IRISH SWEEPS DERBY, 1962

Behold! A Stallion Leads the Fashion

By CAPT. SPENCER FREEMAN, C.B.E. There's much more than the prize money for the owner of the winner of the £60,000 Irish Sweeps Derby next year, despite it being one of the richest races in the world. A new star in the constellations will appear. Those who are concerned with the winner of the Irish Sweeps Derby fall into three categories: (a) Those who breed to sell; (b) those who breed to race; (c) those who race but do not breed. Those who breed to sell aim at mating their mares with the most fashionable stallions—the fashion for stallions is related to their pedigrees, racing achievements, successful progeny or a combination of all. Out of the 40 services during the year the anxious breeder is eager to at least one. Money doesn't always do the trick. Usually only 20 or 25 mares are taken the first year and 40 each year afterwards. Immediately the animal passes the winning post the owner becomes one of the most sought-after persons in the world of bloodstock breeders. Within 24 hours he will be besieged by breeders seeking the services of the horse as soon as he goes to stud. After winning a race like the Irish Sweeps Derby the owner becomes conscious of his power and whereas previously he had not much chance of getting a nomination to a fashionable stallion, he will be a petitioner to negotiate from strength. Every sort of breeder will approach him—he will be well paid on the race course and in the club and importuned by post, telephone and telegram. He will be a friend of princes and courted by women of title and fame. He will require a full-time secretary, a bodyguard or a posse of private detectives and he would be well advised to hire an experienced diplomat to do the fobbing off and advert offending his friends. The stallion is fairly certain to be in the fashion for some time but the owner's sights will be raised beyond the first five years at stud after which he will be judged by the 7 years and 3 years old winners he has sired. Not all stallions, which enter the Stud as aristocrats like Nearco continue in that lofty eminence. Many after five years have fallen from grace, but on the contrary, some have begun as commoners and ascended to the p.p.e. If the owner retains the horse he will aim at heading the list of winning sires, the road to which is hilly, contested but is easier negotiated through matings with the best mares. Those combining an illustrious pedigree, high achievement on the race course and already the dam of a class winner. He will have access, by exchanging nominations, to practically any stallion in Great Britain, Ireland, America, France or elsewhere—realms

MEMORIAL TO FOUNDER OF FIRST IRISH COLLEGE

Speaking at the unveiling of a plaque at Bunmahon, on Sunday last, to Philip Barun, founder of Ireland's first Irish College, Michael Keane, C.B.E., president, Connradh na Gaeilge, said they were gathered at the historic spot where the first Irish college since the Battle of Kinsale was founded. Philip Barun founded that college without financial aid of any kind. The college was founded about 1830, when the people were oppressed and the Irish language ridiculed. English was spoken everywhere and the poets were beginning to arouse the people in the language of their English masters. It was in that time that Philip Barun decided to turn the tide.

THE DAWN OF THE CLASSICS

THE DERBY  
Epson, famous to-day for the Derby, was, in the 17th century, famous for its salts, and the fashionable world used to drink its waters. These waters were discovered by accident about 1618 when cattle refused to drink from a hole. Epson Salts were sold at 5/- per oz. Horse racing at Epson on Banstead Downs dates from 1648 and Popsy in his diary speaks of going to Banstead Downs to "see a great race". Here, 15 miles from London, the 12th Lord Derby, after whom the race is named, had a shooting box called "The Oaks" and from this was derived the name of the other classic race founded 2 years earlier in 1779 and also run at Epson. The course is difficult, beginning with a long straight, then a left-hand bend reaching to Tottenham corner and a final half mile rising to the finish. Several Irish-bred horses have won lustre in the Derby. In 1907 "Orby," sent from Glencairn, Co. Dublin won the Derby for "Boss" Croker. From this same stable, managed by Seamus McGrath, "Panastipper" (owned by his father Mr. Joseph McGrath) made an Irish challenge in 1955, being beaten only by "Phoebus" in 1951. Mr. Joseph McGrath was more successful with his Irish-bred "Arctic Prince". The Derby was again won in 1958 by another Irish horse "Hard Ridden."
