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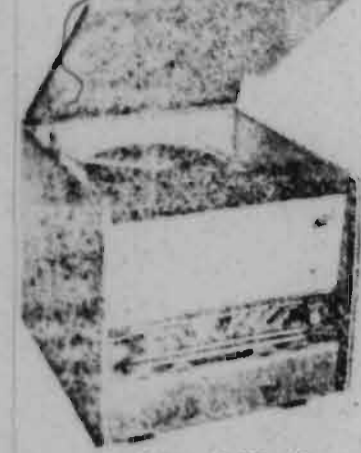

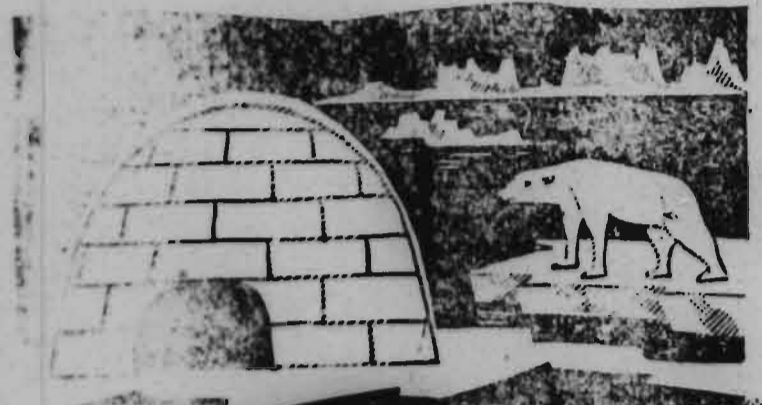

THE IGLOO OF THE ESKIMO

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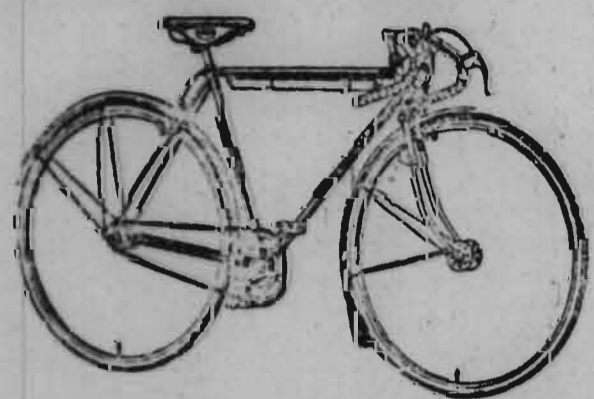

TO PRESERVE ELECTRIC PLUGS Switch off current before pulling out plug, this is a simple, but important rule, to prevent damage both to the plug on the electric lead or cord, and the wall socket, it holds for appliances large and small, from washing machine to ordinary portable lamp.

Pulling out the plug, when an appliance is running, or heading, shuts off the flow of current suddenly, so that it sparks, and makes an arc between the prongs (or pins) of the plug and the wall outlet, this burns the prongs, leaving them black and pitted they cannot make good contact and will eventually cause trouble.

LIVER FLUKE

The incidence of liver fluke disease in sheep is very much greater than usual this year on account of the abnormally heavy rainfall during the late spring and summer months. A species of fresh water snails plays a vital part in the development of liver fluke. In the absence of which the fluke cannot complete its life history.

For the greater part of the year weather conditions were unusually favourable for the development of the snail, and poorly drained low-lying or marshy pastures become heavily infested.

The result of this has been that numbers of sheep have been heavily infested with immature Flukes, the effects of which are now becoming obvious in poor condition and in some cases sudden deaths in flocks.

If one or more sheep - irrespective of whether they are in poor or good condition - die suddenly or after a few days' illness, acute liver fluke disease should be suspected even though the flock has been dosed previously for fluke. In such cases the owner should request his veterinary surgeon to make a post mortem examination or have a fresh carcase sent to the Veterinary Research Laboratory, Tormdale, Drumcondra, Dublin. If the disease is confirmed the veterinary surgeon's advice should be sought as to treatment to the flock.

The ordinary routine dosing for fluke is of little or no value for the treatment of sheep likely to die from a heavy infestation with immature fluke that is of undoubted value in destroying the fully grown or adult fluke.

The owners of flocks in which the acute form of the disease has been diagnosed, and those in which the ordinary or chronic form of the disease is known to occur yearly, are strongly advised to give flocks routine monthly dosing until the month of April and at the recommended dosage.

It is not unlikely that young cattle that have grazed on wet or marshy land may show the effects of fluke infestation later in the winter, though it takes a much greater number of flukes to affect the condition of cattle than it does sheep. Cows may also show symptoms where the grazing has been heavily infested. Where the presence of fluke is suspected a veterinary surgeon should be called should be put on the driest land available.

To avoid fluke infestation of pastures drainage of the land is essential and open drains should have clean sides, which will not offer cover to the snails.

Treating infected pastures with copper sulphate will kill the snails but farmers should make sure that the copper sulphate is not being carried off the land into streams and rivers. (See Department's Leaflet No. 121.) Pastures should not be grazed for at least three weeks after treatment with copper sulphate.

As a precautionary measure it is advised that all owners should carefully examine their flocks and submit samples of droppings from four or five animals to their veterinary examination. It is most likely that many flocks will carry heavy infestations of both fluke and stomach worms.

The nutrition of sheep and of more than usual importance this winter if the animals are to get through to the spring in good condition. Farmers are advised to do everything in their power to keep their animals thriving and especially to ensure it at all possible that young stock do no lose condition.

ROADS It is understood that the engineering Department of Waterford Co. Council has made provision for the rolling of the following roads in this area: Clashmore road at Coolree to Dro-more; junction Ardmore road to Ballyquin strand; Ardmore Round Tower to Whiting Bay. It is also understood that the road from Kilmore to Ballinacree is to be rolled on the following year. This announcement will be welcomed by the users of the roads mentioned.

NO PUMPS The Secretary of Waterford Co. Council has forwarded to Mr. C. Curran, M.C.C., a copy of following letter from County M.O. H.:-"Re application for provision of pump at Ballinamona, Ardmore. Reference your letters of the 6th and 12th inst. I attach herewith copy of Health Inspectors' reports in the matter. There are four families concerned - fourteen persons in all. Two families (outside Parochial House), one approximately 300 yards and one approximately 250 yards. I do not recommend a pump in this area."

The Inspector's Report pointed out that some time ago the Council failed to locate water for a pump at Monea, which is less than a mile from houses at Ballinamona.

The Council have also decided not to supply a pump at Ballinacree due to the facts that there were only two families concerned and that this would not justify the cost (£160). The Council have advised the families concerned to seek a state grant to install a private supply.

SEWERAGE SCHEMES It is understood that the Co. M.O.H. has recommended that the application of a local member of the Co. Council to have sewerage schemes laid down in Aglish, Clashmore and Villierstown be approved. This information will, no doubt, be welcomed by the residents of the villages concerned. All these schemes, if sanctioned by the Council, will give considerable employment.

ROAD WORK 43 YEARS AGO To hand is a copy of the Report of the Waterford County Surveyor in 1915. It shows that the total amount of money spent on roads repaired by Direct Labour that year was £3,654 7 0, and that the roadworkers pay at the time was 14/- per week. DRIVING CHARGE AT YOUGHAL COURT

O'Brien said he examined defendant at Killeagh Garda Station on October 29. He was able to say he seemed however to be mentally confused and smoked of alcohol in his witness statement, defendant was incapable of driving a car.
