## POPULAR FIGURE PASSES ON

LATE MR. M.L.  
RONAYNE  
COONEN, AGLISH

The announcement of the death which took place in the District Hospital, Dungarvan of Mr. Michael Ronayne, Coonen, Aglish, occasioned the passing of a life and genuine regret throughout a wide area of West Waterford last week-end.

A man of many exemplarily characteristics and a universal favourite, the late Mr. Ronayne who had been in failing health for some weeks back, passed away peacefully on the morning of Friday the 20th.

During his younger days the deceased was actively associated with the struggle for National Independence and as a result was interned for a time in Ballykinlar. The attendance at the removal of the remains to Aglish Parish Church and again at the interment, which took place in the adjoining cemetery, included several fellow-veterans of that fateful era. The coffin, which was draped with the Tricolour was borne to the graveside by the local members of the deceased's old company, I.R.A. and the last post was sounded by Mr. M.L. Terry, Dungarvan.

Mr. P. D. Slattery, C.C. received and blessed the remains at the Church Gates in the presence of a large attendance of friends and sympathisers on Friday evening. Subsequent to the celebration of Masses of Requiem burial took place on Sunday morning. Rev. D. Slattery, c.c. again officiated.

The chief mourners to whom deepest sympathy is extended in their great loss, were Mrs. Ronayne (widow), Patrick and William Ronayne (sons), Mrs. Dawley and Mrs. Scott, (daughters), William Ronayne (brother). As a mark of respect, the senior championship match, Geraldines v Dunhill arranged for Kill was postponed.

## LABOUR PARTY ORGANISE

A meeting of the Ballymacarberry Branch of the Labour Party was held in Dooney's Hall on the 30th May and was well attended. A number of items were discussed including wages and means of bringing employment to the area.

Deputy Kyne was requested to make representations to have water taps placed at Ballymacree cross, Fourmilewater, Newtown, and Millstreet.

The following committee was elected. Chairman P.J. Grant, Sec. Joe Gillman, P. Ormond, J. Keane, Terry Byrne, J. Norris, Ed. Markley and Wm. Grant.

Deputy Kyne addressing the meeting stated that the unemployment position in the district was the worst for the past 10 years. He could offer no hope of any improvement in the near future. Between the loss of the road grants and the reduction of the Managers estimate by the Co. Council (which of course had to be met out of a cut on roads) he estimated that some 240 workers less would be employed by the Council this year as compared with last year. The workers formerly employed by the Co. Council would be well advised to check up on the voting for the striking of the rates and they could then see who it was had to accept responsibility for the present position.

Deputy Kyne appealed to the members present to strengthen the Labour Branch and reorganise the Union Branch. Without organisation workers were open to be exploited by any one who came along.

Mr. P. J. Breen P.C. also spoke.

# The swimming pool nobody wants

**"AN AWFUL DILEMMA"**  
WATERFORD County Manager, Mr. S. J. Moynihan, is in a strange dilemma at present because of the swimming pool nobody wants. Situated along the beautiful seashore of Dungarvan, it was built with the aid of Government grants at a cost of approximately £10,000.

Now the Urban Council members do not want it; the ratepayers say it is a burden they cannot afford; the local Swimming Club will not take it over and the County Manager is left with the awful dilemma of deciding what to do with it.

The Council and the Manager say: "even though we increased the charge for the use of the pool the revenue was only a fraction of the cost of keeping it open." This summer, a caretaker will not be appointed. Bodily repairs will not be carried out and the pool remains empty and deserted.

"The suggestion was made that we should have a caretaker," said Miss Mary Hill, hon. Sec. of the local swimming pool, "but this is impossible. We have no funds and we certainly could not shoulder such a big responsibility. It seems an awful shame that this should happen but there seems to be no solution to the problem."

### "Could be a Danger"

Mary Hill, who last year brought about a revival of the club with the aid of Miss Eleanor Power, now in Dublin, is a former champion swimmer. "I am really sorry that such a position should arise," she told me. "I realise the operation of the pool has been losing money and I feel the Urban Council should have charged everyone using the place whether they went in for a swim or not. It is done elsewhere and why not Dungarvan?"

"If a caretaker is not appointed, the pool cannot be opened this summer. A part-time man will not suit such a task because the water must be changed with the tides and if this is not done, the pool would become a terrible danger to public health. Apart from that, a caretaker is essential for the swimmers. It is a sad picture indeed - a dilemma if ever there was one."

"To keep it open, it must pay for itself - this has been tried and it failed. There is no in-between as I have explained. . . yet close it completely and the pool becomes an eye-sore."

### Still a Hope

Now, the Urban Council have announced that they would like to hear from people who would be prepared to supervise the swimming pool for certain hours on Sundays. . . but there is no mention of the other six days of the week. I understand that during the remainder of the week it is hoped to have the pool supervised for a few hours in the days by employees of the Council. As the Acting Town Clerk

WHILE the belief is almost universal that Waterford will open their defence of the Munster hurling crown on a comfortably-winning note-Kerry's prospects are summarily dismissed by the average follower of the game-the Deise selectors are striving to ensure that over confidence will not undermine the enjoyment of Sunday's journey into the Kingdom.

The men who steer the county's hurling destiny, so to say, are not unmindful of the fate that befell a Kerry football team under more or less identical circumstances twelve months ago, hence the trepidation with which they approach the Kenmare engagement.

That the Kerry challenge is being respectfully treated is also indicated by the decision to bring full-forward John Kiely over from London for the game.

Although I feel the Waterford team falls a long way short of the side which did duty twelve months ago, it goes without saying that the plucky but inexperienced Kingdom will find the odds stacked heavily against them.

Kerry, no more than moderate at the best of times, will find it well nigh impossible to find adequate replacements for the accomplished Hennessys who for so long formed the backbone of the team and the former Munster substitute, Billy McCarthy.

Just how seriously perturbed Waterford mentors are about the old goalkeeping problem is illustrated by the sensational switch which gives John Barron, the best corner back in the game and by a long shot our most consistent defender, the number one jersey. Regardless of how well the De La Salle man performs between the posts, the defence can ill afford his absence from out-field duty.

Joe Harney, who has been on the fringe of the team for the past year or so, is a reasonably dependable defender, 'tis true, but Barron's new placing will not be to the advantage of a defence that has already lost Jackie Condon, who is presently nursing an ankle injury.

Indeed, I cannot see the rearguard as constituted for Sundays test coming out of Munster again. But then the feeling is that Barron will be restored to his customary berth and that Harney and Condon will be available for selection further a-field when the selectors sit to name the provincial final line out, assuming of course, that we come through the Kerry engagement.

Mid-field and attack is the same as finished the All-Ireland last September, the switch of Walsh and Guinan excepted, though the claims of Ballygunner's Sean Curran for a half-forward post were thought to be unassailable by many followers who know their hurling.

The haphazard hurling of Tipperary and Cork to-date has strengthened the conviction that the Munster crown will remain with the county of Forlidge for 1958. But, while the present set-up should not be greatly extended to prevail on Sunday, I harbour a feeling that changes will be the order in defence and attack for July 6th.

Let it be said though that the outlook is considerably more encouraging than it was twelve months ago.

Assuming that the available talent will be utilised to the best possible advantage as it undoubtedly will we should again gain grace Croke Park on September Sunday.

Glenn na Deise, who trailed by four points at the halfway stage, made all the second half running to run out clear cut winners over De La Salle in the opening round of the senior hurling championship on Sunday afternoon.

The winners scored 6-2 in reply to the city side's 2-1 in the one-sided second period.
