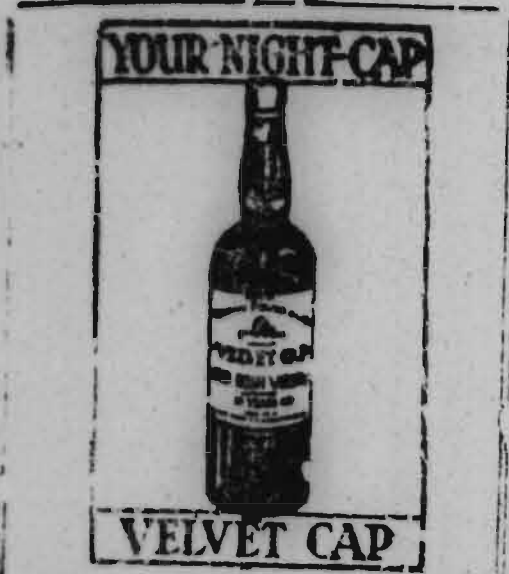

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LATE MR. ARTHUR HUNT

Mr. Arthur Hunt Answers The Great Call—Yes! Mr. Arthur Hunt, Rockmount, Kilmacross, is with the Great Majority since Friday, 13th inst. At his residence he died, as he lived, in peace with all. Born in 1864, his great length of years gave ample opportunity for a real appraisal of his outstanding characteristics, as they became evidenced in his estate pursuits, in his agricultural show judging, and in his sporting activities, and in his social contacts.

Doyen of the Waterford Hunt, he was a peerless horseman, being always to the fore with his mounts in the show-jumping competitions and point-to-point racing events of his heyday he participated in. A foundation member of the Dungarvan Agricultural Show and for some years past, Hon. President of the Sterling Society in charge of same, the late Mr. Hunt kept and hunted his own pack of hounds—the famous "Rockmount Blazers"—upwards of six decades ago.

While emotional hysteria or impassioned arguments motivated others, Mr. Hunt always maintained a calmness and an insurmountable fortitude that were proverbial and that emphasised his real gentlemanly attributes.

In social circles, he was always a source of cheerfulness and entertainment. His wit, charm and his inexhaustible supply of humorous incidents were freely available. During his lifetime he made a host of friends all over his homeland and in many parts of the Sister Isle, and all of them knew him as a man of deep learning, a noble Christian of absolute integrity and a loving husband and dear parent and grandparent.

With his estimable widows, Mrs. Arthur Hunt and Mrs. Robin de Vere Hunt, M.F.I., grandchildren and relatives sincere sympathy is universal.

Persons from all walks of life formed the immense cortege that followed the funeral, which took place in the family burial ground in the necropolis adjoining Comeragh Church on Monday of this week. Rev. Mr. Dunne, the Rector, Stradbally, read the burial service.

Of a verity, Mr. Arthur Hunt won the affection of all acquainted with him, and he will have a place in their hearts as well as in their memories.

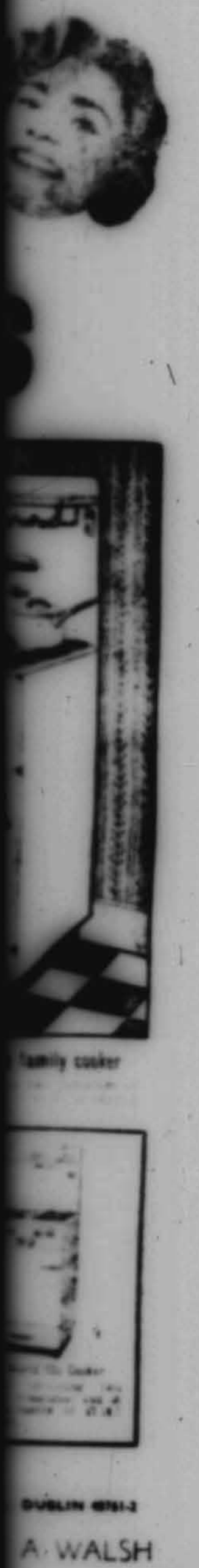

ADULT EDUCATION NOTES (Contd.)

The subjects are: Sociology, Economics, Modern Social Organisation and Procedure and of Conduct of Meetings (including Public Speaking and Debate). The Adult Education Group in West Waterford had this course in mind originally. The Class Fee would be 10 guineas, covering a two-year course. In addition to the class fee the following fees are also payable: Examination Fee of 10/- payable on entry for each examination. There will be two exams in all—one at the end of each year; (2) Confering Fee of 10/-, payable on conferment of a Diploma. The class fee in each case covers (1) Tuition; (2) Textbooks; (3) Class Fees.

MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE
