Colr. T. Lee: The harbour is filling up every day.

**Vaccination Against Poliomyelitis**

**WATERFORD HEALTH AUTHORITY**

Vaccination is available, FREE OF CHARGE for—

(1) Persons in the lower income group who are (a) between the ages of six months and 40 years (i.e. persons born between 1st April, 1921, and 1st November, 1960), (b) expectant mothers.

(2) Persons in the middle income group who are between the ages of six months and 40 years (as stated above) who are: (a) staffs of all hospitals, clinics and homes (including ambulance drivers) and their families; (b) other practising nurses (not engaged solely in private practice) and their families; (c) medical and dental students and dental attendants and their families; (d) teachers and their families; and (e) other public health staff who might come in contact with poliomyelitis cases, and their families.

Vaccination is available on a PAYMENT BASIS for—

Persons in the middle income group, between the ages of six months and 40 years, who are not included in the above categories.

Application forms may be had at local dispensaries or direct from the Secretary, Waterford Health Authority. Completed forms and where necessary, appropriate payment, should be sent to the Secretary, Waterford Health Authority, Arus Brugh, Dungarvan. The latest date for receipt of completed application forms is 23rd May, 1961. Parents, guardians and others concerned are urged to apply NOW for vaccination as no further scheme is contemplated this year.

**Decision Against Local Farmer Upheld**

An appeal against a District Court decision brought by Thomas and Ita Carroll, Grawfadada, against Waterford County Council, was unsuccessful at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday last.

The Co. Council claimed £22.10 was due by defendants for domestic and non-domestic water supplies for 3 years at a recent District Court appeal was upheld by Judge L. B. Skinner.

Mr. J. G. Dowling Co. Secretary in 1958, there was correspondence between the Co. Council and the defendant and an agreement made in 1957 fixing the water rates at 5/- per year was terminated.

In reply to Mr. Sheridan, B.L. witness said that the matter came before the Assize in 1957, Carroll's predecessor (Mr. Flynn) had a stream going through his land and the Co. Council had used it for a water supply.

Mr. Sheridan said his clients were also given three weeks' notice of the termination of the 1957 agreement and this was totally inadequate.

Mr. Dowling said the notice was only to bring the matter to a head. 5/- was a reasonable price for water rates in 1957 but was not at the present time.

Mr. Augustine Morrissey, Water Caretaker for the Co. Council said Mr. Carroll had two cattle tanks and also had water laid on to his house.

Mr. Sheridan, B.L. (instructed by Messrs J. F. Williams & Son) asked Judge Fawcitt to uphold the appeal. The price of 5/- he said, was a perpetual one and if the Co. Council wished to terminate the agreement they would have to restore the stream to its position in 1957. The notice of termination given on March 4th to take effect on April 1st to people to change their rights which were there for half a century, was too short.

Mr. Morris B.L. (for County Council) said there was nothing in the agreement of 1957 to bind the Council to supply water at a rate of 5/- forever more.

Judge Fawcitt said he did not think the 5/- was bidding for £22.10 together with costs and expenses.

**Successful Claims by Dungarvan Men**

**TWO** Dungarvan men, Garrett Morrissey, Abbeyside, and Bernard Deo, Mitchell Street, brought successful malicious damage claims against Waterford County Council at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday last.

Mr. G. A. Morrissey, Bank Official, Roscrea, said he is owner of a house at Abbeyside known as The Hermitage. He returned home every week-end from Roscrea, returning on Feb. 25th, he found the door leading to the garden had been forced. He also realised that the place had been re-arranged and broken. He identified them as his.

Sgt. J. Browne said Mr. Morrissey called on him to investigate the matter on Feb. 26th. He (witness) went to the house and found windows broken, the door forced and the place ransacked. Piping on the wall had also been cut. He investigated the matter and Carroll's ranging for 14 (or 17 years of age were charged and pleaded guilty to the offence.

Judge Fawcitt gave a decree for £38 and costs, and expenses.

Mr. Deo was awarded £28 and costs in his malicious damage claim.

Sgt. J. Browne said he investigated the breaking and entering of a shop owned by Mr. Deo. The door leading from the back garden had been pulled from the hinges and broken in two. A second door leading to the shop was partly broken. A quantity of cigars were also stolen. No one had been charged.

# Tipp Take Tenth Title

## Doles Glorious Second-Half Effort Just Failed

### THE GALLANT WATERFORD TEAM

THE NATIONAL HURLING LEAGUE TROPHY WHICH HAS BEEN MONOPOLISED WITH ALMOST MONOTONOUS FREQUENCY BY TIPPERARY IN MODERN TIMES HAS MADE ITS TENTH SOJOURN INTO THE PREMIER COUNTY. ITS DESTINATION FOR THE COMING TWELVE MONTHS WAS DECIDED AT CROKE PARK ON SUNDAY LAST WHEN, AFTER A THRILLING AND FANTASTIC HOUR, TIPP THWARTED WATERFORD'S GLORIOUS BID TO CAPTURE ITS FIRST TITLE WITH A 6-6 TO 4-9 VICTORY.

To say that this final, which despite the inclemency of the weather attracted an attendance of 25,072 was an extraordinary event, is a complete understatement. The pattern of the game, the unpredictability of the exchanges and one of the most epic finishes ever witnessed at this famous venue made the decider an enthralling one the memories of which will be cherished by the fortunate enough to have witnessed it, for some time to come.

Tipperary at the laurels, the laurels of the game were equally distributed between the victors and vanquished. The only thing that was all through was the master quality, with the holders to help exchanges in the closing stages. Call there had to be a goal and if the holders are the champions, few would have quibbled if the goal had ended in stalemate.

Tipperary's almost impenetrable defence in the opening 30 minutes, Waterford, undeterred, set about their seemingly impossible task of overhauling the champions straight from the restart. At the interval the selectors were up to the fact that neither Cheasty or Grimes were making much headway in their respective centre-forward and mid-field berths, and their second half inter-switching surprisedly laid the foundations for their closing rally.

With ten minutes remaining the score-board made pathetic reading for the big Waterford following—6-3 to 1-1, and many of the spectators could be seen smiling for the effort, convinced that it was another case of annihilation at the hands of Tipperary. But these selfsame pessimists must have overlooked these Decies men. In the 21st minute "Doc" Walsh started this amazing and never to be forgotten recovery with a goal. Now the Waterford attack, which up to this had received little praise from a resolute Tipperary defence, suddenly began to find chinks in their armour. Point by point the deficit was narrowed to a creditable score of 6-3 to 4-3.

Although Waterford failed to wrest the title from the champions, they nevertheless can feel eminently pleased with their performance. The bitterness of the defeat, however, is only doubt surrounding the team was its inability to come from behind, but Sunday's gigantic effort, which, to-day, must be the talk of the entire hurling world, blew sky-high any such lingering doubt.

What might have happened had Whelan (twice) and Quinn availed of gilt-edged chances of goals; had not Matt Hassett won the toss and given his side the advantage of the strong breeze in the opening half; or had Tipperary possessed

ed a goalkeeper of less ability than Dom O'Brien? These are questions that will be asked by the Gaiety for many a long day. Personally, I thought Waterford's terrific opening twenty minutes, during which Tipperary amassed the huge lead of 4-3, proved their undoing. Nevertheless, let the laurels rest where they lie. Tipperary, true to tradition, accepted almost every scoring chance in the opening half-hour in a manner that hall-marked them as a side worthy of the name of champions, and then held (if only just), the lead right to the end.

When one considers the fact that so many Waterford men had off days and yet could come so close to victory, the equality between the sides can be readily seen. After the game I heard several Tipperary supporters remark that their side nearly paid the penalty of lacking off. To my mind, such a statement is totally unfounded and merely tried to conceal the anxiety caused by that second-half Waterford effort. The Tipperary players, several of whom I spoke to after the game, were adamant that their success was deserved, but freely admitted that had the game lasted much longer, Waterford might have lived to fight another day.

Tipperary, backed by the strong breeze, opened brightly and Tom Ryan crashed home goal no. 1, after a minute's play. Shortly afterwards Billy Moloughney pointed from a Nealon centre. In their first attack, Waterford forced a pointless "70." But back came Tipperary and newcomer "Mackey" McKenna with the coolness of a veteran, scored Tipp's second goal.

In the 10th minute, Dom O'Brien brought off the first of a series of brilliant saves and seconds later Frankie Walsh was wide from a close-in free. Direct from the puck-out, Tom Ryan placed Nealon for Tipperary's third goal, and two minutes later Devaney had a point from seventy yards. In the 19th minute, the hard-pulling Billy Moloughney crashed home another goal and 30 seconds later Jimmy Doyle made it 4-3 to nil with a point from a free.

The remaining ten minutes of the half saw a complete reversal in the trend of the game. Mid-fielders Power and O'Riada began to dominate the sector. Power had a point in the 27th minute and Frank Walsh quickly pointed a free. Then came Whelan's miss from point-blank range and seconds later Quinn's disallowed goal, leaving Tipperary in a commanding 4-3 to 0-2 lead at the interval.

on the '40' was far too elusive for Martin O'Gorman whose continued poor form must be causing anxiety amongst Decies followers. Left half Tom Ryan hit peak form and had probably his best game since joining the senior team.

Biggest surprise of all was the display of Jimmy Doyle. The Thurles man had a most unprofitable hour being held scoreless from play. He did show a vast improvement in the second half and was responsible for his side's two goals during that period but overall came off second best in his duel with Joe Condon.

In corner forward 'Mackey' McKenna, Tipp, have a rare find. This diminutive forward scored two goals off John Barringer when in possession. Full forward Billy Moloughney proved his form against Limerick was no flash in the pan but his namesake Tom was never really effective. Waterford lost no caste in defeat and subscribed more than generously to an epic final.

UNSTEADY FULL LINE Ned Power, although beaten six times had a reasonably good game in goal and saved many dangerous shots in the opening quarter of the second half. The full-back line never displayed its usual solidity and was inclined to panic under pressure. The Dungarvan men Cunningham and Flynn in particular, seemed all at sea on occasions whilst Barron found McKenna difficult to handle, but nevertheless made many fine clearances.

His feat in out-hurling Jimmy Doyle speaks for itself and adds further to the views of many that he is now one of the finest half backs in the game. Martin O'Gorman and Mick Flannely were always toiling against Nealon and Ryan and could never find an effective answer to the Tipp pair.

Seamus Power turned in a tremendous hour of non-stop hurling. His seemingly endless stamina sent him into defence at one moment and into attack in quest of scores the next. Phil Grimes who partnered Power at the start was never happy in the sector. However, a switch that sent him to the mark on Tony Wall had the desired effect and the '800 man proceeded to cut lanes through the Tipp defence in the second half.

If McKenna is a find for Tipp, then Mick Murphy should prove just as great an acquisition to Waterford. Murphy had a dream debut on Sunday scoring two goals and being in hard luck for several others. Cheasty could make little impression on Wall but what a game he played at midfield in the second half. Larry Guinan had some hectic duels with Carey and Tom Walsh never stopped trying, but Frankie Walsh and Donal Whelan were outplayed right from the start.
