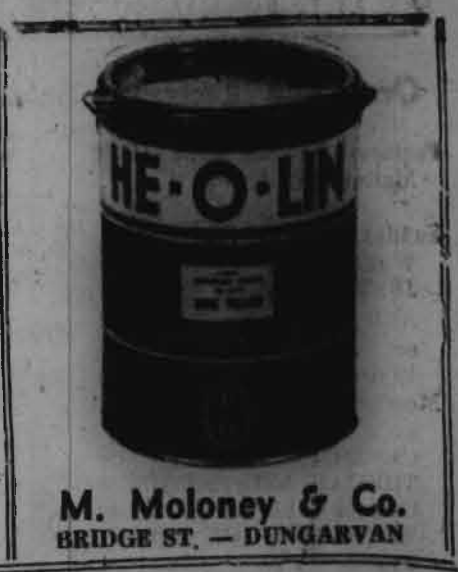

## LOCAL HAPPENINGS

### SEEKS PUBLIC HOLIDAY FOR GOOD FRIDAY

It was the wish of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions that Good Friday should be a public holiday, said Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, T.D., speaking in the Dail on the Holidays (Employees) Bill.

He appreciated that the pay for working on public holidays was being increased under the Bill from time-and-a-quarter to double-time, but this was not a very big advance, in view of the fact that the trade unions had already secured double-time for many workers, and treble-time for some workers who had to do duty on public holidays.

The entire wedding service was conducted through the medium of Irish. The bridegroom is a well-known member of the farming community, and the bride was formerly employed on the clerical staff of Waterford Co. Council in the County Engineer's Office, Dungarvan.

### EXCELLENT FISHING AT HELVICK COMPETITION

One of the most successful angling competitions ever was held by the Dungarvan Sea Angling Club on Sunday last when over sixty competitors participated in the big day of the Open Sea Angling Contest which commenced from Helvick Pier at midday and provided a day of excellent sport for the many anglers from near and far who took part.

Mr. P. Glynn, Kilrush Sea Angling Club won the prize for the heaviest individual catch. His catch totalled one hundred and eighteen pounds weight and included a seventy-four pound blue shark. After an exciting struggle lasting twenty minutes he succeeded in landing the blue shark, which qualified him also for the prize for the heaviest fish caught during the competition.

Runner-up in the competition for heaviest individual catch was Mr. J. Cummins, Dungarvan, with a total of one hundred and five pounds. The heaviest fish, a twenty-seven and a half pounds tope, was caught by Mr. P. Donaghy of Dublin.

In the Inshore Competition, Mr. E. Curran, Windgap, Dungarvan, caught the heaviest individual fish, a pollock weighing nine pounds eleven ounces. Mr. J. Cummins, Dungarvan, also had the greatest number in his catch to qualify for a second award. The prize for the greatest variety caught went to Mr. J. F. Elliott, Dungarvan.

County Waterford Committee of Agriculture SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1961

For the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in County Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture, to locate a limited number of high-grade black-faced rams on the out-moorage areas of the Connemara and Knockmallow Mountains on the following conditions:—

(1) The Committee shall grant 4 premiums of maximum £20 each towards the cost of Scotch imported rams and 40 premiums of maximum £8 each in all other cases within the limits of the allocation. The value of the premium in each case shall be less by £5 than the cost price of the ram.

(2) In the allocation of rams preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to state the rams to selected ewes.

(3) The Committee will endeavour to secure that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case an animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes.

(4) The ram must be maintained in good and healthy condition and retained in the flock for two breeding seasons.

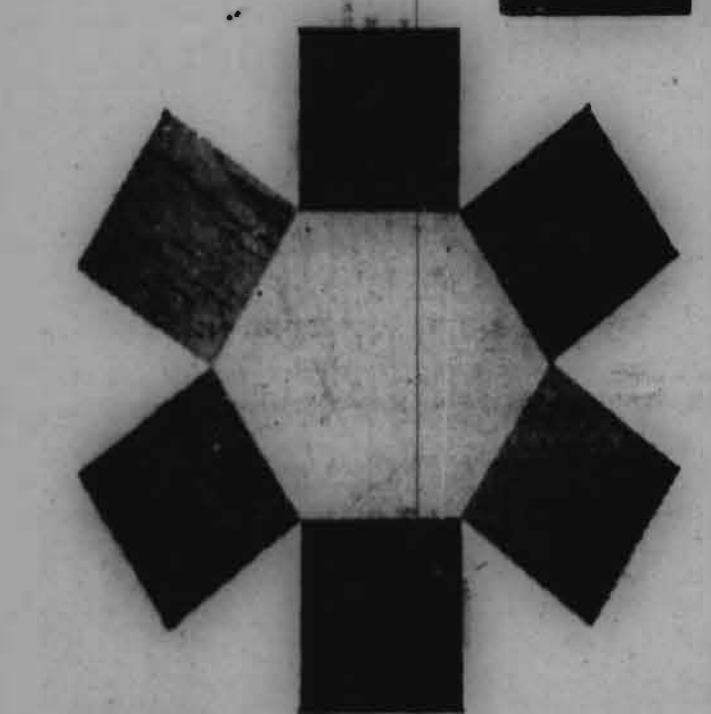

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


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**DAON SCOIL**

Sandwiched between these ties is the game of the day—the meeting of Ardmore and Kill in a second round football championship clash that is arousing widespread interest within the county.

Although the champions of both codes will be in action, there can be no denying that Gaelic followers of the county await the meeting of Kill and Ardmore with greatest interest. This game has all the ingredients of a thriller—a game that will, I'm sure be won on pure football ability alone. Indeed I would go so far as to predict one of the best games in the championship campaign on Sunday.

be their maxim and if they approach the game in a serious vein then they can come a step nearer retaining their crown.

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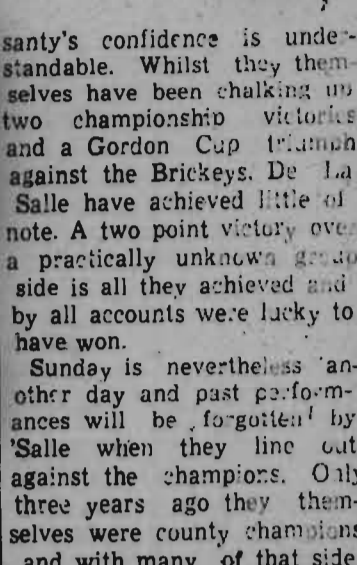

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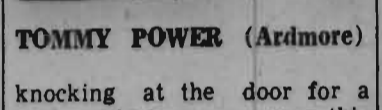

**INTERESTING** Against Faughs the group team shows themselves as being a tough side, without frills, yet capable of achieving something worthwhile.

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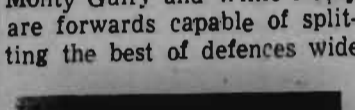
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
