STRUCK BY CAR NEAR HOME

Tragic death of young Aglish man

LATE PATRICK DAVIS

News of the sad tragedy cast a gloom over Aglish, where the deceased and his family have enjoyed the respect and esteem of all sections of the community since their coming to the district several years ago.

Throughout the day the shocked parishioners and many from further afield sorrowfully streamed to the Davis household, where the remains rested until their removal to the local Parish Church.

Pat, as he was affectionately known, was one of the most highly regarded young men in the parish, well-liked by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance and particularly popular with the various local organisations of which he was a member. He had attained his eighteenth birthday on the previous Wednesday.

There was a moving manifestation of public sympathy at the removal of the remains on Monday evening. The coffin was shouldered by his colleagues of the local F.C.A. Platoon and the accompanying concourse included the Chairman and members of Waterford County Council and representatives of the F.C.A. and G.A.A. At the church gates the remains were blessed and received by Rev. F. D. Slattery, C.C. who was assisted by Very Rev. Fr. Hackett, P.P. and Rev. Fr. Callanan, C.C. men of the parish.

Amongst the attendance were Mr. M. Morrissey, solicitor,

Chairman Co. Council, Coirs C. Curran, N. Walsh, J. Quirk, T. Lannon, W. Dwyer and J. Power; Capt. R.D. Keating, O/C Dungarvan Battalion F.C.A., Lieut. T. Harrington, Training Officer, do., Lieut. S. O'Brien, do., and Sergeant C. Hayes, Q.M., do.

On Tuesday morning, following the celebration of Requiem Masses and again in the presence of a huge attendance of relatives, friends and sympathisers, interment was made in the adjoining cemetery. The coffin, draped by the Tricolour, was borne by members of the F.C.A. and his colleagues of the Geraldines hurling and football clubs formed a Guard of Honour from the Church doors to the graveside. Rev. D. Slattery, C.C. assisted by Very Rev. Fr. Hackett, P.P. and Rev. Fr. Callanan, C.C. officiated.

The chief mourners, to whom heartfelt sympathy is extended in their tragic loss are, Mrs. J. Davis (mother), James and Harry (brothers), Maureen and Josephine (sisters).

After Devotions

It was subsequently learned that the deceased, accompanied by Walter Downing and James Rosayne, set out for a walk to see their wonted following devotions in Aglish Church on Sunday night. They travelled in the direction of Villierstown. On the way Walter Downing and James Rosayne decided to turn back and the deceased and William Downing continued into Villierstown for the purpose of purchasing a package of cigarettes. The accident occurred while they were on their way back to Aglish.

Medical evidence and evidence of identification were heard by Dr. D. Healy, Lismore, Coroner for West Waterford, who, sitting with a jury, held an inquest at Villierstown Garda Barrack on Monday evening.

James Davis, brother of the deceased, who identified the remains, stated that he last saw his brother alive about 6.45 on Sunday evening when he was in his usual good health. He was a social drinker.

Dr. M.J. McCarthy, Keeney, stated that he was called to the scene of the accident at 11.30 on Sunday and found the body on the left-hand side of the roadway leading from Villierstown to Aglish. There was a pool of blood about two or three feet away from the head. He examined the body and found it to be extinct.

In the course of a post-mortem examination he found an extensive fracture of the base of the skull with laceration of the brain. There was a compound fracture of both legs. Death in his opinion was instantaneous. The injuries would be consistent with being struck by a fast-moving vehicle.

Adjudged

On the application of Inspector McCloskey, who said that investigations were not yet complete, an adjournment was granted at this stage. The papers will go before the Attorney General, he stated.

AN APPRECIATION

There is, we are told, a certain element of sadness about doing something for the last time. When tragedy strikes the circumstances it is an occasion one approaches with even greater misgivings. So it is with a heavy heart that I pen this inadequate appreciation of the late Patrick Davis, who was so tragically and regrettably called from our midst late on Sunday night.

To those who knew him intimately the painful shock of parting was made bearable only by the knowledge that he had gone to meet his Maker with soul and character unblemished. Pat Davis, eighteen the previous Wednesday, had played the game of life, and played it well, when he answered the last whistle on Sunday night.

Strong and sincere, good-natured and jovial, his hearty laughter and perpetual smile embodied a spirit of goodwill that earned him the respect and admiration of all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

Whether it was on the hurling field—he was a valued member of the Geraldines and Ballinacoola teams—whether it was playing a game of handball or throwing a score of bowls, his uncanny sense of humour, a humour which belied the determination he could display when the occasion warranted, invariably made him the life and soul of the party.

Likewise, in the ranks of An Foras Cosanta Aitiuil, in which he had served with distinction since his enlistment, Pat's many able qualities were readily recognised for what they were by his superiors and colleagues alike. These were the self-same qualities that caused him to be so highly regarded by all with whom he came in contact.

In years to come, I will like to recall him as I saw him alive—putting all the zeal and spirit of eighteen into the game of handball in the local alley. That was Sunday evening at 5 p.m.

EVEN THE 'FLU COULDN'T STOP BALLINROAD

With one of their cast strikers by the flu at the last minute there was a little more than usual pre-performance tension and anxiety among the members of the St. Laurence's Hall Ballinroad Dramatic Society on Saturday (the eve of the performance).

On Sunday night they went on stage at Abbeyside Scouts Den to give a marvellous performance of "Mrs Mulligan's Millions" before a capacity audience through their cast included one player for whom it was the first time ever on the stage. Council adjourns on rates

HAVING decided on a sum of 11/0.74 for the road service, the members of Waterford County Council adjourned consideration of the Estimate for the financial year without discussing the position further when they met in Dungarvan on Monday last.

Instead they will return to Dungarvan to resume their deliberations on to-morrow (Friday).

In a statement which accompanied the estimate of expenses the Co. Manager told the members:

The Estimate of Expenditure as prepared and considered by the Estimates Committee at their Meeting held on the 26th. (Ultimo), provides for expenditure amounting to £19,668 from Revenue Account for the forthcoming year. To meet this expenditure, receipts are estimated at £612,396 (apart from £15,058 chargeable to Dungarvan Urban District Council) and when account is taken of the excess votes required, including £6,731 already passed for the current year, a general rate of 41/10.64 in the £ will be needed to meet the proposed net expenditure as compared with the current year's rate of 39/01 an increase of 2/10.14 in the Pound.

Copies of the Estimate, with detailed explanatory and comparative tables attached thereto, are enclosed herewith.

The following comparative table shows the estimated rates in the Pound for each service and the variations therein as compared with 1958/59 viz.:

Of this total net increase a sum of 2/16d. is attributable to the Road Service, of which 1d. is needed to meet the estimated excess expenditure over the net amount provided for in respect of the current year and 88 pence for increased contingencies provision (£1000).

The Health Account provides for an increase of 1/2.21 in the £. The Demand of the Waterford Board of Public Assistance for Health Services shows an increase of £27,049 gross after taking credit for 56 per cent Health Services Grant Recoupment, this increase accounts for about 1/2.21 in the £ on the increase for Health Services the balance being due to the combined effect of miscellaneous variations in the expenditure and receipts as detailed in the accompanying explanatory schedules.

As from 1st April, 1959, the Administration of Ardkreen Hospital will pass to the Waterford Board of Public Assistance, the Council will in future pay the Board the average daily maintenance cost of County Tuberculosis patients sent there for treatment.

Taken by and large, the increase in the cost of health services may be attributed to the fact that the conversion of Ardkreen Hospital into a General Hospital will have the effect of providing 100 extra beds in the Board of Assistance Institute (B.A.I.), the cost of this increased service is, of course, borne by the City and County of Waterford jointly.

The Demand of the Mental Hospital Board requires an increase of 1.92 pence in the Rate, while the Demand of the Board of Assistance for Public Assistance Services shows a reduction of 86 of a penny.

Sanitary Services requirements are practically unchanged, while the cost of this increased service is, of course, borne by the City and County of Waterford jointly.

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provision for Loan Charges or monies to be borrowed for the purpose of the making of Supplementary Grants for the provision of new houses (£3,000) and £10,000 for the repair and reconstruction of existing houses as well as for loans authorised under the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1958, and including loans to borrowers under the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts for the acquisition of both existing and new houses. In this connection, the Council have not as yet adopted schemes for the continued payment of Supplementary Housing Grants or for the advancing of Loans for the acquisition of existing dwellings. With regard to Cottage Repairs, the sum provided out of Revenue in the Estimates is £10,000 (same as 1958-59). The provision for Loan Charges on Cottage Repairs is, however, £17,100, which includes provision for an additional loan of £15,000 to be spent on cottage repairs in 1959/60.

In General Purposes Account the rate in the £ shows an increase of 1/2.60. The principal increases under this heading are for Vocational Education (£656) Libraries £1,556 (being £787 less than the Libraries Committee Estimate); Scholarships (£950) Dredging of Helvick Harbour £1,250 net after crediting 50 per cent Grant; Reformatory and Industrial Schools (£1,000); Diseases of Animals (Net £310 after crediting recoupments); Costs of Rate Collection (£1,200); Fire Brigade (£220); Yghl. Bridge Expenses (£400); Loans for other new bridges (Annestown, Bonmahon and Kildangan) (£200); Loans Irrecoverable Rates and Refunds (£400) Wages, Repairs, Fuel, Light, Maintenance of Council Offices and Courthouses and contributions (£800) for Waterford and Clonmel Courthouses (£1,100); General Purposes Salaries (£450); The debit balance on this account includes provision for Superannuation Allowances to two retiring Rate Collectors.

Savings as follows are anticipated, viz.: Overdraft interest £2,000; Printing, Stationery and Advertising £200 and Postage and Telephones £200.

Town Charges will be levied in Lismore and Tramore in accordance with the Estimates and Demands received from the respective bodies of Town Commissioners.

Members will have noted from the Auditor's report for '57-58, which has just been circulated that the Council's financial position at that date was regarded as unsatisfactory, notwithstanding some improvement in the course of that year. Every effort must be made, not merely to prevent a deterioration in the Council's finances, but to take positive steps to procure a steady improvement therein, and to liquidate the present heavy debit balance, which involves a rate of about 9d. in the £ for overdraft accommodation. Such improvement has been possible to achieve recently can only be maintained by adopting a rate fully adequate to meet the cost of the services which the Council is bound by law to provide and the general services which the Council undertake to provide whether under housing, sanitary or other general headings. In previous years, I have impressed on the Council the desirability of making specific provision in the Estimates for a reduction of the debit balance, and while having regard to the increase in the rate proposed by the Estimates Committee, this may not be expedient in the current year, I must repeat my advice that the rate to be struck be adequate to meet the cost of all services proposed to be provided.

Provision has been made in the estimates for a sum of £2,359 net in respect of the increase in temporary allowance for certain grades of officers, as from 1st April, 1958. Such allowance has not yet been paid, in view of the Council's recent decision declining approval thereof.

However, the Council are no doubt aware by now that Local Authorities in the country have been given also to the Civil Service, Teachers, Gardaí and to employees generally under the National Wage Agreement, the Officers of the Councils subsidiary bodies have also been granted this increase, and I recommend that the provision therefor in the Estimates be allowed to stand.

A general review of the extent and scope of the services administered by the Council was given to you in connection with the Estimates for the current year. This year the report has been brought up to date so that the Council may be kept fully informed of the duties and responsibilities incidental to the administration of the local services, and I set out hereunder some further particulars of the various services administered by the Council.

Colr. T. Lannon raised the question of officials' salaries and stated he would firmly oppose any provision for an increase to these men who were already well paid.

Colr. Quirk—The point is have we the power to cut salaries. If we have not there is no point in discussing it, though I may look very well in the press, if we have, then by all means cut them.

Colr. Lannan—I am not speaking about reducing salaries. We don't want to give them if we don't want to and we can decide them on a majority vote to-day.

Colr. Keane—If we don't provide the money they cannot get it.

In reply to Colr. Lannon, the Co. Accountant stated that the Council's engineers were allowed travelling expenses on a sliding scale: cars under 10 h.p., 44d. per mile up to 4,000; 7d. per mile thereafter; over 10 h.p., 43d. per mile up to 4,000; 5d. per mile up to 4,000, 8d. thereafter.

Colr. Curran proposed that the Council adopt a rate of 10/10.58 for the road service. It was, he said, only a slight reduction on the estimate and would in effect be the same amount as they had provided for the previous year, stating that he had gone into the matter closely. Colr. Curran said he felt the Council should be able to meet their obligations on the existing rate. It was not, he said, his wish to see any man unemployed.

In reply to Colr. Walsh, the Co. Engineer agreed that by reducing the amount they proposed to spend on a proposed scheme for Stradbally he might be able to work within the sum suggested by Colr. Curran. This would be effected by reducing the amount of money they had proposed to spend on a scheme to reduce flooding at Stradbally.

Ald. Tom Kyne who stated that the labour content employed last year by the Council was one of the lowest ever, proposed that the Council should decide on a sum of 11/0.74, an increase of 6 pence on the amount suggested by Colr. Curran. This was seconded by the Chairman.

On a ballot Ald. Kyne's motion was carried by ten votes to nine.

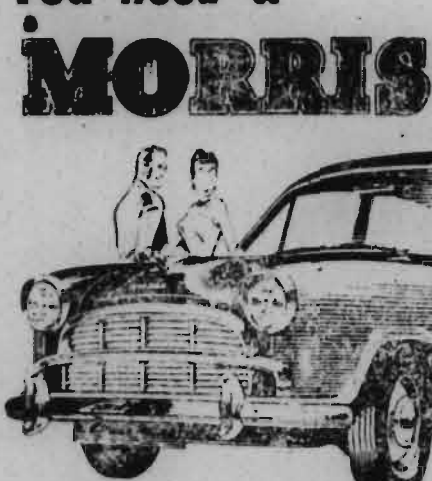

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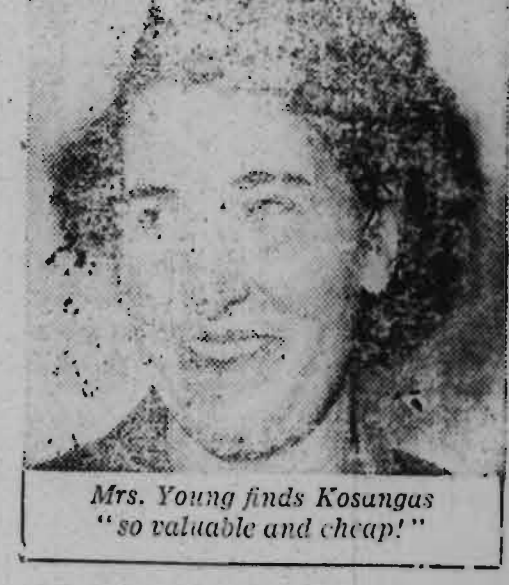

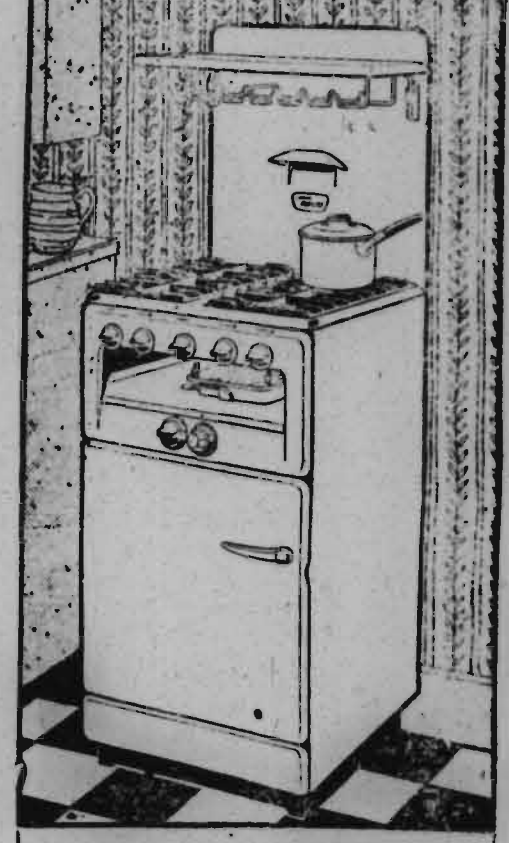

Deputation will see Minister

MEDICAL CONTROVERSIES TO BE DISCUSSED

The establishment of a maternity unit at Ardkeen Hospital and the probable impact on the services available at present were discussed in detail when the members of a special deputation which interviewed the authorities at Ardkeen Hospital reported back to Monday evening's meeting of the Board of Ardkeen.

As a result of allegations that the religious nursing community were being ignored, made during the course of the closing debate the Board decided to appoint a deputation to meet the Minister for Health and discuss the entire matter with him on Monday next.

His Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Cahan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore will be represented on the deputation which will also consist of Mr. T. Lannon (Chairman), Mrs. J. Fitzpatrick, Mr. T. A. Keane, T.D., Mr. J. J. Carroll, Mr. T. Walsh, Dr. Corrigan B.M.S. Ardkeen and Mr. J. A. Hayes, the Board's Secretary.

The County Manager (Mr. S. J. Moylan) said he had just received a phone message from the Secretary of the Department of Health, who informed him that he received a communication from the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore on Saturday evening and had not time to study the letter.

In view of this information the County Manager would suggest that a discussion on the proposed establishment of a maternity unit at Ardkeen be postponed until Monday next.

Mr. T. Lannon (chairman) said the main purpose of the meeting was to discuss the matter. Some of the members had been on a deputation to the Ardkeen authorities.

Mr. J. Fitzpatrick said it would be just as well if the members made known their opinions. Their views could be sent to the Secretary of the Department or the Minister and might be of assistance in dealing with the letter from his Lordship.

SUCCESSFUL APPLICATION FOR SALMON LICENCE

At Youghal District Court before Mr. District Justice W.P. Cahill, Mr. S. Barrett B.L. instructed by Mr. J.R. Barry Solicitor applied on behalf of William Carr of Curragee, County Cork, for a licence to deal in salmon. Mr. T. K. Keane, Solicitor for the Board of Conservators, opposed the application. Mr. Barrett said that in 1952 Mr. Carr was fined for offences against the Fisheries Acts and had no conviction since. He carries on an export business in a large scale. He has eight employees and this will increase if the present application is granted. Justice Cahill granted the licence. Mr. Carr said that the Board of Conservators stated that the applicant had a number of convictions in 1952. At present there were 25 dealers who handled 20,000 salmon last year. At this time was granted a licence it would be hard for the Inspector's staff of 18 to keep track of him in his van calling from door to door. Mr. Barrett - There is a statute of limitations and this man should not carry this on his back all ways. The offence was committed over 7 years ago and he had served the sentence. District Justice Cahill granting the licence said that taking everything into account, he was prepared to give the applicant a chance.

LAYE MRS. MARGARET O'NEILL

The funeral of the late Mrs. Margaret O'Neill, Town of Youghal whose death was reported in last week's issue, took place to North Abbey Cemetery followed by a large and representative cortege. Airmount was usually pretty full to capacity. They are now dealing with generalities.

Chairman - When you transferred the staff at the County Hospital to Ardkeen, you should have transferred all the staff.

Mr. Moylan - Ardkeen was always a lay hospital. If you transfer any of the nuns from the County Hospital was always governed by nuns. They should have been transferred to Ardkeen.

Mr. Carroll - Why should some of the staff at Ardkeen lose their positions?

Mr. Moylan - They are retained there and will be fully occupied. I have a report from the R.M.S.

Mr. Carroll - I do not care what the R.M.S. or others say with all respect to everybody.

Mr. Carroll - They are highly trained and would be an addition to Ardkeen.

Mr. Moylan - The nurses at Ardkeen are also highly trained. Mr. Carroll - I do not think the nuns should be discarded. There was a question of an objection at Ardkeen to the nuns going out there. That objection was not now exist.

Mr. Moylan indicated at this stage that he had received a memorial signed by the nurses at Ardkeen objecting to the nuns taking charge there.

Mr. Carroll - Some of the nuns signed under a certain amount of duress and had not full particulars.

Mr. Carroll said that the general staff at Ardkeen now felt that supervision by nuns would result in a better running of the hospital and better staff relations.

Some of the nurses thought they would become redundant if the nuns went there. A number who signed the memorial had since secured posts at Glenties, which is conducted by nuns. It did not look as if to protest carried any weight or was general.

Mr. Lannon - We should look after our own staff in the County Hospital.

Mr. Moylan - This Board is getting a gift of a £1 million hospital. You should keep this in mind when considering the transfer. From the point of view of administration there will have to be more officers to run it and higher costs.

He did not like, he said, to hear Ardkeen Hospital being called a County hospital. It would be a Regional Hospital and they would cater for patients from Kilkenny, Wexford, Tipperary and other places.

Mr. Carroll said that as far as the staff of both hospitals were concerned, he was prepared to stand over an increase of staff in order to give a proper medical service. They were anxious that the staff at the County Hospital should be looked after and that the nuns should take control at Ardkeen.

Mr. Moylan - The nuns in the County Hospital are not suffering any financial loss.

Mr. Lannon - We will have a County hospital in Ardkeen. We want all our staff at St. Patrick's hospital transferred there.

Mr. Moylan - I have received a letter from the Matron at St. Patrick's Hospital in which she stated that all the staff at the hospital was fully employed and there was no question of redundancy.

The County Manager added that the staff of Ardkeen Hospital was entirely a managerial function.

Mr. N. Walsh - Is it finalized?

Mr. Moylan - As far as I am concerned.

Mr. Carroll - We are entitled to have some say in the staffing of Ardkeen. I will vote against the taking over of Ardkeen unless we have a say in staffing.

Mr. Carroll - The County Manager has made a decision about the staff at Ardkeen and the retention of the nuns at St. Patrick's. All we can do is protest.

Mr. Moylan - If the nuns were transferred to Ardkeen, some of the nuns there would have to go. If the nuns went there it would create a problem with that.

Mr. Moylan said that according to letters he had received, the employment of nuns under a lay matron would not be tenable.

Mr. Walsh stated that the matter could now be decided only at Minister's level.

Passing of Well-Known Gael

The death just taken place in New York of Mr. Patrick (Wick) Meagher, a native of Toomevara, Co. Tipperary, and one of the best known figures in the G.A.A. world. He was known in Gaelic circles throughout Ireland and New York.

He is survived by his wife (nee Nell Wheelahan), formerly of Toomevara, and by his brother Jim.
