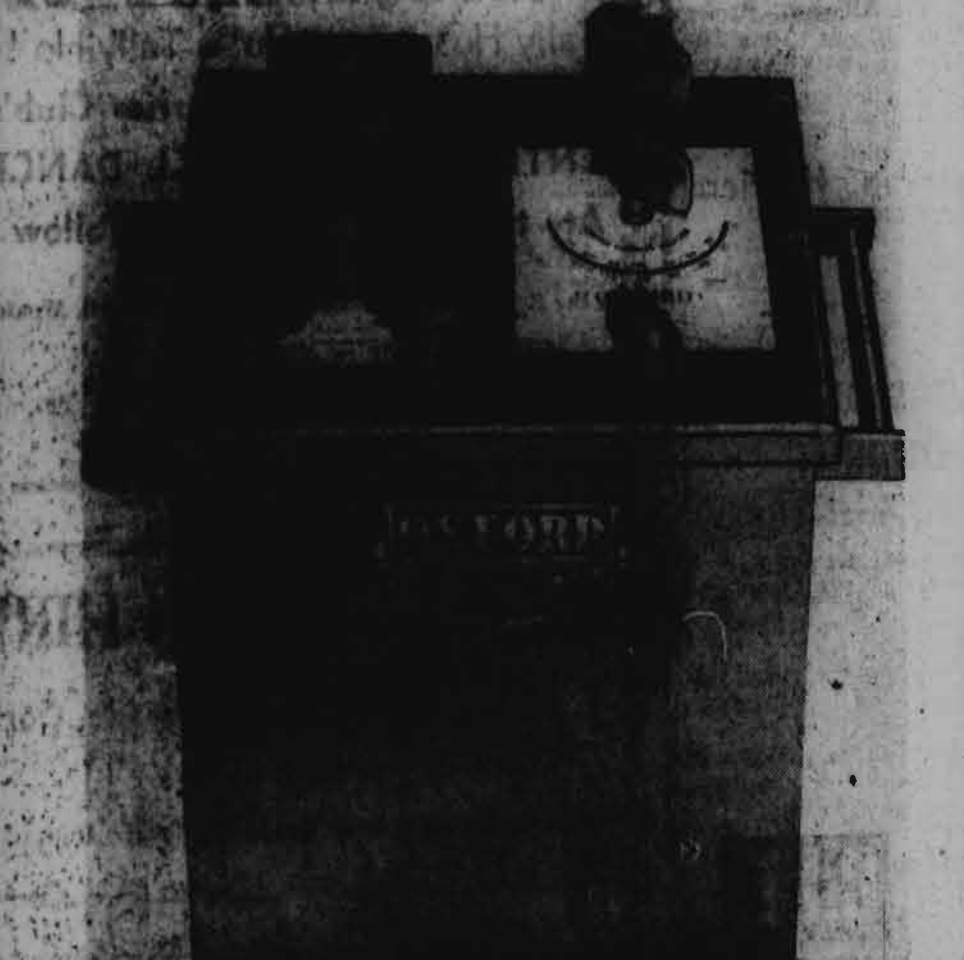

E.S.B. GIANT RURAL NETWORK

250,000 consumers are now connected to the E.S.B.'s rural network. 72% of the 791 areas in the country are completed, and in them 75% of the householders have taken electricity supply.

By March 1962 every parish in the country will have supply. And the cost — £31,000,000. These facts were given by Mr. P. J. Dowling, Engineer-in-Charge of rural electrification when he addressed the Dublin Rotary Club.

Describing what the advent of electricity supply has meant to the farmer and his wife, Mr. Dowling said: "You will appreciate it all the more when I tell you that in a survey carried out a few years ago in 3 different parts of the country, open hearths were used for cooking in half the number of houses and there was no water on tap in 80%. In half the cases the water had to be drawn more than 100 yards."

How has the supply been used? In a good farming area, about 8 years after supply being extended, the following figures give the number of appliances as a percentage of the number of consumers:

Iron, 77%; Radio, 86%; Fire, 20%; Vacuum Cleaner, 22%; Pump for water supply, 27%; Kettle, 48%; Cooker, 31%; Washing Machine, 15%; Refrigerator, 10%; Water Heater, 15%.

"In the farmyard also," said Mr. Dowling, "the use of electricity is expanding. It is common now to find electric grain driers, grain grinders and elevators with the man feeding his own grain; milking machines and water heaters for the dairy farmer; Infra red lamps for poultry houses; doors for the poultry and pig keeper in addition to many specialised uses. The artificial barn drying of hay to preserve the protein is one of the newer uses and one which could have considerable use here where hay is such an important crop. We intend having a number of installations ready for action before next season."

Mr. Dowling pointed out that the automatic pressure storage water pump is a most important appliance. Nearly half the country houses have a water source within 100 yards of the house and most of these are shallow wells. The electric pumping set costing about £40 can give the farmer water under pressure automatically and the total cost of the pump installed with a sink in the kitchen can be as low as £70. Government and Local Authority Grants can bring his actual out of pocket payments between £25 and £25 or even lower if he is prepared to do some of the work himself.

The benefits of rural electrification, continued Mr. Dowling, are not confined to the home and farm. The Churches are usually lighted inside and out. Some are heated electrically and power is available for a public address system or an organ. The parish hall with light, heat and power takes on new life. Technical classes held there are facilitated tremendously and a wide range of modern equipment can be demonstrated and explained and country people kept abreast of a cinema projector is frequently installed and film shows provide funds for many parochial projects. Plays and concerts can be properly staged and rehearsed—the bright lights are no longer confined to the towns.

N.F.A. NEWS

IRELAND LAGS BEHIND
Time and again, the N.F.A. has stressed the need for a more deliberate and intelligent approach to the possibilities of developing foreign markets.

On the 8th January this year an official German trade delegation left for a four week visit to Kenya on behalf of the Federal Government and with the approval of the British Government.

We have valuable contacts in Kenya and indeed in most other countries and therefore it is a double pity that note is not done to exploit the obvious marketing possibilities that exist.

Modern transport has made the world a rather small place in a sense. Technical knowledge is growing apace and there are few difficulties that could be regarded as unmountable.

Preliminary investigations must be made. Marketing surveys must be carried out. The tragedy is that whereas most other countries have been doing just these things for many years past, with obvious advantages to themselves, we in Ireland continue to lag behind.

But there is not the same welcome for those who come to buy our land. The reasons for this are many. Because of our history, we slip easily out of our grasp.

WILLIAM BUTLER YEATS AND P. H. PEARSE

"TWO FRIENDLY ENEMIES"

(Continued from last week)
Yeats' life was a perpetual intellectual flirtation with a shadowy world of cloud and fancy. Pearse's that of a man of continuous growth, the best ways of overcoming them. From these schools we expect people to come and read us into the huge foreign markets which we ought to be tapping, even now.

Yeats' early ideas of what Irish Literary drama should be, must be viewed in a context of the Irish Revival and the mysticism. To him Edward Martyn's hankering after the strabness of modern plays based on Irish social themes was a gash.

In November 1903 and during the following few months Yeats was on a lecturing tour in America. He strode across the platforms in dark coat and top hat, his eloquence skilfully skirting the borders of contemporary Irish politics, his mists trailing behind him in clouds of glory from club to club, from girls' convicts to their aseptic atmosphere to the crude catastrophe of Mrs. Pullet's parish.

He had dreamed a dream of an "Irish Literary Revival" in "English" and the cold breath of the Gaelic League had dissolved the vision into its irreconcilable opposites. Or, at least Pearse interpreted the situation when he wrote in "An Claidheamh Soluis":

"The Irish Literary Theatre"
Dear Sir,
Ireland is a land of contradictions and of shams, and of Irish contradictions and shams Dublin is assuredly the hotbed. We have in the capital of Ireland "Irish" national newspapers whose only claim to nationality is that they run down—whilst they initiate—everything English; we have "Irish" national poets, who in heart and soul are as un-Irish as Professor Mahaffy; we have a "national" literary society, which is an anti-national, without being so outspoken as Trinity College. Apparently, the only thing necessary to make a man or an institution Irish is a little dab of green displayed now and again to relieve the monotony, a little eloquent twaddle about the "Children of the Gael," or a little meaningless vapouring about some unknown quantity termed "Gaelic glamour." Take away the dab of green, strip off the "leafy luxury" of words, and what have you? The man or the institution is English as Lord Salisbury.

SURPRISES ON RAILWAY CUP SIDE

The announcement of Munster's Railway Cup hurling side on Saturday night certainly put tongues wagging in no uncertain fashion. Whilst the majority of the "certainties" were again chosen, the omission of such stalwarts as John Doyle and Tom Cheasty is difficult to understand.

The side shows numerous changes, personnel and positional from last year's successful side. Gone are Austin Flynn, John Doyle, Philly Grimes, Tom Cheasty and Paddy Barry. They are replaced by Mick Maher, Martin O'Morrissey (centre-back last year) Tony Wall, Terry Kelly, Theo English and Liam Devaney.

The goal-keeping and full-back berths contained no surprises. Mick Cashman was an automatic choice whilst Jimmy Brohan and John Barron were both rightly retained. The recall of Mick Maher was also expected as the Holycross man had an outstanding year.

Only surprise in the half-back line—and what a surprise is the selection of Martin O'Morrissey in preference to John Doyle. Barely in a brilliant career extending over a decade or more has the Tipp man been in such irreplaceable form. Morrissey, on the other hand had a comparatively quiet year during 1960 achieving little or nothing of note. Doyle is listed as first sub, but it is quite on the cards that he will command a place on the side for the decision on St. Patrick's day against probable opponents—Leinster.

At mid-field Theo English and Seamus Power form what looks like a first-class partnership. The omission of Tom Cheasty from the attack is perhaps the greatest surprise of all. In my opinion, not alone is he the best centre-forward in the province but is the leading "40" man in the country. His replacement Terry Kelly is undoubtedly a first-class hurler but can hardly be compared favourably with Cheasty.

Jimmy Doyle is again at right half-forward but I would have preferred Liam Devaney, now at top of the left, to Frankie Walsh.

The incomparable "Ringsy" leads the attack and this ageless "Glen" man has now twenty years of inter-provincial hurling behind him. Jimmy Smith, Clare's only representative retains his right corner berth and Lia Devaney completes the side.

The team meets Ulster at a Northern venue in the semi-final and should have a trouble-free passage to a St. Patrick's Day final at Croke Park.

The football selectors have decided to hold a trial game between Kerry and the Rest of Munster before they set down to pick the side to play Connaught. Two Waterford men are chosen on the Rest. Killrossney's Mick Pender and Tom Power of Ardmore. A good display in this trial could easily ensure Pender of a place on the Provincial side as there seems to be a scarcity of good full backs in the Province.

There was a contest for all positions except Chairman, and here the popular Nire man Mr. Jamie Moloney N.T. was returned unopposed.

Biggest surprise of the Convention was the election of Shamie O'Brien to the secretaryship by the huge majority of 98 votes to 20. The issue between the Abbeyside man and Dec Sullivan was expected to be a very close affair and few could have anticipated such a sweeping victory for the outgoing Secretary. The Abbeyside candidate was a slight favourite to succeed but his victory margin was the surprise of the evening.

LAST SUNDAY'S WESTERN CONVENTION Outgoing Officers Again Returned

SUNDAY LAST WAS CONVENTION DAY FOR THE GAELS OF WEST WATERFORD AND 118 DELEGATES REPRESENTING EVERY CLUB IN THE DIVISION MET AT THE HALF-WAY HALL, BALLINAMULT, TO REVIEW A VERY SUCCESSFUL YEAR.

All the Outgoing Officers were again re-elected, the Chairman, Mr. Jamie Moloney being returned unopposed. Of the 14 motions listed for discussion, 8 were passed, 2 defeated, 1 withdrawn and 3 were referred back to the Co. Convention.

After Mr. Moloney (outgoing) had declared himself re-elected, the voting for the remaining positions began. Of the six nominations received for the Vice-Chairmanship only two stood—Nicholas McGrath (outgoing) and Moss Pollard. Mr. McGrath was elected by 92 votes to 25, with 1 vote spoiled.

John Fraher withdrew his nomination for the Treasurer-ship, leaving it a two-man race between Tom Walsh (outgoing) and Paddy Foley (Ardmore). But as with the Vice-Chairmanship the man in possession had a sweeping victory by 93 votes to 30. Mr. Walsh thanked the clubs and delegates who had voted for him and nominated him, and also those who voted for Mr. Foley.

Then came the eagerly-awaited contest for the right to act as the Board's Secretary for 1961. The rivals were the outgoing man Seamus O'Brien and Declan O'Sullivan, himself a former Secretary.

But the expected close struggle never materialised and Mr. O'Brien was returned for the coming year by an overwhelming majority of 78-98 votes to 20.

Addressing the Convention Mr. O'Brien thanked the delegates for electing him again. They had shown great confidence in him and he would do his best for the Board during the coming year.

The defeated candidate, Mr. O'Sullivan, congratulated Mr. O'Brien on his success and said that although defeated, the game would still be first and over-all with him.

The election of three representatives to the Co. Board was in marked contrast to the others and it was only after a stirring contest that Donal Whelan, Mickey Tobin and John McKenna were elected. Thirteen candidates in all sought the three positions. They were John Coffey, J. Cullen, M. Culloo, M. Flynn, J. Fraher, J. Hogan, P. Hurley, D. Lee, P. Kenneally, J. McKenna, M. Tobin, S. Tobin, D. Whelan. The total poll was 120, and the quota, 31.

The following are the counts in detail:— 1st Count: J. McKenna (outgoing), 22; M. Tobin (outgoing) 18; Sean Tobin, 15; T. Coffey, 14; D. Whelan, 11; J. Fraher (outgoing), 9; M. Flynn, 8; J. Cullen, 7; M. Culloo, 6; P. Kenneally, 6; D. Lee, 6; J. Hogan, 6; P. Hurley, 0.

2nd Count: Lee was eliminated and his votes were distributed as follows: Coffey +4 (18); and Whelan +2 (13). 3rd Count: Culloo eliminated and his votes went to Cullen +1 (8), and Whelan 5 (18). 4th Count: Kenneally eliminated and his six votes were distributed to Cullen 1 (9); McKenna 2 (25); Whelan 2 (20). 5th Count: Flynn eliminated and seven of his 8 votes went to Coffey, bringing him to 25, and 1 was non-transferable. 6th Count: Cullen eliminated and his 9 votes went to McKenna.

THE MOTIONS The first motion on the agenda, moved by St. Declan's Ardmore, that junior championships be completed in the West before the first Sunday in October next year, was passed unanimously.

The first of Abbeyside's three motions, That regraded players in both codes be not entitled to play in the Junior Championship until such time as the club's senior team has played in the first round of the championships, was ruled out of order by the Chairman, who also thought it was a matter for the County Convention.

Speaking for the motion, Mr. Donal Whelan said that it was for the betterment of all junior clubs. Many clubs had to face teams with players who were just regraded from senior. These teams, he said, often knocked out good junior teams. Opposing the motion, Mr. N. McGrath said: "This motion is not in order. It would require to ask the Convention to delete the existing bye-laws. There are five senior clubs in the division and if they are to field junior teams they'll have to get players regraded. If these clubs agreed to form a special group of their own and played each other then the problem would be solved. At the draws and fixtures meeting we could ask to have this group formed. But as it stands now, the motion is out of order."

Mr. N. McGrath said, every year senior clubs put in players for regrading and very few junior clubs objected. Therefore if junior clubs had a crib it was their own fault. Mr. N. McGrath said that senior clubs had players regraded for the purpose of fielding a junior team.

Mr. D. Whelan said Mr. McGrath's proposal that a special group for club with senior teams be formed was grand in theory, but what guarantee had they that the senior clubs would participate in such a group?

Mr. Moloney: In reality it's a motion for the County Convention. As it stands however it is out of order.

MINOR CHAMPIONSHIPS ON KNOCKOUT SYSTEM The Convention decided by an overwhelming majority to revert back to the knock-out system for the minor hurling and football championships. The motion was moved by Abbeyside, whose speaker Mr. T. Manfield said that the championship was the championship and should be played on the knock-out system. Last year, he stated, that players would get more games by having the league system in force. In the 1960 championships 11 teams competed minor hurling and there were only 11 games played. In minor football 14 teams competed, but only 16 games were played. Where asked Mr. Manfield, did the extra games come in? Mr. Liam Power said that teams were only making a mock of the present system. When teams were beaten early on they failed to fulfil their remaining engagements in wholesale walk-overs were given.

The motion was then put to the meeting and carried by 95 votes to 23. Mr. Moloney (Chairman): "When Cathal Brugha failed to get expenses they should have notified the board. If anything like this happens again I hope the board will be informed." Mr. Fitzgerald: We didn't want any club suspended. All we wanted was our rights. Mr. K. Murphy (Stradbally): There was a new change of officers in our club that year and I as Secretary knew nothing of it. Mr. Fitzgerald: Didn't you say to me that you would pay the expenses after a medal medal Tournament had been played. Mr. P. Whelan, Dungarvan is a witness to that. Mr. N. McGrath: I suggest any club is not entitled to expenses. I imagine the expenses referred to in the Rule Book concern the Board only. Mr. D. Whelan: It doesn't state that specifically in the rule book. Mr. McGrath: If Cathal Brugha had played the game and won it they wouldn't have got expenses. Mr. Fitzgerald: That's not the rule. It's the principle of the thing. This kind of thing is only encouraging clubs to give walk-overs without notice. Mr. J. Moloney (Chairman): The rule is there and Mr. Fitzgerald has cited it. Ye are all aware of the penalty. Personally I don't agree with the opinions of my vice-chairman (N. McGrath), and I hope this will serve as a warning to all for this year. The Convention then agreed to have the Rule strictly enforced.
