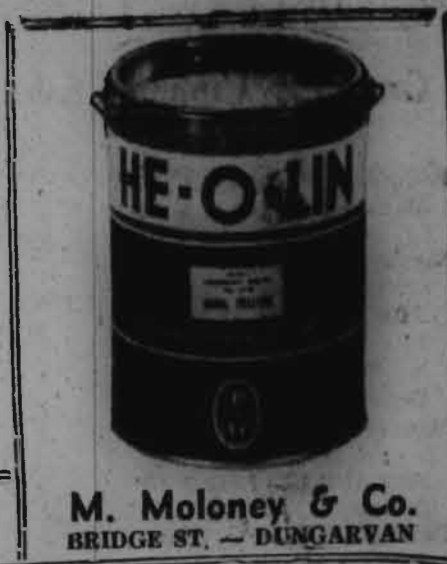

**Demand for Electricity Still Growing**

THE E.S.B. annual report for the year ended 31st March 1961, states that the generation of electricity increased by 166 million units or 7.8% to a total of 2,262 million units. Because of the very wet year the production of water power exceeded, for the first time, 900 million units or 42.8% of the total production. Sod peat provided 19.7 per cent, peat provided 12.8%, native coal 4.4% and imported coal and oil 20.3%. Native sources provided 79.7 per cent of the total output. The report says that the demand for electricity is still growing steadily. Sales realised in 1960-61, an increase of £1,529,000 over the preceding year. The principal increases were in motive power for industry and in domestic supplies.

The accounts show a surplus of £270,197 compared with a deficit of £432,558 in the preceding year. It was estimated that the extra production from water power resulted in a saving in fuel cost of £500,000. The number of consumers increased by 17,295 to a total of 628,241. The increase in recent years of the rate of growth of demand for electricity has necessitated a revised programme of extensions of generating plant which includes two new peat fired stations and extensions to six existing major stations. It also means the extension and strengthening of the transmission system. In addition, the Board is considering the erection of a new high voltage transmission network at 220,000 volts. For these purposes substantial sums of capital must be obtained during the next few years. The report mentions that arrangements have been made for a substantial long-term loan from the New Ireland Insurance Co. Ltd.

In regard to rural electrification it is stated that the deficit for the year on the Rural Account was 736,186. The rural electrification programme is expected to be virtually complete by the end of the present financial year. Forty rural areas were completed last year and the proportion of dwellings connected in all rural areas is 75.1%.

The average use of electricity for all consumers in rural areas went up from 1,351 units to 1479 units. The report also states that the buildings occupied by the Board at Lower Fitzwilliam St. despite extensive and costly maintenance, is causing concern and the future policy in regard to these buildings is at present under consideration. In its Fisheries Report the Board states that the scheme for the rehabilitation of the River Shannon salmon fisheries progressed satisfactorily. £48,369 was spent on the works and a revised programme of works is being prepared. The outdoor rearing tanks at the Parteen hatchery were completed and at the end of 1960 was held a stock of 2,475,000 salmon fry. The success of the new fish pass at the Ardara power station has resulted in the distribution of salmon over a very large catchment area.

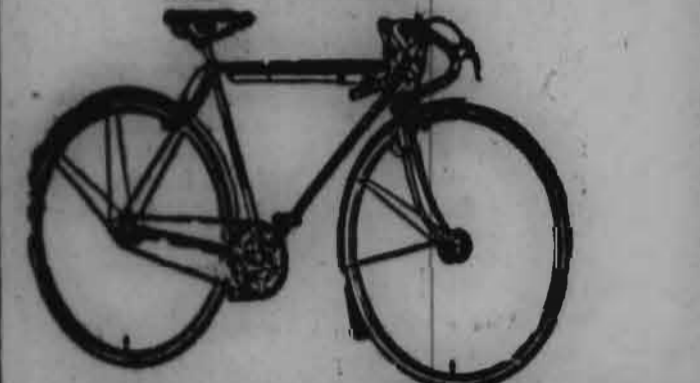

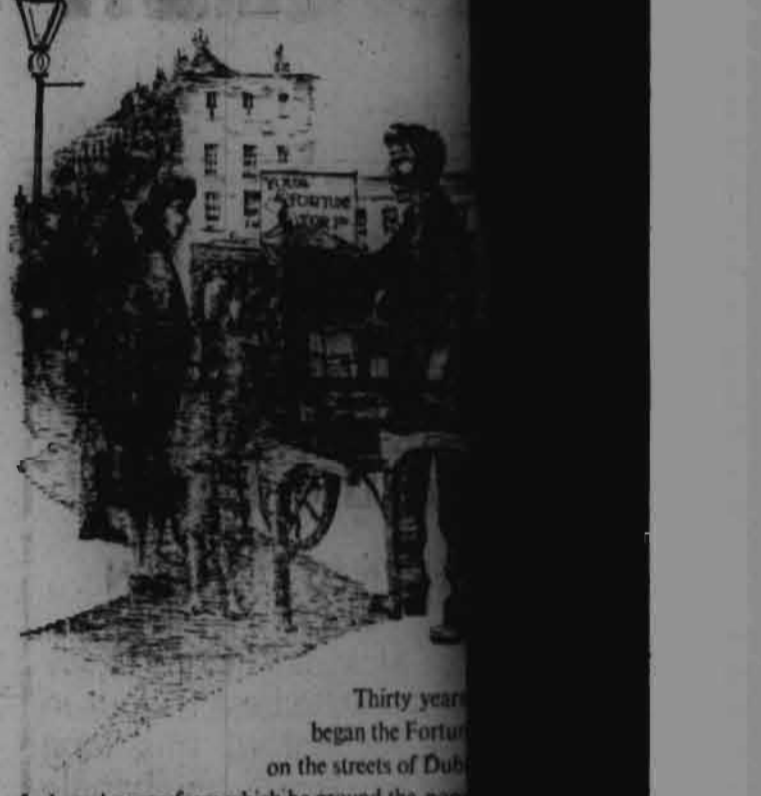

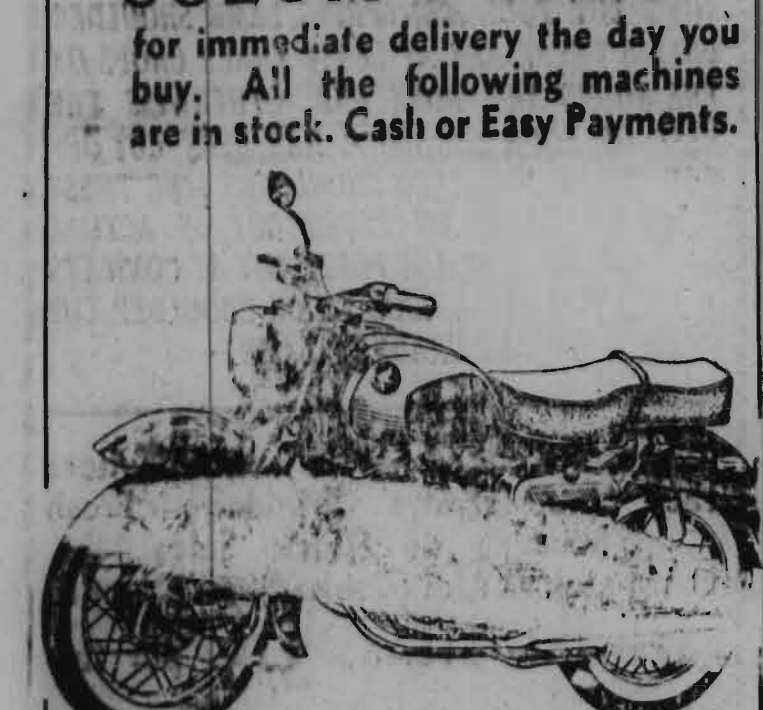
