COUNTY RATE GOES UP AGAIN

A rate of 40/9 in the £, which represents an increase of 1/9½ on last year's and a reduction of 1/1.64 on the Co. Manager's Estimate, was adopted by Waterford County Council at a special meeting on Saturday last.

Mr. C. Curran was the proposer of the figure, which was seconded by Mr. R. Keane and carried by nine votes to three. During the course of the meeting the County Library service was under fire. It was suggested by Mr. W. Fagan that it should be abolished in an effort to reduce the rate and strong criticism was levelled at dispensary doctors who did not reside in their areas, and the Council's practice of maintaining unauthorised dispensary residences.

Mr. Moynihan stated that the estimate of expenditure as presented by the Estimates Committee, provided for expenditure of £1,100,000. A general rate of 40/6 in the £ would be needed, as compared with the current year's rate of 38/0, an increase of 2/10.44 in the £.

At an early stage of the meeting Mr. R. Keane said that if Mr. Lannon proposed that the rate be submitted by the County Manager he would be adopted, he would second it.

Mr. Lannon - I am worried about the people who cannot afford to pay them. A lot of those who have two jobs, can afford to pay them. A lot of people here have two jobs.

Mr. Keane - What salaries will be received by consultants. Mr. Moynihan - I could not deal with that of hand. I would have to go into it.

Mr. Keane - The general feeling is that they should be done away with. It is a terrible waste of money. If our own officials can do this work.

Mr. Keane - What about a rate of 40/- in the £. Mr. M. Morrissey, Solr, (Chairman) said that they would have to go through the estimate.

Mr. Keane - If we go through the estimate we will not get any further. Mr. Morrissey - If the estimate committee could have reduced it.

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PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITION

Mr. O'Leary (Co. Accountant) said that the increase amounted to 5/3d in the £. In 1951/52 the demand was 80d, and other figures were - 1952/53 92d; 1953/54 102d; 1954/55 106; 1955/56 127d; 1956/57 136d; 1958/59, 143d.

Mr. Curran proposed that a rate of 40/9 be struck and suggested that the following cuts be made: Roads, 2,16d, salaries 1,25d, cottage repairs, 1d, library services 1,25d, rate collection, 2,25d, scholarships, 1,5d, disease of animals, 1,5d.

Local Happenings

EFFORT ON BEHALF OF GLUE FACTORY
At Question Time in the Dail Mr. Tom Kynne, T.D. (Labour) asked the Minister for Industry and Commerce whether he was aware that the Irish Gelatines Ltd. factory at Ballinacree, Co. Wick, had ceased to operate, with a loss of employment for some 60 workers, and whether he had any proposals to enable the factory to re-open and re-commence operations, and ensure the continued employment of these men.

Mr. Lemass replied that he was aware that the factory referred to had ceased to operate. There were no proposals before him at present for its re-opening, but any sound proposals for the resumption of industrial activities at the factory would be afforded all assistance within his powers.

VERY SUCCESSFUL COURSE
There was an attendance of over sixty local housewives on each of the five nights of the special Demonstration Cookery Course which concluded at Dungarvan Technical School on Wednesday night last. The value and uses of Cheese in cookery were demonstrated on the opening night, to be followed by lessons on demonstrations dealing with the use of Potatoes and of Puddings, on the succeeding nights. Scores of attractive dishes were prepared and leaflets containing hundreds of useful recipes were distributed.

A special feature of this Course was the Housewives Forum night, on which previously submitted written questions dealing with household problems including cookery, painting and decorating, condensation and the care of the garden, were answered by a Panel of Experts.

Co. Councillors and Officials Hear Civil Defence Address

Mr. Fogarty, Director of Civil Defence, when he addressed the County Council...

stressed many times recently the devastating fall-out may make people think that it is hopeless to try to do anything to combat them.

While the Government will continue to try to provide the best technical knowledge available, and to assist Local Authorities in organising Civil Defence, neither the Government nor the Local Authorities can bring Civil Defence to life if the people do not give their support with their voluntary service.

As an Air Corps Officer, he has seen many occasions in which Civil Defence is an indispensable part of our national defence.

The other very real danger is that even if we do escape entire from direct hits by nuclear weapons, we could be subjected to a serious wave of radioactive fall-out from nuclear bombs exploded in other countries.

It is necessary, therefore, to restate the belief that no matter how great the power of weapons used in future war may be or how numerous the casualties or how great the destruction—organised, trained and disciplined men and women will always be able to reduce considerably the loss of life and destruction of property.

Miss Foley, who previously taught Domestic Science at St. Mary's College of Domestic Science, Cathal Brugha Street, Dublin, is well known in Cappoquin, Ballinacree and Dungarvan, where she taught classes in Domestic Science.

For her new job she will be in charge of the Domestic Economy section of the new modern Primary Training College of St. Anne's at Maryland, Lagos, Nigeria, in West Africa, where she will be responsible for the training of native girls who are undergoing a course of training to become Primary School teachers.

Land Contractors State Their Case

The Government's proposal to discontinue the Land Reclamation Scheme was the subject of the following statement issued by the National Land Reclamation Association during the week.

The Contractors feel that the Government should be very slow in reducing money from the Land Reclamation estimate. It may be argued for or against the Land Reclamation work for himself?

It has been very widely published that the Land Reclamation is costing the country £300 per acre. This is a huge £300 per acre. This is a huge £300 per acre.

The Department's figures for 1958 show that 174 contractors plants were in operation in the country during the year.

From what we understand from the White Paper it is suggested that money from the Land Reclamation be cut by a quarter of a million pounds this year and by a further million pounds in the following year.

Practically all contractors work is done under Section B, the reason being that the Government pay the contractors for their work and the farmers' contribution to his annuity. This means the farmer has no cash contribution to make and can use any capital he has towards the development of reclaimed land.

Does the Government realise that a Land Project Contractor's plant is a rural industry in itself?

Does the Government feel that the Land Project contractor can now finance land project work out of his own resources?

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Outspoken Criticism of St. Patrick's Day Parade
