Dungarvan U.D.C. Pay Tribute

The weekend meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council was adjourned as a mark of respect to His Holiness, the Pope, on the proposal of Colr. Tom Lee seconded by Mr. John McCarthy.

Mr. N. Kelly, who presided in the absence of the Chairman, Ald. Tom Kynne, T.D. and in the absence of the vice-Chairman, Mr. Donal Moloney, stated that all the world was in deep mourning at the loss of His Holiness, the Pope, a truly great Pontiff who had been "very fond of this country." Pope Pius XII had been one of the greatest Popes of all time and his loss was indeed a very sad one.

Mr. J. Howlett, Town Clerk, associated himself with the resolution and informed the council that on the instructions of the Chairman a resolution of sympathy on behalf of the Council had been sent to the Papal Nuncio in Dublin and to the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr. Cahalan, D.D.

Votes of sympathy were also extended to the O'Neill family, Childara, Abbeyside; to the Curran family, Grattan Square and to the Costin family, Keating Street, on their recent bereavements.

The resolutions were passed with all members standing in silence.

ARCHDEACON'S STIRRING ADDRESS

Opening of New Fruit Season

THE opening of the fruit season was marked at the factory of Dungarvan Co-Operative Fruitgrowers in Shandon on Wednesday when Venerable Archdeacon D. Power, P.P., V.F., celebrated Mass within the specially decorated buildings.

The directors and staff were in full attendance together with Mr. P. J. Breen, P.C., local secretary of the A.T. & G.W.U.

Addressing the attendance afterwards, Ven. Archdeacon Power stated that it was a very great privilege for him to be able to celebrate Mass in their factory to seek God's blessing on their work in the season that was ahead of them. As a priest he should feel privileged on this occasion when on reading the trials and persecution that were being faced by priests in all countries.

Only recently he had seen in the papers that two priests had been sent to prison in Poland because they would not obey the order of their Government to take down the Crucifix that hung on the school-wall. It was a tragic story indeed especially when one considered that Poland where the Faith was now forbidden, was once a fine Catholic country that could be compared with Ireland in many ways.

They had a lot to be grateful for in Ireland to-day, stated Archdeacon Power. Priests and people were so united and their Faith was so strong that they offered up the Sacrifice of the Mass at the opening of industrial undertakings.

Referring to the recent death of Pope Pius XII, the Archdeacon said that they had to sympathise with one another in such a great loss. "It is not within my power to pay an adequate tribute to his memory," he stated. "No greater tribute could be paid to any King and no greater interest could be taken in any personage than that which was centred on our beloved Holy Father. We may, however, in this our hour of sorrow find some rejoicing in the knowledge that he had, as our leader on earth, a personage who was unique... and all people of all creeds admitted that he was an outstanding leader and honoured him as such... a leader who taught the world."

SEED POTATOES—an opportunity for the F.M.C.

As a result of joint discussions between the Ulster Farmers' Union and the North of Ireland Potato Marketing Association, a level of prices has now been fixed for seed potatoes. The prices range from £35 per ton down to £18 for Arran Peak and Stormont Dawn.

This move in a year of scarcity will bring stability to the North of Ireland Potato Marketing and at the same time will protect the farmers' interest.

As yet, we have no indication of the price that will be paid by the Potato Marketing Company here and it is opportune to point out some relevant facts. Ordinarily, about one-third of the total crop of potatoes goes for home consumption, and a very large proportion is fed to pigs and poultry.

Therefore, a high level of prices will mean that farmers will substitute coarse grain for potatoes and consequently place on the market a higher proportion of this year's crop. This will go part of the way to meet the shortage due to the partial crop failure.

Another important aspect is that if the level of ware prices exceed that of seed, we will run a grave risk of exhausting our supplies of seed as a result of their being sold as ware.

The Potato Marketing Company therefore has some important decisions to make and the fact that they may have contracted to export potatoes at the normal price should not deter them from meeting their export commitments and at the same time paying to the growers the prices that this year's shortage must command.

The deficit should be met by the Government and if this is done Potato Marketing Company representatives could make use of the situation to negotiate bigger and more attractive contracts for next year.

Any suggestion that farmers should accept a low price because of F.M.C. contracts cannot be considered. Firstly, growers have suffered heavily as a result of the weather and secondly, it would not work out in practice because as we have pointed out, the price of ware potatoes will find a high level anyway.

The Potato Marketing Company therefore have now the opportunity of acting constructively, of availing of this opportunity to gain the confidence of the farmers and also to improve their trading relations abroad.

T.B. ERADICATION—some complaints from Co. Mayo.

Some delegates of the N.F.A. Mayo Co. Executive who met last week complained that the compensation being paid for reactors is on occasions not as high as the price that the cows have realised when sold to a canning factory. They further pointed out that despite the fact that Cennacht is cordoned off that there is a movement of non-attested cattle too and fro across the Shannon.

The latter, if true, is one that can easily be checked on and it should not be difficult to efficiently police the boundary.

On the other hand, the N.F.A. has received numerous complaints from many Counties about the prices being paid by Department of Agriculture valuers for re-actors.

We would like to make it quite clear that re-actors should be compensated for at the market value and not the carcass value. Neither should there be an element of 'tangling'. The best should be purchased outright on the valuation of a competent man.

The T.B. Eradication Scheme is too important to be impeded by matters such as this, which undermine the confidence and the enthusiasm of the farmers. It is particularly regrettable that these complaints should be emanating from Mayo, a County where the farmers are solidly behind the T.B. Eradication Programme.

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

ONLY THE MEMORIES REMAIN.

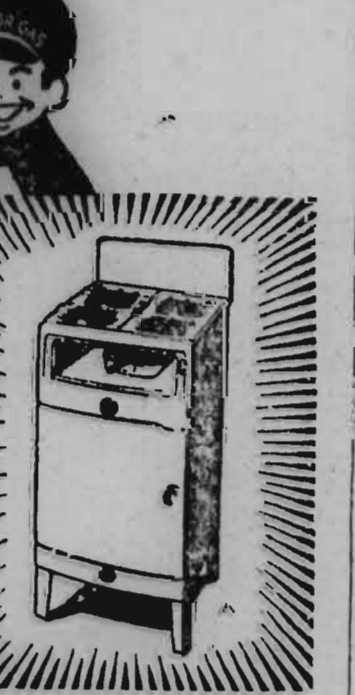
