Ballinroad Third Annual Social a Record

A capacity gathering at St. Laurence's Parish Hall, Ballinroad, enjoyed a terrific evening on Thursday last, when a huge attendance broke records for the third annual social in which the Ballinroad Parish Hall Committee joined forces with the Ballinacourty Football club to stage an unequalled successful combined operation.

A gaily festive crowd of over one hundred and fifty persons sat down to a delightful turkey and mince pie supper in the spacious hall, and later enjoyed a dancing session to the music of the Cornegagh Valley Band.

BISHOP REPRESENTED

Presiding over the evening's entertainment was Rev. Fr. Michael Walsh, C.C., Abbeyside, who is President of the Parish Hall Committee. The attendance also included: Rev. Fr. Robert Keane, Dungarvan, Diocesan Secretary, who represented His Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. D. Cohan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore; Rev. Fr. J. Morrissey, C.C., Cloughmore, nonagenarian Mr. M. J. McCarthy, formerly National School teacher at Abbeyside; Mr. Gerald Morrissey, donor of the site for the Parish Hall; Mrs. M. Hallahan, Dancing Instructress; Mr. Maurice Hallahan, Knockenpower.

FROM FAR AND NEAR

In addition to the large numbers who attended from Ballinroad, Ballinacourty and district, representatives were present from Waterford City, Kilmacthomas, Kilmacomas, Dungarvan and Abbeyside, as well as a group of visitors from Ardkeen Hospital. "Socials of this type are good for people," stated Rev. Fr. Walsh, who welcomed the guests. "They bring people together in a pleasant atmosphere to spend a few enjoyable hours free from the hum-drum affairs of everyday life and in that way they provide a safety-valve."

"OUT OF THE RED"

He referred to the work done on their parish hall and its growth and progress during the past year, and paid glowing tributes to the work of the members of the committee.

Amid loud applause, Fr. Walsh stated: "We have collected for our hall, over the past two and a half years a sum of over £3,000, and we expect to be out of the red by the end of this year." Great credit was due in this respect to the members of the Committee of the hall, their attention to the smooth running of the building, as well as for their efforts in finding the necessary finances to keep things going.

The non-stop draw was undoubtedly their principal source of revenue and he would like to pay a special tribute to the promoters for their loyalty and perseverance in the thankless task which was theirs—that of collecting the money.

NO STRAIN ON THE CONSCIENCE

Referring to the fact that in the past month or so, there had been a number of similar parish halls opened in various parts of the country by the Bishops of the various dioceses in which the halls were situated, Fr. Walsh said that on one of these occasions the officiating Bishop had advised the people to attend at, and make full use of their halls. Urging them to patronise these halls this Bishop had said that the parish halls were designed for a type of public amusement and enjoyment which would not wound the conscience. Much of the entertainment afforded at commercial halls was not always in keeping with moral principles.

KEEPING THE RULES

They had, said Fr. Walsh, drawn up a set of rules for the guidance of those patronising the Ballinroad Parish Hall. The rules were posted up on the wall inside the hall, and those rules had been made for all to obey. There was a preface to these Rules, which was taken from an address given by the late Pope "Pius XI": "In rule there is order. In order there is peace, and in peace there is God." They wanted, in Ballinroad hall, to have order, peace and God.

THE FOOTBALL CLUB

They had with them that night, continued Fr. Walsh, as joint organisers of this splendid Social, the members of the Ballinacourty Football Club. He recalled that when he first came to the parish that his first meetings with the people came through his contact with the members of Ballinacourty Football Club, that club had had its ups and downs too, just as they had with the hall, but he would advise the members of the club to retain their identity as a club and not allow themselves to be swamped from outside.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

The splendid men with which they were served that night, said Fr. Walsh, had been prepared and served under the guidance of Mrs. Richie Morrissey and Mrs. Ellen Foley, with the help of their able team of assistants. These two ladies were active members of the parish hall committee and have done splendid work for the parish. He would like to compliment all those who had taken such pains to ensure that the meal which they had just enjoyed would be nothing short of first-class, and he paid tribute to the enthusiasm and endurance of those who gave long hours to the preparation, and, it should not be forgotten, would have to spend a long time on the inevitable clearing-up following the function. (Fr. Walsh paid tribute to the individual members of the hard-working hall committee; to Jimmy Power, their able Chairman; to Tom Morrissey, the capable secretary, who is brother of the site-donor Gerald Morrissey; to Dick Doherty who was a man of few words but was a man of action; to Jim Morrissey, who was not merely a man of action, but a man of taste also; to it was the who had been responsible for the tasteful decorations in the hall for the social; to Declan Foley and his wife Eileen, who had been looking after the financial side of things, not only had they put in a great deal of work, but had collected over £300 for the non-stop draw; and last, but by no means least, to Mrs. R. Morrissey.

CO-OPTED

They had recently co-opted three new members on their committee, said Fr. Walsh. There was Jack Carleton, who had always been active in the interests of the hall, his wife, Mrs. Carleton had attended to the catering for the supper tonight. The second man was a small but a very active and important one. He was Tom Hayes, who had been associated with them on the hall project from the very beginning. "Not a day has passed since the hall started," said Fr. Walsh, "but Tom came to visit the site, and he has put in a lot of hard work there." "Jimmy Coughlan made up the trio of co-opted members," Jimmy came along the first night wearing a collar and tie," continued Fr. Walsh, "but he found that here on the site of the parish hall that it could be approached with, and with all the hard work going on that he did not need them except for formal occasions, such as tonight's social." They felt that he would make a splendid member of their committee.

Among their valued helpers, stated Fr. Walsh, there was Mrs. Hallahan and her son Monnie, who had been of constant assistance to them. Very often

Late Mr. John Tobin SHANDON STREET, DUNGARVAN Kilmacthomas Notes

Numerous tributes have been paid to the memory of John Tobin, Shandon Street, Dungarvan, whose death occurred unexpectedly recently in Ardkeen General Hospital, but one that stands out is the appreciation written by an old Dungarvanite as follows: "He was one of the old school of Dungarvan, and he was connected with the commercial life of the town for many years indeed. We were great old friends. In the course of his work he was most courteous and a faithful servant of the Munster and Leinster Bank in Dungarvan. In passing, I should say he did quite a good deal to enhance the position of the 'old bank' in the town, a fact that many of us will recall today. "It is hard to see the old school passing out, and especially when we are not so far advanced in years. But when it does happen it is good to know that he was held in great esteem and ploughed his way through the path of life in the 'Old Boro' with great courtesy and dignity."

The late Mr. Tobin was widely known and held the respect of all, a fact which was clearly in evidence when his remains were brought to St. Mary's Parish Church from Waterford. People in all walks of life paid an impressive tribute to his memory. He went through life the friend of everyone who knew him; whenever he could help someone, he did so and that was often every day. He enjoyed the simple joys of life and brought happiness to many with his ever cheerful outlook and there are many of us today who will miss him in the Old Boro where he had been such a familiar figure.

Not a Paid Holiday The Minister for Lands has decided not to grant St. Stephen's Day as a paid holiday to forestry workers this year. Pensioners' Hopes Dashed says Deputy Speaking in the Dail on the Second Stage of the Pensions (Increase) Bill, which provides for the payment of increases in civil pensions payable from the Exchequer, or other public funds, Alderman Thomas Kyne, T.D., said that the Bill did not measure up adequately to the plight of many pensioners who had served the State. High hopes had been dashed when the terms of the Bill became known. Replies to a questionnaire sent to pensioners had shown that some would receive only 6d. a month and others only 3d. per month increase. In reply, the Minister stated that if there were people who would get only 6d. or 3d. a month increase, it was because, until now, they had been in a better position than colleagues who retired at the same time, from equivalent positions.

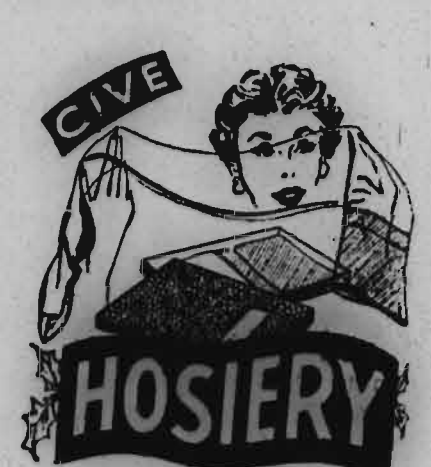

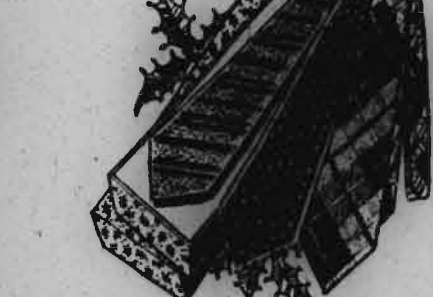

On the evening of 8th December the remains of the late John Ryan of Treary Park were brought home to Carrick-on-Suir from England and the occasion was marked by one of the largest displays of sympathy that has been witnessed here for some time. The late John Ryan was only 22 years of age and he died as a result of burns inflicted by acid in an English factory where he was employed. To his bereaved parents and relatives were tendered deepest sympathy. R.I.P.
CHRISTMAS HAMPER
The Ballyneale Hamper tournament, which was finished off on last Friday night, was a great success. The first place was won by George Power of Figlash and Paddy Murphy of Lisadobber. Other prizes went to Martin Connolly of Figlash and Tom Cooney of the same address. This very popular event attracted players from all the districts around and some from a larger radius still.
LOCAL DANCE

CATTLE MART

Heifers at three year old made £60 to £70, while two-and-a-half year olds were sold at £55 to £65. The price for in-calf heifers varied from £60 to £72 and such calves went from £20 to £30.
BEEF
The best harvest is nearly at an end in the Carrick area. This year, it started early and in favourable weather. It is learned that the sugar content of the beef is very high and the local farmers, in general, are very pleased with the result of the season. A meeting was held lately in the Carrick Vocational School to enable farmers to sign on for contracts for the coming season. A very large crowd attended and the surrounding Kilkenny and Waterford regions were all well represented.
GAR PARKING
In common with other towns Carrick has its own parking problems and these are no nearer to a solution now than before—quite the reverse. The Main Street and New Street are the most congested areas in this respect and when it is realised that these are the principal trading streets of the town and are approached by very narrow thoroughfares, it will be seen that the solution of Carrick's parking problems will not be an easy matter. Already an attempt to limit parking in New Street to one side has not been a success but eventually something will have to be done.
