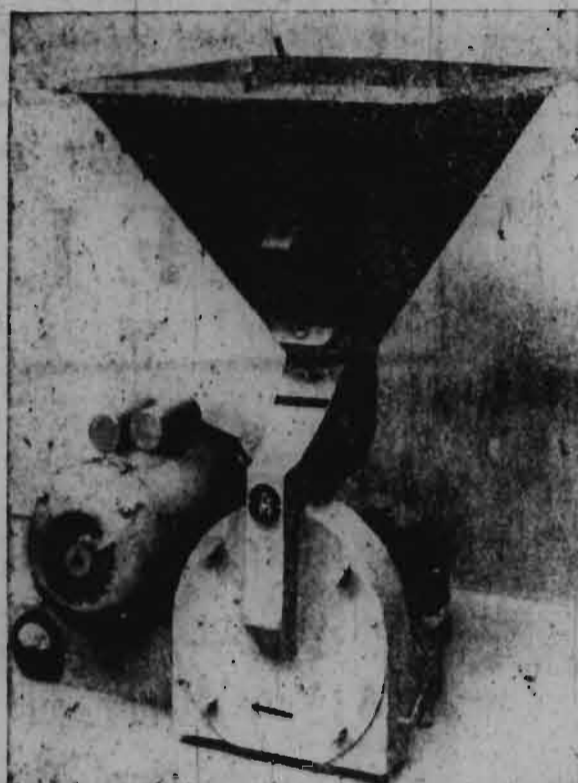

#### SUNDAY'S JUNIOR FOOTBALL FINAL

This final, which was due to be played on December 11th, completes the 1960 championship programme, and the respective rivals should serve up an encounter worthy of the occasion.

Had the game been played on the appointed Sunday then I would have undoubtedly given my vote to the Western champions. But the intervening weeks cannot have enhanced their prospects and the final now bears a very open appearance.

For this decider both teams will field at full-strength. Of the two Ardmore have had by far the more impressive passage to the final. All through the West their precision-like football has pulverised practically every opposition, and not even the defending champions Valley Rovers could extend the Seaside's in the Western final.

Newtown, on the other hand, can be termed a competent, if not brilliant side. In all their championship games to-date they have done just enough to succeed. Since beating Ballyduff in the Eastern final they have been constantly training and are eagerly awaiting Sunday's clash determined, and at the same time confident of upsetting the odds.

Tommy Power and Pat Hartly have proved an hitherto unbeatable mid-field partnership, and have laid the foundations for several of Ardmore's victories.

The Ardmore attack is a prolific scoring unit. Half-forwards Mooney Hallahan and brother Vin can run riot if given any scope, whilst the inside trio of Jim Cullen, J. J. Carlton and Tommy Hallahan will likewise turn the remotest chances into match-winning scores.

And so these are the men whom the entire village and parish of Ardmore look to for victory on Sunday. The opposition is tough and will not be easily overcome, but for all that, I row in with those who fancy the Western champions, and give them the vote to overcome the Newtowners and take their first-ever county title.

# IT'S COLLIGAN'S TITLE

## Ballyduff Mastered in Replay

COLLIGAN ROCKIES 4-3 BALLYDUFF 2-6

**IN A TOUGH, UNCOMPROMISING AND AT TIMES VIBRATING STRUGGLE COLLIGAN ROCKIES MADE HURLING HISTORY WHEN THEY CAPTURED THEIR FIRST-EVER JUNIOR HURLING TITLE AT THE FRAHER FIELD, DUNGARVAN, ON SUNDAY LAST AT THE EXPENSE OF A GALLANT BUT LUCKLESS BALLYDUFF SIDE BY 4-3 TO 2-6.**

And so yet another new name is enlisted on that privileged roll of honour. But behind this result lies a tale of controversy and discussion that should prove food for thought for all amongst the approximate attendance of 1,500 Gate £112 for quite some time to come.

Picture the scene! Ballyduff agais inspired by that hurler supreme, Tom Cheasty, were leading the obviously disrupted Colligan side by a seemingly commanding six points with 15 minutes to go. The Rockies, despite their now pronounced territorial advantage could make little or no headway against the dour and hard-tackling Easterners.

**DISPUTED GOAL**

And then it happened. From a Pat Tobin free, Paddy Walsh doubled on the ball but to the obvious disgust of Rockies supporters, went flashing outside the post... or so we thought.

The umpire in question signalled wide but his opposite colleague waved the green flag. Controversy arose in the Ballyduff goalmouth as both sides bitterly disputed the case but referee Billy McGrath, after consultation, awarded a goal.

This decision had a startling effect on the game. Ballyduff, hitherto impregnable resistance weakened and with the Rockies attacks gaining in momentum with the passage of time, the Easterners eventually scored their comeback. Paddy Tobin made matters all square seven minutes from time when his crashing drive left goalkeeper Whelan helpless in the Ballyduff goal.

At this stage there was only one team in it. Colligan. They beset the Ballyduff goal in quest of the match-winning score. Then within three minutes to go the inevitable happened. A high centre by Tom Byrnes was fumbled by defenders Larkin and Faulkner. From the mix-up Jim Flynn gained possession and carved an ever-lasting niche for himself in Colligan hurling fame when he buried the match-winning score in brilliant fashion.

**LAST EFFORT**

Ballyduff were down but as yet not out. In the dying seconds they retaliated in typical fashion. Tom Cheasty's goal possession in his own half and began one of his bewildering runs with ever-increasing rapidity. From 70 yards out his drive came dropping into the Colligan goalmouth. But a shrill blast from referee McGrath's whistle signalled the end of the game and simultaneously sounded the death-knell of the championship hopes of Cheasty and Ballyduff.

But back to that controversial 15th minute of the second half. From the free, the ball seemed to have gone wide, but this vantage point was not the best.

But Colligan's contention that the ball went through the net certainly adds fuel to the fire. Having inspected the net after the game, I find it difficult to visualise such happening as the net seemed in good condition and the Ballyduff defenders were adamant in their views that the ball had gone wide.

Yes, all this controversy cannot detract from Colligan's glorious achievement. They encountered a vastly improved opposition from the drawn game and yet managed to prevail. On the general run of play they had, slightly the better of the exchanges and are certainly worthy junior hurling champions of the county.

**GOOD QUALITY HURLING**

Without ever attaining a classical status the hurling was nevertheless of a comparatively good quality in view of the prevailing conditions. Indeed such was the treacherous condition of the pitch that both sides can feel justifiably proud of their displays.

Colligan's victory foundations were well and truly laid at mid-field where despite the brilliance of Cheasty the winners won almost an equal share of the play. That in itself was sufficient for the Rockies. That Ballyduff failed to monopolise this sector to the expected degree was due entirely to the faultless display of Tom Byrnes. Rarely if ever has the Modeligo man performed so splendidly in the black and amber jersey

to the attack, made for an immediate improvement. But still the scores just failed to come. Gerry Quinlan fuffed a great chance in the 7th minute and Mickey Walsh, from a 70 and Tom Byrne, both had wides. Then came that ill-fated incident for Ballyduff when Paddy Walsh's shot was registered as a goal. Although officially he took the lead for the first time in the hour a minute later. A perfectly placed free by Cheasty completely mesmerised the Rockies defence and Mick Power was on hand to crash the ball to the net. In the 29th minute Cheasty was fouled going through and he himself pointed the resultant free. Seconds later when again entering goalwards he was unceremoniously 'downed' and duly obliged with a point from the free to leave his side leading by 1-5 to 1-1 at the interval.

The Rockies re-opened in splendid fashion and now aided by the breeze set about their task of reducing that four point deficit. After only a minute Dick Tobin had a point from a 60 yards.

But Ballyduff surged upfield from the puck-out and Pat Power went right through the Colligan rearward for one of the best goals of the game. Twice in quick succession Cheasty was narrowly wide with efforts that deserved a better fate.

Colligan now trailing by 2-5 to 1-2 made their great effort, switches that sent Jim Flynn to corner forward and Pat Tobin from the half-back line in-

to the attack, made for an immediate improvement. But still the scores just failed to come. As already stated, Tom Byrnes took the major honour for the Rockies at mid-field, but in Paddy Kirwan he had an

able partner whose contribution cannot be overlooked. He was easily their outstanding attacker and was a constant source of worry to Tom Nolan. Jim Flynn was of course the idol of all Rockies supporters on Sunday evening. Apart from the fact that he scored the all-important winning goal, his all-round performance was a good one. Of the remainder Paddy 'Lackentigra' Walsh was best but he will never understand why he was taken out of the game in the second half.

Defeat must have been a bitter disappointment to Ballyduff, but to have victory snatched from their grasp in such bewildering fashion, must have added salt to the wound. But the Eastern champions need not have any great qualms at defeat. They gave a splendid performance and had improved the proverbial ton since the drawn game.

**CHEASTY WAS AGAIN MAN OF THE MATCH**

Their outstanding player was again the incomparable Tom Cheasty. Admittedly he never dominated the game to the same extent as when the sides met last. Yet who can deny him the right to the man of the match award. He instigated practically every Ballyduff attack, and besides fetching five points himself, was also directly responsible for his side's other 2-1.

Goalkeeper Noel Whelan had a very good game and deflected several first-class saves during the hour. In defence Willie Power, Noel Larkin and Mick Oates in particular were outstanding. Mick Power had a good opening half at mid-field but faded on the resumption. Greatest danger to Colligan's defence was Pat Power who had a personal tally of 1-1, his goal being one of the highlights of the game. John O'Donnell was the pick of the remainder and fared well against the Rockies captain Mickey Walsh.

And so another junior campaign has ended. The Rockies unquestionably were worthy champions, and their efforts over the years have been justly rewarded. Ballyduff, on the other hand, can look to 1961 with justifiable confidence, and who knows, but Cheasty and Company may be joining the Rockies in senior fare in the not too distant future.
