With ceremony and pagentry this well-beloved Community of teaching Sisters of the Presentation Order in Dungarvan celebrated the 150th anniversary of the foundation of the convent.

### STREETS DECKED WITH

Streets were decked with flags and bunting, and in brilliant sunshine and ideal warm conditions the school-children in their attractive blue-and-white costumes with red-crested hats, marched in procession to the 11.30 a.m. Mass at St. Mary's Parish Church.

### NUNS AT SPECIAL MASS

Members of the Community, led by Reverend Mother Margaret Mary proceeded from the Convent to the Church and occupied specially-allotted places.

### DEDICATION

His Lordship the Bishop Most Rev. Dr. D. Cahalan, D.D., presided at the commemorative Mass, which was celebrated by Rev. Fr. D. Byrne, C.C., Dungarvan. His Lordship was assisted at the Throne by Ven. Archdeacon D. Power, P.P., V.F., Dungarvan, and Rev. Fr. Lynch, formerly of the Australian Mission.

### BISHOP PRESIDES

His Lordship, accompanied by the Archdeacon, and Rev. Fr. R. Keane, Diocesan Secretary and members of the clergy, went from the Sacristy down the centre aisle of the Church to the centre of the altar.

### SPECIAL ADDRESS

# Preacher's Tribute to Dungarvan Presentation Sisters

"For His mercies to the Presentation Sisters, to the clergy and faithful of Dungarvan for the past one hundred and fifty years, we have come this day before almighty God to offer Him the gratitude of our hearts," stated the celebrated Carmelite Preacher Very Rev. Fr. Martin Leydon, O.D.C., at the 11.30 a.m. Mass on Sunday at St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan.

Fr. Leydon gave a special address commemorating the Centenary of the Presentation Sisters, 1814-1959.

**NATION IN BONDAGE**

"So much do we depend on God for all good things, for our achievements great and small, that we would be foolish if we failed to ask the bounty of His Providence." A strange and chequered past has been ours in Ireland for the past century and a half. When the nineteenth century dawned Nano Nagle of Cork founded the Order of the Presentation Sisters while this nation was still deep in mourning. We were held in chains of bondage in body and soul and the nation was on the verge of doom. The young people of Nano Nagle's time had little to guide them on the way to a mature life, when laws were designed to crush the people even more—to rob them of their native tongue and to wean them from their Religion.

**MOBILE QUALITIES**

Dungarvan in 1809 lived only on the memory of great days. Visiting poets came hither from the hedge schools of Sliah Laochra in Kerry to the cabins of Sliah gCua to serve and educate the children who clustered everywhere.

"The Presentation Sisters," stated the preacher, "have inherited from their noble founders great qualities of mind and spirit. Theirs is the challenge to devote their lives to be the servants and educators of the poor. This challenge they accepted in Dungarvan from the first day their presence graced the town."

**THANKS TO PRESENTATION NUNS**

One hundred and fifty years ago Catholic education was in its infancy in Ireland, and many scoffed at the idea of a Sister setting the world on fire from within the convent walls. It was, then, no easy matter for the daughters of Nano Nagle to win the confidence of the poor for whose interest and uplifting they had dedicated themselves to God.

**A HAPPY DAY**

"We are happy to arrive at this evening," said Fr. Leydon, "and to see around us the fruit of the unselfish interests of the Presentation Sisters, and I take this opportunity of thanking the good Sisters in the names of their past pupils and the people as a whole. Such staunch steadfastness, such magnificent co-operation and charity as has been shown are deeply appreciated by the Bishop who is your chief pastor, by the clergy whose joy it is to see the children of the parish cared for. This is the day the Lord has made and let us rejoice in it."

**TEACHING CHEST**

Briefly outlining the history of the Presentation Order, Fr. Leydon said that his first contact with the nuns of the Presentation was at the Presentation Academy in Masonic Avenue, San Francisco, U.S.A., where he had seen the wonderful work done by them. "But," he said, "Dungarvan is no mean town beside the last rampart of the Gaeltacht of the Deise. In the shade of the Comeragh mountains, where we have reason to speak profoundly of its brave and courteous women in the cloister and without. The Presentation Sisters are teaching Christ—which is the most important work of all."

**FAST CHANGING WORLD**

"A fast-changing world is displacing many of our traditions," continued the preacher. "The screen of the cinema is now brought to our parlours and

**BUILD A CATHOLIC HOME—GIRLS COWARDLY**

"I cannot stress too much," said Fr. Leydon, "the importance of building a Catholic home. Our Irish girls are turning, I am afraid, into cowards when Almighty God and the Church calls on them to go out and build a Catholic home. Many of them lose their heritage in the streets of the big cities in England and America. Our towns are crying out for good Catholic homes which in many cases are wanting due to what must be called the cowardice and selfishness of our Irish girls."

**THREAT FROM T.V.**

The world nowadays was so small that the theatre of war—and the theatre of temptation both lay on our doorstep. Television was a challenge to our girls and a challenge to the home, and it was up to every one to preserve everything that was decent, holy and modest and magnificent in our past. "I would ask," said the priest, "of the parents and of our teaching Sisters to see to it that our girls are trained on these lines."

**WE HAD FORGOT OUR OWN MISSIONARIES**

We had been sending our people all over the world as Missionaries in religion, but there was a danger that we might forget our own country. There was at present scarcity of vocations which was being felt by the Presentation Sisters in common with every other Religious Order in Ireland.

**A BLESSING FOR THE FUTURE**

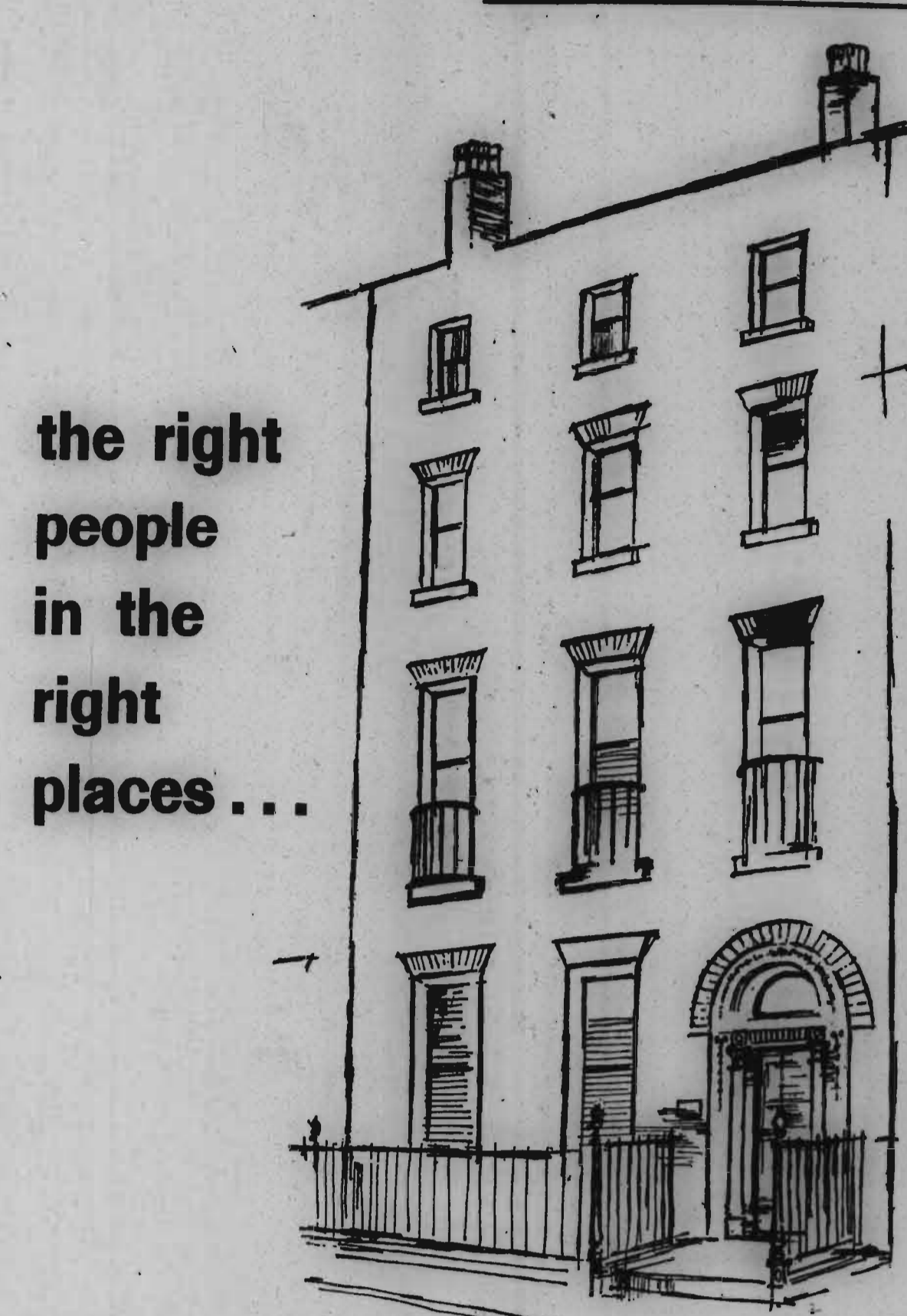

AN EYE TO THE PAST

By P. C. Power, N.T. (ARTICLE NO. 5) From Rake to Hymn-Writer... Over a 170 years ago a strange character came to the neighbourhood of Kilmacthomas. He was a young man, Hugh Gaelach O'Suilleabhain, Le. Gaelic Thade Sullivan. He was a native of Co. Cork and lived a rakish life wandering the roads. He was glib of tongue and ready to ensnare in melodious verse the praises or the blame of those he knew. Whatever he had to Thade's conversion from his rakish living, we do not know. However, he turned over a new leaf and changed his ways. Instead of the songs of another time, he now wrote hymns. One of these beautiful Gaelic hymns was actually written in Dungarvan and sung in the old Church, which stood where the present Christian Brothers' Schools now stand. It is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and is never heard and is learned only by students studying the poetry of Tade O'Sullivan. Thade died in 1785. A wanderer to the last, death overtook him in Ballylawn in the parish of Stradbally and he is buried in the old churchyard there. Over his tomb is a slab bearing a Latin inscription. As one part of it says: "In praise of the Lord, great poems he wrote, and hymns sweet he shall fervently chant." The Gaelic Dungarvan he knew is gone forever, as surely as the bones have returned to dust.
