'PROCEDURE UNFAIR'

— ALLEGES COLR. LANNAN

When the members of the Waterford Co. Council at their meeting in Dungarvan on Monday decided to pass over a number of items on the agenda to deal with an application for increase in Temporary (cost of living) allowance for members of the Irish Local Government Officials' Union and a request for reception of Deputation, Colr. Lannan complained that the method of procedure was unfair.

After Aid. T.A. Kyne, T.D. had asked the chairman if the meeting would consider the matter before proceeding with the other items before them, Colr. Lannan commented: They're not going to die of hunger within the next six months. About 90 per cent of them are well paid.

The Chairman, Mr. M.M. Morrissey pointed out that in order to have the matter put to the meeting and discussed it would be necessary to have a two-third majority of the members present in favour. When the matter was finally put to the meeting it was

defeated by 7 votes to 10. Replying to Colr. Lannan, who asked would the matter be brought up, the chairman said it was up to any member to bring it forward if he wishes to do so.

REGISTRATION OF ELECTORS

Elector lists are now being published, which, when revised, will form the register of electors for the year commencing 15th April, 1959. Copies of the lists can be seen at Post Offices, Courthouses and other public offices and the public are urged to examine them to ensure that they are complete and accurate. A person entitled to vote should find his name in the electors list for the district in which he was entitled to be registered on the qualifying date, namely, 15th September last.

PHOSPHATE SUBSIDY SCHEME

The phosphate subsidy scheme outlined in the recent White Paper on Economic Expansion will be operated with effect from 1st September, 1958. The subsidy will be paid to manufacturers, compounders and importers of fertilisers, who will be required to deduct the full amount of the subsidy from their current wholesale price in respect of all sales made by them since the 1st September, 1958. Retailers, in turn, will be required to pass on the deduction in full to the farmer. Detailed particulars of the Scheme including the rates of subsidy on the various types of phosphate fertilisers will be announced at an early date. The foregoing statement has been issued by the Government Information Bureau on behalf of the Department of Agriculture.

On Monday evening the remains were removed to St. Anne's Church, Ballydoon, where the coffin was received and blessed by the Rev. M. J. Russell, C.C., do.

LIVESTOCK MARTS - Retrogressive approach of some dealers.

Reports received over the weekend convey that livestock auction marts are being boycotted by some buyers.

This advertisement in itself is vague as it has so often been pointed out as far as the farmer is concerned, there has never been an issue between the mart and the fair.

It is not for the N.F.A. or for any other group to decide where a farmer will sell his cattle. It is the duty of the N.F.A. as a farmers' organisation to give every assistance in providing the most up-to-date method of marketing and when these services are provided, it is up to the farmer to make his decision.

MEETING WITH ADVISORY COMMITTEE. This week, the N.F.A. Poultry Committee will meet the Marketing Advisory Body for the purpose of examining the general position with regard to turkey marketing in general in this country.

WOOL REVIEW AT N.F.A. The marketing of wool at N.F.A. centres was reviewed at a meeting of the National Committee on November 27th. Final figures for this year show a steady increase in throughput and almost one million pounds were sold through the centres in 1958.

LIME SCHEME. Many County Executives arrange through their Branches bulk buying of lime, and this year the Louth Co. Executive is again making arrangements for this system of bulk buying for its members. It has operated a Scheme in that county for the past two years and it has meant that lime in bulk orders were supplied to members at considerably reduced prices.
