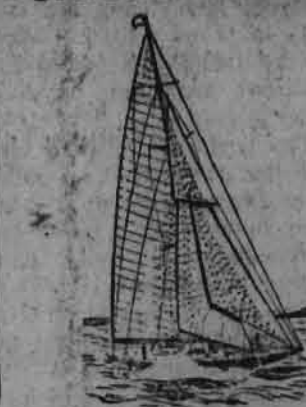
Runners-up in the teams event were Fethard with 48 marks and in the third place was Kinsalebeg with 45 marks.

FOOT CARE STARTS IN CHILDHOOD

It's just as important to wear divided into two groups of 500 the right shoes as the right at each unit. The first group clothes and a change of shoes will wear supervised footwear, and the second group will be left to choose their own.

Do you take little Jimmy or Susan along to a shoe shop that will make sure their shoes fit comfortably and well, with ample room for their toes to grow, without allowing the foot to be completely unsupported? Or do you just go in when you're passing and buy another pair of shoes the same size as those you bought three months before? Because one of the major causes of foot defects is that many parents forget that a child's foot can alter in a very short space of time. What fitted a month ago could, very easily, be too tight today.

Do you always make sure the shoes have a leather sole? Because that will help the shoe to retain its shape, and continue to support your child's foot at the most important stage of its development; as well as make sure that it can 'breathe' through the natural fibres. Children rush about and can become very hot and that leather sole can ensure that the moisture which will not retain the moisture which may result.

Now a research unit has been set up by the Ministry of Health at Guy's Hospital, London, to investigate foot conditions in 1,000 schoolchildren. A similar unit will operate at the Salford Royal Hospital in Manchester. In co-operation with school medical boards the children's feet will be kept under medical survey throughout their school life. The children concerned will be from a life-time of foot ill.

This time the emphasis was on Meat Dishes, and so successful did this second course prove that it was repeated a second year.

EGGS AND CHEESE

In the 1956/57 session, eggs came into prominence as the subject for that year's demonstration course, and detailed instruction and demonstrations were given in the selection, preservation and cooking, including their use in Invalid Cookery. In charge were Instructors Miss E. Beresford and Miss Bernice Spratt (now Mrs. D. Twomey, Clonkeragh, Cappagh).

THE WELL-KNOWN MITCHELLS

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CORK DEATEN IN THRILL-CONSUMING HOUR

MAGNIFICENT . . . pulsating . . . superlative and every adjective in the dictionary could hardly do justice to last Sunday's epic National Hurling League tie between Waterford and Cork at the Athletic Grounds, Cork. From the moment referee T. O'Sullivan set the game in motion, the 17,000 odd attendance was treated to an almost continuous hour of hurling thrills and at the end of the classic the Decies men deservedly prevailed by 4-9

to 4-6. And so after a lapse of twelve months Waterford are again in the National League decider. That they are deserving of this honour is beyond all argument. Yet, it was only after an hour of brilliant hurling that enthralled the huge attendance that they disposed of a Cork side who emerged from the tie pointless but with reputation enhanced one hundred fold.

In my preview of this game I said it could prove to be one of the classics of the year. And that in brief is exactly what it turned out to be. The exchanges were tough, with neither asking for or giving any quarter. Yet, not once did the game really boil over and the exemplary sportsmanship which prevailed throughout shed lustre on both sides. During that suspense-packed hour, the tension was electric with the fortunes of each fluctuating like the tri-colour in the breeze.

QUALIFICATIONS OF A CHAMPIONSHIP TIE

Yes, this League tie had all the qualifications of a championship. Never have I witnessed a League game in which both sides were so dedicated to their task. Every ball was contested as if the very lives of the players depended on the outcome. Is it any wonder then that we witnessed a magnificent hour of hurling? To master Cork in their own 'back-yard' is a notable achievement at any time, but to concede an early six points and still triumph is something which countless can boast of. But Waterford, after a shaky opening, that saw them trailing by 1-3 to 0-0 after 10 minutes and 3-4 to 2-2 at the interval, gave a magnificent second-half display that not even the gallant Leeslary could match.

In victory, Waterford must have dispelled all lingering doubts as to their current potential. Since their resurgence last September they have gained in hurling status with every outing, and now even months prior to the commencement of the championship are fancied by many to regain the coveted McCarthy Cup.

CORK ARE GOOD

Some may offer the contention that this was not a good Cork team. Nothing could be further from the truth. On Sunday the Leeslary were brilliant and matched the Decies men in practically every phase of the game. In the end lack of fitness took its toll of them, but had they been on an even keel in this respect then the result would have been even closer. Yet all connected with the Cork side must be feeling more than pleased at their performance. On leaving the ground I could not but overhear a conversation between two obviously delighted Cork supporters. One remarked to the other: "Well, Joe, we'll be on the road to Dublin in September again." If this latest performance is any indication then these Corkmen are justified in being so optimistic.

VEGEL SWITCH

To the Decies selectors, too, this Decies side come to light. With a brand of hurling all too rarely seen nowadays they swarmed to the offensive and scored by score whittled down the lead, until a Battle Foley point balanced matters in the 22nd minute. Waterford were the undisputed masters now and when they raced into 4-7 to 4-3, less the issue seemed to have been decided.

PACKED WITH DRAMA

But those remaining minutes were packed with drama and excitement. Points were interchanged, but for all their effort Cork could not carry the day. In the dying seconds a Gallagher effort was brilliant, saved by a cool, calm and confident Ned Power, and so Cork's last chance had vanished.

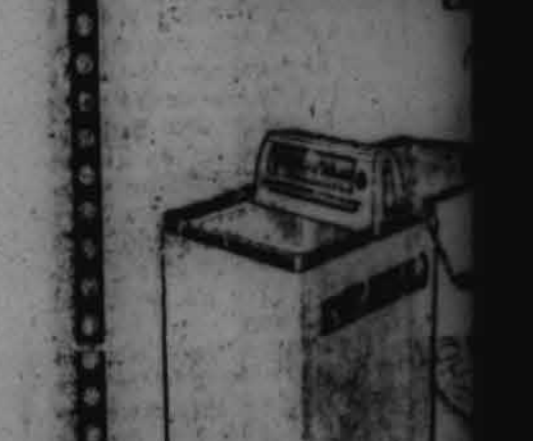
