret we announce the death of Mrs. Cullinane (Toor, Lismore), which took place at the residence of her son Mr. David Cullinane, Drogheda, Cappoquin, Mrs. Cullinane was a typical example of the grand Irish mothers, who suffered and endured so much in the fight for Irish freedom.

And who in no small measure helped to bring the struggle to a successful conclusion.

A supporter of Sinn Fein since its introduction to the district by the late Miss A. Johnson, Cappoquin, in the early years of the present century, she remained loyal to its principles to the end.

During the Black and Tan period members of the I.R.A. were always sure of a cordial welcome when they sought her help. In consequence of her husband's long absence for "men on the run" she was frequently raided by the Black and Tans and British soldiers.

After the signing of the Treaty in December 1921, she in common with her sons Eddie (who came from the United States to be present at her death bed) and Davy took the Republican side thus following in the footsteps of Cathal Brugha, Rory, Liam, Dick and Joe and consequently endured the dreadful hardships and heart-breaks of the second phase of the struggle to uphold the Republic proclaimed by the leaders of 1916.

During the Civil War her sons Eddie and Davy were active members of the I.R.A. During the big "round up" by the Free State soldiers in April 1923, in which Eamonn Lynch and Charles Keating were killed, Eddie was captured while bringing important despatches to the leaders of Dail Eireann who were to meet in the Nire Valley. He was subsequently brought to Cork prison, where he participated in the hunger strike which lasted for a prolonged period. He was released in December 1923 and the following year he went to the U.S.A. where he has been domiciled since.

Members of the Old I.R.A. from all over West Waterford attended in large numbers at the funeral to show their appreciation of a noble woman who had helped them in no small way in the War of Independence. Ar deis Lamh De go raibh a-bannam.

Successful Aghlish Gymkhana

FEATURED by glorious weather and a standard of jumping that was nothing short of magnificent, the revived gymkhana sponsored by the local Harriers club treated an exceptionally big audience to a grand afternoon's entertainment at Aghlish on Sunday last.

Staged in a scenic setting amidst the sylvan surroundings of the Blackwater countryside, the various competitions—open, novice and confined novice—attracted the grand overall total of fifty-three entries.

The open competition, as expected, provided the real high lights. After the preliminary rounds and a most exacting jump off, Mr. J. B. Casey's Hilary and Mr. J. Waide's Dundrum, with unblemished records, sportingly divided the first prize. The standard of jumping in this event bettered anything seen in West Waterford for years back.

RATES UP 5d. IN THE £ Housing Blunder Costs 3½d.

DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL adopted a rate of 43/- in the £ for the coming year... an increase of 5d on last year's figure... and a reduction of 2d in the Manager's estimate. The 1958 rate of 43/- is, however, the same as that of 1956. The undemolished houses will cost the ratepayers of Dungarvan £165 this year... or 3½d of the £ increase burdened on them.

The meeting proved a quiet affair in which members were slow to offer any suggestions. No proposal to effect a saving was made and the reduction of 2d in the Manager's estimate was brought about simply because the Manager agreed to work within the figure of 43/- in the £ with the hope of effecting some economies.

The swimming pool was discussed at length when it was stated by the Manager, Mr. S. J. Moynihan, that he would be very glad if some local club did take it over and save the ratepayers of the town a good deal of money. When members protested against his proposal to discontinue the employment of caretakers at the pool because of the danger of children getting into difficulties there, he suggested that there might be a way of dealing with that without having to employ caretakers. The running of the swimming pool was, he stated, a very big drain on the council's finances from which there was no reasonable return.

UNFAIR
Mr. Tom Lee said that they should put it up for tender and whatever they would get for it would be better than paying men to look after it. As it was, it was very unfair to ask the ratepayers to shoulder the loss. Mr. Lee reminded the council that he proposed that the pool should be opened for use over a year ago but none would listen to him.

Mr. R. Keane said that the council had done a fair job in building the pool and there should be some club prepared to take on the responsibility of running it. He stated that he would like to be sure that children using the pool would be safeguarded and some arrangement should be made to take on these lines. The life of one child lost, he added, would be far more expensive than the cost of any number of caretakers.

An effort will be made to interest a local club in taking over the responsibility of running the swimming pool and failing this, the matter will have the attention of the Manager who will make an arrangement whereby the pool will be opened for a few hours daily only.

Record Entry and Time

PROMOTED by the local athletic and cycling club the 50 kilos Munster championship held over the usual circuit on Sunday last was once again an outstanding success and must be now regarded as one of the most colourful and spectacular events in the sporting calendar of the Old Boro.

It attracted a record entry of 55 riders and the time of 1h. 20 mins. 7 secs was the fastest ever returned for the distance.

Right from the start a fast pace was maintained. Numerous attempts were made to break away but all these were nullified by the fast moving bunch. Early on four riders crashed, several others retired with mechanical trouble and some were just "burned off" by the high speed.

Entering the last lap there were still about 35 riders left. In the final sprint Irish race champions Frank O'Sullivan (Fermoy) once again came with his usual devastating finishing burst to win from Malacky Walsh (St. Finbarrs) with Frank Leahy (Ballymore) in third position.

The lap prize, which speeded up the race considerably, was won by Mick Slattery (Clonmel). St. Finbarrs retained the team prize. The race produced its usual quota of thrills, spills and drama.

Just before the final sprint M. Woods (Carrick Wheelers) crashed and was removed to hospital but fortunately his injuries were not serious. T. Lavin finished with his front wheel almost completely seized up.

Congrats to the three local riders Noel Reid, J. Harby and J. Kearney on putting up such a splendid performance.

J. Kearney retired with a puncture in the early stages, but Reid and Harby finished right at the head of the bunch.

MCCARTHY, the well known East Cork amateur rider who had been on the Red Gillette in the Hunters' Chase at Mallow on Easter Saturday, had a very successful day at the West Waterford Hunt's Point-to-Point fixture at Limore, on Monday, as he rode three winners—Gleaning, Pace Better Luck II and Cottage Pet—but he had a big disappointment at the same time when Red Gillette was beaten by Loran in the lightweight race.

The meeting was a particularly successful one, for the afternoon was sunny and warm and a very big crowd attended. Fields were also very good and there were some fine finishes.

Best race of the day was the lightweight for which a strong field was saddled. Loran and Red Gillette shared favouritism. Victory went to Loran, the mount of Mr. C. Vaughan, which is due to run at Panchestown, Co. Wick, with Red Gillette and Isabella, had a great set-to over the last mile, each being shouted in turn. Mr. Vaughan, however, got every ounce out of Loran and in the race up to the post from the last fence gained the advantage to win by two lengths. country. No doubt they will regret it in the years ahead—when to late.

STILL SOME HOPE If about 56 of the non-acceptors respond to the appeal made by the clergy on Sunday last there is still hope that work on the scheme will be resumed. This would be welcome news, especially for those who are eager for the scheme and for the big number of workers who have been unemployed as a result of the withdrawals.

VIEW OF THE PEOPLE Asked for his view on the prospect of the abandonment of the scheme, a former-acceptor said that the news had come as a bombshell to him as he required electricity badly and had been waiting for it for many years. He could not understand the attitude of those who would not take electricity as it was the cheapest and best form of light, heat and power and would make life easier for all.

A worker-acceptor expressed the view that non-acceptors had acted against the best interests of themselves and the general public. It would be in the best interests of all cottiers and workers to support the scheme. A member of the local organising committee said that all their work seemed to have gone for naught because of the fact that a small minority failed to co-operate. A few who were not taking electricity themselves went as far to influence others to adopt a similar attitude. They were thankful to all who had worked so hard in a futile attempt to make the scheme a success.

An E.S.B. official stated that those who had signed acceptance forms and then withdrawn had deceived the E.S.B. and had done a lot of damage to the scheme.

Asked to comment on the situation a small holder in the Ardmore area, who installed electricity some years ago, remarked: "They are foolish, they do not know what they are missing."

A Ballynacorney farmer who has long experience of the advantages of electricity commented: "The farmer who refuses electricity is acting foolishly and against his own interests. Electricity is not cheap but it is cheaper and better than other forms of light, heat and power. I would not be without electricity for anything—it has made life easier and brighter for us all."

A dismissed worker had this to say: "If the scheme is not resumed some of the dismissed workers have no alternative but the emigration ship. Had 80% of the people taken electricity we would be assured of 12 months continuous work. We are terribly disappointed."

And finally a non-acceptor stated: "I do not want electricity myself and I do not see why I should take it to oblige others."

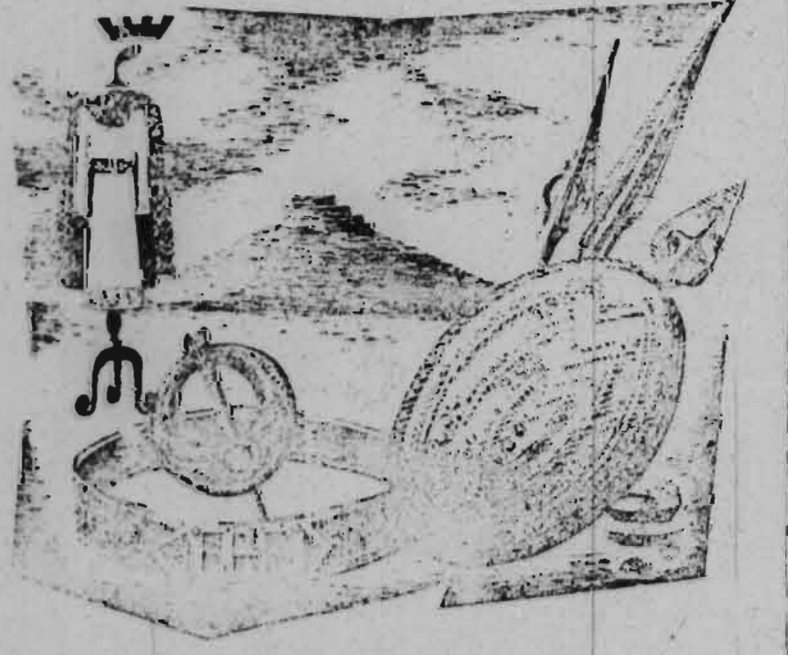
