## ST. PATRICK'S DAY SHOWS Splendid fare at Friary Hall

Outstanding item on the mat-  
inee and evening programmes of  
the St. Augustine's Dungarvan  
Past Pupils Union St. Patrick's  
Day Concert at the Friary Hall  
was the Paganet "An Sagart  
Oidhna" (The Golden Priest) pre-  
sented by the senior pupils of  
the Presentation Convent, Dun-  
garvan.

The paganet depicts Eire and  
her faithful children, mourning  
to her persecuted priests. In  
singing her, but her hopes  
are shattered once more by the  
announcement of the execution  
of Oliver Plunkett at Tibourn.  
While the story of his martyrdom  
is unfolded in plaintive verse,  
Blessed Oliver is dragged along  
the bloodstained path. On his  
way his faithful servant - James  
McKenna, and his loyal noble  
friend, Mrs. Elizabeth Sheldon,  
lead him a pathetic farce.  
Blessed Oliver mounts the gallows,  
re-assures his determination  
to die for his Faith, pro-  
claims his forgiveness of his  
enemies, and commends his soul  
to God. The music is played about  
his neck and the curtain closes.  
When it re-opens, the  
verse-speakers bid Eire rejoice  
that she has now a powerful  
advocate in heaven, Her Guardian  
Angel, standing above the  
pass of execution, holds aloft  
triumphantly the martyr's palm  
and crown. An exultant hymn  
to Blessed Oliver is sung, and on  
a note of triumph the paganet  
ends.

Prolonged applause from the  
audience greeted both matinee  
and evening performances of the  
Paganet at the Friary Hall. When  
it was presented by the Presenta-  
tion Convent pupils at the re-  
cent Felle na Spol in Waterford  
it was warmly praised and highly  
commended by the adjudicators.

## Dispensary To Be Transferred To Priory House

That the Co. Manager had  
ordered the transfer of the dis-  
pensary to Priory House con-  
sequent on a notice to quit the  
present premises at O'Connell  
Street, Dungarvan, was dis-  
cussed at a meeting of the  
Board of Assistance in Dungarvan  
on Monday last.

The Secretary (Mr. J. Hynes)  
told the members that in ac-  
cordance with the agreement en-  
tered into when they took over  
the tenancy of 19 O'Connell St.  
premises in 1954, two months  
notice has been served on them  
to quit. As it was the intention  
to have the dispensary in Priory  
House when renovated, the Co.  
Manager had made an order for  
an immediate transfer.

Mr. T. A. Kyne suggested that  
arrangements should be made to  
avoid queuing as was necessary  
at O'Connell Street.

The Chairman (Mr. T. Lan-  
non) said the proper thing to  
do would be to build a dispensary  
in Dungarvan. It would be  
much better to build a new one  
than to alter and repair an old  
old building.

## Late James Landers

AGLISH

Another link with an era that  
is almost forgotten was severed  
during the past week by the re-  
gretted passing of Mr. James  
Landers, Aglish. The deceased  
was an expert thatcher—a craft  
once synonymous with rural life  
—and carried on a thriving busi-  
ness until advancing years  
caused his retirement from the trade  
some years ago.

A quiet inoffensive type of  
gentleman, keenly interested in  
the games of the Gael, he was in  
his younger days a player of no  
mean ability. He breathed his  
last in the District Hospital,  
Dungarvan, after a compara-  
tively short illness.

There was an imposing con-  
course at the removal of the re-  
mains to Aglish Parish Church  
on Monday evening and again  
at the interment which was  
made in the adjoining cemetery  
after Masses of Requiem on  
Tuesday.

## Kilmac' Man on Deputation

One of the nine-man deputa-  
tion from the National Farmers'  
Association which approached the  
Minister for Agriculture, Mr.  
Smith, at Government  
Buildings, Dublin, on Thursday  
last, was Mr. David J. Cough-  
lan, Rossmore House, Kilmac-  
thomas, a member of the Water-  
ford County Executive of the  
N.F.A. The deputation put a  
series of recommendations with  
regard to bovine tuberculosis eradica-  
tion with particular emphasis on  
the problems existing in the  
dairy industry.

## Cow-testing members take stock

The annual general meeting  
of the Dungarvan Cow-Testing  
Association was held in Egan's  
Hotel, on 21st February. Mr.  
Patrick Morrissey, President,  
presided.

The Minutes of the last annual  
general meeting were approved  
and signed, as was also the fi-  
nancial statement.

The following was the super-  
visor's annual report:-  
At the beginning of the year  
the Association comprised 18  
members, owing 190 cows, and  
at end of year 15 members  
owning 198; these completed  
records are available for 179  
cows.

The average yield of milk and  
b.f. of the completed cows was  
6,884 lbs. milk, 240.45 lbs. b.f.,  
with an average test of 3.49%.  
Valuing b.f. at 4/- per lb. and  
skim milk 8% of whole at 3/-  
per cwt. per gallon, the value of  
produce was £54,171.11 per cow.  
This yield shows an increase  
of 182 lbs. milk, and 5.23 lbs.  
b.f. and a decrease of .02%  
average test as compared with  
1957.

The best cow recorded was the  
non-pedigree Shorthorn cow  
called "White Face" that in a  
lactation of 43 weeks gave an  
average yield of 9,303 lbs. milk,  
323.38 lbs. b.f., average test 3.50%.  
Value £23,191.

The worst cow recorded was  
a non-pedigree Shorthorn which  
in a lactation of 29 weeks gave  
a yield of 3,108 lbs. milk, 95.1  
lbs. b.f., average test 3.06%.  
Value £222.5. This would show  
a difference of £71,168 in the  
earning capacity of the good  
cow over the bad one. 4 cows  
like the bad one would not pro-  
duce as much as the good cow.  
Assuming that labour and food  
cost £30 and value of calf £18,  
The best cow would leave a profit  
of £81,191.1 whereas the  
worst cow would leave a profit  
of £102.5.

The five best cows recorded  
were: 1st, Christian Brothers  
"White Face" which gave 9,303  
lbs. milk, 323.38 lbs. b.f., average  
test 3.50%. Value £23,191.1.  
2nd, Christian Brothers "Bread"  
10,881 lbs. milk, 397.15 lbs. b.f.,  
average test 3.65%. Value  
£30,447.

3rd, Mr. Patrick Morrissey's  
"Ballycove Gynne" 7th, 10,941  
lbs. milk, 374.18 lbs. b.f.; aver-  
age test 3.42%. Value £85,149.

4th: Mr. Martin Kelly's  
"Holyough", 10,314 lbs. milk,  
363.05 lbs. b.f., average test  
3.52%. Value £82,182.

5th: Mr. Con Dempsey's "13",  
9,380 lbs. milk, 366.75 lbs. b.f.,  
average test 3.91%. Value  
£29,648.

Averages for above: 10,164  
lbs. milk, 384.88 lbs. b.f.; aver-  
age test 3.78%. Value £87,111.

The 5 worst cows recorded  
gave yields as follows: 1st, 3,108  
lbs. milk, 95.10 lbs. b.f. test  
3.06%. Value £222.5; 2nd, 3,587  
lbs. milk, 108.32 lbs. b.f., test  
3.02%. Value £253.2; 3rd, 4,025  
lbs. milk, 117.93 lbs. b.f. test  
2.93%. Value 27,119; 4th 3,426  
lbs. milk, 130.18 lbs. b.f. test  
3.8%. Value £29,848; 5th, 3,885  
lbs. milk, 132.86 lbs. b.f. test  
3.42%. Value £30,744. Averages:  
3,866 lbs. milk, 116.88 b.f., 3.24%  
Value £26,188 per cow.

The best herd of 10 cows or  
under, completed, was Mr. Pat-  
rick Morrissey's with 6 cows,  
which gave an average of 8,634  
lbs. milk, 297.70 lbs. b.f.; aver-  
age test 3.4%. Value £68,210  
per cow.

Second best herd in this size  
group was: Christian Brothers,  
herd of 3 cows, completed, that  
gave a yield of 8,165 lbs. milk,  
331.02 lbs. b.f.; average test  
4.05%. Value £74,776.

The best herd of between 10  
and 20 cows, completed, was Mr.  
Edmond Phelan's 17 cows that  
gave an average of 7,639 lbs.  
milk, 269.56 lbs. b.f.; average  
test 3.52%. Value £61,103.

Second best herd in this size  
group was Mr. William O'Brien's  
Stradbally, herd of 14 cows,  
completed, that gave an average  
of 7,742 lbs. milk, 263.60 lbs. b.f.;  
average test 3.54%. Value  
£60,253.

Congratulating the cast on their performance, Rev. Fr. M. Walsh, C.C. Abbeyside, who is President of St. Laurence's Hall Ballinroad, said it would appear definitely that practice made perfect...

"It is a great achievement," said Father Walsh, "for this rural group to put on two plays in one season. They have produced "Mrs. Mulligan's Millions" and "The Down Express"...

"The plays, both comedies, staged by the Ballinroad Players," said Father Walsh, "have provided us all with many a good laugh. A laugh is an excellent tonic and helps to release what a psychiatrist calls 'inhibitions'..."

"These boys and girls from the country," said Fr. Walsh, "have set a headline and provided a good example that the boys of the Village might well emulate. In my six-and-a-half-year period in the parish of Abbeyside, I haven't seen one show put on by the boys..."

"Great credit is due to this branch," said Mr. Reid, "last year was an uneventful year here as elsewhere, but the branch had the good sense to meet regularly in a quiet year and the records show that every member is fully paid up..."

"Over the years a tremendous amount of work has been done for the members. Things were not yet at the stage they could wish, but great advances had been made from the hopeless conditions that obtained in 1901 when the organisation was founded. There were then no half-holidays, meals were taken only when it suited the employer, there was no lunch hour, and many staffs worked under appalling conditions. All that had been changed but not without sacrifice. Many of the pioneer Union men lost their employment and many were jailed by alien courts in the land for their fight for rights. Perhaps many of our younger members to-day do not fully appreciate the efforts of these pioneers."

"I am not saying," continued Mr. Reid, "that things are perfect yet, there is still a lot to be done. All over the country, young people are leaving the Distributive Trades mainly to the low starting wage and that is something we will have to tackle."

"Among the improvements which were sought was the substitution of an eight year incremental period for the ten year one. A new approach must be made to the wage structure in the Distributive Trade in this country. There was also the question of pensions. Many of those who had devoted their whole lives to the trade were let go finally without any pension. 'There is,' said Mr. Reid, 'depreciation of machinery, of office furniture... but no provision for appreciation of the human being.' The Union itself was investigating the possibilities of a scheme of contributory pensions within the Union. He wished success to the Distributive Branch in the coming year."

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Distributive Workers Hold Annual Meeting

"Buy Irish goods and help to check the flow of emigration from our country," was the appeal made by Mr. William J. McGrath, St. Garvan's T.C., Dungarvan, Secretary of the Distributive Workers and Clerks, at the annual general meeting of the branch held in Egan's Hotel, Dungarvan, recently.

"There is hardly one family in this town," said Mr. McGrath, "which has not been affected by the constant drain of emigration. The census figures show the deadly sapping of the youth of the country caused by emigration. We could all help, even in a small way, if we ask for Irish goods in the shops. We will help Irish industry and help to give employment in our own country. We should ask if the article on sale is of Irish manufacture and our goods to-day can hold their own with any of the world. Yet, I wonder how many of us this day, or this week went in and asked for Irish goods by name."

Referring to what he termed "dead" members, Mr. McGrath said that many had come to meeting after meeting of the branch, but contributed nothing. For all practical purposes they were dead. He had noticed a depressing feeling of apathy of late. "No longer does anybody seem to work to achieve anything," he said, "Maybe our past success works in this way. Maybe branches are only strong and active when they are fighting for something."

He appealed for esprit de corps among the members and ending the meeting of the strength of a chain lying in its weakest link, said that he felt that his chain needed re-forging. He sought the full co-operation of the branch to accomplish the great deal which still remained to be done.

Area Organizer, Mr. Edward Reid, Waterford, complimented the Secretary on the excellent work he was doing for the Distributive Branch for his splendid report and comments on affairs. The fact that all the members of this branch were fully paid up members showed that they were in earnest about their affairs and the happy state of affairs was largely due to the efforts of Mr. McGrath, their Secretary.

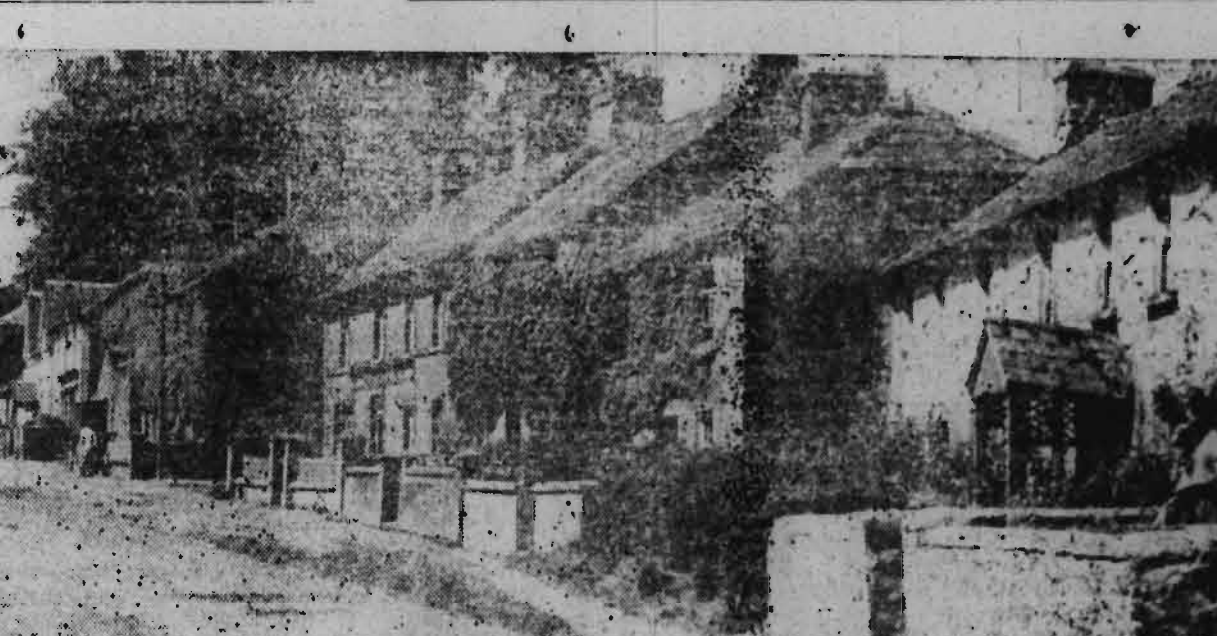

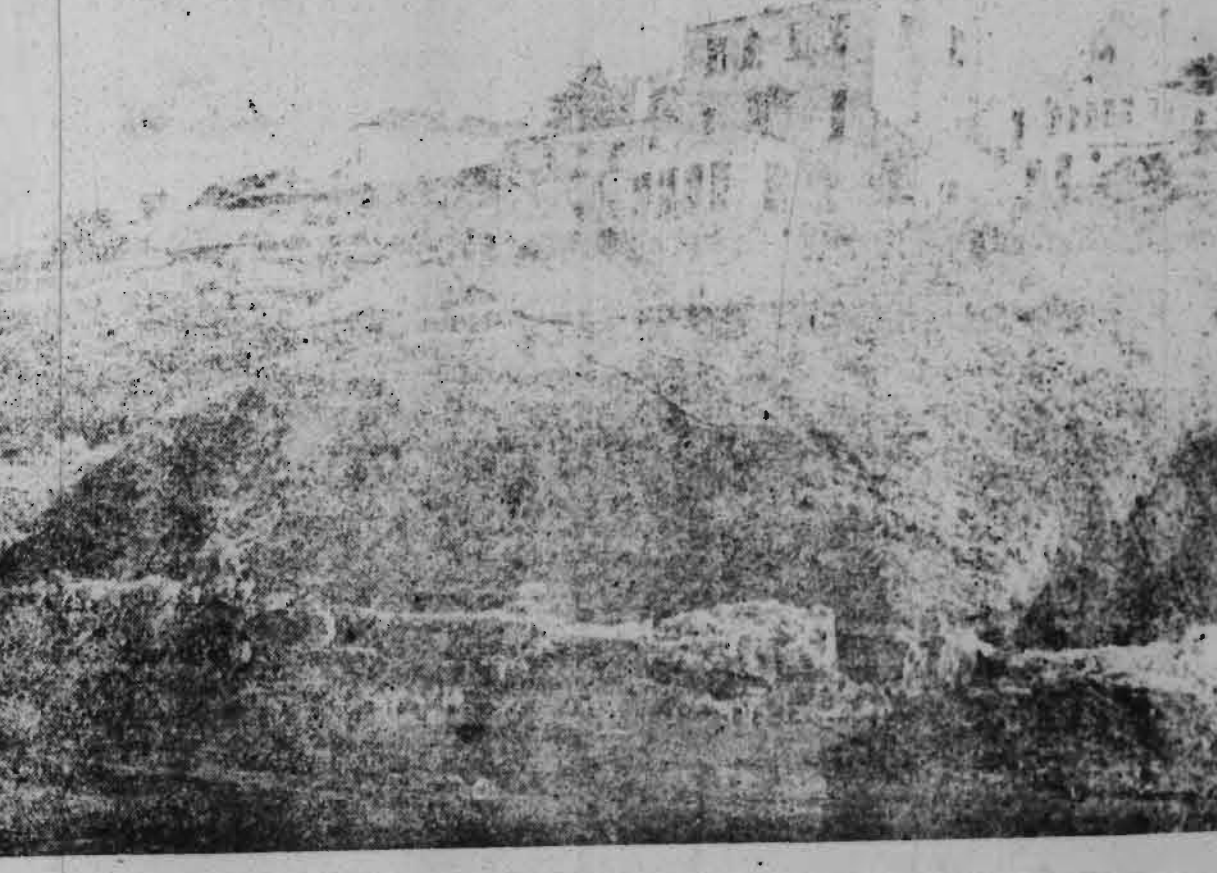
