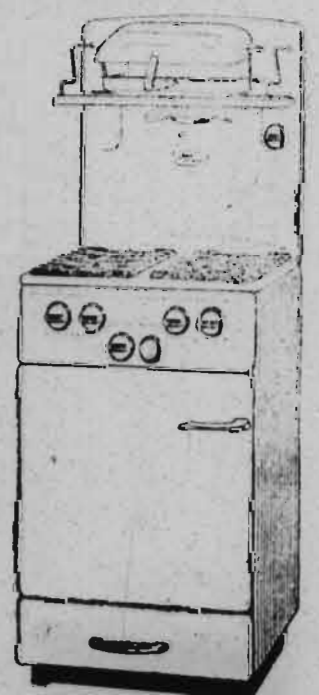

Dungaran Urban Council

A notice of motion in the name of Cirs, T. Lee which called for a sworn inquiry into the payment of a reconstruction grant to Mrs. A. Quahy, O'Connell St., was rejected by the members of Dungaran Urban Council at the fortnightly meeting in the Town Hall, on Friday night.

In a special report, the Co. Manager stated: "In January, 1958, a supplementary reconstruction grant of £80 was paid to Mrs. Quahy following notification from the Department that a State grant of £120 had been paid in this case.

Some months later investigations were made by the Gardaí in regard to these grants. The Council's solicitor was asked to advise on the correct procedure to be adopted in regard to this investigation and in pursuance of his advice and after full consideration of the matter, the Town Clerk was authorised to furnish to the Gardaí such information as they required from the Council's files.

At the same time the Department was requested to furnish their observations on the case and to state whether they intended to take action thereon.

It is the practice here, as elsewhere, to pay supplementary grants on payment of the relevant State grants and the duties of local officers do not extend to the inspection of completed works prior to payment.

By the letter dated November 1958, the Department stated that an overpayment of £80 had been made in respect of the State grant and that this amount had been recovered from the applicant.

The Chairman, Aid T. Kyne, T.D., told Cirs, Lee that he had been informed by the Minister of Justice in the Dail that acting on the advice of the Attorney-General, it was recommended that no proceedings be taken.

The Adult Education movement sponsored by U.C.C. has now been in existence for 22 years and already over forty districts in Munster have benefited by the courses.

These courses are in the nature of leadership training courses and are specially directed towards the members of urban and rural organisations. Some are for men and some for women. Some are for employers and some for workers. Some are for farmers and some for the citizens of county towns.

The courses have received the support of all sections of the community and already over a thousand students have successfully attended them. They are providing not only a thorough grounding in social and economic principles but also practical instruction framed to meet the needs of the particular group undertaking each course.

Farmers' courses, for example, include instruction in Rural Science, Agriculture, Farm Accounts and Farm Building & Engineering. County town courses include instruction in Procedure at Meetings, Public Speaking & Debate, and Modern Social Organisation. Women's courses include instruction in Home Science, Food & Nutrition Arts and Crafts, Hygiene, Vegetable, Fruit and Flower Growing, etc.

At the course at present in operation will shortly conclude, a new series of courses will commence this year and applications from interested bodies are now being invited by U.C.C. These courses are all of two years duration and lead to a Diploma from the College. Due to exigencies of finance and staff, the number of courses that can be undertaken for any two year period is strictly limited and, therefore, early application is essential.

Annual Report of ICA (Town Association)

Nevertheless the year has been an active one; assistance with catering and stewarding at the Dungarvan Show was given, and the Guild joined up with Macra na Feirme in organising the Macra Dress Dance in November. Competition at the Friary Hall and the Annual General Meeting of the Waterford Federation at the Technical School was also undertaken successfully.

A team of four entered for a Question Time in Ardara and won as a team, also a personal first prize. Members have visited other Guilds on invitation, seeing and learning many things. Help was given with the Annual Party at the Co. Home on the 20th and 21st of November, and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul were made for Christmas.

Attendance at the Monthly meetings at the Court House has been very good. The programmes have been varied and interesting and always enjoyable. Three Travel Talks were given on—Winter Sports Holidays, Europe and the Brussels Exhibition (illustrated), and Christmas in Sweden (illustrated). Also a lecture from British Nylon Spinners, a facial demonstration from Melina Beauty Preparations, and a culinary demonstration. The Annual Cup for the Cottage Garden Competition was presented by the Federation President at the November Meeting, and always the social aspect has been enjoyable, including the abundant and delightful teas supplied by the hostesses.

Work meetings have been held each week and ruseairt undertaken and demonstrated by four members of the Ring Guild. Irish crochet too was demonstrated and taught.

So the Guild looks into their future, which will undoubtedly be a busy and interesting one, and while the membership grows so the problem of space grows too. The Guild is grateful to the Co. Council for the use of a room, but we have already outgrown our creche and are obliged to seek a new abode. What is to be done? Is the age of miracles and Fairy Godparents really past?
