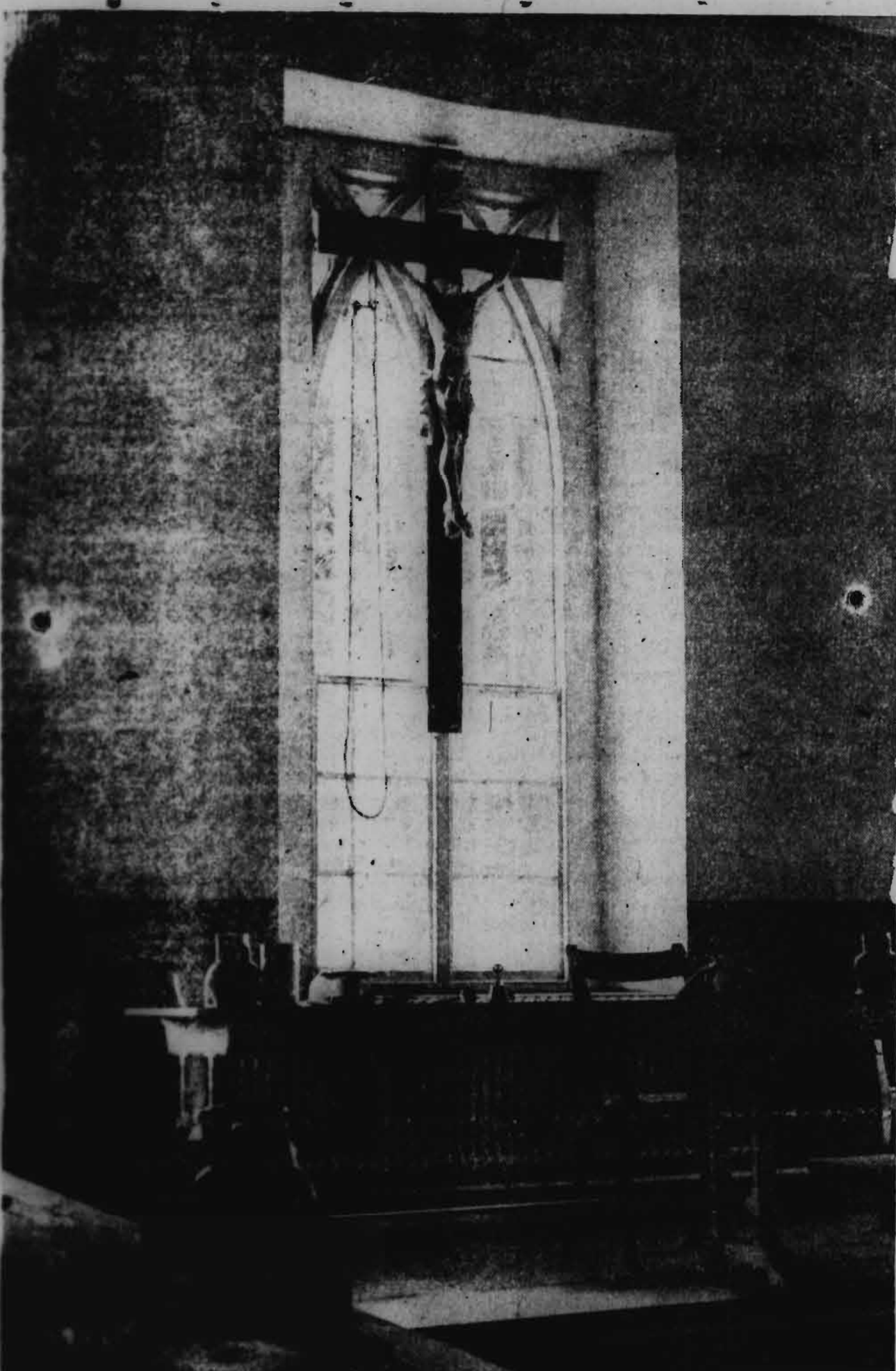

AGREEMENT AT LAST

Ardkeen to be taken over

WATERFORD Board of Public Assistance, following a three-hour special meeting on Saturday evening last, decided to take over the £1,110,000 Ardkeen Chest Hospital from the County Council for use as a Co. Hospital as and from April 1st next, provided that an agreement satisfactory to the Medical Missionaries of Mary, who conduct Airmount Nursing Home is reached in the meanwhile.

The arrangement will involve the appointment of a temporary obstetrician gynaecologist and the Minister for Health's proposal to set up a maternity unit at Ardkeen.

MINISTER'S ASSURANCE

At the meeting it was stressed by County Manager S. J. Moynihan and Dr. P. L. Corrigan, R.M.S. Ardkeen that the Minister for Health gave an assurance to the deputation which he received three weeks ago that the position of the Medical Missionaries of Mary would not be worsened in any way.

Mr. Moynihan indicated that it would cost £143,000 a year to run Ardkeen.

It said that Dr. Corrigan, Mr. Hynes, Secretary and himself, saw His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Cahalan Bishop of Waterford and Lismore on Wednesday and they had a lengthy conference on the suggestion made by the Board that the nuns at St. Patrick's Hospital should be transferred to Ardkeen. They came to an agreement and he informed the Rev. Mother in a letter that it had been agreed to transfer from the Co. Hospital to Ardkeen the maternity centre. The Sister attached to the Orthopaedic Unit and the Children's sister when qualified. These posts when they became vacant in future would be filled by open competition within Ardkeen and the nuns serving there could apply equally with the staff nurses for the posts.

Mr. Moynihan said they could take it that a satisfactory solution to their problems would be arrived at. The Minister had given them his word that he would meet the wishes of the Medical Missionaries of Mary.

NUNS CAN COMPETE

In future the nuns of the Mercy Order could compete for advertised special nursing posts in Ardkeen.

Councillor W. Carroll felt that all the nuns in St. Patrick's Hospital should be transferred to Ardkeen as they had specialised training. It looked he said as if Ardkeen would be a millstone around the necks of the nuns for many years and it was their duty to see that not a penny of public money would be wasted.

Mr. Moynihan said that the staff of St. Patrick's Hospital was now fully employed.

Dr. Corrigan told Mr. T. Gallagher that nine doctors would be engaged at Ardkeen when the full transfer took place.

Councillor Carroll - We have 12 doctors between Ardkeen and the Co. Hospital.

Dr. Corrigan said that the total number of patients would increase and the number of doctors would rise by one to fourteen as they had to cover two institutions.

He also stated that in order to reach a satisfactory standard the cost of personnel should be two-thirds of the total running cost of the hospital. At £143,000 they had under one-third of the £600,000 cost.

Mr. Tom Lannon said he still thought that nine doctors at Ardkeen was too many.

Mr. Charles Curran said there was a certain amount of underground opposition by the nursing staff at Ardkeen to the nuns being transferred there from the Co. Hospital.

Mr. Moynihan said he made an offer last July to transfer five of the community from St. Patrick's but was turned down.

DUNGARV COURT

DISTRICT Justice Skinner, at Dungarvan Court on Wednesday last dismissed the case against Laurence Power, haulage contractor, of Main Street, who was charged with using a lorry that was not covered by the necessary merchandise licence on the 1st November last.

His Worship had reserved judgement from a previous sitting at which the relative evidence had been heard.

A summons against Thomas Lannon, the Quay, who was charged with entering into an agreement with Power for the carriage of merchandise on the same date contrary to the Road Transport Act was also dismissed, the Justice remarking that Lannon in the circumstances was entitled to the benefit of doubt.

Sgt. Flanagan was for the prosecution; Mr. E. P. King, Solicitor (Messrs. J. F. Williams and Son) represented Power, and Mr. A. V. Maher, solicitor (Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey) appeared for Lannon.

The Attorney General charged Vincent Mooney, Dunabratlin, Annewstown, with using an unlicensed lorry and with the carriage of merchandise contrary to the Road Transport Act 1932.

In this case, which was adjourned from a previous sitting, Mr. King, solicitor, who appeared for Mooney, stated that the lorry was not in general use. The defendant was employed as a mechanic in a garage in Kilmestras and on the occasion in question agreed to help out a neighbour.

A fine of £28.10.0, mitigated to £2.0.0, was imposed in the first charge, and a further fine of 10/- in default to produce the road merchandise licence. His Worship remarked that the penalties would be higher in future.

The P.O.A. was applied in a case in which Henry A. Barlee, of 4, Mary Street, Waterford, was charged with driving an unlicensed car and with failure to produce a driving licence.

The defendant, who appeared in court, stated that he had only purchased the car ten days prior to the summons and had experienced some difficulty in procuring the insurance book. He agreed that his driving licence, which had since been renewed, was expired on the date of the prosecution.

Lismore came second in the team prize, won by Dunhill A.C. in the three mile road race held in Tramore on St. Patrick's day, at which there was a total of twenty-two entries. Mr. P. Whelan, Lismore, came in close behind the individual winner, F. Walsh, Waterford, to take second place.

Ballinameela's Enterprising Young Men

The decision to grow beet as a junior young farmers' club project proved a lucrative one for the lads of Ballinameela, Co. Waterford last season. Three teen-age members of this active young group collected bonus prizes cheques of £10 each from the Irish Sugar Company for high yields. In addition to the sale price of their crops.

First to receive his prize from Mallow Sugar Factory Mr. Tadhg Twomey, at a presentation ceremony at Ballinameela, was sixteen-year-old Patsy Cashman of Rockfield, Cappagh, who had a return of over 17 tons of beet from his project area.

Chairman of the Ballinameela Branch of Macra na Tuaithe, though still attending school, finds time after classes to help his father's farm, attend junior farmer Club meetings and organise rural activities for the members. He joined the club in 1956 at its inauguration. In that year, he says, I took on as my project the rearing of sheep and lambs. Last year I decided to take part in the National Beet Growing competition and though I had to work hard at it, I enjoyed every minute and it proved profitable too.

Paddy O'Keefe, aged 16 1/2 years, is another prizewinner from Ballinameela. This is Paddy's second year growing beet, because he found that there were good financial returns from it. He works on his father's farm at Killeshal, Cappagh. His return from his beet project was a little over 16 tons per acre. Paddy says that it is his intention to grow some beet every year.

Though he is the youngest of the three prizewinners, Jim Cliffe, aged 14, still turned out a good job on his half-acre of beet. He kept it clean and neat,

and compiled careful and accurate accounts of his project. His returns were 8 tons for the half-acre. He intends to grow beet again this year, as he feels that there is good money in it for him. He farms at Bewley, Cappoquin.

For the 1958/59 Beet season five more members of the Ballinameela group have entered for the competition.

A group of thirty girls and boys from the Ballinameela, Co. Waterford Macra na Tuaithe Club, all of them under 17 years of age. The branch which was one of the first in the country, was formed in April 1956, and is going strongly since. In addition to meetings, lectures and ordinary club affairs, the youngsters undertake various projects such as rearing of calves, pigs, beet crops, potatoes, etc., on a plot of their own. Technical assistance is available from the agricultural and vocational instructors, and encouragement is given by Macra na Feirme and the Countrywomen's Association, who regularly award prizes for competitions.

Last year the Ballinameela branch entered five members for the national beet growing competition and won three out of the twenty prizes offered by Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Eireann to members of young farmers' junior clubs throughout Ireland an excellent record for a small club.

Rural Science Instructor Donal Whelan, Cappoquin, who is in charge of the club, and who stars in the forward line of the Waterford Senior hurling team, visits the projects regularly with Jimmy McGrath and John O'Donnell of Macra na Feirme. They give helpful advice and useful tips to the youngsters.

N.F.A. REPLIES TO CRITICS

In view of recent correspondence in the local press, the N.F.A. County Executive wishes to bring the following points to the notice of the public:
1.-An allegation has been made that the N.F.A. attitude to the rates problem is a negative one and in response to several requests we have refused to examine the Estimates and suggest where savings could be made. The N.F.A. deputation did in fact, refuse to examine the Estimates pointing out that it is the business of the Council and officials to see where reductions could be made and the rates maintained at a reasonable level. We did, however, suggest what still seems to us to be the only solution, that is, that a firm of business consultants be employed to advise the Council where savings could be made. We understand that the charge made by such a firm is on a basis of a percentage of the savings effected. This means no further expense on behalf of the Council.
2. We would further like to point out that in justice, a relationship should exist between rates and farm income. In fact, such a relationship existed until 1951, but as our graphs have shown this relationship has since ceased, rates having soared from 21/11.82 in the £. in 1951, to 40/9 in the £. in 1957. During the same period farm income tended to drop and is now in fact lower than in 1951. The County Council and officials who developed that situation to develop and at the same time allowed the county indebtedness to rise from £20,964 in 1951 to £1,373,201 in 1957, could not be described as other than irresponsible.
The N.F.A. County Executive does not propose to issue any further statements in this matter, but in fairness to our members we felt it was necessary once again to bring the above points to the notice of the public.

PROUD prizewinners at the Cappoquin Drama Festival, the Ballymacarby Choral and Dramatic Society presented the three-act play by Joseph Tomelty "Is the Priest at Home?" before a packed audience at the Friary Hall, on Sunday night, when they gave an excellent performance.
This active amateur group of rural actors sprang into being a little over six years ago, as an offshoot of the choral singing classes formed in the district by the then new curate Rev. Fr. J. Bracken, C.C., who is a native of Clonmel and who had ministered at Ring parish prior to his transfer to Ballymacarby.

Co. Librarian Reports on Estimate Meeting

Reporting verbally on the above proceedings, the County Librarian stated that he had appealed to the County Council to look upon the Library Estimates in a proper perspective. He had pointed out for instance that the proposed cut on the road estimates amounted to one, two hundred and fiftieth in a total expenditure of some £200,000 and that he would agree to a proportionate cut for the Library Services which would give a reduction of roughly £21, whereas the County Council proposed reducing the Library Estimates from the original £9,278 demanded to £6,944. Such a cut would have a most disastrous result on the services and there was no reasonable proportion at all between such a cut and that actually made for roads.
In the course of the County Council debates, Mr. Curran stated that he had received a survey of branches and centres and had reached the conclusion that the Library services were not being utilised to any great extent by the general public.
The County Librarian said he wished to know, what particular qualifications Mr. Curran had for undertaking such a survey, what his terms of reference were, and what were the reasoned and detailed proofs upon which his conclusions were based.
Mr. Curran had also stated that the fact that he found the shelves at centres and branches filled with books proved that the public were not reading them. The County Librarian said he wondered how borrowers could select reading material when they were faced with empty shelves.
A general discussion followed upon the County Librarian's Report.
Mr. N. Walsh, M.C.C., said that he believed Mr. Curran was one of the ablest members of the County Council and that he was sincere in his efforts to keep the rates as low as possible. As regards the reduction for roads compared to that for Libraries, he must remember grants were given for roads in proportion to amount spent. Such was the case for Libraries. Referring to the County Librarian's remarks he thought the latter should have made his criticism at the meeting and not from the shelter of the Committee. The County Librarian replied that undoubtedly he had not been quick-witted enough at the County meeting and his present remarks were the issue of further reflection since then. If the Library Service had no grants it was all the more dependent on the amount supplied by the County Council.
Mr. M. O'Hara said that while he understood and sympathised with Councilors in their rate problems he still considered it the duty of the County Librarian to be progressive to select the Library Service for such drastic cuts.
Mrs. C. Griffin and Bean Uí Cuinn said that they considered the cut imposed on the Library service altogether out of proportion and very harmful. Every effort must be made to alter the Council's policy in this respect by contacting local councillors and explaining the case to them.
Mr. F. X. O'Leary said that anyone who had observed borrowers at Branches knew how they went from shelf to shelf looking over the books in order to find what they required, if the shelves were not well stocked how could borrowers select books?
Bean Uí Cuinn stated she was in complete disagreement with the Council's policy in this respect and that she would work to alter the Council's policy in this respect by contacting local councillors and explaining the case to them.

RECORD MILK PRODUCTION IN 1957

The record total of 616,000,000 gallons of milk was produced on Irish farms in the year 1957, of which 290,000,000 gallons went to creameries. The more difficult season of 1958 caused a reduction in total yield, and the supplies to creameries dropped by the end of the year to 274,000,000 gallons.
Of the 1957 total, 108,000,000 gallons were consumed in liquid form, 138,000,000 gallons went into butter manufacture, 77,000,000 gallons were fed to animals and the balance amount 3,000,000 gallons went into other industrial processes.
The record milk yield caused a record production of creamery butter in 1957—48,900 tons, which dropped in 1958 to 46,800 tons. Of the latter total approximately 16,000 tons were exported to the Six Counties and Britain.

JOURNEY INTO SPACE

CONVEYANCE OF EGGS BY POST

At this season of the year considerable quantities of eggs are sent by post. The Minister for Posts and Telegraphs, therefore, directs the attention of the public to the method of packing which has been found by experience to afford the best protection. A strong rigid box, with suitable partitions and a well-fitting lid, should be used. Each egg should be wrapped separately in paper or other soft material and placed on end in a separate compartment and the vacant spaces should be filled with paper or some such material as cotton waste. The cover of the parcel should be conspicuously marked "Eggs".

GOVERNMENT NOTICE

The Department of Posts and Telegraphs announces that, in order to comply with international obligations, the postage payable on letters for Continental Europe and Overseas destinations will be increased with effect from the 1st April. The present minimum charge of 5d. is less than the minimum permitted under the revised Universal Post Union Convention, which comes into operation on the 1st April. Some other charges in the foreign post service are also affected. There is no change in the postage on letters or other mail items for delivery in Ireland or Great Britain. Air Mail rates also remain unchanged.

The Department also announces the introduction of a new category of mail known as Small Packets in the foreign post service. The service is provided specially for the transmission by letter mail of goods, whether dutiable or not. Small packets, which may not exceed 2 lb. in weight, must be packed so that the contents may be easily examined without breaking any seal. They may not contain letters but an open invoice reduced to its essential elements may be enclosed. They may be registered but not insured. The service is cheaper and as a rule speedier than the foreign parcel post service. Small Packets may be sent only to countries which operate the service; these include the U.S.A., most Commonwealth and British Overseas territories, and most European countries. Details of the new service may be obtained from any post office or from The Secretary (Room 276), Department of Posts and Telegraphs, G.P.O., Dublin.

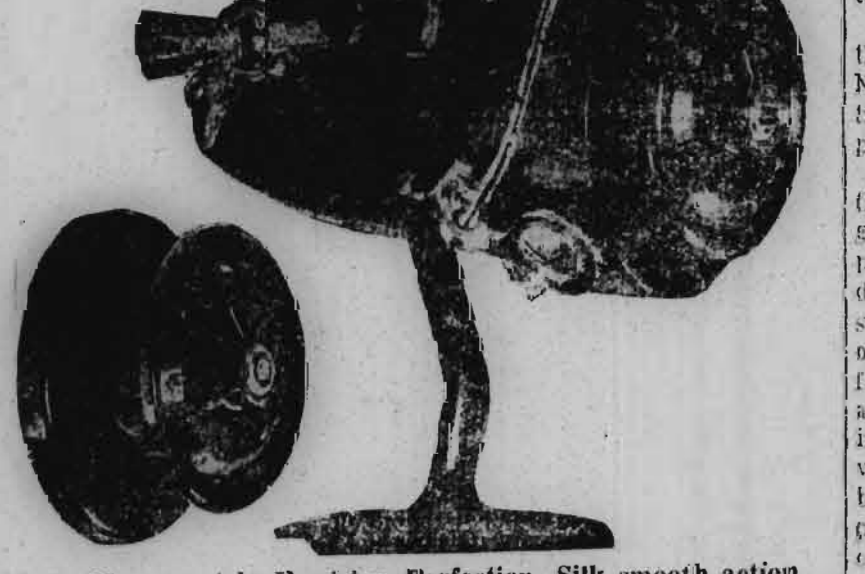

Statement by Minister for Fisheries

Mr. Erskine Childers, Minister for Lands, speaking at a meeting of N.A.I.D.A., Dublin on 20th March said that those who claimed that Irish people would not eat fish were wrong, just as they would not plant trees.

The consumption of fish had increased from 1951 to 1958 by more than thirty three and a third per cent and this with virtually no advertising or propaganda save for one brief campaign.

The export market was buoyant and proof of this was the steady small increase of exports each year—the total figure for 1958 being £1,361,219 compared with £1,187,228 in 1957 and £1,027,887 in 1956.

Moreover, more private fish and shell processing plants had opened in 1958 than in any previous year and a herring canner had commenced in a fishing port.

A further canner was under construction and two others were in various stages of formation.

The promoters were promised permission to secure supplies from foreign fishing boats if home caught supplies were inadequate.

In spite of poor fishing for part of 1958 substantial quantities of fish taken in November and December brought in over all weight and value for 1958 above the figures for the previous two years. The preliminary figures of catch for 1958 showed increases in the value of fish caught of 24 per cent and 14 per cent respectively over the corresponding figures for 1956 and 1957.

The Programme for Economic Expansion provided for the introduction of bigger boats and with that in view he intended to ask the Government to repeal the clauses in the Fisheries Acts which limited the freedom of Irishmen to own large boats.

The retailers and wholesalers had promised to deal with larger landings and Irish fish well found was so fresh that good prices should be available on the British market.

Progress depended on the number of fishermen offering for training under the Training Course.

Married men with families and young men with dependants were offered reasonable terms.

He hoped that young men would apply for lobster boats whose cost was reasonable.

The market for shellfish had great potential as the purchasing power of the middle and lower income groups all over Europe inevitably expanded.

Lobster fishing was still very undeveloped, along whole stretches of the coast.

If training was needed he asked these young men to write to the Department.

He welcomed the holding of the first Congress of the National Fishermen's Organisation which was due to take place at the week-end.

Speaking on inland fisheries, the Minister said that the Programme for Economic Expansion provided for improvement works designed to increase the runs of salmon in certain rivers capable of carrying heavier stocks of fish. As well as improving existing rivers should result in an increase in salmon exports which at present were valued at between £500,000 and £600,000 per annum, the highest return of 2 1/2 varieties of fish exported.

The bulk of our salmon went to Great Britain where its high quality commanded a ready market.

Plans were also in hand for stepping up exports of fresh water eels, currently valued at about £30,000 yearly.

It was hoped to commence the promotion of small scale fish farming in the near future with a view to providing rainbow trout for the home and export markets.

Our inland fisheries had only recently begun to be exploited from the point of view of attracting tourist anglers but results to date had shown that angling tourism gave every promise of contributing vitally to the economic prosperity of the country.

Anglers from abroad were coming in increasing numbers each year, the numbers of anglers and trout fishing tourists here in 1958 being 73% and 55% respectively higher than in 1957. The big attraction for these visitors was the size of the fish to be found in Ireland.

Trout weighing from 3 to 5 lbs. were common in some of our rivers and lakes and eleven to fourteen pounders had been taken. Pike up to 33 lb., bream of 21 lb. and tench of 42 lb. had also been caught.

See angling though still in its infancy in this country was already beginning to play an important part in attracting tourists. Twenty-four new sea angling clubs were founded in 1958 and eleven sea angling festivals and competitions were held, all of them highly successful. It is clear from the catches last year that the water around

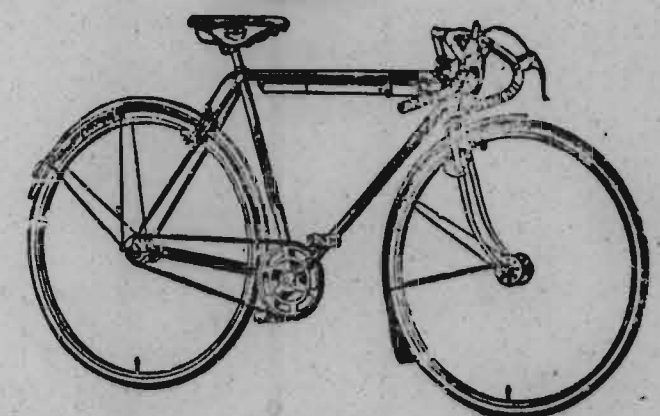

Functions of Agriculture has many tasks to perform in the national interests of the country. Its funds are obtained by way of roughly equal contributions from the County Council and the Department of Agriculture. The total amount received each year from the Co. Council is based on a rate per £ and the Department contributes an amount of the same amount to the grant.

Starting at the beginning of the financial year the Committee parcels out its funds into a number of smaller sums. Each sum of money is allocated to meet the spending needs of a particular Scheme during the ensuing year. Special allocations are made for schemes such as Livestock Improvement, horse-breeding scheme, which makes provision for nomination to mares, the cattle-breeding scheme with premium awards to bulls to encourage selected applicants to bring high-quality breeding stock into the county, the pig-breeding scheme with similar provision, and the sheep-breeding scheme with substantial premium awards towards high-class breeding flocks in mountain districts.
