# Successful Drama Festival at Ring

With a score of 97 per cent amateur drama group from Ashford, Drom-siochta, Co. Limerick secured first place in the three-day Festival of Gaelic Drama which concluded at Ring Hall de Hindeberg on Sunday night last. They secured the Corn Aithir Uí Dhomhnaill, the silver trophy presented by Very Rev. Fr. O'Donnell, P.P. Ring, for the best play presented at the Festival.

Runners-up with 77 per cent were Ring Drama Group, who presented 'Súibhras Mhaire Mhor' under the direction of Nicholas Mac Craith. A total of 13 plays was entered.

Galway-man Mr. Michael O'Fatharta secured the College Cup (Cora an Chloiche) which was donated by Coláiste na Rime for the best producer at the Festival. He was the producer of the winning play 'Gealltanas' by the Ashford group.

### FOUR PLAYS

Commencing on Friday evening the Felle Dram-siochta entered for four plays on the opening night. Old Parish Players, under the direction of Rev. Fr. Victor Power, C.C. presented 'Chidhracht' (The Inheritance). Dungarvan Technical School drama group, under producer-actor Seamus O'Fatharta, O.C. staged 'Nuair d'Adhammar an Gleo' a translation of 'When Wexford Rose'. The Collesman Uí Canáin, Co. Cork group directed by Michael de Longport, presented 'An Feor O'Beunós Aires'. Ring Gaelic League Branch performed 'Cor in Ardhuigh an Chaim' (Tie-for-tie) under producer-actor Dòmhnall O'Clonadhóidh, O.C.

### SECOND NIGHT

Three plays were acted on Saturday, the second night of the Felle Dram-siochta. The Cappoquin group under the direction of Irish teacher Pádraig O'Flannas played the original composition by Mr. O'Flannas 'Actann i dtír Uí Cheallaigh' (Lumpus at Kelly's House). An act (The Will) was performed by the Bualle Bua players from Roserea, Co. Tipperary, under the production of Tomás O'Meathair. Again Ring drama group

were in action, this time with 'Ca bhfuil an Ghloir' (There is no Glory, again produced by Dòmhnall O'Clonadhóidh).

### AFTERNOON SESSION

On Sunday there was an afternoon and evening session. At 3.30 p.m. The Ring Drama group under their producer Nicholas Mac Craith, O.S. staged 'Súibhras Mhaire Mhor' a translation of the 'Riches of Mrs Muldooney'. This was followed by another translation when the St. Nicholas' Players directed by Rev. Fr. Victor Power, C.C. played 'Eis-Eiri Dhomhnaill' (The Renunciation of Dinny O'Dowd) by Seamus McManus, the famous Donegal dramatist, folk-artist, and author, currently residing in the United States.

### VISITORS' SUNDAY

The visiting teams took over for the Sunday evening session, which ran on until after midnight and four plays were acted. Kilkeigh, Co. Cork played 'An Dr. Boghda' (The Bogus Doctor). The winning play 'Gealltanas' (The Promise) was acted by Ashford, Co. Limerick players. 'Ca bhfuil an Ghloir' was the choice of the Nenagh, Co. Tipperary players, under Seán O'Dubhghaill, while the Kildare, Co. Cork drama team directed by S. O'Boin staged 'Mudh an t'ias' (A Light went out).

Mr. Thomas McCann, Abbey Theatre, Dublin, producer, who was the adjudicator at this all-Irish drama festival, expressed his satisfaction at the high standard of all the plays presented. Great credit, he said, he said to all those in rural areas who undertake the difficult task of producing plays as they nearly always have to labour under great handicaps.

He would recommend to them to see to it that the cast is suited to the play and likewise the play to the available cast. He well knew the difficulties which confronted the rural groups. There was the cost of costumes, a great burden on already very slender club finances added to the provision of stage settings, suitable halls, staging etc. Still, he would recommend highly that those who undertook amateur dramatics pay close attention to all the details that went into the producing of a play. He stressed the importance of proper make-up for the artists, suitable costumes for the parts, and recommended particular attention be paid to arranging the scenes on stage, to make them look authentic if the scene calls for a kitchen, with the proper furniture, chairs, table, pictures, etc.

Mr. McCann recommended that full use be made of Stage Effects where they fitted in the plays. Any type of special device available should be used off-stage to produce certain desired effects. Special gramophone records were helpful in this respect, but better still would be a tape recording of the desired effect.

Speaking throughout in Irish at this all-Irish drama festival in the Decies Gacilack, Mr. McCann offered very helpful advice and constructive criticism to the participants. Stressing the importance of Gaelic Drama in the Irish language revival, he recommended that wherever possible the producer should not participate in the play, as by doing so his attentions were divided.

He paid special tribute to the Committee of the Ring Gaelic Drama Festival for the excellence of the organisation, and congratulated them on the success of the venture, which drew packed houses nightly and was of a very high standard.

### PRESENTATION OF PRIZES

Very Rev. Fr. John O'Donnell, P.P. Ring presented the silver cup donated by himself to the winning Ashford team. An Fear Mor, Seamus O'Fatharta, L.L.D. presented the College Cup to winning producer Mr. M. O'Fatharta. Rev. Fr. V. Power, C.C. presented the silver cup donated by himself to the best actress of the Festival Mrs. Peg Regan. Ring. A gold medal for best male actor was won by Mr. Nicholas Louisa. Ring for his part as 'Seamus' in 'Cor in Ardhuigh an Chaim'. Eirid Harney, Old Parish was highly commended for her part as Beán a Tighe in the play 'Chidhracht'.

Organising Secretary of the Felle Dram-siochta was Dòmhnall O'Clonadhóidh, Ring.

### DUNGARVAN P.T.A.A.

### SHOW TRIBUTE TO LATE MONAGENARIAN PRESIDENT

A unanimous resolution of sympathy on the death of the late Mr. Arthur Hunt, Rockmount, KilmacThomas was passed at a specially convened meeting of the Dungarvan Agricultural Show Committee, Mr. Hunt who died in his ninety-fifth year had been president of the Show Committee for a number of years.

In moving the resolution of sympathy, the Chairman, Mr. Edward Naber, referred to the long association which the late Arthur Hunt had had with Dungarvan Show Committee, having been a founder-member of the Agricultural Show the first decade of the present century, and President of the committee.

The Resolution was seconded by Mr. Paul J. P. Vice-President, who paid tribute to the late Mr. Hunt for his continued interest in the show and for his outstanding quality as a judge of horses. He was well known to the members of the Royal Dublin Society and the Provincial Shows and his fame as a judge of horses was as well-known abroad as it was at home. Individual tributes were also paid by many members, and the resolution of condolence was passed in silence, all present standing as a mark of respect.

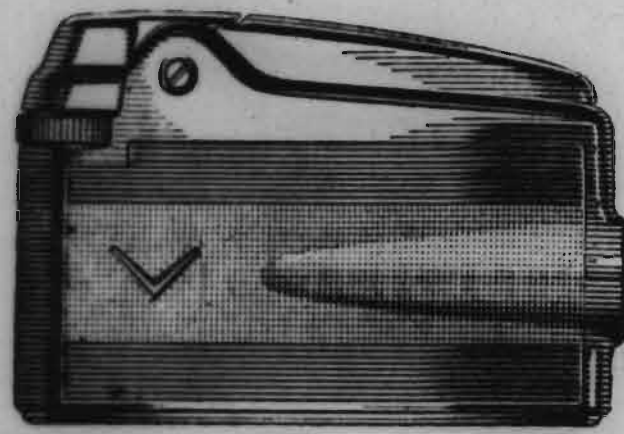

About 7.30 on Saturday night while using a ladder to inspect a skylight on a ten-foot roof adjoining the hotel, the ladder slipped and he fell on his head on the concrete yard and rendered unconscious. A well known member of the community the late Mr. Hickey was a farmer and proprietor of the Summerfield Hotel and formerly of Knocknagoshal, Co. Kerry. He was brother-in-law of Very Rev. M. White, P.P. Manchester and Rev. Mother Bridget Presentation Convent, Youghal. He is survived by his widow and three daughters to whom sincere sympathy is extended in their great sorrow. ### touching the tragic death of James Hickey, Summerfield Hotel, Youghal, Supt. M. Staunton represented the Gardai. Dr. Foy stated that the deceased was admitted to the Hospital at 6.30 on Saturday and was deeply unconscious. The left side of the face and scalp was severely bruised, and he was bleeding freely from his left ear. He died at 11.30 without regaining consciousness. In his opinion the cause of death was due to a fractured skull and the injuries would be consistent with having fallen from a roof. Jack Joyce who was with the deceased on the roof at the time of the accident said that when the deceased put his right foot on the second rung of the ladder it slipped and he saw him over balance and fall to the ground and his head came into contact with the concrete pathway. His laces were open at the time and one of his shoes fell off. A verdict according to the medical evidence was recorded, and the coroner said that it was a very tragic accident with no blame to anyone. He expressed sympathy with the deceased's wife and family and in which he was joined by the Garda Supt.

### At a special Meeting of the Youghal Branch I.N.T.O., presided over by M. S. De Barra B.A., N.T. there was a full attendance of members. Addressing the meeting the Chairman stated that a resolution on the matter of the pre 1950 pensioned teachers sponsored by over 30 branches took precedence over all other resolutions at the recent Congress in Youghal. This reflected in no uncertain manner the feelings of the general body of teachers throughout the country towards the injustice meted out to teachers who retired prior to 1950. These teachers retired on pensions based on the small salaries obtaining at the time. He could not understand the attitude of the Government in not paying the balance of the gratuity due to them, being already recognised the validity of the claim by paying portion. The following resolution was unanimously adopted. "That we should not be paying the balance of the gratuity due to pre 1950 Teachers."

### NOXIOUS WEEDS

Thistle, ragwort and dock cause serious loss of productivity on tillage and pasture lands and are additionally objectionable in that their seeds may be blown about and infest neighbouring fields. Accordingly under the Noxious Weeds Act, 1936, owners and occupiers of lands who fail to destroy these noxious weeds are liable to prosecution without notice.

The weeds may be destroyed by cutting, spraying with a selective weed-killer, or, if circumstances permit, pulling. If possible two cutting should be made during the season. The weeds should not be allowed to flower. It is particularly necessary to collect and burn ragwort immediately after cutting or pulling to ensure that stock will not eat the plants, which are poisonous. As selective weed-killers may make ragwort more palatable, stock should be kept off sprayed pastures until the ragwort plants are dead.

The common barberry is also scheduled as a noxious weed under the Noxious Weeds Act with a view to preventing Black Stem Rust disease in cereal crops. Owners and occupiers of lands who fail to destroy such plants are also liable to prosecution. Common Barberry plants should be eradicated either by grubbing out of the ground or by use of a suitable weed-killer.

Farmers are advised to consult the local instructor in Agriculture or Parish Agent in regard to the use of selective weed-killers. They should also read the Department's leaflet No. 97 on "Weeds", copies of which may be obtained free of charge from the Secretary, Department of Agriculture, Publications Section, Dublin.

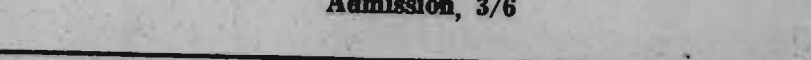

It most certainly would not be outside the juniors turn.

## BLOW TO PRESTIGE.

The county's hurling prestige took a body blow by virtue of Mount Sion's crushing defeat at the hands of Glen Rovers in the final of the Dunhill tournament on Thursday night. By comparison with the sweet-moving Cork blitzers, the local champions appeared sluggish and bedraggled. It took the visitors, inspired again by the hurling wonder of the age, the incomparable Jimmy, ten minutes to forgive an advantage they thereafter never looked in danger of relinquishing. Mount Sion's performance did not tally with the great display they turned in against an almost identical Glen side at Cork on Easter Sunday. # Kerry visit Lismore on Sunday

THE visit of Kerry junior hurlers to Lismore, where they engage our representatives in the semi-final of the Munster championship, and a variety of senior and junior county tests divided between the City Sportsfield, Dunhill, Cappoquin and Ardmore, combined to make Sunday's fixture list possibly the most appealing since the opening of the season.

Strictly on form, De La Salle the county champions, should commence their defence of the senior football crown on a winning note at the expense of Dunhill, Mount Sion should have the measure of Clann na Gaeltacht, and the odds are on Ardmore readily accounting for Stradbally's second string.

It, then, one can never anticipate with any degree of certainty the trend a championship test is likely to take at this stage of the season.

In the case of the Tourin-Lismore clash, which is set for Cappoquin, the issue looks wide open.

Form, it can be taken for granted, will mean little to the battle-hardened men of Dunhill when they throw down the gauntlet to the 411-chickens, Dunhill have traditionally nurtured a flair for achieving the unexpected, their game is rugged and could easily throw the stylish champions off their usual methodical game. Certain it is that it will not be for want of effort or enthusiasm should they fail to join their hurling colleagues in the second round.

De La Salle, of course, must remain the more obvious choice. The Stephen Street side is very capable and well-balanced, and their confidence has come on a hundred fold as a result of last year's great triumph. In the circumstances it is difficult to visualise Dunhill, four batters though they are, calling a halt to their gallop at this stage.

The combined forces of Ring, Old Parish and Emmetts, who as Seaside Rovers battled their way to the semi-final last year, will be up against it when they encounter a Seamus Power-less Mount Sion at Dunhill on Sunday evening.

Despite the absence of Power probably their most prolific ball player, the Munster championship would still appear to be an obstacle for the inter-club selection which will be operating under the banner of Clann na Gaeltacht. All told, it seems too much to expect the Western side, fielding without Ardmore's Tom Power and Eddie Mooney, two of the cornerstones of last year's side, to stay a full sixty minutes with the city men.

Playing, as they will, before their own supporters, Ardmore, who have cut a great dash in recent challenges, should prove much too powerful for Stradbally's second string in the second round of the Western junior championship. The Reds won well from the Nire in the opening round, but it would still appear too much to expect them to concede ground advantage to a side of Ardmore's capabilities. From what I've seen in the grade to date, the latter measure up as a definite championship proposition.

They should not be unduly troubled to prevail at this stage. Beralidines will be endeavouring to record a morale-restoring victory at the expense of Stradbally's first fifteen when they clash in a senior challenge after the championship tie at the seaside venue. The Aglish men have incurred a resounding fall from grace and the Reds are presently preparing for their clash with Kill a week hence.

In the circumstances the outcome of a great importance to both sides.

The fact that no fewer than six positions have been entrusted to representatives of champions Perrybank is the most striking feature about the junior hurling team to oppose Kerry at Lismore. In contrast, Colligan the beaten finalists, have failed to secure even a substitute on the selection.

Like-wise, Ballyduff and Shamrocks, who have come to be quite rightly regarded as the kings of Western hurling, are very sparsely represented, while Tourin, one of the traditional strongholds, have inexplicably failed to gain representation.

As in the case of the junior footballers, it is again apparent that the desire to ensure a lively club representation has over-ruled all other considerations, a development that is neither in the interest of the game

in general or the county's prospects.

How much brighter our prospects would be had team selectors recognised the claims of Shamrocks' Frank Corcoran Dick Dooney of Tourin, Mickey Walsh of Colligan and Pat Spratt of Brickeys.

Of the men selected I can only vouch for Joe Daly and Tom Coffey in defence, mid-fielder Power and Tommy Geary and Batty Foley in attack.

Going on Kerry's first round victory over Galway and the great stand put up by what was largely the same side against our first fifteen in last year's senior championship, it seems certain that we will have occasion to call on all our available resources to pull through.

# Brickeys are through to the final

Faster on the ball and displaying a considerably superior brand of teamwork, Brickey Rangers were full value for their resounding victory over a very disappointing Geraldines fifteen when Con Crowley called a halt to this Phelan Cup semi-final at the Sportsfield, Cappoquin, on Sunday evening.

Played before a great crowd, the game retired out as a spectacle largely because of the failure of the losers challenge to measure up to expectations.

Apart from the opening stages and a brief bout towards the close of the third quarter Geraldines were always toiling. The defence was a denial of all the allegations.

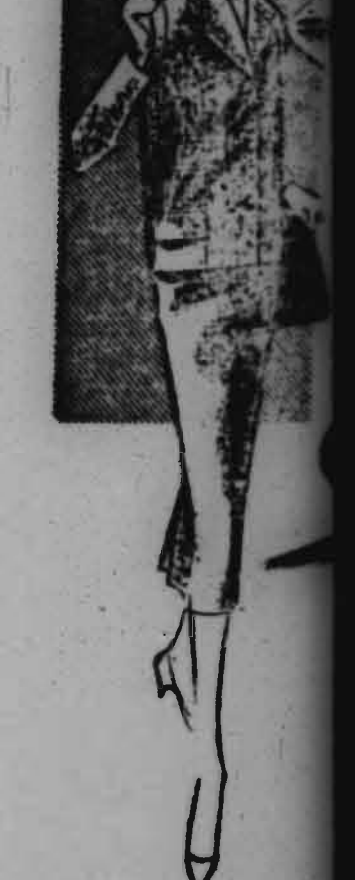
The case came up for hearing in the High Court on 16th February and occupied twelve days.
