COUNTY LASHED BY GALES

Local Happenings

A torrential rain swept the south coast of the county on Saturday, with gusty winds and driving rain causing severe flooding in many places. The rain was particularly heavy in the afternoon and evening hours, when it was accompanied by strong gales from the west. The result was that many roads were cut off, and a number of houses were flooded. In some places, the water was several feet deep, and in a few cases, it was necessary to evacuate people. The rain continued through the night, and it is expected that the situation will remain difficult for some time.

On Monday morning an incessant downpour which lashed the Waterford City area caused a landslide on the main Waterford-Kilkenny road at Newrath, about half a mile from the Suir bridge. The road was closed for several hours, and it was necessary to divert traffic to the Suir bridge. The landslide was caused by the heavy rain, which had saturated the ground. The water was several feet deep, and in some places, it was necessary to evacuate people. The rain continued through the night, and it is expected that the situation will remain difficult for some time.

Twelve yards of the road were covered by about 100 tons of clay, silt and loose earth from an embankment which skirted the road. The road was closed for several hours, and it was necessary to divert traffic to the Suir bridge. The landslide was caused by the heavy rain, which had saturated the ground. The water was several feet deep, and in some places, it was necessary to evacuate people. The rain continued through the night, and it is expected that the situation will remain difficult for some time.

Gardaí from the nearby Ferrybank Station under Sgt. J. McGinn, rushed to the scene and diverted traffic which had to make a three-mile detour to get to and from the city. The road was closed for several hours, and it was necessary to divert traffic to the Suir bridge. The landslide was caused by the heavy rain, which had saturated the ground. The water was several feet deep, and in some places, it was necessary to evacuate people. The rain continued through the night, and it is expected that the situation will remain difficult for some time.

The diesel truck service from Waterford to Tralee was suspended owing to flooding of the line and an alternative bus service had to make a detour. The road was closed for several hours, and it was necessary to divert traffic to the Suir bridge. The landslide was caused by the heavy rain, which had saturated the ground. The water was several feet deep, and in some places, it was necessary to evacuate people. The rain continued through the night, and it is expected that the situation will remain difficult for some time.

The main Waterford-Cork road was flooded for long stretches to a depth of up to a foot and roadways in the new Cork Road Estate were under water. Flooding also took place in a number of low-lying districts including Park Road, Hennessy's Road and Foleybridge. The road was closed for several hours, and it was necessary to divert traffic to the Suir bridge. The landslide was caused by the heavy rain, which had saturated the ground. The water was several feet deep, and in some places, it was necessary to evacuate people. WATERFORD'S TRIBUTE TO DR. WHITE
Tributes were paid to the memory of Dr. Vincent Joseph White, 21 Broad Street, Waterford, a former member of the Ball and Mayor of Waterford, prior to the opening of the new District Court.

Justice F. J. MacCabe said during the week flags in Waterford were flown at half-mast as a tribute to the memory of a distinguished citizen and a familiar figure in the court. Dr. White, in the course of his distinguished career, he had many accolades, but in paying tribute to his memory they would naturally speak of him as they knew him in court.

For nearly forty years and before he came to Waterford as District Justice, said Mr. MacCabe, the deceased was medical officer to the Civil Guards and in that capacity he was a frequent witness in the court. The duty he had to perform in that way was a difficult one. But they knew how well he performed it with what skill, with what high sense of fair play and perhaps one should say most of all, no matter how difficult was his task he never shirked his duty.

They knew, he said, how the poor of Waterford mourned his passing. At the funeral he saw several poor women crying over their loss.

"A GREAT MAN"
The late Dr. White was a landmark in many ways. There were three or four generations of doctors in his family and he was informed that a grand-uncle of his, Dr. White, was the first doctor in the city. He was a great man and Waterford had reason to be proud of him.
