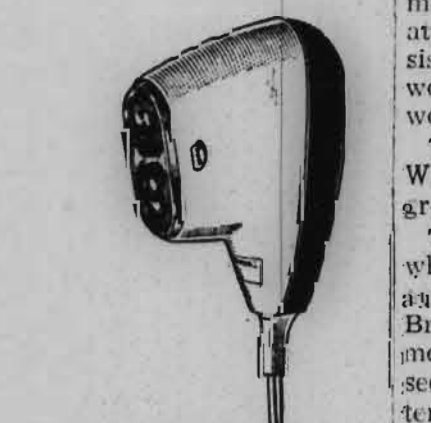

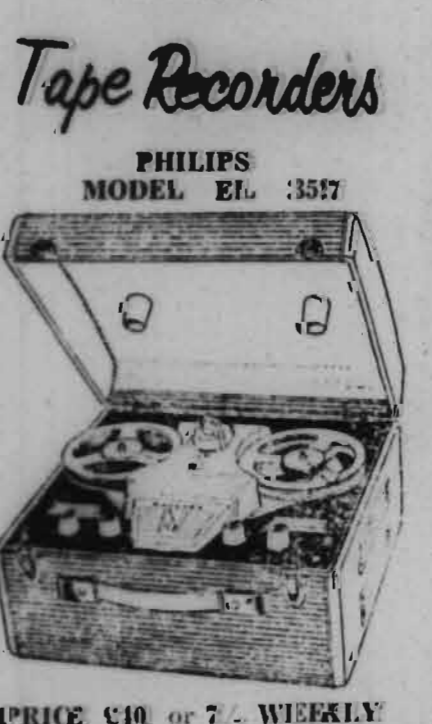

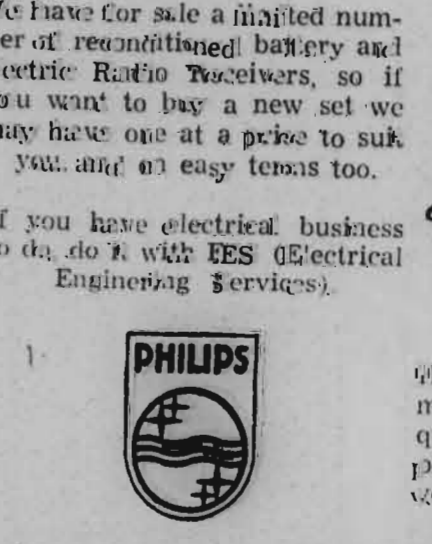

SCOLARSHIPS FOR GAELTACHT WOMEN

AWARD OF £2,100 FOR TALLOW MAN
Mr. Denis Barry, Railway House, Tallow Road Station, Glencairn, a gate-keeper employed by C.I.E., was awarded £2,100 in his action against Patrick McGrath, lorry owner, Ballysaggart, Lismore, in a High Court case in Dublin on Thursday last.

CO. LIBRARIES MEETING

A special meeting of the Waterford County Libraries Committee was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Tuesday, 1st December, to consider estimates of requirements of the Waterford County Libraries Services for year ending 31st March, 1961. Present were: Ven. Archdeacon Power, P.P., V.F. Chairman, Rev. M. Power, Bríd Bean Uí Conduin, Treasa Bean Uí Cúilrín, Mr. C. Griffin, Messrs. M. H. O'Hara, and M. J. McCarthy.

Introducing the estimates, the County Librarian stated that under the Ordinary headings he had to allow for small increases in salaries to meet Annual Increments, in Filings and Repairs to carry out essential repairs at Dungarvan Adult Library and in Transport, cost of which had increased. There was a slight decrease under Insurance. The total increase under the usual headings was £213 as compared with last year's estimates. Unfortunately the time had come when the Library Van had to be replaced and the cost of provision of a new van was estimated at £2,100. Chassis at £1,100 and construction of body at £1,000. The present van had given excellent service and was now in its eleventh year. Its deterioration from now on would be rapid and it was sensible economy to replace it while it had a "trade-in" value.

The book-stock position continues to deteriorate owing to the totally inadequate amount which has been available for books over the last two years. Even the amount of £3,100 for which he had provided would not bring the book-stock up to the level of 1958 level. No public library can fulfil its educational functions and keep pace with modern trends without an adequate book fund. Failure to provide the required amount for book purchase is tantamount to rendering our service virtually inoperative and furthermore build up heavy commitments for the future which must eventually be met.

We must face up to the reality of our situation and cannot give way to any policy of curtailment imposed on us from without, through mistaken motives. He advocated the adoption of the estimates as presented for a sum of £11,600.

There was a long discussion on the items. Mr. M. H. O'Hara stated that it would be advisable to point out to the County Council that the provision of a book-fund was a non-recurrent item and to set out the estimates accordingly. Mrs. C. Griffin proposed "that if the County Council were not prepared to meet the cost in full that they be asked to provide the cost by way of a 7 year loan which could be made available at 4 1/2% repayment would be £386 in the first year. This proposal was seconded by Treasa Bean Uí Cúilrín and passed unanimously.

Treasa Bean Uí Cúilrín asked if Book-binding was done by Irish Firms. The County Librarian replied that all binding was done by Irish Firms and that the quality of binding had improved.

E. Bean Uí Cúilrín queried the provision of £123 for contribution to An Comhairle Leabharlanna. The County Librarian said that this was a statutory payment and there was no option in the matter.

It was proposed by E. Bean Uí Cúilrín and was seconded by Mrs. C. Griffin that the estimates as presented for a total of £11,600 be adopted. The proposal was passed unanimously.

Treasa Bean Uí Cúilrín said that she had been informed that Library Books had been offered for sale at a Jumble Sale and asked the County Librarian if he could state how they got there?

The County Librarian replied that the only Library books which could have appeared at such a sale were old withdrawn books. Such books were clearly marked with the Withdrawal Stamp on the title page and on two or three other pages throughout the books. When withdrawn, books are often given to hospitals and institutions. From this point the County Librarian has no further control of their subsequent movement. The vast majority of withdrawn books were sold as waste-paper.

CREDIT FOR FERTILISERS. We wish to draw farmers' attention to the credit facilities...

Earlier this year the Government decided to drop the Scheme whereby farmers could obtain short term credit for fertilisers and ground limestone...

As a result of N.F.A. representation on this matter it was decided to continue the Scheme:

(1) The only security necessary is one solvent surety who must be a property owner. Two farmers may come together and act as surety for one another...

(2) The loans are sanctioned by the Corporation, but they are actually issued by a Bank selected by the applicant...

(3) The interest rate is 3%. The interest is deducted by the Bank on issue of a loan, but should a farmer repay the advance before the repayment date, a rebate of interest is allowed...

(4) The period of the loan would be normally be in the region of 9 months.

(5) There is no maximum loan, and a minimum of £10. If farmers wish they may write directly to the Secretary, Agricultural Credit Corporation Ltd., 11 Kildare Street, Dublin.

Instead, however, of applications being made direct, the farmer may, if he so wishes, apply to the local office of any Bank, where applications will be dealt with on behalf of the Corporation.

END OF CONFUSION AND UNCERTAINTY. The timely announcement by the Minister for Agriculture puts an end to the confusion and uncertainty which recent events have introduced into wheat marketing policy.

Good sense has prevailed and the married price scheme introduced two years ago at the suggestion of the N.F.A. will continue.

This announcement shows that the Minister has not yet finally closed the door on wheat quotas; this may lead some farmers to think that they should grow an acre in 1960 in the hope of improving abnormal acreage of wheat in their chance of a larger quota in the possible future.

N.F.A. has requested the Minister to state that if he should ever decide to introduce quotas and to relate them to past production he will not take the 1960 wheat deliveries into account.

All grain growers will welcome the introduction of the appropriate additions for barley less than 20% moisture content.

The N.F.A. protested against the absence of these additions in the official announcement of the arrangements for the marketing of the 1959 barley crop.

It is not possible to comment on the floor price of 38/- per barrel for green barley until we know how the Minister proposes to control the price of dried barley to the pig feeder.

COST OF FEEDING STUFFS. The cost of feeding stuffs was considered at the N.F.A. special Council Meeting on November 25th. Members reported that exorbitant prices were being charged for feeding stuffs. Maize meal was quoted at 37/- per cwt. in Co. Roscommon and for similar prices in counties Londonderry and Mayo.

The N.F.A. were given an assurance by the Minister for Agriculture on August 6th this year that two on lots and over of dried barley could be bought at £22.10s. per ton up to December 31st, 1959. This assurance was reiterated in Seanad Eireann on the same date.

The Minister also pointed out that general enquiries with regard to the sales of feeding stuffs should be directed to the Council of Maize Meal Millers.

It is important that this assurance, given to the N.F.A. by the Minister for Agriculture, will be honoured by the Maize Meal Millers.

We recommend, therefore, that farmers generally would ensure that the dried barley is, in fact, available in two ton lots and over at £22.10s. per ton, ex-store. Farmers wishing to purchase at this price should, where necessary, buy in groups to avail of the tow ton lots and over price.

Planning for New Year's Turkey Flock

Although the broad-breasted strains of turkeys introduced by the Department of Agriculture a few years ago have been taken up widely by breeders and producers, there are still many birds marketed every year which fall far short of modern market requirements.

The best method of building up next year's flock is to buy day-old poult of the broad-breasted strains from the turkey hatcheries. Since these poult are bred from selected parents of excellent rearing type, the producer can start off with the assurance that he has the right strain and that, with careful feeding and management, he will produce birds of good quality which will command good prices.

Some producers prefer to keep a few hens and mate them with cocks at the turkey cock stations. The cocks at these stations are well-bred selected birds, but if they are mated with inferior hens their progeny are not likely to be of high quality.

Producers who follow this method of securing replacements would be well advised to select for breeding only the best of their hens. There is a temptation to sell these on the Christmas market, but by retaining them for breeding producers will be improving the quality of their flocks each year.

Farmer's or their wives who would like help in deciding on which hens to retain can get the advice of the poultry instructors on the County Committee of Agriculture staff in each county, but they should, in general, retain only well-grown broad-breasted hens that have no obvious deformity such as crooked breasts or knobs on the breasts.

Some producers may feel that to buy poult from the hatcheries at 5/- or 6/- each is not an economical way of building up a flock, but many people are doing this with good results. The birds obtained in this way, provided they are fed and managed correctly, will have a far better chance of making good than near it than birds bred in haphazard fashion. On a poor market they have the best chance of returning a profit to the producer.

It is with deep regret we record the death of Mr. Richard O'Neill, Ballinacorney, Tallow, which occurred at his residence on Sunday last. A member of a widely esteemed agricultural family, he had reached an advanced age. There was a large and representative cortege at the funeral to Knockanore cemetery on Tuesday, December 8th. Rev. Fr. T. Nugent, C.C., Glendine, officiated. To his bereaved family and relatives, we tender our deepest sympathy. R.I.P.

GROWING WHEAT BY CONTRACT

Proposals have recently been made for the growing of wheat on a contract or quota basis. These are at present being examined by the various interests concerned, and further consultations on them have yet to take place between the Minister and those interests.

If the proposals should, in due course, be accepted by the Government, legislation would be necessary to implement them. As it is now clear that it would not be practicable to give effect to such proposals before 1961, the Minister has decided that, for the 1960 crop—

(1) The basic prices for millable wheat will be the same as for the 1959 crop; and (2) The arrangement for deduction of a levy from these prices to meet the loss on disposal of any wheat in excess of a four-milling requirement of 300,000 tons, dried, will be retained.

The Minister draws the attention of wheat growers to the fact that the amount of the levy would depend on the extent to which the area sown to wheat is calculated to yield more than 300,000 tons, dried, for milling.

The Minister also announces that there will be a floor price of 38s. per barrel (€19 per ton) for feeding barley of the 1960 crop. This price will be payable for barley of 20 per cent. moisture, delivered to the purchaser's premises and represents an increase of 1s. per barrel on that guaranteed for the 1959 crop. There will be appropriate additions to the price of 38s. per barrel for barley of lower moisture content than 20 per cent., and appropriate deductions if the moisture content is over that figure.

The foregoing has been issued by the Government Information Bureau on behalf of the Minister for Agriculture.

Shipping of Cattle. At my request, I have had discussions over the week-end with the Shipping Companies, the Dublin Market Salemasters, and the Shipping Agents regarding an allegation that cattle from certain stands in the Market not be handled for shipment. In order to allay any doubt that may exist in the minds of buyers and sellers, I have been asked for, and received, an assurance that all cattle offered for shipment will continue to be handled as heretofore.

The foregoing statement has been issued by the Minister for Agriculture.

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Brickey Racers 5-5 Ballyduff 4-0 To say that the conditions under which the divisional junior racing was decided at the Sportsfield, Cappoquin on Sunday last were abnormal is a rather mild description. The fact is that a game of such importance should not have been played at all in the circumstances.

The rain poured down relentlessly to reduce the pitch to a veritable quagmire. The contestants bravely grappled with the conditions, though theirs was an utterly impossible task, while spectators huddled together in the shade of the surrounding walls in a fruitless effort to gain some measure of protection from the elements.

Overall the picture painted was a sorry one. From a battle that was a far greater test of inner fortitude and endurance than it was of hitting ability, Brickey Racers very deservedly emerged to gain possession of their first championship success since the mid-forties.

The Erickey's victory was every bit as warranted as the other side's wide margin of defeat. Brickey's well-merited victory stemmed largely from the spirited hurrying of Justin Spratt at mid-field and a typically wily exhibition from county star John Kiely in the half-line of attack. Kiely, in fact, was the brains of the attack on a day that was anything but suitable to his type of game.

There was, too, a pronounced touch of class about the work of Pat Spratt at half-back. Goal-mate Paul O'Donoghue displayed tremendous courage in his handling of some difficult situations, while his full—Bill Spratt, Nicholas McGrath and Peter McComb—Mick Walsh, Patsy Murray and Shaughnessy Woods all left an imprint on the game.

Once again Mick Becker was the outstanding man on the Ballyduff side, playing power-packed hurling who never pulled a leg wrong under the most difficult conditions. A great display from a man who has given Ballyduff unparalleled service over the years.

Others to catch the eye on a side that sadly lacked the steady influence of regular centre-back Joe Daly, were Paul Flynn, who curbed his usual dashing game to shadow Kiely; Davy Barry, the Quirkie brother, Gerry Hurley and Richie Tobin.

Apart from a brief flare-up as a result of which a Ballyduff player received marching orders the game was incident free credit to both sides in the circumstances.

A word of praise, of course, is not out of place to revere Jim Irish, from Ferrybank, who was right up with the play and delivered his decisions firmly and smartly for every minute of the sixty. His was a grand job.

Back in the early fifties the side who wore the saffron and blue of Abbeyside were undisputed kings of mid-field ball affairs within the county. For three successive years they farmed the county title. And then they fell on a rain-soaked November Sunday at the City sportsfield, when within reach of their fourth championship on the trot.

In the years immediately following their football fortunes slumped and within the decade—inspired by the feats of their senior compatriots—to specialise on hurling interest in the big ball game gradually dwindled.

That was the pattern until this year they came thundering back with a series of great displays that culminated in the recapture of the divisional title.

On Sunday they go back to Waterford hell bent on regaining the County crown when they take on Tramore.
