Again while dairying has been... generally admitted to be the... keystone of Irish agriculture, dairying... techniques and science... have apparently been ignored in... government planning. Ministers repeatedly... stress the need for more and... more technical education in all... walks of life yet untrained and... unqualified men are allowed to... manage creameries.

"Within the past few years un-... qualified men were given man-... agerial posts in the dairy indus-... try. Today over 50 men with... university training and with... Dairy Science Diplomas and... Degrees are working in the... dairy industry. The progress of the... national drive to wipe out... tuberculosis among cattle and... the impact of our dairy products... on the health of the nation... without the aid of qualified... men is a matter of serious... concern. It is only a question... to say that the management of... the pasteurisation of milk... for even a few minutes can... back the whole bovine tubercu-... losis drive by means of man-... and that the fat content of butter... can be pulled by just one care-... less packet. Let us be candid... then and admit that there is... some dishonesty somewhere that... permits of anything but our... dairying and our agriculture by... passing unqualified men in key... posts.

Strangely enough, or is it... many other countries are... highly to appreciate our Dairy... Science graduates. In New Zea-... land and in British Irish Dairy... Science graduates have attained... to top dairying posts. Yet the... faculty of Dairy Science at... U.C.C. alone among all the educa-... tional and teaching establish-... ments in the country gets no in-... crease in its ordinary running... grant this financial year. And... the voluminous Whitaker Report... dismisses the Faculty in one... short sentence: 'Although in a... relatively healthy condition it is... rather too specialised to be of... great importance in the field of... general agriculture education.'

"After such a dismissal of the... Faculty that has won renown all... over the world for the brilliance... of its academic personnel, it is... any wonder that the White... Paper on Economic Expansion, the... weaning of the Whitaker... Report, has seriously mislead... dairy policy?"

"On two fundamental scores... the White Paper would seem to... be misdirected in its programme... for agriculture:

County Waterford Committee of Agriculture SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1959.

For the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in County Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture, to locate a limited number of high-grade black-face rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmeal-down Mountains on the following conditions:

(1) The Committee shall grant to each selected applicant a premium of from £5 to £8 on the basis that the value of the premium shall be less by £5 than the cost price of the ram, subject to a maximum of £8.

(2) In the allocation of rams preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes.

(3) The Committee will endeavour to secure that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes.

(4) The rams must be maintained in good and healthy condition and retained in the flock for two breeding seasons.

The estimated acreage under feeding barley this year is 240,000 acres. At an average yield of 11 tons per acre and accepting the Minister's price of £22-10-0 a ton for barley at 15% moisture, this year's crop is worth approximately £5,280,000.

The growing of feeding barley has been on the increase over the past number of years. In 1958 we grew approximately 220,000 acres; in 1959 approximately 240,000 acres.

The N.F.A. policy to make pig production in this country as far as possible independent of imported grains and therefore insulated from the fluctuations of the international grain market.

From the National point of view, it is not good business to be spending more money on imported grains than we earn on pig exports. For instance in 1956 our income from pig exports was £220,000 and the cost of imports of grain was over £1m.

This year, even though our pig population has increased steeply over the 1956 level, we nevertheless could have practically met our total requirements of home-grown barley to feed these pigs.

Therefore, all that was required was the internal organisation to ensure that the grower received an economic price, that the feeder received his dried barley at a fair relative price and that the pig grower was able to supply his pigs with the same in all parts of the country.

To achieve this, the N.F.A. presented to the Minister a Scheme outlined as follows:— It will be remembered that the Grain Board sold class 2 wheat, i.e. the wheat unfit for milling for human consumption as a result of the hard weather of 1959 at £22 a ton.

By exporting barley early in the season and delaying the import of barley and maize, a condition of scarcity can easily be created especially after the 1st January, when feeding stocks on the farms will have been reduced.

operatives and merchants. 2. The trade, i.e. the co-operatives and merchants would purchase the barley and dry it. It would then be bought from them at a fixed margin by the Grain Board. This would be mainly paper transaction. The margin would be based on the Wheat Order formula recognised as not being excessive.

3. The Grain Board would then sell the barley back to the compounders and the farmers on the same basis as class 2 wheat mentioned in the introduction.

4. The Board would alter and adjust the ratio in relation to imports and transport distances and administer an even price throughout the country.

THE SCHEME INTRODUCED BY THE MINISTER FOR AGRICULTURE The following are the weaknesses and possible injustices in this Scheme in the opinion of the National Farmers' Association:—

1. Export of barley and import of maize is, in practice, confined to the Corn Trade Association, which has a very limited membership of about a dozen closely associated firms. They are the only first-hand importers of maize.

2. Export of barley requires sales of at least 500 tons and in practice, would again be done by members of the Corn Trade Association.

3. Therefore, this Association would effectively control the distribution and price of imported maize and barley.

4. According to the Minister's announcement there is no limit to the distribution and price of imported maize and barley.

The estimated acreage under feeding barley this year is 240,000 acres. At an average yield of 11 tons per acre and accepting the Minister's price of £22-10-0 a ton for barley at 15% moisture, this year's crop is worth approximately £5,280,000.

The growing of feeding barley has been on the increase over the past number of years. In 1958 we grew approximately 220,000 acres; in 1959 approximately 240,000 acres.

The N.F.A. policy to make pig production in this country as far as possible independent of imported grains and therefore insulated from the fluctuations of the international grain market.

From the National point of view, it is not good business to be spending more money on imported grains than we earn on pig exports. For instance in 1956 our income from pig exports was £220,000 and the cost of imports of grain was over £1m.

This year, even though our pig population has increased steeply over the 1956 level, we nevertheless could have practically met our total requirements of home-grown barley to feed these pigs.

Therefore, all that was required was the internal organisation to ensure that the grower received an economic price, that the feeder received his dried barley at a fair relative price and that the pig grower was able to supply his pigs with the same in all parts of the country.

To achieve this, the N.F.A. presented to the Minister a Scheme outlined as follows:— It will be remembered that the Grain Board sold class 2 wheat, i.e. the wheat unfit for milling for human consumption as a result of the hard weather of 1959 at £22 a ton.

By exporting barley early in the season and delaying the import of barley and maize, a condition of scarcity can easily be created especially after the 1st January, when feeding stocks on the farms will have been reduced.

operatives and merchants. 2. The trade, i.e. the co-operatives and merchants would purchase the barley and dry it. It would then be bought from them at a fixed margin by the Grain Board. This would be mainly paper transaction. The margin would be based on the Wheat Order formula recognised as not being excessive.

3. The Grain Board would then sell the barley back to the compounders and the farmers on the same basis as class 2 wheat mentioned in the introduction.

4. The Board would alter and adjust the ratio in relation to imports and transport distances and administer an even price throughout the country.

THE SCHEME INTRODUCED BY THE MINISTER FOR AGRICULTURE The following are the weaknesses and possible injustices in this Scheme in the opinion of the National Farmers' Association:—

1. Export of barley and import of maize is, in practice, confined to the Corn Trade Association, which has a very limited membership of about a dozen closely associated firms. They are the only first-hand importers of maize.

2. Export of barley requires sales of at least 500 tons and in practice, would again be done by members of the Corn Trade Association.

3. Therefore, this Association would effectively control the distribution and price of imported maize and barley.

4. According to the Minister's announcement there is no limit to the distribution and price of imported maize and barley.
