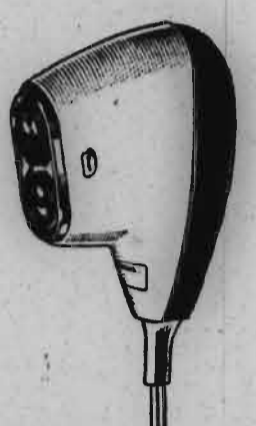

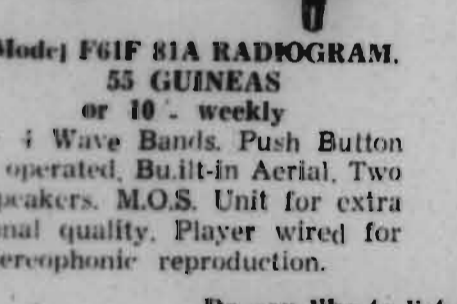

## Local Happenings

### CONGRATULATIONS

Congratulations are extended to Master Jim Mountain on his outstanding successes at the recent Feis na Mumba. He is a pupil of the Croys School of Dancing, Waterford, and has already amassed a huge collection of trophies at Feisannas throughout the country.

### IN HONOUR OF ST. NICHOLAS

Quarante Ore, the devotions of the Forty Hours Adoration, will be held at Ring Church on Sunday next in honour of the feast of Saint Nicholas, patron of the village.  
Arrangements have been made for the holding of a feast day Irish concert and variety programme at Halla Hindberg on Sunday night.

### AT DUBLIN SALE

Two hundred and fifty guineas was the price secured by Mr. Nicholas Connors, Park Stradally for his hunter "Just Fox" at the concluding day of the four-day Bloodstock November Sales, held last week in Dublin.

### VOTERS' LIST

The provisional lists of persons to be registered as electors in the year from 15th April next are now being published. They can be seen at courthouses, post offices, Garda stations and other public offices.  
Local elections are due to be held next year and only persons whose names are entered in the register, which will be compiled from the voters' lists will be entitled to vote.

### DEPT OPPOSED TO LATE PUB OPENING

Speaking in the Dail on the Second Stage of the Intoxicating Liquor Bill, Mr. Thomas A. Ryan, T.D. (Labour), Abbeyville said that if a free vote were permitted, the Minister would have a true indication of the wishes of the people throughout the country.

The Bill was good in parts, but he did not agree with the proposal for later openings. There seemed to be general acclamation for doing away with bona fide houses, but he did not agree with this. His experience was that they were well-kept houses. Owners of bona fide premises whose earnings would be reduced by an Act of the Oireachtas, were entitled to compensation.

### OVER THE BORDER—BY POLICE PERMIT—TO ATTEND DANCE

Ireland's leading ceili band, the Clancy Brothers combination from County Tyrone had to get permission from the police authorities in Northern Ireland to attend the big ceili scheduled for Dungarvan on Sunday night next.

This famous band is coming for the Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann ceili of the year, with dancing from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. (See advertisement in this issue).

These top-rank musicians are led by Pat Clancy who was leading accordionist of Johnny Pickering's band, and include in their group the Ulster champion violinist and a former member of the Army No. 1 band as their drummer.

Ceili fans from all over the county will flock to the Town Hall on Sunday night to dance to the lively music of this renowned band.

There will be Holy Hour devotions at 7.30 p.m.

On Monday the 10 a.m. Mass will be a High Mass pro pace, which will be offered for world peace. Devotions of the Holy Hour will commence Monday night at 7.30 p.m.

On Tuesday there will be Solemn High Mass at 11.30 a.m. and there will be a Procession of the Blessed Sacrament and Evening Devotions commencing at 7.30 p.m.

### MINISTER IMPRESSED BY CASE FOR LISMORE FACTORY

Kilmacotbeg Dail Deputy, Mr. Sean Ormond, T.D. (Fianna Fáil) made arrangements for a special conference with the Minister for Industry and Commerce to discuss the proposal for a chipboard factory for Lismore town. 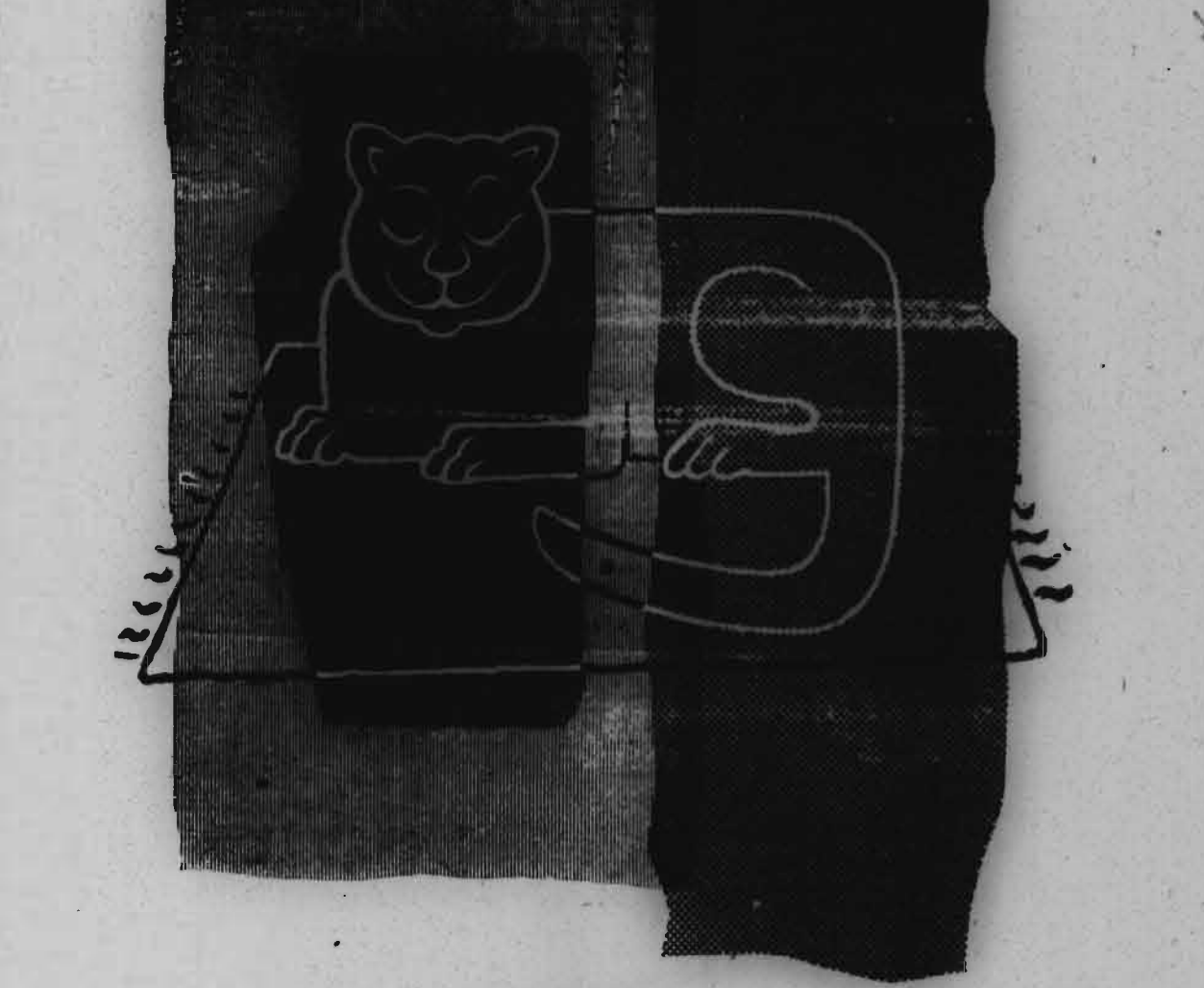

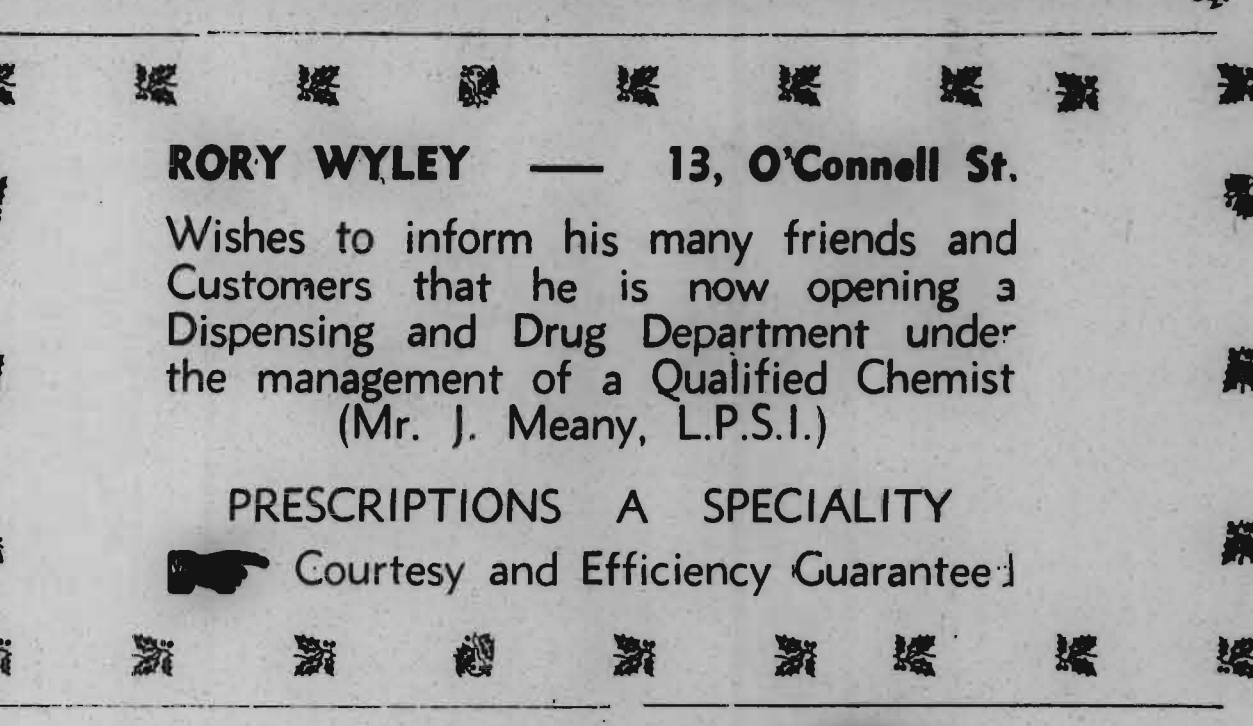

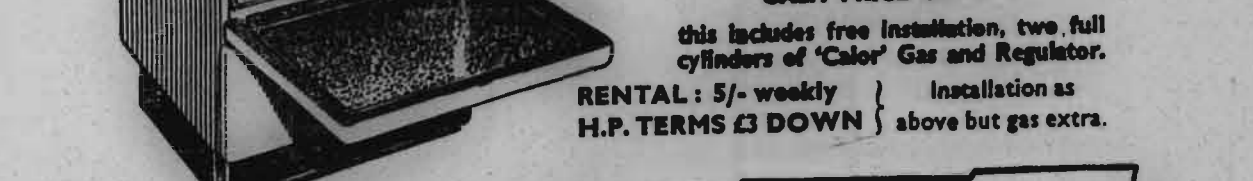

GERALDINES GO DOWN

De La Salle qualify for final

DE LA SALLE, 2-4; GERALDINES 1-3  
MIDWAY through the second half of last Sunday's Senior football semi-final, which was played in bitterly cold weather at the City Sportsfield, De La Salle's hold on the championship crown was in real jeopardy.

The champions interval lead of 1-3 to 0-1 had been cut to an insecure point and challenging Geraldines, playing with tremendous dash and increasing confidence, were coming more and more into the game with every passing minute. The stage seemed set for a shock result.

De La Salle were rattled and floundering. Much of the gilt had been knocked off their customary machine-like game by the hard-hitting Aglish men and a spate of sideline switches had failed to halt to any appreciable extent their downward trend as time sped on. This was the pattern pursued during an action-packed third quarter.

Then the champions, almost in desperation as it were, broke upfield. The challengers were caught on the wrong foot as Barron bore in to place Ferris for a goal that was all against the run of play. De La Salle, four points clear, were as good as through to the final, for Geraldines, try though they did, were unable to again close the gap on a side that was obviously trained to the ounce as the saying goes.

When all is said and done one must concede that the better footballing side prevailed. Their all-round balance and uncanny team-work were in sharp contrast to the always whole-hearted but rather lopsided efforts of the losers.

Yet had Geraldines made the most of the advantage they achieved during the purple third third quarter it is conceivable that their followers would to-day be thinking in terms of their first senior title in over thirty years.

Their failure to do so could be attributed to a variety of reasons. Lack of match practice—they had not played a game since last August—lack of combination and a patent lack of experience—no fewer than seven members of the team had less than a year's senior football behind them—these were the crippling factors in the long run.

The day, though, was not without a ray of encouragement for Aglish people. Their young side in staying within four points of the champions exceeded the expectations of many of their most ardent followers and confounded the critics, the big majority of whom were loud in their predictions of a most humiliating defeat.

This was without any shadow of doubt Geraldines' best performance of the year. It was a game in which every man of the side virtually played himself to a standstill. No one failed for want of effort. The result should help to rub out bitter memories of some of their less inspiring displays over the past couple of years or so.

De La Salle played their best football of the year, too, though they were never allowed to produce the scintillating movements of twelve months ago, for the simple reason that the losers particularly their defence and mid-field, hampered and hustled them at every beck and call.

The winners, who led by 1-3 to 0-1 at the end of the first half, during which they utilised the advantage of the breeze, had

a grand goalman in Denis Corcoran and sound defenders in Willie Smith, J. Sullivan and M. Harney. Bro. Barrett, playing one of his finest games for some years, was the better of two hard-working mid-fielders, while John Barron was the key man in an attack that was also helped along by Noel Dalton and newcomers P. O'Connor, a deadly hand-to-foot carrier, and J. Foley.

Patsy Kennelly, who was probably the outstanding man of the thirty, the indefatigable Stylo Riordan and Billy Hallahan were the heroes of a Geraldines fifteen which also owed much to Jack O'Neill, Tom O'Connell and Jim Davis for their tireless work over the hour.
