WATERFORD WILL FIGHT FOR ITS ORTHOPAEDIC UNIT

Another Transfer Mooted

Solution of the 'Fox Racket'

Members of Waterford Hunt and representatives of Waterford Sheepbreeders' Association attended a meeting of the County Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan on Tuesday to discuss ways and means of ending the racket that is being operated in the fox destruction scheme sponsored by the Committee of Agriculture and the Sheepbreeders' Association.

At the June meeting of the County Committee, members of the Waterford Hunt complained that in the lowland areas coxes were being destroyed at an alarming rate and were being taken into the mountain areas where those responsible for killing them were paid the bounty of 5/- provided by the Committee of Agriculture plus 3/- put up by the sheepbreeders.

Mr. Robin Hunt of Waterford Hunt informed the members of the county committee of agriculture in Dungarvan that an agreement had been reached with the sheepbreeders on a scheme which they hoped would put an end to the racket.

Explaining this, Mr. B. J. Conboy stated that in future when a fox was killed it would be taken to a member of the Sheepbreeders' Association in the first instance. This member would remove the tail and sign the bounty-form. The fox would then be taken to the local Garda Station to comply with the Committee of Agriculture regulations. It would also be necessary for all applicants for the bounty to be approved by the local branch of the Sheepbreeders' Association in their own areas. People from outside areas would not be considered.

Mr. N. Quailly stated that the sheepbreeders were in full agreement with this scheme.

Mr. N. Walsh - It certainly seemed to be a practical solution. U.A.O. (Mr. P. Conroy). When a man is claiming the 5/- from the committee of agriculture, only then will be no onus on him, him to go to a member of the sheepbreeders' association.

In the course of further discussion it was stated by a member of the deputation that a man in the Leamybrien area was reported to be killing something like 40 or 50 foxes a year.

Mr. R. Dowd stated that by cutting the tail of the fox the skin would be of little commercial value.

He was told that as matters were at the present time the fox-skin was of no commercial value.

The committee approved the agreement reached by the two interested parties.

On the proposal of Mr. William Dower Waterford County Committee of Agriculture at their meeting in Dungarvan on Tuesday, unanimously called on the Dept. to acquire the lands of the Dromona Estate, Villierstown for the purpose of providing seedlings for forestry purposes.

The proposal was seconded by the Chairman, Mr. M. Hartley.

The committee also called on the Dept. to set up a marketing board to deal exclusively with finding markets outside the county for agricultural produce in which there would be representatives of all farming bodies and which would have agents in outside counties.

Mr. S. Quigley - "The trouble with these boards is you have too many Civil Servants on them."

Mr. John Fahey who proposed the resolution stated that he had this in mind when he asked to have all farming bodies represented on it.

Mr. R. Dowd agreed it was worth while stating that there was no point in greater production if he could not have the outlet. According to reports he had read in England which could not be read from British soil, there also was a good market if it could be availed of properly.

The resolution was passed unanimously.

A deputation representing Waterford Waterford Board of Public Assistance is to call on the Minister for Health to inform him of the Board's intention to fight any proposal that is made for the transfer of the Orthopaedic Unit from Waterford to Kilkree, Kilkenny.

This was decided at a meeting of the Board on Monday night, July 21st, when Mr. Tom Langan, who was elected chairman, presided. The matter was raised by Ald. Wm. Kennedy, T.D., who spoke in very strong terms against the proposal to close down the unit in Waterford.

Ald. Kennedy stated that such a step would be a very retrograde one as one they could not stand for. There were 70 beds in the unit and two-thirds of these catered for people from the city and county of Waterford. To add to this there was, he understood, a waiting list of 300 people.

Mr. Denis Fitzpatrick Mayor of Waterford, said it appeared that the proposal was to move the orthopaedic unit to Kilkenny for the orthopaedic service.

Mr. J. A. Hynes Secretary, pointed out that Kilkenny has been in fact the administration centre.

Ald. Kennedy - The question is are we going to lose the unit and are we going to lose Dr. O'Driscoll?

Mr. Hynes - We are not going to lose Dr. O'Driscoll.

Ald. Kennedy - With such a proposal we are going to be a subsidiary to Kilkenny's orthopaedic service - Waterford with a population of 80,000 people between city and county with a population of 80,000 people stand for it anyway. I can assure you.

The Mayor spoke in support of Ald. Kennedy's views and added that they would have to take their stand immediately and fight any proposal that might be for the removal of the unit to Kilkenny.

The Manager in reply to a member stated that he presumed that when the hospital at Kilkenny was ready the orthopaedic patients in Waterford would be transferred. He believed some beds would be provided in the County Hospital in Waterford for urgent cases and a clinic would be provided.

Ald. Kennedy proposed that a request be made to the City of Waterford that it was of considerable interest to the people of the

Hospital, Waterford, into a county hospital were going on at present. He hoped to be in a position to make a full report on the matter at the next meeting of the County Council to be held in Dungarvan when all regulations should be completed.

HOSPITAL ATTENDANTS STILL WORKING 60 HOUR WEEK

Hospital attendants in County Waterford are still working 60 hours weekly. Their request for a 48 hour week which has been the subject of negotiations between A.E. AG.W. Union, Waterford Board of Assistance and the Dept. of Health for the last three years have failed to bring about a satisfactory solution to the problem.

Mr. D. Fitzpatrick, Mayor of Waterford, stated that the attendants were the worst paid workers in Ireland.

Ald. W. Kennedy agreed stating that as far as he was aware their pay amounted to £9.16.4 a fortnight.

The increase was passed.

Clashmore dispensary residence was on the agenda again when a report from the deputation on their visit to the Dept. in connection with the proposed purchase of a bungalow at Clashmore was read out. No concrete decision was arrived at apart from the Dept's suggestion that it would be better to build a new residence. However, the Board decided to get the costs of erecting a new building and dispensary for comparison with the costs of putting the bungalow into the existing residence.

The matter was discussed at the Board of Assistance in connection with the Labour Court if it would prefer to see a deputation in view of the fact that the Manager was prepared to take up with the Minister a deputation of the Board on his behalf.

A meeting of Waterford Board of Assistance in Dungarvan on Monday, an increase of 10 bob was granted to hospital attendants, male and female, ambulance drivers and porters.

Lita Roza coming to Goatenbridge
