With a total of six-hundred-and-sixty-five marks scored by the team, the Abbeyside Troop of Catholic Boy Scouts came third in the inter-troop competition held in Clonmel at which seven troops totalling over three hundred scouts from Waterford and Tipperary competed. **SETTLEMENT IN THREATENED CREAMERY STRIKE**  
An eleventh-hour settlement averted the threatened strike of over one hundred employees of the Dungarvan Co-operative Creameries Company, which was scheduled to take place on Saturday last. It was made by the creamery management of 12/6d. per week plus fifteen shillings for the first three-and-a-half hours work on Sunday; 2/6d. for the next half-hour of part thereof, and five shillings an hour for work after that. The offer also included time-and-one eighth for shift workers.

**TWO-ALARM FIRE**  
A chimney-fire at the home of Mr. J. Mooney, Villierstown on Friday afternoon had the Dungarvan fire brigade at the ready when a further message stated that the blaze had been got under control. The brigade were stood down. When the town fire-siren sounded again within half-an-hour it was learned the local fire-fighters in Villierstown had not been able to cope with the blaze and the Dungarvan brigade was again summoned.

**HISTORICAL ASSOCIATIONS OF GRAVEYARD**  
County Waterford National Monuments Advisory Committee have approached the County Council with a request to have Ballylianeen burial ground vested in the Council so that this historical spot containing the grave of Tadhg O'Sullivan, the Irish poet, can be maintained in a fitting manner. At the May meeting of the Committee, Mr. Michael Creagh pointed out that the Council had recently decided to undertake the maintenance of other burial grounds, and that a favourable decision would be given in this case.

**CO-OPERATION CUTS COSTS IN WATER SUPPLIES**

MANY groups of people throughout the country have found that where suitable water is not readily available, big economies may be effected by a number of householders getting together and utilizing one source of water and one pump for the whole group. There are many groups of houses in the country where such a plan could be put into operation at a net cost of as little as £30 per house.

**WHEN A GROUP SCHEME IS IMPRACTICABLE:**

Where a source of water is readily available and where a group-scheme may be impracticable, an individual water-system can be installed, and with the aid of Government and Local Authority grants, the cost is surprisingly low. There are thousands of farm-houses in the country where water could be provided on an expenditure of about £35 by the farmer. For example, where a suitable well with water at less than 23 ft. depth is available near the house and where there is a convenient out-house to shelter the pumping unit, the whole installation up to a tap in the kitchen could be carried out for less than £60. A sink, draining board and waste pipe could be fitted for about £10, making a total of £70. Half this cost is covered by the Government grant and would leave £35 to be borne by the householder. £20 or less should be ample for providing a suitable pump-house if one not available. If the well is deep, a "deep well" pump must be provided and in the case of an 80 ft. well, the extra cost would be about £35. If the well is 100 yards or so away, the additional cost would be about £25. Supply can be brought to a trough in a field 100 yards away for approximately £10.

NEWS N.F.A.

IRELAND ON THE VERGE
It looks as though the whole question of Ireland's joining the Common Market as an Associate or Full Member will come to a head in the very near future. Things have been moving fast lately. It appears from reports in the press, that England is about to make a move, and when she does we can expect Ireland to follow suit.

Several times in recent months the Taoiseach Mr. S. Lemass has said that our Government has the whole question under review and that our next move depends on Britain. For many different reasons it appeared in the past as though the British Government could not take a definite step. The last few weeks, however, have seen a tactical change in all this.

It is well known that President Kennedy advised Mr. Mc Gilligan to take a more active part in the growing European Community, both from an economic and a political point of view. It is also known that certain sectors of the British economy have been pressing for Britain's entry into the Common Market. They see the growing prosperity of the various Member States and they are anxious to share in it.

This statement is of very great importance to Ireland. On the same day Mr. Lemass stated in the Dail that if Britain should take this step we would consider establishing a link with the Common Market and endeavour to secure terms of membership or association which would satisfactorily take account of our economic conditions.

The Industrial & Transport Committee wishes to draw the attention of farmers to a recent notice which was issued by the E.S.B. to the effect that anyone who proposes to erect a building or other structure within the area mentioned in the notice should give the Board at least two months notice. This notification is required by virtue of certain provisions of the Electricity Supply (amendment) Act, 1954.

The Committee was assured by the E.S.B. that there is absolutely no question of a complete prohibition on buildings within the above mentioned areas. Notification is required solely to enable the Board to specify the safety distance required between the structure of building and the lines. This distance will vary, depending on whether the line is a main line or a low tension one and also on the nature of the terrain on which the line is built.

Following representations to the Minister for Transport & Power, by the N.F.A., Industrial & Transport Committee the Government is to discuss the question of the extension of the Rural Electrification Scheme to areas where no supply will have been provided when the present programme is completed next year.

The Committee understands that at 31st March, 1961, 728,000 houses were developed by the E.S.B. out of a total of 792,000. At that time, approximately 70,000 rural consumers were connected, representing about 75% of the dwellings in the areas developed.
