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### Functions of Committee of Agriculture

The County Committee of Agriculture has many functions to perform in the agricultural interests of the county. Its funds are obtained by way of roughly equal contributions from the County Council and the Department of Agriculture. The total amount received each year from the Co. Council is based on a rate per £ and the Department contributes approximately the same amount by way of grant.

Every county ratepayer contributes to some extent towards this fund, as for that matter does every taxpayer. It is of interest to every farmer to see how the schemes are designed and to satisfy himself that he is getting the maximum amount of benefit from the spending of the funds.

**ALLOCATIONS**

Starting at the beginning of the financial year the Committee divides out its funds into a number of smaller sums. Each such sum of money is allocated to meet the spending needs of a particular scheme during the financial year. Special allocations are made for schemes such as stock improvement, the pig-breeding scheme which provides provision for nominations in the cattle-breeding scheme with premium awards to encourage selected applicants to bring high-class breeding stock into each area, the pig-breeding scheme, with provision, and the Sheep-breeding scheme with substantial premium awards towards the best breeding rams for use on mountain districts.

**SCHEMES**

Money is spent by the Committee on poultry premiums which are designed to maintain a high standard of excellence in the breeds of turkeys. In the purchase of a certain quantity of certified seed potatoes, special foundation or quality stock, farmers and cottagers can avail of the Shelter planting scheme to procure certified young trees in variety which planted in suitable positions will provide invaluable windbreaks around the exposed holdings or homestead. In the field of horticulture, the Committee subsidises the planting of fruit trees and bushes in suitable blocks and areas, encourages vegetables growing and gives grants towards the purchase of hives and kindred equipment. For destruction, dairy cattle prizes, cottage prizes, agricultural shows, and county ploughing matches are also among the activities of the County Committee.

**EDUCATIONAL**

The provision of good technical education is, by far, the most important work in which the Committee of Agriculture is engaged. Instructors in Agriculture are employed who are highly

# Another crux arises over Ardkeen

### LATE MR. LUKE DALTON

Dungarvanites in every walk of life were saddened over the weekend by the announcement of the death of one of the town's most esteemed business men, the late Luke Dalton of Grattan Square, who breathed his last at a moderately advanced age on Sunday last.

A man of many outstanding characteristics and an expert craftsman—he carried on a thriving tailoring business in conjunction with the family drapery establishment—the deceased enjoyed the patronage of a wide clientele throughout the town and neighbouring countryside.

There was ample testimony of the late Mr. Dalton's standing in the community on Monday evening when the remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church in the presence of a huge concourse. The coffin was blessed and received at the Church gates and the burial was made in the family plot on the following morning following the celebration of Requiem Office and High Mass. Again the attendance was large and representative.

## over Ardkeen

### Board of Public Assistance Discussion

Consideration of the proposal to transfer the administration of Ardkeen Hospital from Waterford County Council to the Board of Public Assistance has been adjourned yet again.

When the members of the Board of Assistance met in the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Monday last, they unanimously agreed to defer a decision on the matter until the next ordinary meeting.

Mr. Walsh—And that is not fair to any public body and something I will not stand for while I am in public life.

M. C. Curran said he was most anxious to see the matter settled but he would not be prepared to support any resolution to take it over until the arrangements were resolved to their satisfaction.

Mr. Walsh: Supposing the arrangement is not to our satisfaction—as could easily be the case—what comeback have we? Mr. Fitzpatrick—We are in a fairly false position at the moment.

Mr. Walsh—We are in a proper dilemma. We have only been treated like boys along here.

Mr. Farrell then said they could pass a resolution agreeing to take over Ardkeen but they could not attach any effective restrictive conditions to it.

Mr. Carroll said that in that event the Board should not be "bulldozed" into doing something they did not want to do. The position had not altered since their last meeting.

Mr. T. Gallagher then proposed and Mr. W. Carroll seconded that no further action be taken and that further consideration of the matter be adjourned to the next ordinary meeting of the Board.

This was unanimously agreed to.

## Urban Demand is up by 1/10 in the £

When the Estimates meeting for payment of a revised salary scale to the Town Engineer and provision has been made for this item, subject to sanction. The Manager recommended, in any event, that full temporary allowance should be paid to the Town Engineer from April 1st, 1958 as he now appears to be the only officer for whose grade revised rates of bonus were not approved.

**MATTER OF EXPEDIENCY**

At the end of March 1958 liabilities were barely covered by assets, states the report, and no adequate working balance was available to finance the services in the early part of the year. This position has obtained for some years past and has resulted in payments of overdraft interest and lack of any reserves to meet exceptional expenditure.

The overdraft and the growing deficit on the Harbour account have been the cause of a considerable deterioration in the financial position during the past year. The deficit on harbour account which stood at £2,248 on 31st, March 1958 increased to approximately £3,000 at the close of this year. It has been the practice to take credit for a contribution of £220 from the Harbour account in respect of the harbour's share of the costs of public lighting, road maintenance and general administration. It would be imprudent to continue to take credit for this item irrespective of the state

**APPOINTMENT**

The principal components of the present estimate and rate in the £ to meet them are: County Council Services (Demand) 22/1d.; General Town Services 18/11d.; Swimming Pool 2d.; Christmas Relief 2d.; Over-expenditure Christmas Relief 1958/59—2/1d.; Overdraft interest 3/1d. giving a total of 44/10d. in the £.

**SPREADING LEVY**

Reporting to the Council on the Estimates County Manager Mr. S.J. Moynihan states that in accordance with the decision of the Council, the provision for Christmas Relief was increased by £150 to afford additional employment last Christmas. It is necessary to levy the additional sum in the present estimate.

During the past year a payment of approximately £1,700 had to be made to a retiring rate collector. An additional rate of 2/6d. would be required to liquidate this amount which was not provided in previous estimates. To avoid an undue increase in the rate it had been decided to spread the levy of the deficit over a period by appropriating annually part of the estimated savings which will result from a proposal to revise arrangements for the collection of rates and other revenues.

**ONLY OFFICER**

Figures for salaries in the Housing and General Purposes Accounts have been reduced by a total of £200. This represents the maximum credit which can be allowed in the present estimate having regard to the operation of the arrangement. An application had been received from Cumann na n-Tineachtóirí

The deeply regretted death of Mr. Jack Greany, which occurred in St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan, on Monday last, removed one of the oldest members of the carpentry trade from the locality.

A craftsman of the first water, he was the last surviving member of a family that had long associations with the trade locally. When he answered the call after a very brief illness he had attained four score and some odd years.

On Tuesday evening the remains were removed to Garranbane Church being blessed and received by Very Rev. Fr. Roche, P.P., and interment was made on Wednesday morning following Requiem Mass in the adjoining cemetery. An imposing concourse was in attendance on both occasions.

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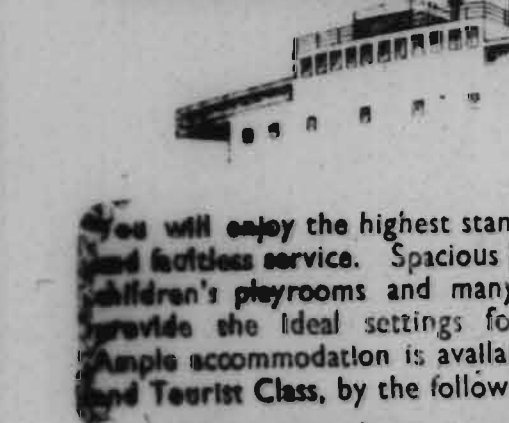
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## Urban Demand is up by 1/10 in the £

When the Estimates meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council takes place on Friday April 10th, the members will have before them a proposed rate of 44/10d in the £, a total increase in rate of 1/10d, being an increase of 1/8d, plus the 2d. difference on the proposed rate last year of 43/2d, as against the 43/ which was adopted. The provision in the 1959/60 estimate is for a net expenditure of £21,366.

By comparison with the estimate presented last year the additional requirement of 1/8d. may be analysed under the following broad headings—An increase of £783 of County demand calling for a rate of 1/14d. New Housing Grants £285 increase 5d. rate. Overexpenditure on '58 Christmas Relief Work £150. (22d. rate). Other net increases totalling £140 for which a 2d. rate will be sought. Total amount of increase - £1322 (rate in the £- 11d.) less the produce of increase in valuation - 3d.- leaving a rate increase of 1/8d.

**Black Scab**

Wart Disease, also known as Black Scab, one of the most destructive diseases of potatoes, is the subject of a Department of Agriculture leaflet which has now been revised.

Wart Disease is so called because of the appearance of warty growths on infected potatoes, and it has spread in Europe over a wide area as well as appearing in Asia, Africa and America. It is spread by the introduction of the spores of the fungus which causes this warty growth, usually by the use of potatoes for seed from infected ground or in soil adhering to potatoes which are immune to the disease and do not show the symptoms. Infected soil may be carried on the roots of other plants such as cabbage.

The leaflet, which is entitled "Wart Disease or Black Scab of Potatoes," lists the varieties of potatoes which are immune to this disease and outlines the precautions to be taken to avoid the introduction of the trouble. In other words, where it appears in a crop crop the owner is obliged by law to report it to the Department of Agriculture without delay.

Copies of the revised leaflet can be had from the Department of Agriculture, Dublin, free.

**BUILT TO LAST**

Still in a fine state of preservation, the Casino at Marino was commissioned by the Earl of Chatterton and designed by the architect Sir William Chambers. Apart from its exterior and interior attractiveness this small but very perfect building exhibits considerable technical and constructional ingenuity. Thomas Milton, in his *Views of Ireland* states: "The inside disposition is that of a dwelling house on a very small scale, perfectly adapted for the purpose intended — not family accommodation, but solitude and retirement. There is a Vestibule Saloon, Boudoir and Closet for Books. There are in the attic four chambers for beds, and under the principal floor a kitchen and office for servants."
