Ancient Slow Airs of Ireland

Another "first" has been scored by Dungarvan's traditional musicians. For the first time ever the forthcoming Music Festival this autumn in the Old Boro' town will cater for the ancient slow airs of Ireland in its programme.

This is the first time in Ireland that such a competition has been held by An Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann, the group of traditional Irish musicians formed less than ten years ago with the avowed purpose of safeguarding and strengthening our cultural heritage in the songs and traditional music of the Gael.

Conscious of the great wealth and beauty of the music contained in the Sunnagh (Lullaby) and the Galtraigh (Lament), the Dungarvan Committee of Feadh Ceoil na Déise will, this year, inaugurate an open competition in Sunnagh Violin for these slow and lovely Irish airs.

Staunch Waterford Gael and ardent supporter of all things National, veteran fighter of our struggle for freedom, Mr. Pádraic Whelan, Sexton Street, Abbeystead, former Officer Commanding the West Waterford Brigade of the I.R.A. and for many years Secretary to Waterford County Board G.A.A., has generously donated a special trophy for the Slow Airs competition. The silver trophy will be inscribed "Corn Pádraic Ó Faoite" and will be awarded to the senior violinist in Ireland in an open competition for Sunnagh and Galtraigh, at the Feadh Ceoil Festival.

Heartened by the branch's success to date, and confident of the continued support of the people of Dungarvan and throughout the County, as well as appreciating the help given by those individuals and firms who have so generously donated cups and other trophies, the Dungarvan Branch of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann has decided to hold Feadh Ceoil na Déise (the Feadh Ceoil Festival of Traditional Irish Music) on Sunday, 4th October next.

In addition to competitions for ten perpetual challenge cups awarded to entrants from Co. Waterford, the Committee will this year sponsor open competitions in Sunnagh Violin, Accordion and Flute and Pipes.

The valuable perpetual challenge cup to be won in these competitions should draw big entries from the cream of Irish traditional musicians throughout the provinces of Munster and Leinster.

Under the Patronage of Venerable Archbishop D. Power, P.P., Dungarvan, the officers of the Feadh Ceoil Committee are: Mr. Jack Tobin, Ballymacarbery (Chairman); Rev. Father Joseph Bracken, C.C., Ballymacarbery, a native of Clonmel (Vice-Chairman); Mr. Liam Comerford,

Mary Street, a native of Kilkenny (Secretary); Mr. James Foley, Skeeharine, Abbeystead, a native of Cork (Treasurer). "It is our aim," Declan Publicity Officer, Mr. L. Comerford, told the "Observer," "to make the Declan take the lead in Ireland's musical renaissance."

Up to a decade ago, he stated, traditional music was often derided and scouted at as "the old-time" and "back-of-beyond", but that position had now been changed. The advent of Irish TV was being looked forward to by members of An Comhaltas which organisation had already entered the request for the proper portrayal of our Irish way of life through this new medium.

TAKING PART IN SAFE DRIVING COMPETITION

Waterford County Council are enrolling their lorry and other vehicle drivers in the "Safety First" Association's Safe Driving Competition. The objective of the scheme is, of course, to further road safety and to encourage the drivers of the Council's fleet to take proper care of the plant under their control, and proper precautions on the road.

At the end of one year's reliable accident free driving each driver will receive a Certificate from the Association; at the end of five consecutive years accident free driving the driver will receive a bonus of £2; the Silver Medal will carry a bonus of £5; the Gold Medal £10, and the recipient of the Gold Star will receive £25.

In order to encourage the drivers, and to impress upon them the importance attached to the Scheme by the Council, each driver in receipt of a Certificate will receive a bonus of £2; the Silver Medal will carry a bonus of £5; the Gold Medal £10, and the recipient of the Gold Star will receive £25.

Thirty one of the Council's drivers are being enrolled in this scheme which will be inaugurated in the Council Yard, Dungarvan at 12.20 p.m. on Monday, 28th July, 1959, by Very Rev. D. P. Kennedy, S.J., the President of the "Safety First" Association of Ireland.

In conjunction with the inauguration of the Safe Driving Competition, Very Rev. Archbishop Power, P.P., Dungarvan, will bless the Council's fleet of plant.

The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the County Council will attend.

Sequel to Accident near Killeagh

Arising out of a motor accident near Killeagh, Co. Cork, on the 19th August, 1957, four actions were brought by Mr. Lovatt-Dolan, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Farrell and Morrissey, Solrs., Dungarvan) acting for Thomas Lynch, Ballylemon, Mrs. G. Lynch, do; James Lynch, do, and Mary Lynch, do, both minors, against William A. Kelly, 16, David Rd., Glasnevin, Dublin.

In the case of Mary Lynch and James Lynch, sums of £101 and £27 respectively were lodged with the defendants. These lodgments were accepted and on hearing their father, Thomas Lynch, and the medical evidence, the Judge directed that the sums be invested for the children and Thomas Lynch was appointed their guardian.

In the case of Mrs. Gertrude Lynch, the Judge awarded her a decree for £175, together with costs and expenses. A sum of £111 had been lodged with the defence and the Judge ordered that this sum be paid out to Mrs. Lynch in part satisfaction of the decree.

Mr. Thomas Lynch was given a decree for £333 and in his case also, the lodgment of £276 was directed to be paid out in part satisfaction. He also was awarded costs and expenses. Negligence was admitted on the part of defendant and the only issue to be tried was the amount of damages.

Dr. Brendan McCarthy gave medical evidence for all four plaintiffs.

Mr. Gerard Lardner B.L. instructed by Messrs. Comerford, Daly & Co., South Mall, Cork, represented the defendant.

WATERFORD'S SWEET REVENGE

Tipperary Annihilated by Rampant Deise Men

VICTORY over Tipperary at last! The fantastic happened in Munster Hurling at Cork on Sunday when the Deise hurlers annihilated the All-Ireland Champions and League winners Tipperary to the tune of 9-3 to 3-4, having led by 8-2 to 0-0 at the interval.

Tipperary won the toss and elected to play into a strong breeze. Waterford immediately got down to business and were seven points up in a few minutes. The crowd of 27,236 spectators could not help anticipating the fireworks when the champions would start the fight back. But the rot continued and after twenty-two minutes Waterford had the mammoth score of 8-2 up with a reply. This was even a greater landslide than against Galway two Sundays previously when they had a five goal lead after twenty minutes.

On the turn over we awaited with anxiety the Tipp. come back. Ten minutes passed and they did nothing about it and at the end of another nine they had secured two goals and two points. After the interval Guinan scored and Lacey added the point. Tipperary's marksmen were Neilson and Jimmy Doyle (1-2 each) and Wall (1-0).

Strong Championship Contenders in Opposition
WITH highly regarded championship contenders in opposition in both counties and the possibility of raising the rule ceiling at least one of the ultimate titleholders the Castle Farm, Lisimore should have a bumper crowd for Sunday's hurling-cum-football programme.

The big ball test brings Emmets and Ring into opposition, and Brickey Rangers and Fournilewater.

When they met twelve months ago, Ring, then one of the big championship forces, caught a tartar in the greatly underrated Emmets. But the boot is on the other foot these days, for the Colliers men have gone from strength to strength while the feeble Ravens that the Gaelic side is no longer the force it was.

Ring's real status is, however, a matter for conjecture and I personally feel there is considerable merit in the popular Gaelic theory that their young side has yet to attain its full bloom in point of fact, lack of years rather than football ability has hitherto been their greatest bugbear, for it inevitably takes a fairly seasoned side to survive in the razor-keen competition of senior football.

Apart from Aidin O'Faolain, who is domiciled across-channel, Ring will have all their regulars on duty: Bobby Curran, Silvester Murray, Crisler Kennedy, the Hart's, Tommy McGrath, and the former Old Parish man Mick Curran will form the backbone of a side that has prepared earnestly for the fray.

Emmets will, naturally enough start favourites. They routed Dungarvan in the opening round two months ago and their present disposition of forces is regarded as being considerably superior to the side which contested last year's divisional decider.

The acquisition of Carlow-born Vincent Byrnes, who played with Dungarvan seniors last year, the return of Nicky Quill and the benefit of a hard championship campaign would appear to qualify them well.

By my reading of the form book, Emmets should be capable of pulling through. But I hasten to add my respect for the undoubted potential of the Ring. Ring men, it should all make more for a gripping struggle for supremacy.

CONVINCING VICTORIES
The convincing manner in which Fournilewater and Brickey Rangers put away Kilrossanty and Abbeyside respectively in the opening round caused shrewd hurling judges to sit up and think again on the championship prospects of both sides.

On Sunday, however, a draw excepted, the road will end for one or the other and the only certainty is that it will take a hard hour's hurling to ordain who goes on to contest the area final.

Fournilewater, it is said, are on the road back to the eminent position they acquired some five or six years ago. The manner in which they accounted for Kilrossanty stamped them as a side of definite possibilities. But it remains to be seen if their team-building programme is as yet sufficiently well advanced to stand up to the experienced Brickey men.

The Rangers have, for long, fancied their hurling prospects. Against Abbeyside in the opening round they looked extra useful, though the opposition admittedly sub-standard, and a reproduction of that form should suffice to earn them a ticket for the next round.

CAMOGIE VICTORY FOR WATERFORD

It was a big day for Waterford sports fans on Sunday last, when following the goal-scoring spree by the Deise-men who trounced Tipperary in senior hurling at Cork, the Waterford girls completed the double for the county when they defeated the London-Irish team in the all-Ireland camogie semi-final at Dungarvan on Sunday night.

The game, which was refereed by Miss Fitzgerald of Dublin, was played before a large attendance, and was keenly contested to the final whistle. The visitors got off to a good start and were four points up after the first five minutes, but Waterford settled down and midway through the first half the home team took the lead.

FOOTBALL AT WATERFORD

Geraldines may have edge on St. Brendan's

JUST how far advanced into the Gaelic season we are, is illustrated by the fact that the first semi-finalists of the championship should be known on Sunday evening. That circumstance is, of course, dependent on Geraldines and St. Brendan's reaching a decision when they clash in the senior football championship at the Gaelic Field, Waterford.

This is the lone senior fixture of the day. In the West the spotlight is on the junior grade, with vital hurling and football ties arranged for Lismore and a further encounter down for decision at Cappoquin.

The minor championships, which have made tremendous progress since being resumed last month, will be continued with an almost nightly series for the coming week. There is also a big list of juvenile fixtures arranged.

Adding to the mid-week attractions is the opening game of the Geraldines senior football tournament which brings Brickey Rangers and Stradbally in opposition on Wednesday evening at Aghlish.

FOOTBALL ENIGMA
While Geraldines should ordinarily be odds on to account for St. Brendan's, the Aghlish men have displayed such in-form in recent times that it must be with considerable trepidation that they approach Sunday's visit to the Urbs Infaicta.

Geraldines are a football engine. Shocked in the opening round of last year's championship, they came back to qualify for the Phelan Cup semi-final in convincing style. In the interim they turned in a couple of first-class performances. Again, however, they failed to Brickey Rangers in most unexpected fashion, only to score a morale-boosting victory over a good Stradbally side a week later. They achieved although short half a dozen of what had come to be regarded as their regular line out.

The fact that John Kiely, Mick Hallahan and Bob Scanlon are still out of commission as a result of injuries sustained in the Phelan Cup semi-final increases the concern of a side that, challenge games aside, has failed to live up to expectations since their epic bouts with Kilrossanty two years ago.

Geraldines lack nothing in incentive, however. With every man of the side the rubbing out of their fall from grace has assumed the nature of a personal task. They realise, too, that the championship that really matters in the long run and their approach to the game has been made all the more earnest by the knowledge that victory will almost certainly entail a date with De La Salle reigning titleholders, and their final aim is the Junior championship-winning year of 1955.

GRATEFULLY HEARTENED
Followers are greatly heartened by the "arrival" of Ray O'Brien, who is regarded by one and all as a great mid-fielder in the making. The knowledge that he is a nephew of legendary Matt O'Brien, the full-forward on the great championship-winning side of 1915, should suffice to advertise his capabilities among the elder generation. Although only admitted to the Association a few weeks ago, he has taken to the game in the manner of a natural and is already regarded as one of the big men of the side.

St. Brendan's are not at all intent and purposes are unknown quantities with western followers. Safe it is, though, to assume that Fenor, an old stronghold of the game, Tramore and the city unit St. John's will succeed in putting a fit and enthusiastic bunch on the field.

In the opening round they accounted for St. Vincent's, no mean feat, and it is but reasonable to anticipate a general all-round improvement now that they have had the benefit of a championship outing together.

With "home" advantage—Geraldines proposed Cappoquin as the venue and lost on the toss of a coin—the Eastern men must be in this game with every chance of qualifying for the semi-final of the championship. Teamwork, spirit and experience—vital qualities all—weigh heavily in favour of Geraldines, however, and, all going well, may just about see them through.

BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS

(MOVEMENT-CONTROL) (CAVAN & MONAGHAN) Order, 1959.

MOVEMENT OF CATTLE INTO COUNTIES CAVAN and MONAGHAN

Cavan and Monaghan will become a Clearance Area on 20th July, 1959. As from that date, cattle will not be admitted into Cavan and Monaghan, unless accompanied by a permit or special licence. The only exception will be cattle from the present Clearance Area Counties, viz—Clare, Donegal, Galway, Leitrim, Mayo, Roscommon, and Sligo, which do not leave those counties during transit.

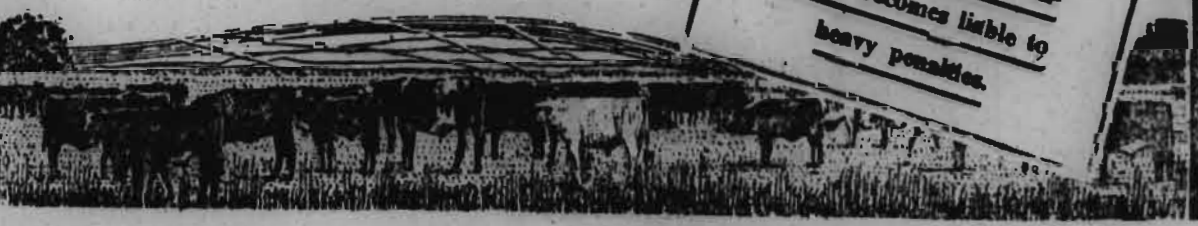
- Permits will be granted for the following classes of cattle—
- (a) Cattle which within 14 days had been tested and passed that test.
 - (b) Calves under 14 days old.
 - (c) Accredited or attested stock.
 - (d) Cattle tested within the clearance area and returning from outside the area.
 - (e) Cattle passing through the area to destinations outside the area.
 - (f) Fat cattle for immediate slaughter at licensed meat factories or premises which have been approved for this purpose.

* PERMITS will be available at Garda Stations or at Frontier Posts.

IN ADDITION TO A PERMIT cattle in the classes referred to at (a), (c) and (d) must be accompanied by veterinary certificates or documents establishing that they are accredited or attested cattle.

Every person bringing in cattle under permit must record on the permit form particulars of the disposal of the animals. Where the animals are disposed of to a herd-owner in the area, the permit holder is obliged to give particulars of the name, address and herd number of the herd-owner to whom the animals have been disposed. Where the permit holder disposes of them to a dealer, he is required to report the name and address of the dealer and the dealer is in turn required to give full information to the Department.
