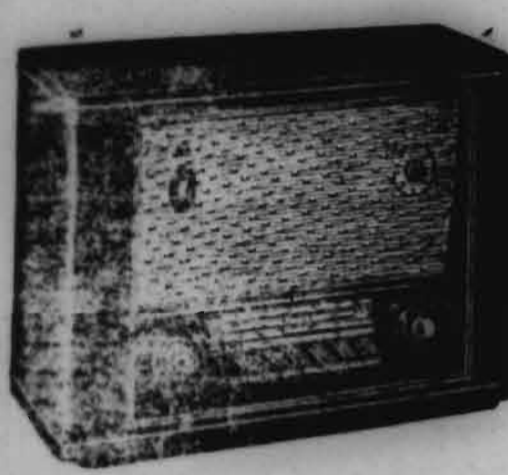

STILL SOME WAY OFF Minister Speaks on Television Prospects

OPENING the Irish Radio and Television Show in the Mansion House, Dublin, the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs, Mr. Sean Ormonde, said that while the establishment of television in Ireland was necessarily still some way off, the artists were apparently beginning to take up the formidable challenge of providing the necessary talent for it.

It was encouraging, he said, to find that in all the programmes to be performed at the exhibition both in sound and television, only Irish producers and actors were engaged.

The Minister said that for obvious reasons he could not say anything definite there about Irish television.

Referring to the 'complex' task of the Television Commission he said they were meeting at practically weekly intervals.

"While we would like to have recommendations as early as it is convenient for the Commission to make them, we would prefer that the Commission would take reasonable time to carry out a thorough study of the factors involved," he said. "I am quite sure from what I have heard of the Commission's work that the matter is being studied exhaustively."

In a brief reference to Radio Eireann the Minister said that while admitting the inherent inability of broadcasting organisations to be regarded as excellent all round, he thought he could

fully claim on behalf of Radio Eireann that the best had gone when they had the standing job about paying Radio Eireann a licence fee to listen to the B.B.C. Many of the programmes could stand comparison with those of Britain.

FUTURE OF RADIO

Mr. Ormonde said that with the establishment & rapid spread of television most people had been wondering whether the end of sound broadcasting was in sight. Experience in other countries had shown that this was far from being the case.

Instead of being superseded by television the position appeared to be that two services supplemented one another.

The Lord Mayor, Mrs. Byrne, said she was hoping that the Minister would see his way to having an Irish television station in the near future.

"We should give serious consideration to this question of television although I know it will be costly, but we do not want to be behind the times," she added.

'CATASTROPHIC' WHEAT HARVEST

As heavy rain and gale force gusts felled cornfields along the east coast on Tuesday an official of the N.F.A. described the wheat harvest as 'catastrophic'. Fields were flooded in some areas and in the south east wheat was flattened over a wide area.

Hundreds of thousands of acres of spring wheat still to be cut were battered in rain-soaked fields while farmers stood helpless.

Thousands of tons of wheat, oats and barley cut during the recent fine spell and hand-stacked to mature and reduce moisture content are now threatened with ruin unless the weather speedily improves.

Sprouting of spring wheat is very much on the increase and is now bringing a serious new threat to lodged and weather-beaten cornfields.

In addition to financial loss through weather damage farmers will face an extraordinarily heavy harvest wage bill.

Said one farmer: "Efforts to official sources to whitewash the harvest picture are not helping anyone. It would be better for all concerned to face up to the facts and do everything possible in co-operation to minimise the damage to the individual farmers and the national economy."

TIMETABLE

The harvest timetable has fallen weeks behind. In the grain-growing areas only about 25 per cent of spring wheat has yet been cut. Farmers have a bare month left before the crop would be in danger of becoming a total loss unless it has been saved.

One farmer with 200 acres of concrete under wheat in addition to his own tillage said his loss would run into thousands. He had paid £28 per Irish acre for concrete on a contract basis two years ago.

Indications are that the beet yields are very much down also.

The details of the N.F.A. Heifer Credit Scheme have now been cleared up and consequently it is expected that the Scheme will be in full operation throughout the country in the shortest possible time.

A Meeting has taken place between Officers of the Department of Agriculture, and Veterinary Medical Association of Ireland, the Commercial Banks and the N.F.A. As a result of this Meeting the two main points have been successfully cleared up.

The loan will cover all Breeds whether Beef, Dairy or dual purpose.

MEETING TO FIX GRASS SEED PRICES. The price of Grass Seed for the coming year will be discussed at a meeting between representatives of the N.F.A. National Grass Seed Committee, the Co. Committee of Agriculture and the Council of Representatives which is being held in Drogheda on Tuesday September 23.

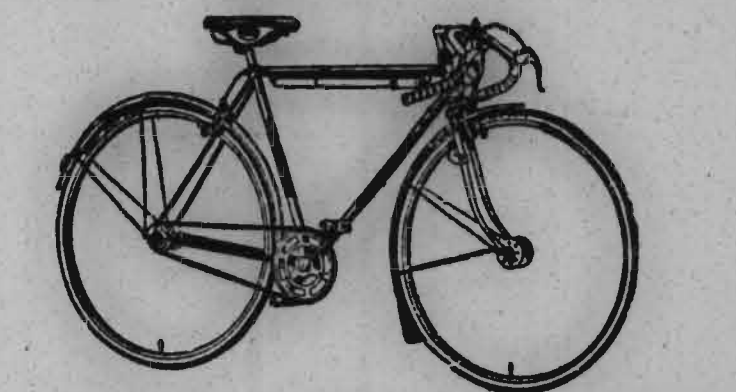

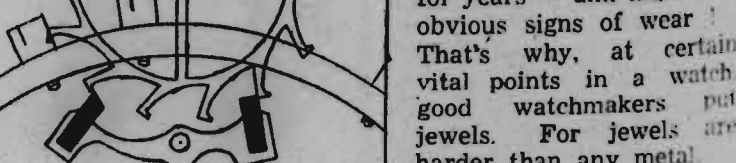

"WATER - WATER EVERYWHERE AND NOT A DROP TO DRINK"

Despite all the rain that fell on Saturday last and on the days before it, there was not a drop of water to be got from the taps in Abbeyside homes at ten minutes to six that evening. It was just another day in the life of Dungarvan's shocking water supply. The supply is cut off at 2.30 every afternoon and is supposed to come on again at 6.00.

The fact is, however, the water should never be cut off. We have been told that it is being done to boost the supply to the other end of the town but residents up there tell me that they are finding little or no improvement in their supply. In fact, one person told me that she still finds it impossible to get anything more than a trickle of water from the taps in her home. If this is so, and I have no reason to question the word of the people who told me, so then it would seem that the present system of water rationing is utterly ridiculous.

RIDICULOUS

I am convinced of course that it is ridiculous and I will tell you why. Driving along in the car with a friend the other day I decided to take a suggestion on the hop. I went up to the reservoir at Deilish to see the position there. It was a case of water rationing everywhere so much so in fact that thousands of gallons of it were rushing to waste every hour and all because the pipes that feed the town are far too small. I have never before seen such a shocking waste of water, and while things are at the present time, I would respectfully suggest to the members of Dungarvan Urban Council that they get together and pay a visit to the reservoir and see the shocking position for themselves. When they see it, they will agree that it is high time a stop was put to the water rationing that is going on and setting down to the problem of dealing with a situation that cries out for urgent attention.

THE FACTS OF THE MATTER

How many people in our town realise what it costs to stage a big production such as the personal appearance of some radio and recording star as guest artists at a dance? Just to give you some idea I will quote the cost of a very recent case. The cost of bringing the artist, the amounts to £85 or £90 a head, not cost anything from £25 the cost of a hall another £25 and a further £250 is likely to amount to at least £120. Other minor matters, tot up to £10 may be more. For the night's entertainment can cost £100. Now, in small provincial towns, people expect to gain admission to dances for the sum of 6d. and 7/6 the most for 5 hours dancing. Some grumble about the charge is not less but one can sit back and work matters out. They will see that having paid tax to the Government out of £12 (12 tax) or 7/6 (7/6 tax) the promoter would receive £60 people in the hall before he could call a penny of the takings his own. For big dances of this type in Dublin the admission price is between £2 and 7/6. In bringing such big shows down the country, it can be seen that big halls and more important still, big attendances are needed to make them a paying proposition and in the province it is really difficult to find both. Yet, we have had our share of such star productions in recent times and from information I have, it seems that we will have a few more.

N.F.A. News

DETAILS OF N.F.A. HEIFER SCHEME

The details of the N.F.A. Heifer Credit Scheme have now been cleared up and consequently it is expected that the Scheme will be in full operation throughout the country in the shortest possible time.

A Meeting has taken place between Officers of the Department of Agriculture, and Veterinary Medical Association of Ireland, the Commercial Banks and the N.F.A. As a result of this Meeting the two main points have been successfully cleared up.

Because an intensive testing is operating in only 9 or 10 Western Counties and because it may be a year before it is fully operative in the remaining Counties, it was decided that the Credit Scheme would not be limited to applicants testing under the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme.

It was agreed that 14 day testing will be added to official testing in addition to official testing any time limitation.

For the purpose of the Credit Scheme the 14 day test will be accepted for a period of 66 days from the date of test and will be accepted by the Bank on that basis.

A Certificate in respect of a heifer in a registered accredited herd will be acceptable without any time limitation.

It was decided that where the herd to which a heifer is being added with loan facilities has not been tested or if testing still contains reactors that the Bank might request the borrower to undertake to keep the heifer segregated.

On the request of livestock owners a Veterinary Surgeon under the Bovine T.B. Eradication Scheme may issue an individual Certificate.

The census test result will continue to show all the animals tested and when the individual Certificate is issued the Veterinary Surgeon will superscribe the entry relating to that heifer on the bulk Certificate and will enter, fill up and sign the individual Certificate.

The individual Certificate will be presented on a distinctive yellow card and they will be issued to practitioners by the N.F.A.

Veterinary Surgeons normally issue block certificates in respect of 14 day cattle. They will now on request issue individual certificates in respect of heifers which were subjected to this test.

The Bank at its discretion may also require a borrower to produce the certificate relative to any reactor of a heifer on which a loan is outstanding.

The Bank may also require a borrower not to sell or otherwise dispose of any heifer on which a loan is outstanding without prior notification to the Bank.

The loan will cover all Breeds whether Beef, Dairy or dual purpose.
