## Triumphant Homecoming For Hurlers

**Jubilant Waterford did its hurling heroes proud on Monday night when thousands of rejoicing supporters, representative of city and county, united in extending a tumultuous welcome home to the newly-crowned champions.**

Bonfires blazed, flags were waved and thunderous cheering went on to win the most difficult Munster Championship staged in the history of the competition.

In the All-Ireland, said Mr. Fanning, they defeated their friendly foe, Kilkenny. Between had grown up over the past three years a spirit of mutual respect. Each now had a healthy regard for the other. As they passed through County Kilkenny here and there little groups of people cheered and waved flags and shouted "well done." He would like to say they appreciated the gesture on the part of the people of Kilkenny.

At the reception in Malahide, Rev. Thomas Maher, trainer of the team; the chairman, Mr. Fanning, and others came to tell them that they were doing well. They were also for the good of themselves but also for the benefit of the county.

He added that he wished, on behalf of the people of Waterford to say that what the team did at Croke Park was appreciated by the people.

They brought honour to themselves and renown to the county. They were an inspiration to those who would follow them and in the future when they wished to spur teams to greater endeavour they would be able to use as their slogan: "October 4, 1959," when Waterford truly marched to glory.

The Mayor associated all members of the Corporation with the welcome of the team. They were sorry that Ald. Kyne was not able to be with them and all wished him a speedy recovery.

Ald. Richard Jones, Mayor of Waterford, said he was indeed thrilled in his term of office as Mayor of Waterford to be should have the opportunity of welcoming home and according a civic reception to his fellow citizens—the hurlers of Waterford and champions of Ireland. At the conclusion of the game, which was watched by a record replay attendance of 77,285, captain Frankie Walsh was carried on a wicker chair to the Hogan Stand to receive the Cup from the President of the Association, Dr. J. J. Stuart. The President congratulated both teams, and expressed the hope that Waterford would be back again next year.

After the presentation, 22-year old Walter was introduced to President De Valera, who shook

his hand and extended congratulations while they posed for pictures. In addition to An t-Uachtaran, the distinguished attendance included the Taoiseach, Mr. Lemass and Mrs. Lemass; Sean T. and Sean Uí Ceallaigh; Canon T. B. Walsh, who represented His Lordship, the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore; members of the Government, the Diplomatic Corps and Hierarchy.

## A Heart-warming Exhibition says Sean O'Ceallachain

Sean O'Ceallachain, in the "Evening Press" ... The All-Ireland hurling crown justifiably returns to Waterford after a lapse of eleven years. At Croke Park yesterday, the Deise hurling giants captured the coveted honours after an hour of hard hitting hurling.

An attendance of 77,285 which exceeded the drawn match figures by 3,578, thrilled to a heart warming exhibition of hurling which Waterford conquered their neighbouring rivals Kilkenny, by 3-12 to 1-10.

Waterford's success was a clear vindication of the form which swept aside the challenge of such powerful hurling exponents as Tipperary and Cork.

Undoubtedly victory on this occasion was achieved the hard way for the Deise had to call on all their reserve of stamina and craft before finally triumphing.

It was obvious too, that the winners had learned a lesson from the drawn game for at no stage yesterday were they lulled

into committing defensive errors which proved so heart-breaking in the first meeting. The defensive tactics paid off handsomely. Close marking and quick tackling stifled the best efforts of the Kilkenny forwards right through the game.

Above all, and I thought it stuck out very noticeably, Nore side forwards were not allowed to crowd the Waterford goalkeeper to the same extent as in the drawn game.

The real basis of Waterford's win could safely be attributed to their fast ground striking and first-time pulling which at times transformed defence into attack.

Not alone that but they excelled in aerial exchanges and, this, too, played its part in establishing a grip on the exchanges at vital stages.

This game also proved conclusively that Waterford are fighters in the best Munster tradition; they showed that they had he will and tenacity to cover when the odds were against them.

As a team and not as individuals that Waterford played the game. "Kilkenny," he said, "the team was beaten by Waterford yesterday. I must say it with great pride that the people of Waterford welcomed their heroes home. Waterford were good enough to meet Kilkenny yesterday and beat them."

Congratulating each and every member of the team, he said they all played a magnificent part in the game. Everybody was proud of the people of Waterford and in the name of the people he would say "well done."

Ald. P. Browne said it was a great honour for him to be asked to speak at the reception. "All down through the years since 1879, it has been an uphill fight in the city and the county of Waterford, Maurice Hennessy of Roanmore was now the only survivor of the leaders of the G.A.A. in Waterford in 1897. In the past there were some great teams in Waterford but this All-Ireland team has surpassed them all. Since the start of 1959 they had scored 123 points and now they had taken to Waterford the All-Ireland trophy. It certainly was a great credit to them."

It was hard to pick out anybody for special mention, said Ald. Browne, everybody played a very hard game. Thomas Cheesty, however, was a whole-hearted worker and "is as strong as a lion and as swift as a swallow," he also congratulated the Co. Waterford Board who helped them in many ways.

## SUPPORTERS FETE THE CHAMPIONS

FOUR hundred rejoicing supporters packed the Ballroom, on the Grand Hotel, Malahide, when the members of

the Dublin-based Waterfordmen's Association accorded the County's victorious hurling men a reception on Sunday night.

Mr. Padraig O'Maolaghaigh, welcoming Very Rev. Canon Walsh said Canon Walsh was a great follower of hurling and took a keen interest in the Waterford team for many years. First of all, he said he would like to congratulate the Waterford team who were now just starting their tumultuous tour. "To-morrow," he said, "the team will go on the real stage of the tour. They and the officials will start for home and we wish them every success. When they arrive in Waterford to-morrow night there will be a terrific reception for them."

He went on: "Apart from the adults of the city, probably 8,000 young kiddies will be getting in your way to-morrow night. Those little children are the very fellows that are looking up at you for example, Your influence on them will do more for hurling than anything else."

At Limerick He went on to say that during the Galway game at Limerick a number of critics told him Waterford's victory was a flash in the pan. However, an old Limerick hurler, who was watching the game, turned around when he heard the critics and said: "The team that will beat those fellows will want more than a drink of water."

The president, Dr. J. J. Stuart told the assembled guests that it was a great honour for him to be with the Waterford team after their great victory over Kilkenny. He congratulated the hurlers and said many adjectives would be used to describe their hurling efforts but they would use would be completely inadequate. They were absolutely magnificent.

"They were a credit to the county," the president continued, "and above all, a credit to the G.A.A. Seventy-seven thousand two hundred and eighty-five people attended Croke Park today to see the replay. This is approximately 4,000 more than attended the first game and is a record for a replay. The display given by both teams fully deserved the attendance. The people of Ireland are proud of the Waterford hurlers."

Referring to the London victory over Antrim in the Junior All-Ireland hurling final, Dr. Stuart said it was a wonderful thing that the Irishmen who had emigrated remained loyal to the traditions of Ireland and loyal to the games.

Very Proud Mr. Sean Feeney said he felt sure he was speaking for all Waterford people when he said they were very proud of the high honour which the team had brought to the county. The McCarthy Cup was the greatest trophy that could be bestowed on any team and he was thankful to the Waterford team who brought home victory and especially to their trainer and to all supporters. They had achieved their life ambition by becoming All-Ireland champions. Mr. Feeney also thanked the chairman of the County Board, Mr. Pat Fanning, and all who had helped to distribute tickets and arrange the reception.

Mr. Vincent O'Donoghue, B.A., a former president of the Association, paid tribute to the players for their magnificence as seen on their performance as hurlers and their loyalty as Gaels.

"I am very proud to be at this reception and to be asked to say a few words about Waterford's magnificent team. The men that won the All-Ireland cup for Waterford to-day are no ordinary sportsmen; they are sportsmen among sportsmen and they are champions of champions. And they showed that to-day."

Mr. O'Donoghue, continuing said: "I would like to stress that not only have they been loyal to each other county but they see more games like the one in Croke Park today."

## Wonderful Show

Mr. P. O'Keefe, secretary of the G.A.A., said that Waterford and London teams put up a wonderful show and that the players of all four teams—Waterford, London, Antrim and Kilkenny—should be congratulated on the way they played the game.

"Our task is very easy at times," he added, "and at other times it is very difficult. This time, however, it was made easy by the assistance of the chairman and secretary of the Waterford County Board. It is hoped that in years to come we will see more games like the one in Croke Park today."

## PARA-TYPHOID OUTBREAK

To: Dungarvan Observer There is reason to believe that the peak of this outbreak has been reached and that the incidence of new cases is falling. Attention is drawn to the fact that though some of the residents of Abbeyside may have complained of symptoms of this disease during the past 2 months, they may not have sought medical advice. It is essential in the interests of the Public Health of this Town that such persons consult their family doctor immediately, so that the necessary investigations may be made to ensure that they are not infected with the germ of Paratyphoid Fever. Failure to do this involves the risk of infecting innocent persons with the germ, thereby extending the outbreak and making its ultimate control more difficult and costly.

A CHANCE TO GET RID OF FLUKE

The unusually dry weather this year offers farmers an ideal opportunity for an all-out campaign against the liver fluke disease of cattle and sheep, with an excellent chance of reducing its incidence to very low proportions in future years. The eggs of the fluke are passed out of the bodies of the infested animals, and soon afterwards the immature fluke hatches from the egg. In order to survive, however, it must burrow into the body of a small snail which can only live in mud or damp ground. If the fluke does not find the snail within 24 hours it dies.

TO THE INDIVIDUAL WHO EVENTUALLY GETS AROUND TO WRITING UP THE HISTORY OF WATERFORD HURLING IS OFFERED THIS SUGGESTION IN THE NAME OF EVERY SON AND DAUGHTER OF PORTLAIRGE WHO WAS IN CROKE PARK FOR THE COUNTY'S SECOND ALL-IRELAND VICTORY ON SUNDAY:

Mark down the events of October 4th 1959 as a chapter apart, the day on which eleven years of disillusionment and bitter disappointment were bridged with a victory that even shaded the never-to-be-forgotten victory of '48.

For this was by no stretch of the imagination an ordinary victory. Neither was it an ordinary All-Ireland. This was a double-barrelled triumph, the smashing of a reputedly invincible bogey and the scoring of one of the most convincing final victories for years. This was Waterford's finest hour. This was an occasion worthy of an entire booklet on its own.

### Bogey Smashed

This was the day on which Kilkenny, the most renowned of championship campaigners, experienced the ignominy of an eight-point defeat. This was the day on which Kilkenny, whose proud boast it was that they could contain us at any time, wilted in the path and were finally crushed by the power and fury of determined Waterford.

To the players whose power of action earned the McCarthy Cup another tenure in our midst and the men charged with selection and directing their preparation, one must immediately extend a vote of congratulations and thanks.

They sailed through a most difficult and exacting campaign in a manner that will ever rebound to the county's credit. Galway, Tipperary, Cork and finally Kilkenny all met the same fate—a fate executed with a finity of action and flow of hurling that caused no less a jubilation than the old Nore side star, the great Jimmy Langton, to raise the wazzer, of the white and blue as he finest combination to come out of Munster for many a long day.

Waterford may have produced a more attractive brand of hurling at one time or another during the year. But they were never before so powerfully effective when so badly needed to be.

### Refused to Panic

At one stage, after ten minutes of the opening half, they had the demoralising experience of being half a dozen points in arrears although utilising the advantage of a fairly considerable breeze and glaring sun. Yet they refused to panic, continuing

instead, to play their usual game. The game which had already accounted for the cream of Munster. The game which was to earmark the name of Kilkenny for insertion in the obituary columns before this 1959 All-Ireland had its course.

### Delirious Supporters

There was not in the huge attendance of 77,285, a man who did not leave Croke Park perfectly satisfied with the result. The better team won. Of that there is no doubt. The victors were hailed and back-clapped and skipper Frankie Walsh was carried in triumph to the Hogan Stand to receive the coveted McCarthy Cup from Dr. Stuart, the president of the Association.

Kilkenny drew first blood after three minutes. They tagged on a goal two minutes later and threw up a full six points clear approaching the end of the first quarter. These were anxious minutes for Waterford followers. Kilkenny were hurling confidently. The defence looked just as powerful as in the drawn game. Ollie Walsh had the morale uplift of a miracle save behind him and the Ossory forwards had already slipped our defence for a grand total of 1-4. The outlook was none too bright.

And then it came—the goal that was to shatter the Nore side's confident composure. It had the origin outfield. Seamus Power laid on a typical pass; Mick Flannelly snapped up the leather, veered across the goal and then struck a glorious left-handed drive that left even mighty Ollie helpless. The ball was in the net and the seeming impregnable Kilkenny citadel had fallen. This was the tactic we needed. The time: thirteen minutes of the first half.
