Fear Mor wins decree

SEQUEL TO ARDMORE ACCIDENT

Mr. Seamus O'Hara, plaintiff in a claim against the defendant, August Fear Mor, who stated in evidence that he was driving on Ardmore road in Dungarvan on the evening when he was approaching Monea Cross about 11.15 p.m. outside Ardmore. It was a bright evening and visibility was good. Witness stated that he was going at a reasonable speed as he took the bend over on to the Dungarvan road when suddenly he saw a small car coming toward him on his wrong side at a fast rate. Witness stated that his instinct was to stay on his own side of the road but with the van coming towards him on its wrong side he had no time to give the car any great consideration. Witness slowed down and pulled up to his right slightly but collision occurred. He heard a sharp bang being sounded and he fell in on his own side. Witness stated that he got out of the car and saw the driver of the van who had received a bump on the forehead. Witness offered to get the driver to hospital but he declined. Witness added that he removed his car in front of the car.

TRAGIC PASSING OF LOCAL BOY IN ENGLAND

LATE MR. KEVIN O'BRIEN
A wave of sorrow spread over Dungarvan and district on Friday last when the news arrived of the tragic death of Kevin, 20-year-old third son of Edward and Mrs. O'Brien, Marian Place (Old Hospital Road) Dungarvan. A member of the well-known Dungarvan firm of building contractors, deceased had been in Horden, Co. Durham, England for some time helping his brother-in-law, Mr. J. P. Coatsman, Hudson Ave., do. in the sea-coal business. With two other men, Kevin was loading "duff" coal into a truck when part of the duff slipped and he was buried by tons of coal and rubble. Though he was extricated in a few minutes his life was found to be extinct. His two work mates escaped, one of them being buried up to his thighs. Following the inquest, the remains were brought home via Larne and arrived at Abbeyside (C.C. Abbeyside) on Tuesday evening at 9 p.m. followed by an interment cortege. They were received and blessed at St. Church's by Rev. Fr. Walsh, C.C. assisted by Very Rev. Fr. Roche, P.P. Following Requiem Mass celebrated by Rev. Fr. Walsh on Wednesday morning, the funeral took place in Modeligo Cemetery where interment was made in the presence of another huge gathering of mourners and friends. Rev. Fr. Hally, P.P. Modeligo and Rev. Fr. Michael Walsh, C.C. Abbeyside, officiated at the graveside. The chief mourners were - Mr. and Mrs. E. O'Brien (parents); Vincent, John, Eddie and Paddy (brothers); Mrs. F. HURRIERS TAKE THE FIELD Battle for Blue Riband opens

Although the senior hurling championship is an almost out and out affair these days, the colorful character of the competition has moulded since its inception sixty-one years ago has earned the annual battle for the blue ribbon a niche all of its own in the local Gaelic calendar. It remains an outstanding attraction, despite the tendency to become a one-horse race in recent times and the feeling is abroad that the current campaign, which commences on Sunday next, will produce the traditional brand of fireworks before the time-old issue is finally resolved for another year.

True it is that Mount Sion's tenure of the throne appears in no immediate danger of termination. Yet Sunday's round one programme features men who are ready, willing and capable of throwing down a serious challenge to the Mounty champions should the opportunity present itself.

The appearance of a couple of newly-formed group teams, powerful-looking combinations, they are too, and the fact that the established club sides will in a sense be endeavouring to consolidate their status has, of itself, added to the public interest to a greater than usual degree in the day's proceedings.

But the title-race has not by any means the field to itself for in Cappanagh the local Peasants committee have arranged a right attractive hurling-cum-football tournament programme for the Sportsfield.

Not taken lightly
The meeting of Abbeyside and the Meaghers—a Gael Og St. John's Ferrybank set-up—will in all probability provide the highlights of Waterford's double featured programme.

That Abbeyside are not taking the Eastern challenge lightly is manifested by the strenuous course of training Johnny Hogan and his colleagues have undergone in preparation for Sunday's test.

Big things are expected from the city combination, which has shown some of its best hurling in its preparation.

While the recent feats of Gael Og are largely responsible for the belief that Meaghers will go places this year, the feeling is also nurtured by the knowledge that even the most moderate of city junior clubs invariably contain a fair quota of potential senior material. The men behind Meaghers and after a couple of testing trials they should know just where they stand, are confident that they can muster a side capable of handling the village representatives.

The regular view is that the Abbeyside's teamwork and spirit will prove decisive. In the village camp, however, Meaghers are rated highly and the feeling prevails in recent outings and the general belief is that who will win the survivors will have to step up immeasurably on present form if they are to retain a decisive interest in the decisive rounds of the competition.

Avonmore, though their Sargent Cup form fell short of expectations, are accepted as favorites and are well equipped of the junior combinations. It is even held in some quarters that once they have hammered out a proper understanding and this will be their fourth outing together—these men of Ballyduff, Tourin and Lismore could develop into Mount Sion's outstanding challengers.

SALMON FISHING PROBLEM

For some time past salmon fishermen in this area have been complaining that the scarcity of fish is largely due to the lack of protection on the fresh water rivers during the spawning season in an effort to find a solution to the complaint Mr. Curran M.C. submitted the fishermen's complaint to Mr. Kevin Boland, Minister for Deontol. That as a result the Minister for Lands and Fisheries should give attention to the matter. The Ministers' Private Secretary has replied as follows:—Mr. Boland has received your letter of 30 April regarding the position of salmon fishing on the Blackwater, Mr. Boland has asked me to tell you that Mr. E. Kings Chalmers, Minister for Lands is giving this matter of protection very close consideration and is doing all he can to eradicate the problem of poaching. Your representations in this matter will be placed before the Minister for Lands.

It is confidently hoped that the Minister will now take positive steps in the matter and that as a result this important industry will be preserved.

Protest against rents

A strong protest against the increase in rents was made at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council by Col. Tom Lee who stated that it was very unjust to slip further burdens on those who could least afford to pay them.

The majority of the council tenants affected by the increase in the Congress Villas and Catholic areas, he said, were drawing the dole, home-aid, or insurance, and certainly could not afford to meet the increase. Personally, he believed that the council would do better by effecting more cuts in the rent, he said, which would mean a lot to them now and they were paying out housing grants to people who were not entitled to them and he would protest.

Mr. J. McCarthy agreed the people referred to by Mr. Lee deserved reconsideration. Mr. Lee—We are in these houses for the past 23 years and the rents were never raised until now. All of us living there are working people with little or nothing. We would have been in a better position to meet any increase some time ago when we had jobs but now we have nothing.

The Chairman, Alderman Tom Kyne, T.D. said that as far as he was concerned, Col. Lee was pushing an open door in appealing to him. He had opposed the Manager's proposal from the start but when the decision went through, it went on the understanding that the Manager would give full consideration to those who could not afford an increase. The Town Clerk Mr. J. Howlett made it clear that hardship cases would not be included in the decision but was told by Mr. Lee that every tenant had received the notice of the increase. Mr. J. Hogan came before the meeting at this stage to protest against the increase stating that he was a veteran who was totally disabled and could not afford to pay the extra demand. He was told that his case would be reviewed.

After further discussion the Chairman pointed out that there were genuine cases of hardship these should be brought to the notice of the Manager for investigation. He was confident that the Manager would not propose an increase on any person who was a genuine hardship case.
