Regulations For Lent, 1959

- 1—Meat is allowed on all days in Lent, except Ash Wednesday and Fridays.
- 2—Those between 21 and 64 years of age, who are bound to fast, may take meat and meat soup only once each day at their principal meal.
- 3—Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal and two light collations.
- 4—From 12 to 18 ounces of solid food must be taken at these collations, that is, consisting of the quantity of food usually taken at breakfast and evening tea.
- 5—One egg may be taken both in the evening and even in the part of these collations, and so may butter, cheese, milk, fruit, cereals and fish.
- 6—The division of the total amount of food allowed at the two collations is left to the choice of the individual and so are the hours and order of the meals, e.g., dinner about midday and collation in the evening or vice versa.
- 7—A cup of tea or coffee may be taken as often as desired.
- 8—Parish Priests, even outside of Confession, and Confessors are empowered to dispense from the Law of Fasting or from the Law of Abstinence or from both.
- 9—On Sundays and on St. Patrick's Day there will be neither fast nor abstinence.
- 10—Lenten Fast and Abstinence cease at Midnight on Holy Saturday.

BOVINE T.B. ERADICATION SCHEME DISAPPOINTING IN COUNTY

County Waterford with a large proportion of its cattle eligible for export, has a particular need for bovine tuberculosis eradication at an early date. The British market for untested store cattle will be closed by March next year, and by the Autumn of this year demand for untested stores will have doubled almost to vanishing point.

It is particularly disappointing that only about one-third of the county's 4,700 herd owners have responded so far to the canvass made by the County Committee of Agriculture and the rural organisations in an effort to get the scheme going at maximum pace.

The estimated population of the county is 125,000, composed of 29,000 cows and about 33,000 dry stock and of this 21,000, about 20,000 are estimated to be over 2 years old and ready for export.

The canvass followed the Minister's offer of free testing and purchase of cow reactors at the offer was that a high degree of market value and a credit of the order was that a high degree of participation be secured. Even though the result has been so disappointing it has been decided to give the 1,800 children the benefit of the Minister's offer and testing of their herds has already begun. Cow reactors will be purchased as rapidly as possible after the first tests and the herd owners concerned should then take all other necessary measures to free their herds of the disease, aiming at the final goal of accreditation by the earliest possible date.

CERTIFIED SEED POTATOES

Best potato yields cannot be obtained unless the health and vigour of the seed planted is satisfactory. Good seed cannot be selected on appearance nor is the district of origin alone a reliable guide. The important thing is to ensure that the seed is the product of a vigorous healthy crop which has been grown in suitable isolation from diseased potatoes. Growers are accordingly strongly recommended to plant certified seed potatoes at least every three years. It is advisable that orders for certified seed should be placed with seed merchants early in the season. Certified seed potatoes are sold in sacks sealed with an official red metal seal marked "Department of Agriculture, Dublin" on one side and "Certified Seed" on the other. In addition, the sacks are branded to show the variety, certificate number of grower, grade of seed and initials of the licensed packer. 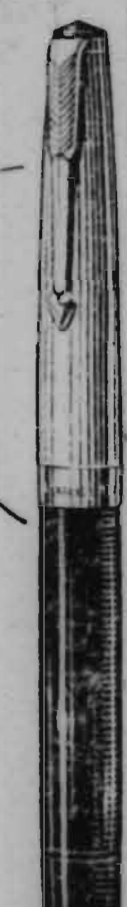

N.F.A. News

WHEAT: "Special Payments" Unacceptable. The N.F.A. declares the "Special Payments" on wheat announced by the Government last week-end to be entirely unacceptable. As a result of the disastrous harvest in 1958 wheat growers lost approximately 60% of their normal revenue of £7m. It was subsequently stated by the Government that contribution from the Exchequer would be made to alleviate the distress caused by the bad harvest.

LAND RECLAMATION. The Minister's statement in the Dail on January 20 to the effect that he is not prepared to allow credit facilities under Section A of the Land Reclamation Scheme further aggravates the serious situation caused by the withdrawal of Section B of the Land Project. Last December, the N.F.A. pointed out to the Department of Agriculture that the withdrawal of Section B would be tolerable provided adequate credit facilities were made available for the operation of Section A. The majority of farmers will not have the necessary cash to operate under Section A without credit. A system of repayment of the Land Project annuities was suggested by the N.F.A. The N.F.A. has also been pressing since last August for a meeting with the Minister for Agriculture to discuss the Scheme generally. We also asked that the Minister would meet a deputation of Co. Leitrim farmers on the same date to discuss land drainage. So far, we have not had the opportunity of having those vital and urgent discussions.

MONOPOLY OF DIAMONIUM PHOSPHATE. Diamonium Phosphate is the cheapest form of phosphate available to farmers and for the farmer who wishes to compound his own fertilizer, there is no comparable substitute. From practical experience, farmers have found out that compounds including Sulphate of Ammonia and Potash must be used immediately. It is very strange therefore that the import of this very valuable fertilizer is being restricted to compounders. We feel we are justified in asking why its import has been made by the Government the

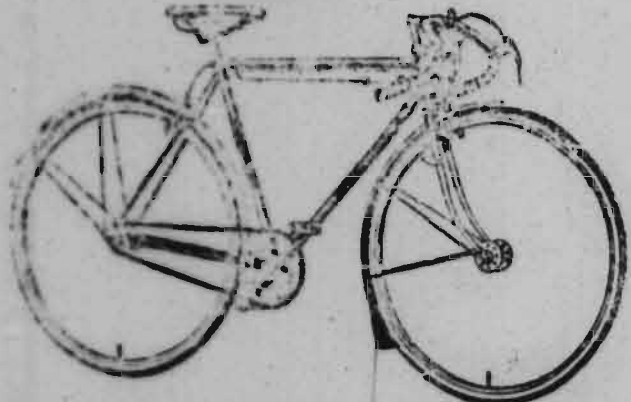
There is no reason to believe that the producers who have suffered a loss of £7m. in a year of singular disaster have been fairly equitably treated. The N.F.A. has taken up this and a memorandum setting out our views has been sent to the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Industry and Commerce. GRANTS AND CREDIT FOR SILOS. The Department of Agriculture has recently announced a substantial increase in grants for the construction of silos. This is a constructive and useful step and it is to be hoped that farmers will avail of the Scheme to the maximum. In passing however, we would like to comment that under the present Scheme, Grants are not being given to assist farmers in rearing existing silos and we feel that it is very desirable that they should. The question is still under discussion between the N.F.A. and the Department. Hot on the heels of the Government announcement of more substantial grants came the news of a Credit Scheme introduced by a Commercial Bank to finance the cost of construction. The Bank is prepared to advance 80% of the cost of building the silo, less the Government grant, the repayments spread over four-and-a-half years and the interest at ordinary Bank rate. The present Bank rate is 5 1/2%. The Scheme we understand is designed to operate with the fewest formalities. A loan will be granted to approved applicants without security but on the submission of evidence from the Minister that a Grant will be given when the silo is completed. "PIGS FOR THE WEST" PROGRESS. The Committee met in Ballyhanna on January 27th and good progress is reported. In Mayo, the Co. Committee of Agriculture are paying a subsidy of £3 per sow up to a maximum of 400 sows. Already, these 400 have been applied for by Mayo farmers. It is noteworthy that the 400, 98% are actual increases and as a result of the drive in Co. Mayo alone, sow numbers are estimated to be up 26%. The problem of marketing is still with us, in Co. Galway for instance where there is no bacon factory, it was generally agreed that a system of collection should be introduced. It is the belief of the Committee that farmers should sell on a dead weight basis. We would add that when farmers send their pigs to the factory, the factory management on their part should ensure that the farmer is fairly treated, because mutual confidence between the farmer and factory is vital in the building up of a sound pig industry. At present, of the five Counties of Connacht, Mayo is giving the lead in the "Pigs for the West" campaign but it is to be hoped that the other four Counties will play their part equally as well. The Committee promoting the Pigs for the West campaign is representative of the County Committees of Agriculture in Connacht, the Advisory Service and the National Farmers' Association. WESTERN CO-OPERATIVE MART. While the collection of share capital for the Ballina Mart, recently purchased by the farmers of North Mayo and West Mayo was getting really under-way, the Committee of the West of Ireland, Co-operative Livestock Mart met in Ballyhanna on Saturday, January 31st. Representatives of Irish Co-operative Livestock Marts travelled from the South of Ireland to attend the meeting and also present were staff members from the N.F.A., H.Q., and Plunkett House, Headquarters of the I.A.O.S. Plans for future development of Co-operative Auction Marts in the West and for a closer coordination of all Co-operative Marts on a National basis were decided on. There is now in the mart movement an integration and co-ordination of all interested parties and positive plans have been agreed on for the future. The importance of these arrangements to the individual Mart Committee is that no single Co-operative Mart is standing alone but rather is part of the general scheme and can benefit from its association with other marts while at the same time it retains its own identity and autonomy in trading.

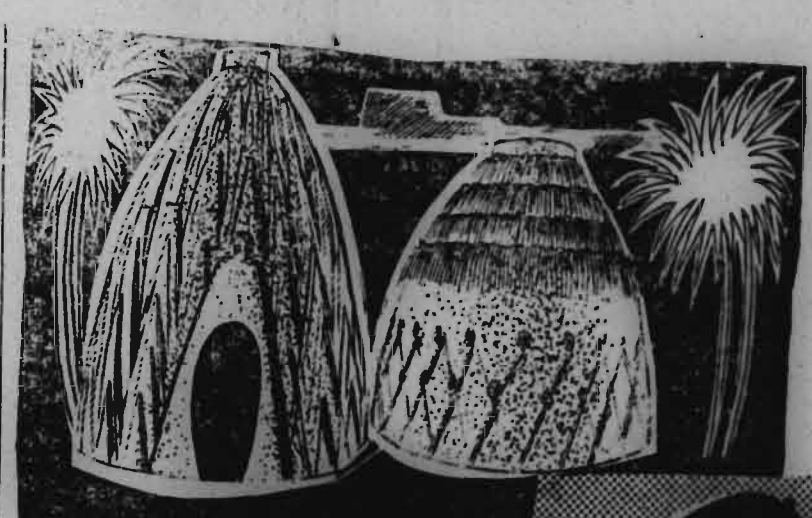
