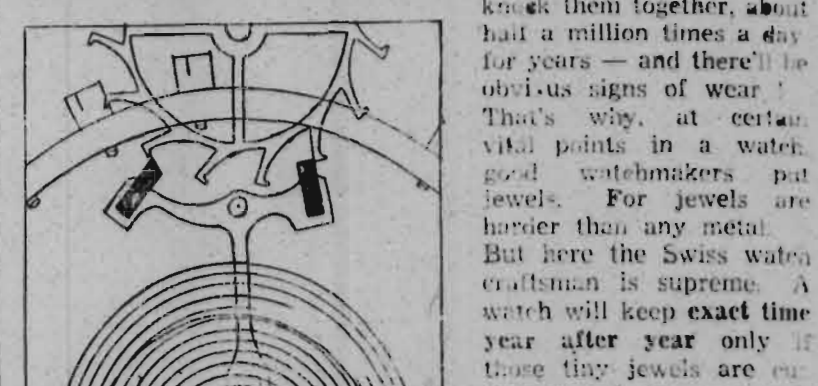

East Cork grain growers, at a representative meeting in Killeagh on Saturday night having voiced their disapproval of the wheat levy of 5/8 a barrel, unanimously decided to test the legality of this action of the wailers and An Bord Grain. The meeting further decided to begin the preparation of a case for counsel's advice when sufficient data was obtained from the members.

**MR. M. J. CORY, T.D.,** who was present at the meeting, said he personally was prepared to go ahead with this test case and the meeting unanimously pledged him their fullest support, financially and otherwise.

**Irish Industry's Part in Power Station Construction**

In the construction of steam power stations in this country and the erection of station buildings, cooling towers and general civil engineering works has always been carried out by Irish contractors. In the years since the war a considerable development has taken place in the amount of other work done in this country.

This applies particularly to steel fabrication and erection and in the design, construction and wiring of switchgear, control panels and desks. The Rhode Island power station, at present under construction near Ballyhenry, Co. Offaly, is a good example of this trend. In this station the work being carried out by Irish firms either by direct order from the E.S.B. or by sub-contractors to main suppliers includes the erection of the cooling tower, culverts and all civil engineering structures.

The supply and erection of nearly 2,000 tons of steelwork to construct such items as main structural steel, boiler frames, waste gas burners, chimneys, fans, cooling towers and auxiliaries.

The electrical construction of the station includes the switchgear to operate at voltages of 110 kV, 38 kV, 10 kV, 3.3 kV, and 380 V. The design and wiring of the main control panels and desks.

Other general items of the work done by Irish firms in-cludes the cabling, electric

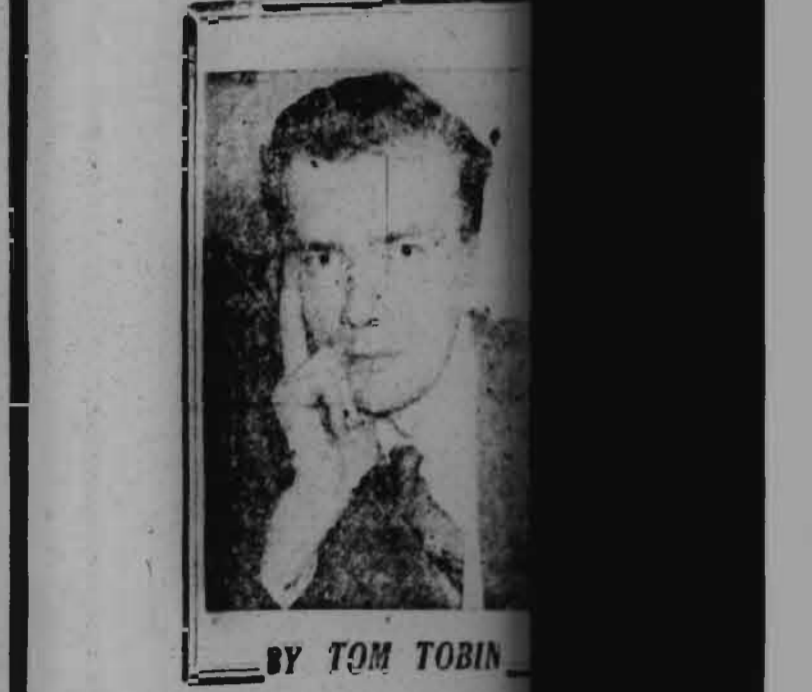

Blissfully unaware of what had happened and the "trap" in to which he was walking, Mr. Loneragan entered the Post Office to transact some business. It was unfortunate for him that he was carrying in his pockets a number of 45 and 50 blank cartridges (necessary for him in the course of his cash collections for his firm). When these were brought to light in the course of a search of his person, he was, despite his pretensions of non-participation in the raid, treated immediately as a "suspect" and was, with several others, apprehended in the vicinity.

Another story worthy of special mention this week comes from Mrs. Margaret Christopher, Gardiner Watford Herts, England. A letter I am very happy to acknowledge. It states: "My dear Mr. Tobin, I have not had the pleasure of knowing you personally though I really wish I had.
