County Waterford Committee of Agriculture

BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION SCHEME

1. The testing of herds under the above-named Scheme will commence in January, 1959, on farms in Co. Waterford from which completed applications have been received.
2. This is the first essential step towards eradication of the disease.
3. Free testing at suitable intervals will be a feature on the participating farms. The Department will purchase cow reactors at current market price.
4. Farmers can greatly facilitate the work of testing by having the animals assembled at convenient points when the Veterinary Surgeon calls to do the test.
5. The whole dairy herd should be in the Byre as at milking time.
6. Dry cattle should be assembled in a collecting Yard or other suitable place on the farm.
7. A simple type chute or driving passage in which, say, 6 strong cattle can be held and leading from the collecting Yard to a Holding Yard or other suitable dispersal point would be a great convenience for the testing and subsequent examination for reactors.
8. The Chute should not be more than 25" wide. The top rail may be set to any suitable height from 42" to 48". Strong lengths of timber or metal tubing may be used as rails.
9. A Cattle Crush will serve the purpose of holding for testing, ear-marking, etc. quite well. (See Department's Leaflet No. 131).
10. Consult your Veterinary Surgeon at the time of his call re disposal of reactors, isolation, byre improvements, etc. but do not otherwise delay him.
11. If as a herd owner, you have not yet applied for participation in the Scheme you should do so immediately as time is running out. Application Forms can be obtained at the Committee of Agriculture Office, Dungarvan. Remember that the British Market for non-tested cattle is closing rapidly and will have practically disappeared by the end of this year.

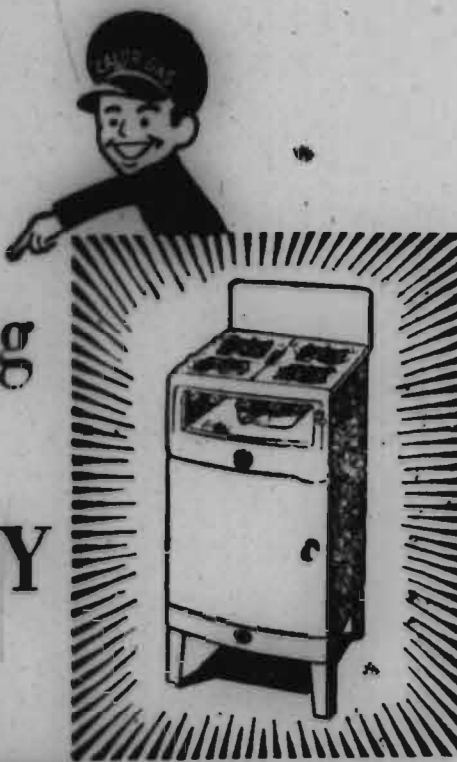

DEATH OF MR. A. SCANNELL, N.T. The Gaelic Athletic Association in Cork lost one of its foremost members and the Irish language one of its greatest advocates by the death on Saturday at his home at Clonduane, Co. Cork, of Mr. Andrew Scannell, N.T.

A former chairman of the Cork Co. Board of the G.A.A., Mr. Scannell had a lifelong association with Gaelic games, his zeal in this direction being equalled only by his interest in promoting the language which he had himself learned in his native Ballygeary.

Mr. Scannell received his early education in his native Ballygeary and subsequently attended the Protestant Brothers' College at Mountrath, and De La Salle, Waterford, where he trained as a teacher.

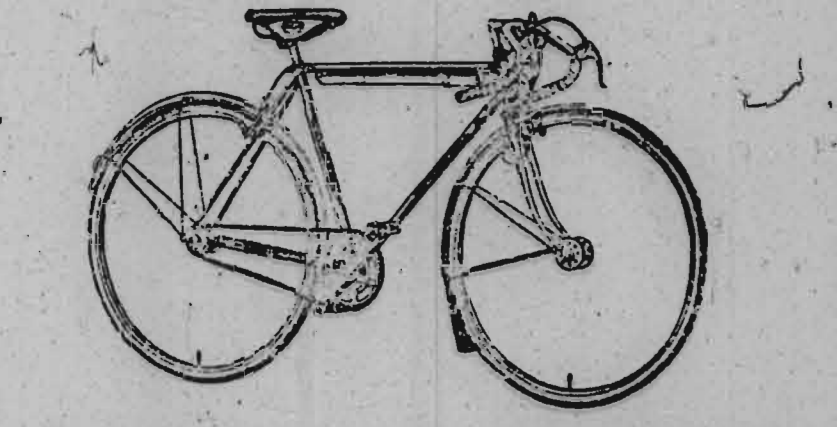
