By: Roderic More O'Farrell Although many Owners race for sheer sport, and for the pleasure they find in the atmosphere and associations surrounding the Sport of Kings the amount of Prize Money that can be won is definitely an incentive.

The £20,000 offered by the Irish Sweeps Derby is a windfall for all Owners who like to win races which are not alone important in themselves, but also rank as milestones in the history of the Turf.

Moreover the Stakes of the Irish Sweeps Derby, when the exact amount of the Prize Money is finally known, may well make it the most valuable race ever run in the world. What Owner would not like to win a race of so much reward, both in money and prestige, quite apart from the sure prospects of the winning horse? But it could mean every-

thing to an Owner who had, for many years, spent large sums trying to win a big race only to be dogged by ill-luck. With racehorses, so many high hopes are so often dashed, so many swans turn out to be geese; there are the unforeseen mishaps in training—the disappointments are legion. In fact, success could mean the survival of a Stable which was about to be abandoned.

Admittedly, great skill and judgment are called for all along the line, breeding the animal, training and jockeyship, but in Racing there is always the element of luck. THE DAWN OF THE CLASSICS

THE GUINEAS

Newmarket, the home of the Guineas, first run in 1864, may truly be called the classic ground of racing. It is the professional man's course, and until comparatively recently, was devoid of the invariable trimmings of other great race courses. There was no grand stand, no crowd, no booth or side show and no fixed winning post, the distance to be run by any race being determined by the Judge's Chair being wheeled about from point to point on the course. Newmarket's celebrity was established by James I. Later, according to a persistent legend, horses which had been cast up on the coast of Galloway from the wreck of the Spanish Armada were brought to Newmarket where their swiftness was favourably noticed. After a decline in popularity Newmarket again blossomed in the time of Charles II since when it has never lost its place. In 1750 Newmarket was the birth place of the famous Jockey Club, which later was to infuse some law and order into the appallingly lax standards of that time. Many of its custom innovations are still with us; pardoning in the paddock, the number board with the names and numbers of the jockeys, and the banning of the use of drugs.

Gaelic Jottings

HURLERS TRAVEL TO FERRET FOR TOURNAMENT FINAL

With that enthralling league game between Waterford and Cork still fresh in the minds of all Gaelic followers, a huge exodus of spectators is expected to converge on Ferret on Sunday next for the 1960 replayed Churches tournament final between these same sides.

When these rival hurling monarchs met at the same venue last year in this tournament final it was only after a thrilling hour's hurling that the game ended in stalemate. A lot of water has flowed under the bridge, as it were in the interim, and that rivalry, strong as it was has now, become even more intense, but let us add even healthier.

That league game at the Athletic Grounds a few weeks ago has whetted the appetite of followers even more. A tournament final is usually only regarded as a training session for more important outings but Sunday's decider has a special significance for both sides, after suffering that League defeat are determined to reverse the result, whilst Waterford will be anxious to add yet another victory to their ever growing list.

On Sunday, Waterford will be without Frankie Walsh, injured in addition, Joe Condon, John Barron and Philly Grimes are being rested, so the Decies line-out is somewhat depleted.

Mick Kieley, Abbey's promising teenager takes Barron's place at left-half, whilst Freddie O'Brien replaces Joe Condon at half-back. Cappoquin's Mick Lacey is recalled at mid-field and Frankie Walsh is replaced by team-mate M. Dempsey in attack.

Cork are approaching this game in serious vein and will field their strongest possible side.

Waterford's team may be termed as somewhat experimental but if the newcomers come up to standard then it confidently predict another Waterford triumph.

MINOR CHAMPIONSHIPS COMMENCE ON SUNDAY

The Western minor championships commence on Sunday next with two games listed for Dungarvan and one for Cappoquin.

At the latter venue, divisional champions Dungarvan defend their football title against Lismore. Not for many years now has the Cathedral town produced a top-class minor side, but hopes are high that the present standard-bearers will capture a title that has not traced the Lismore side since for quite a long time.

Enthusiastic and determined as the Lismore boys may be, however, I honestly can't visualize them beating this Dungarvan set-up.

They will re-invent their attack defeat at the hands of the Nire in last year's semi-final, and will take no chances on Sunday.

On Sunday they will field without several of last year's side yet they boast of first class footballers in Mickey Sheehan, Jim Kelleher, Rodger White, Jim Kieley, P. J. Kilgus and Sean Fitzgerald.

Cappoquin, who will almost certainly enjoy a physical advantage—if one is to judge by their juvenile side of last year, also have the nucleus of a good team. Their big guns are undoubtedly Mick, Eddie

Fraser, Peter Aherne and Billy Meakill and this quartet will take a deal of subduing. The result of this is no game I wouldn't dare to forecast on outright. Both camps are supremely confident and suffice it is to say that a thrilling game should ensue.

At the other, Dungarvan venue—the Friary, Ardmore and Cathal Brugha meet in minor hurling. Despite the fact that Eddie Fitzgerald has been putting his side through their paces, they should not have them wanting in fitness. I cannot hold out much hope for them against the Bessiders.

CAHERBRACK READER DISAGREES WITH MY COMMENTS.

A letter from a Caherbrack (Ballinacorney) reader, totally disagreeing with my comments on the Railway Cup football final has reached this office. In last week's issue I condemned the decision of the selectors to take Tommy Power out of the game whilst Kerry's John Dowling and Gerry McMahon were having a fruitless time against Offaly-men McCormack and Hughes.

First my Caherbrack friend (a Kerry native I would say) accuses me of uttering unproven remarks against Dowling and McMahon. Now, now, friend, I'm surprised at you. Do you call it unproven to say both these Herrermen were utterly outclassed?
