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## URBAN RATE UP BY 1/10 IN THE £.

# Urban Council Adopt Manager's Estimate

By four votes to two and after almost two hours' deliberations, Dungarvan Urban Council adopted the Manager's estimate for a rate of 44/10 in the £, which represents an increase of 1/10 in the £ on last year's figure, at the annual financial meeting in the Town Hall last Friday night.

The figure makes provision for a net expenditure of £21,599. In his estimate the Co. Manager, Mr. S. J. Moloney, apportioned the rate under the following headings: County Council Services, 22/1; General Town Services, 18/11; Swimming Pool, 2/6; Christmas Relief Fund, 2/6. The increased demand, he reported, made provision for the spending of 1/12 more than last year's figure to meet the County Council's demand for the Christmas Relief Scheme and 2/12 for miscellaneous increases.

At the commencement of the meeting, the Chairman read a letter from Mr. Nicholas Kelly, who apologized for his inability to be present at the meeting. The members extended best wishes to Mr. Kelly for a speedy and complete recovery.

Mr. Donal Moloney apologized for his absence from the meeting of the Estimate's Committee.

Mr. Bobby Keane said he saw no point in holding a committee meeting at all because no recommendation ever came from them and they never agree on any rate.

The Chairman (Ald. Tom Kyne, T.D.) said that the meeting of the Estimate's Committee afforded the members concerned an opportunity to go into the figures fully.

Mr. Keane—I don't think it serves any purpose. The Manager, who drew the members' attention to the interest on the Council overdraft, which he said is getting bigger and bigger every year, stated that he had nothing else to add to what he had reported in his estimate.

The Clerk told Mr. Keane that the decision to collect the rates through the Council's office would mean a saving of £400 per year at present.

Mr. Keane, referring to the fall in income from the Town Hall, suggested that the period

of looking dances should be reduced from 12 months to six months. It is, he said, very hard to expect clubs to book the hall twelve months in advance and then find themselves in opposition to events in Clonca and elsewhere.

The Chairman pointed out that it was in deference to the club's wishes that they decided to take bookings for twelve months in advance, as they found they would almost want that much time to book top-class bands and make all the necessary arrangements.

Mr. Keane—I know what is wrong but I don't want to say it here. Chairman—It is fairly obvious what is wrong. There is a row here at nearly every long dance and parents are telling their children not to go as a result. That is the story around town, as I hear it, though I am not a dancing man at all.

Mr. Keane told Mr. Moloney that committee were unable to control these events.

Mr. Moloney held that the onus should be on the committee in charge to maintain law and order. If they failed to do so, he said, they should be refused the hall for a period of twelve months.

Chairman—It is not a complaint peculiar to Dungarvan alone.

When Mr. Moloney raised the question of housing grants, Mr. Lannon said that up to 15 per cent of the people the Council would normally house had availed of the grants in the past.

Chairman—If that statement is correct then we have blatantly infringed the regulations.

Mr. Lannon—That is correct. You don't expect I would make the statement if it was not so. Most of the people concerned were in the £1,200 to £1,400 a year bracket.

The Manager said there was a certain amount of looseness in the awarding of grants in the early years of the scheme. Afterwards both the Government and Council had tightened up on the regulations.

Mr. Moloney—I will say that 90% of the items have been decreased. It is a fair effort but it is a pity that the rate still goes up.

Mr. Lannon stated that the Council had been treated very

## LATE MR. RODY McGRATH

## BUDGET BRINGS TAX RELIEF

When presenting his Budget to the Dail on Wednesday, Dr. Ryan announced reliefs for income tax payers, increases in pensions for old age and blind and military service and State pensioners, and more money for married men receiving unemployment assistance.

Dr. Ryan also announced that cinemas and cine-variety shows would benefit as well as dance halls by reductions and alterations in the scales of entertainment duties, while the duty on greyhound racing and professional boxing would be abolished.

## DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

The Chairman, Ald. Tom Kyne, told Mr. R. Keane at last Friday's night meetings of the Urban Council that while it was purely a Managerial Function, he did not think that the County Manager would make the appointment of a clerical officer to collect the Council's rates from the existing Co. Council panel.

Mr. Moloney suggested that the appointment should be for a trial period of three years.

The Chairman, Mr. McCarthy and the Co. Manager, pointed out that it would not be fair to ask any man to give up three years and then terminate his services.

Mr. Lannon—I hope the boys of the town will get an opportunity to sit for the job.

The Chairman agreed that this should be the case.

REDBARN CO. WOUND UP

In the High Court, Dublin, on Monday, Mr. Justice Dixon made an order for the winding up of "Ireland For Holidays Ltd." Redbarn, Youghal, Co. Cork and allowed the appointment of a liquidator to stand over until a later date. The application for the order was made by Mr. Ashley Powell S.C., with whom was Mr. J. V. Coleman (instructed by Messrs. Cornelius J. Daly and Co.) on behalf of Eustace and Co. Ltd., Leitrim Street, Cork, in voluntarily liquidation, who stated in their petition to have the company wound up that "Ireland For Holidays Ltd." had been incorporated on April 8th, 1958, and that no office of the company had yet been registered with the Registrar of Companies.

The nominal capital of the company was £20,000 divided into 20,000 shares of £1 each. The petitioners did not know the amount of the capital paid up or credited as paid up and had inquiries made at the Office of Registered Companies about it without success. The company was indebted to the petitioners in £3,192/13/11, with £15/18/0 costs. The petitioners had applied to the company for payment of debt and the company had failed to pay. Mr. Justice Dixon asked what was the debt and it was for the construction of the company holiday camp. There was no appearance for the company.

AN OUTSTANDING FEEDING BARLEY

The new Irish-bred feeding barley, Banba, is being propagated this year under the Department of Agriculture's seed certification scheme, for widespread distribution in 1960, and a small amount is still available now from seed merchants, Banba was bred at the Department's cereal station at Ballinacorney, Co. Cork, from Spratt Archer and Kenya, and it has shown up very well in extensive trials over the past few years. Banba resists lodging much better than does Ymer barley, but not quite as well as Herta. It is more resistant to loose smut than Herta, but not so resistant to mildew. It ripens at the same time as both these other varieties and the trials have shown that it gives a better yield than Herta. The average improvement in yield from Banba over Herta, in 280 trials spread over the whole country was more than 1 cwt. per statute acre. Banba was tested at 44 centres throughout the country last year and it beat Herta by 2 1/2 cwt., on average, per statute acre. In addition it showed significant resistance to straw breakdown at harvest time. For these reasons Banba is considered an outstanding feeding barley.

And cuckoos are supposed to feed on hairy caterpillars. Well, I have never seen a thrush, blackbird pick up or feed on those old creeping hairy, granitic things. A choir of small birds led a mavis here pour forth heavenly music. But I love to see swallows and to hear a cuckoo calling.

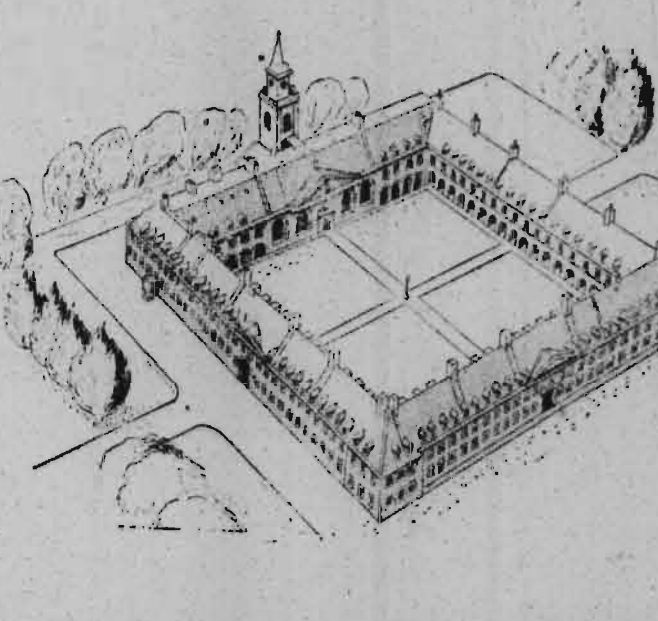
LATE JOHN DALTON

BUILT TO LAST



The Royal Hospital, Kilmalman, one of Dublin's oldest public buildings was commenced in 1680, as a hospital for old soldiers. Kilmalman derives its name from "Magnien's Church" built on this site in early times. Designed by Sir William Robinson, Surveyor General of Ireland, the Royal Hospital is an edifice of two stories in the form of a quadrangle, with a graceful tower rising from one facade. The most noteworthy part is the spacious and well-proportioned hall, considered by many to be the finest interior in Dublin. The Chapel, which contains the only surviving remains of the former Priory, is remarkable for its splendid wood carving, and a magnificent stucco ceiling is a feature of great interest. In recent times the building was occupied by the Garda Síochána, until it was vacated in 1950 for extensive repairs.
