DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

The P.O.A. was applied for in the case of James Kelly, Barrack Street, who was also charged with being drunk and guilty of disorderly behaviour on a recent date. Mr. E. P. King, solicitor, appeared for the defendant. A fine of £13, 10, 0, mitigated to 5/- with 8/3 expenses was imposed on David Leahy, Abbeyatie, who was charged by Sgt. Deasy with driving a motor bike without the necessary insurance coverage. Decrees and settlements were forthcoming in a number of civil bill cases that were called. Fines of 2/6 were imposed on a number of cyclists charged with cycling without the necessary light.

Deputy Tom Kyne speaks out

SPEAKING in the Dail on the motion of No Confidence in the Government, Deputy Kyne said:—

A motion similar to the motion which was put in the House some time ago, at that time I felt it was slightly unfair to bring the Government to task for not having introduced a measure which was the responsibility of the Government. During the 1957 election campaign, I had no doubt that one of the promises I heard in my own constituency would not be fulfilled. In fact I am seasoned a politician to expect that all and every promise made by any political party or any political speaker would be fulfilled eventually. But I had hoped that some of the Government's promises would be redeemed in the interest of the people I represent. The ordinary workers in my constituency. In 1957 the economic position was grave. Those of us in the Labour Party who stood up to speak at that time were as critical of the Government, of which we were apart, as some of the members of the opposition. We did not disguise the fact that there was grave unemployment and there was huge emigration and that there was grumbling about the cost of living. What happened since? I do not believe that any Deputy from Waterford constituency is required to stand up in this House to tell the people of Waterford that unemployment is at a higher level there than it ever was before, notwithstanding what ever manipulated figures may be issued from the central statistics office. When I say manipulated I say it with all respect to the accuracy of the figures supplied by the officials employed there. By manipulation I mean the method by which those who sign on the live register are suspended on investigation of fraudulently drawing the dole. I venture to say that in any one week, in my constituency alone at least 100 or more people are under investigation all of which will be readmitted to benefit in a month's time. Multiply that by the 26 counties and one can easily find a device that would account for the reduction of the apparent reduction per week of some 2,000 to 3,000 people. Whether that is true or not, and there are many people who believe it to be true, there is gain-saying the fact that in the City of Waterford only some two months ago, next of all political parties men of various standing including members of the Harbour Commissioners Corporation, the various Trade Unions, Deputies and lead by a worthy priest, sent a deputation to the Minister for Finance. They did appeal to him for the establishment in Waterford of a factory costing anything in the nature of £15,000 to £20,000 but they did appeal to him to give a small sum of £5,000 or £6,000 in the form of a temporary loan or grant to be used to convert men and women from standing in the City during the rainy winter. So had was the position that the Chamber of Commerce and the Waterford Harbour Board issued an appeal to employers that it was their duty to employ

extra men or women, even if it was only for one day each week. It was in that atmosphere that we appealed to the Minister for Finance. We received a promise that our request would be considered but the very same way as the Government cut jobs in New York, they cut jobs in Waterford. The Minister's promise was not fulfilled. The various figures of insurable employment over the past few years given by the Minister in reply to a question today, indicate that as compared with 1957, there are 36,700 fewer people insurable employed and they give the lie to the suggestion that conditions have improved. I do not believe that it was necessary for these figures to be published, but they do make it very clear that notwithstanding all the talk of a confidence of hope and the new outlook in this country, the actual truth at the moment is that there are fewer people employed now than there were in what we believe were critical days in late 1956 and early 1957. Researched and Waterford Harbour can tell the tale. Each hamlet each village and each town in my constituency has its quota of boys and girls flooding out through these gates. The life blood of the constituency is draining away. I am quite sure that what is happening there within the bounds of the county and city of Waterford is equally happening throughout every constituency in Ireland. The blood is draining away notwithstanding the promises we received. These who remain have the pleasure of watching what when Irish workers leave their homes and families for the loneliness of London, Birmingham or Manchester they like the English people can buy fish butter at 2/9 per lb. while we in Ireland must continue to face starvation and poverty and, out of a miserable pittance, on the whole, have to pay an increase to 4/4 as compared with 3/8 per lb. in 1957. There is a saying that when he asked for bread they gave him a stone. When the workers of this Country asked the Taoiseach for bread, he would give him the bread of life, he answered them by saying that they have a referendum on the subject of proportional representation. I suggest to the members of this country and to each serious man and woman voter including E.F. voters that they have now an opportunity on this referendum, if saying yes or no, but the yes or no will not be on whether or not proportional representation should be abolished.

The recently-elected Committee of the above held its first meeting in the Irish Centre (Blessed Oliver Plunkett House), Camden Square, N.W.1., on Thursday, 6th November, 1958. Councillor E. W. Flynn, Chairman, presided and there were also present: J. Griffin, Hon. Sec.; A. Jones, Hon. Treas.; W. Barron, Vice-Chairman; T. M. Cahill, W. Collins, W. Corcoran (S.E. 17), M. D. Kavanagh; J. P. Roche, Mrs. Griffin and Mrs. Jones.

It was decided to support a raise promoted by the Watford (Herts) Celtic Association Football Club for the purpose of raising funds to assist Waterford men, of whom there are many working or residing in that area, to return to their native town, London, and thus secure a closer degree of liaison and co-operation between members.

ENTERPRISE Airplane Flight for Christmas. An Associate Company of Mc Gill's Travel Service of Dundalk and Drogheda has been operating in London now for some time, trading as 'Topper's Irish Travel Service' from 53 Paddington Street, St. Marylebone, W.1. (Mr. E. A. Walsh, General Manager). This company has laid on special airplane flights between London and Dublin for the afternoon of Christmas Eve, returning on Sunday 28th December. The all-in cost—airport to airport (including coach fares, etc.) is £12. This service is being run for and on behalf of the Central Council of Irish Country Associations in London and flight tickets will be issued only to members of organisations affiliated to that body.
