WATERFORD FARMERS TO START CAMPAIGN FOR ..

T.B. FREE CATTLE

WATERFORD, where the incidence of T.B. in cows might be as high as 45%, was one of the big problem areas in the country, its figure being the second highest in Ireland.

This was stated by Mr. E. Cunningham, Department of Agriculture, at a meeting of representatives of farmers' organisations, co-operative creamery societies, veterinary surgeons and members of the County Committee of Agriculture held in Dungarvan last week-end to discuss bovine tuberculosis.

It was agreed that a concerted drive by the farmers themselves was the only way to rid the country of bovine tuberculosis.

Pointing out that Britain would be free of the disease by March 1961, Mr. Cunningham said that the export of once-tested cattle was a temporary measure to operate to the autumn of 1960. But to ensure the continuity of their live cattle exports, their cattle

WAGE INCREASE FOR CLERICAL STAFF

Waterford Board of Assistance, granted an increase of 10-1/2% a week to clerical workers at their meeting in Dungarvan on Monday. The proposal was moved by Col. D. Fitzpatrick, Mayor of Waterford, and seconded by Ald. Tom Kynne, T.D.

Col. Fitzpatrick said the white collar workers should get the same consideration as others. They were badly hit and had to face the same worries as those who had already been paid an increase of 10%.

Mr. N. Walsh said he was once told there were only two happy days in the life of a public representative—the day he was elected and the day he left public life—He believed it now when he saw applications galore for every agenda coming before them.

He saw big numbers of young men and women going for these jobs whenever they are advertised. They had an army of officials in the country and it was not a "cushy job" there would not be such a rush for it.

The Chairman, Mr. Tom Lannon, said the payment of increases to workers created more unemployment. He did not wish to deny a man his rights but there was a limit to the resources available.

Col. Tom Gallagher said that the real reason big numbers applied for clerical jobs was because of the grave shortage of employment. He knew of many young men in Waterford with the Leaving Certificate who were working in local factories.

Mr. Walsh said the big question worrying the ratepayers was—where would the applications for increases end—It should be remembered that one often had to be cruel to be kind. Working for the County Council, he added, is like little America to many.

As stated the increase was passed on a vote which resulted on a division of 6 to 2.

Col. Gallagher asked the Manager to meet representatives of the staff of Arkeen Chest Hospital to discuss the future of the workers there in relation to the proposed changes at that hospital.

If 50 or 60 workers are paid off, he said, the matter would be grievous for all concerned.

It was agreed to refer the matter to the Manager.

Land Difficulties Delay Youghal Bridge Project

Progress in the Youghal Bridge Project is being held up by two local landowners who are seeking what were described at exhibitor surns from the County Council.

This was revealed at Monday's meeting of Cork County Council when Mr. J. Metherway inquired about the position nine months ago, he said a deputation from the Youghal Bridge Committee was informed that only minor amendments remained to be settled. In those nine months, however, nothing seemed to have been done.

The County Manager, Mr. E. Callanan, said that the Council was now in a position to advertise for tenders provided they had reached agreement with the local landowners. "There are about 12 people involved," he continued, "and of these 12, we have reached agreement with everybody except two, and any difficulty or any delay at the moment is local."

"Within the last week, Mr. Malone, the Chief Engineer, was in Youghal continuing these negotiations and that is the position. If we can reach agreement with these two people we will be in a position to advertise. Not alone have we been in a position to do so, but we have also been in a position to do so."

Mr. Malone said the people who were at the end of their patience and they were now going to take some action themselves.

Mr. Malone suggested that the matter be left stand for another week for a further effort at negotiation.

Chairman — Youghal Bridge Committee here for the past 17 years and the day that the Youghal deputation came here we hoped that all differences between the Council and the Cork and Waterford landowners would be amicably settled. Clonea Deputation before Co. Council

Two ratepayers came before a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan on Monday to seek improvement of their roadway linking Clonea-Power and Feus stating in its present condition it was a serious danger to all those using it.

Having discussed the matter for a considerable time the Council divided on a proposal to provide the sum of £3,500 for the improvement of the road. The result was a defeat of the proposal.

Mr. Dan Kirby supported by Mr. John Cusack put forward their case stating that there was a deep hollow in the road which seemed to have gone beyond repair. They had broken several springs in their cars and the position had become so bad that hackney cars refused to travel along the road.

The 31 houses being served by the road were paying £1,700 in rates and over £140 in motor taxation and for the past 10 or 12 years nothing whatever had been done to the road.

Stating that he considered it a shocking road, Ald. Tom Kynne moved a proposal that the sum of £3,500 be set aside for the improvement of the road.

Mr. Malone said the people who were at the end of their patience and they were now going to take some action themselves.

County Waterford Committee of Agriculture

SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1958

For the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in County Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture to locate a limited number of high-grade black-face rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmallock Mountains on the following conditions:

(1) The Committee shall grant to each selected applicant a premium of from £1 to £8 on the basis that the value of the premium shall be less by £5 than the cost price of the ram, subject to a maximum of £8.

(2) In the allocation of rams preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes.

(3) The Committee will endeavour to secure that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied but they cannot undertake responsibility to make any animal should subsequently prove unsuitable or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes.

(4) The ram must be maintained in good and healthy condition and retained in the flock for two breeding seasons.

(5) Each applicant shall be required to lodge with his application a deposit of £2. Of the amount so lodged, one half may be retained by the Committee where a sufficient supply of rams being available, a selected applicant fails to procure a ram.

(6) In all cases of dispute matters connected with this Scheme, the decision of the Minister for Agriculture shall be final.
