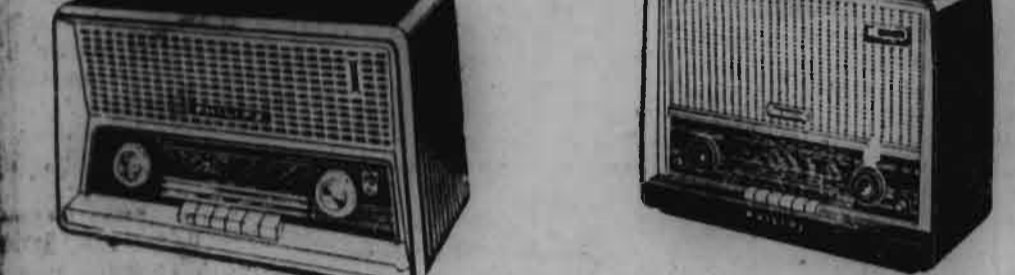

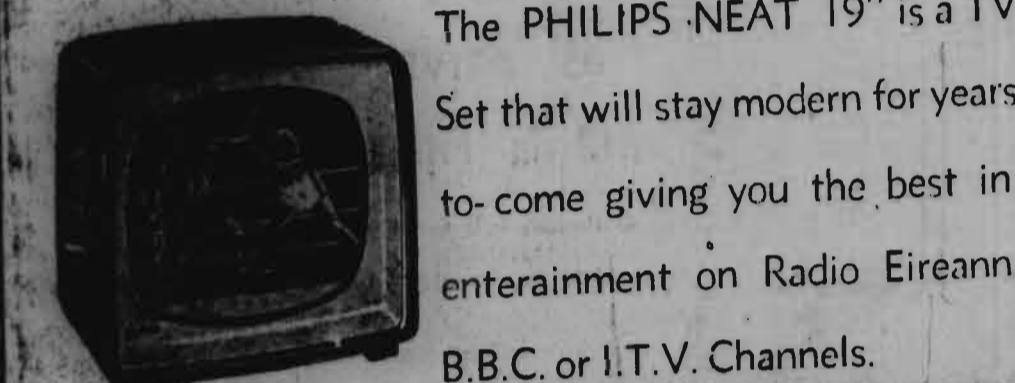

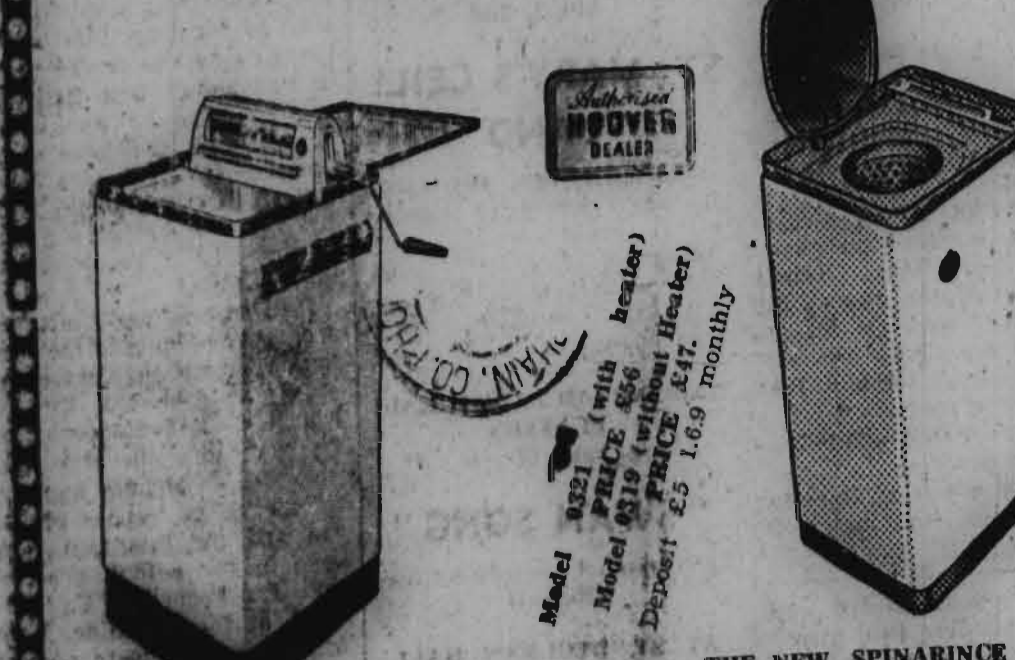

**Cork Should be Saddled with Bridge Cost says County Manager**

Members of Waterford Co. Council, together with officials of the Youghal to the bridge, Cork Co. Council, will meet officials of Cork Co. Council in Youghal to discuss the whole problems of the erection of the new Youghal Bridge at Ardallagh. This was decided at the recent meeting in Youghal when Mr. J. G. Dowling (Secretary) read a letter from Cork County Council.

The letter stated that while some difficulties were raised by the Contractors before the commencement of the work on the bridge, Cork Co. Council insisted on its rights under the legally binding contract which had been originally signed by the contractors, and as a result of this the work commenced in the normal manner and was presently proceeding satisfactorily.

Mr. Charles Curran (Chairman) said the amount of information in the letter was nil. He would repeat his allegations that the preliminary borings and survey on the bridge were not carried out properly by Cork County Council and would not close their eyes to this fact.

Colr. George Heskin asked why Cork Co. Council were hedging information. Colr. Curran said it wasn't the Council's members who were "hedging" but the officials.

Co. Manager, Mr. S. J. Meynahan, said they should meet officials of Cork Co. Council, and find out what the cost of extra borings carried out by the contractors and Cork Co. Council were vastly different and they (Cork Co. Council) should be saddled with the extra cost. "We," he said, "are not responsible for any mistakes made in the original borings."

Deputy W. Kenesally: "What evidence have we that there is any mistakes in the borings. The bridge would have been built 25 years ago only for all the goings-on between Cork and Waterford councils and the Youghal Urban Council. All Youghal is entitled to is the cost, nothing more."

Colr. Lannon: "And we'll pay the cost."

Chairman: "We're entitled to know the reasons."

Colr. J. Quirk: "Why won't they give us the necessary information?"

Dep. Kenesally: "We can't get it in the middle of a contract."

Mr. Meynahan said he was sure the members of Cork Co. Council were just as anxious to get the information as Waterford Co. Council.

Colr. D. F. Madden then proposed that the Deputation be sent to meet Cork Co. Council officials and members. Colr. G. Heskin seconded.

**PEOPLE WILL BECOME SLAVES FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS**

—SAYS COLR. LANNON

"In Dungarvan alone 400 people living in Council houses are finding it hard to pay their bills. If these increases in official salaries continue there will only be one class, and the ordinary people will become slaves for local Government officials," said Colr. Lannon when moving a motion at the meeting that no salary increases be given for 1961/62.

Continuing, Colr. Lannon said: "My information is that a new application for increases in official salaries is coming, and this could cost the county anything from 2d to 3d increase in the rate. The County cannot afford to pay these men any more. The rates are going sky high and no one seems to stop that. No one need feel any as they are already being well paid."

Dep. E. A. Ryan asked the Council to take no action. The motion, if passed, would deprive members of the right to examine a salary application whether it was just or not, each case should be examined on its merits and he proposed an amendment that no action be taken. Colr. D. F. Madden seconded.

Colr. Lannon: "Exams will be held for clerical posts in the Council soon, and these will be more people in town than for the Fishery. Boys here didn't get their rights in examinations before and inferior ones got the jobs."

Dep. Ryan said if Waterford tied itself with regard to increases and other counties gave increases then they would not get the best officials.

The Co. Manager said he had the power to do away with the Council's rights.

Colr. Lannon: "The rights I'm doing away with are to stop officials tapping members to support increases for themselves."

Colr. Lannon agreed to adjourn the motion to the next meeting on condition that a
