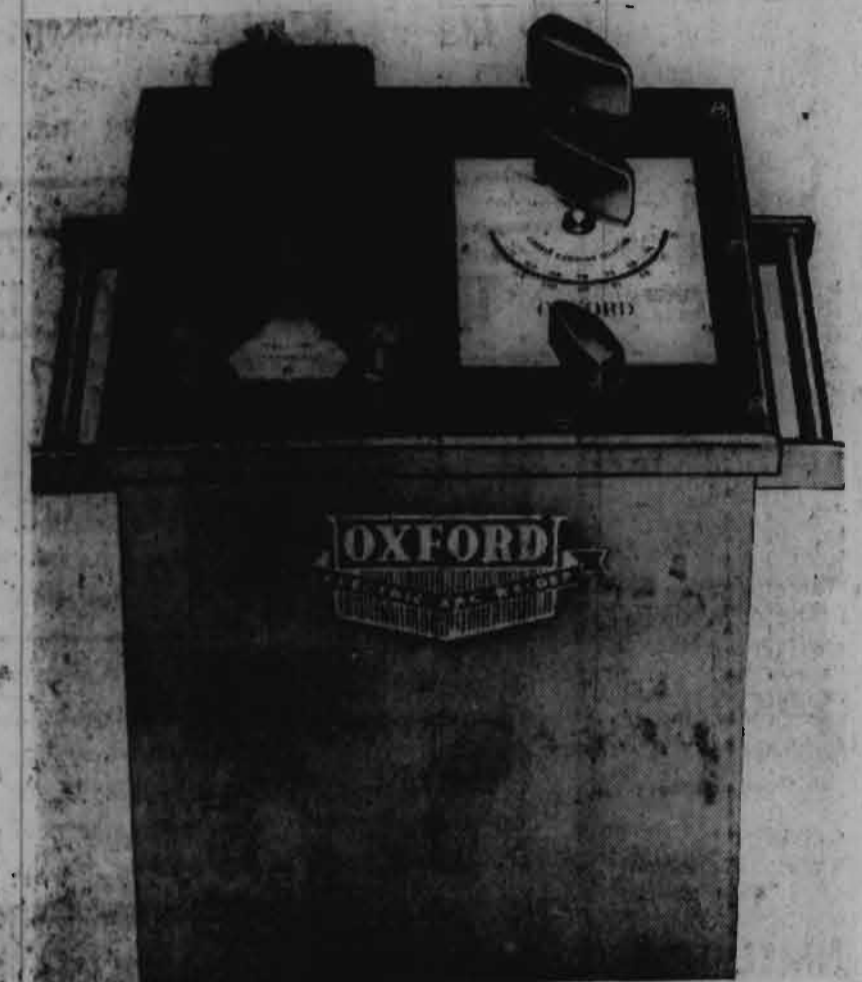

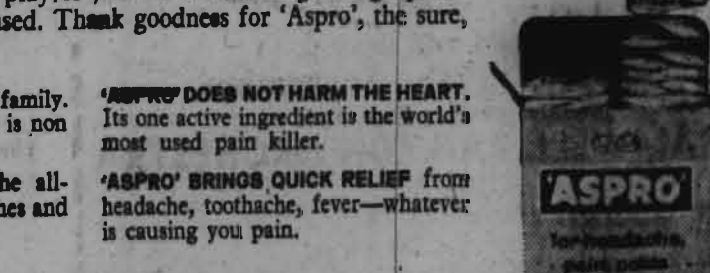



An Exhilarating Excursion

Unavoidably postponed from Sunday, 8th ult. (Feast of the Transfiguration) to the first day of last week (12th Sunday after Pentecost) was the tour arranged by "cheery car-owner-driver, Johnny Foley, for his fellow Kilrossantians—Davy, Power, Dick, Joy, Andy, Joy, and Mark Kiley—to take with him together with yours truly, to celebrate our appreciation of the sustained summer weather conditions.

Shortly after passing the point where the Clogheen-Lieamore road (via through) was reached our way assumed an awesome air, with lofty mountains to left and right, and nowhere around a residence to be seen. Flocks of sheep. Forestry Board's new plantations and at least two ancient sentry-box-shaped shepherd shelters formed of mountain stones were noticed before we beheld the Bay Loch on our left and quite close to the Ve. According to tradition that "shimmering shield in the light of day" marks the centre of the locally famous "witch known locally as "Petticoat Loose" played havoc with traffic and travellers in her time.

We stopped for some time on the part of the Ve nearest the immense Knockedown, pyramidal and the rock construction on the side of which that contains all that was mortal of a gentleman who hailed from a township in the Premier County bearing a name essentially majestic and beautiful, and suggestive of a peaceful place of rural contentment. Davy and Dick and Andy and Mark climbed up to this unique "top" and from the plaque attached to the front of it Davy kindly copied for me the inscription, as follows:—

Samuel Richard Grubb, of Castle Grace, Born 28th September 1855, Died 6th September, 1921.

The picture greeting and cladding our gaze as here on 'the hillside we lingered was a veritable vision of beauty that defies description. It was here he diabolical dictator, Oliver Cromwell, on a balmy day in the summer of 1650, struck with this wondrous sight exclaimed: "A land well worth a fight!" Below, spread out like a carpet, a lush green plain, a chestnut in the sun, Tipperary in eye-compelling panorama of complicated colour—its fields, roads, rivers and "fair Galtee mountains"

et brightly and clearly in optical range. "One felt, as on Thorbor, 'twas good to be here Where earth seemed so beautiful and heaven so near."

A radio set in the car immediately behind Johnny's was tuned in for Michael O'Hehir's commentary on the O'Gally-Ros common clash in the All-Ireland S.F. championship competition second semi-final, broadcast from Croke Park, and so we knew the team that Down might "down" to reduce the Sany Maguire Cup as we drove into the lower line of the Ve. Our road descended steeply through shades of copse and tree until Clogheen was reached. Coming in to this pretty place we saw the neat on our right a really beautiful newly built bungalow positioned some few perches from the public thoroughfare and amidst arranged paths ways but adorning Goggin-fenced patches. Clogheen's arch right to renown derives from its martyred pastor's honoured name, for here the Very Rev. Father, Sheehy, P.P., proved himself "to God and Ireland True." Looking at the picture dispassionately we find that since 1963 (the year on which Government £11.510 is based) the average earnings in industry have increased by 42.4% up to December 1966, that is from £5-10-0 per week to £7-10-0 per week and women were in addition in increases in many other items such as insurance etc. The agricultural workers wage in comparison with that of the industrial worker is low; but the farmer's income shows that he cannot pay more and cannot even employ labour when he needs some, because financially he is not in a position to pay for it. However since 1953, the agricultural workers wage has increased by 34.7%. But when we examine the farm family income during the same period that is from 1953 to December 1966, we find that the family income was reduced by 2.7% in total.

The failure of agricultural income to keep pace with other sectors of the community was not due to inefficiency. Despite the agricultural stagnation the output of agriculture in constant prices increased by 10% in 1966. Output increased 12% per cent. It is recognized that the improvement in the balance of payments position has been due to agricultural exports and reductions in agricultural imports. The chief cause for the increasingly unfair distribution of National Income is price movement. Though the price of food has risen 22% since 1963 agricultural prices have not risen at all. All other workers have been given and are being given increased incomes—even those in the food industry. The farmer must pay increased wages and prices for goods and ser-

N.F.A. NEWS

JUSTICE NOT CHARITY In justice not charity Irish farmers' through their organization the N.F.A. have now demanded from the Irish Government an immediate allocation of £83 million to Irish Agriculture. A sizable sum one may say, but again justice and Government. Farmers demand that the income of farmers and their workers be brought more in line with income in other sectors of the community.

Since its inception the N.F.A. has continuously referred to the unjust distribution of the National income insofar as the members of the Association speaking to the Annual General Meeting two years ago made the following statement: "The adverse effects of our wage economic and political policy have over the past years been cushioned on the farmers and he is now carrying such a burden that there just is not any cushioning left in him."

The present round of wage increases takes the form of demands for higher wages and shorter hours. There is no industrial case made that the increases are being claimed because of an increased cost of living or tied to increased productivity. They are a general income rise. The farmer has equal rights with other citizens. The farmer must work longer hours than other sections of the community and usually seven days a week. (We have no five day cows, pigs or poultry—therefore no five day week.) We demand income increases equal to the shortening of hours, as well as the increase hourly rate in other sections.

This demand has been submitted to the Government by the N.F.A. and will be followed by a more detailed memorandum which will necessitate discussion between the N.F.A. and the Government. The demand is based on Government Policy and on the Government's promise, and in addition on Christian social teaching which asks for the farmer partly of income with the rest of the community. The case is a fait one. It is a case based, as we said before, not on charity but on justice, and so government can refuse to administer justice provided the farmers as a united body ask for it because as the Encyclical "Mater et Magistra" states: "Today almost nobody fears, isolated voices."

amounted to less than £70 million, leaving a difference in favour of Britain of almost £25 million. In contrast, British exports to New Zealand amounted to £97 million approximately, while Britain's imports from New Zealand amounted to £183 million.

Britain's position on the Irish market is the result of her privileges under the Anglo-Irish trade agreement, in return for which Ireland obtains unrestricted access to the British market.

New Zealand is in fact, the real cause of the difficulty for agricultural countries like Denmark and Ireland trading in a satisfactory manner is the refusal of the wealthy industrial countries to accept Free Trade in agricultural produce as they demand Free Trade in industrial products. It is this policy, which should be the target of the Danish producers, the New Zealand producers, the Danish Government and the New Zealand Government.

Denmark which is one of the largest suppliers of bacon to Britain, has been accused of dumping bacon on that market. A complaint was lodged with the Board of Trade, but the name of the complainant has not been disclosed.

**A Line of Expectancy**  
At the time of writing I have vainly tried to get information on the composition of both line-outs, therefore we can only adopt a line of expectancy in running the rule over the respective sides.

Kilrossanty as far as it is humanly possible rely on the players that have carried them to this second last hurdle. Sean Ormonde skips the team from goal and Tom Moloney who was switched to full-back for the De La Salle game with great success is expected to remain on the fringe of the square with Jimmy Maher and Tony Baldwin in the corners.

The selectors have, I think, at last dispensed with the idea of playing Mick Pender at mid-field and the tall strapping Comeragh man may pivot the defence again with Tom Walsh and Michael Kirwan beside him.

**Rich Harvest**

**Few Changes**  
Stradbally will also make few if any changes from their usual line-out. Jim Power is a safe if unpectacular goalkeeper and dangerous though Kilrossanty's attack is they will get nothing easy from Eddie Dunphy, Paddy Power and John Fennell in defence.

As already stated Kilrossanty are favourites, yet Stradbally, quietly confident, remain unruffled. Proof of this self-imposed confidence is surely given by the fact that star player Ken Murphy now resident in South Wales is not being brought home for the game. No doubt Murphy's inclusion would bolster their hopes considerably. Yet the Reds feel they can overcome the ancient enemy without him.

**Champions to Understandable**  
Stradbally, although disappointing in earlier rounds, are on the upgrade, make no mistake about that. But whether or not they have improved sufficiently to lower Kilrossanty's colours is another question. With champions falling like nine pins in neighbouring counties many are wondering if Waterford will follow suit and crown new champions for 1961. And graciously though Sion have led the County's hurling fortunes none (except Monastery supporters of course) would feel very disturbed should the title change hands.

**Undisturbed**  
Already this year Dungarvan and St. Ronan's have attempted to achieve over-night fame, but found the star studded city

at night, and there under the careful guidance of Paddy Langan have been "hard at it." When I spoke to Paddy about his side's chances he scorned my suggestion that it might be one-way traffic. "The lads," he said, "are trained to last the hour and if anyone can beat them, that team is Abbeyside." And Paddy assured me he was voicing the opinion of the entire village.

But Pat Fanning, speaking for the Mt. Sion Club also assured me there would be no complacent approach on their behalf. They were treating the game with the respect it merited and would field their strongest possible side.

**Consistently Sound**  
Dickie Roche has been consistently sound in all their games, and a defence including Mick Flannally, Martin O'Monaghan, Freddie O'Brien and Jim Hurley must be regarded as rock solid. At mid-field, where Seamus Power and Mick Dempsey will most likely be operating, their strength is glaringly exposed and truthfully one finds it hard to see Abbeyside's youthful pairing of Danny Barry and John McGrath making much headway. But Sion's strength doesn't

end there. Indeed it is in attack that their real key men are placed. Phil Grimes and Larry Guinan, who were both nursing injuries recently, are expected to be fit in time and will probably be drafted to the centre-forward and corner forward berths respectively. Frankie Walsh and Sean Flavin will complete a formidable half-line, whilst the burly Sean Hayden at full-forward and Mick Gallagher may partner Guinan in the full-line.

In comparison, Abbeyside's line-out is far less attractive, yet their collection of individ-

ual county stars and proven club hurlers, gives their side a solid appearance.

**Need Not be Over-awed**  
Thomas Hogan has always given satisfaction in goal and even the 'Sion attack will find him quite a stumbling block. Full-back John Browne, Austin Flynn and Ned Moore face stiff opposition, yet need not be over-awed by the face value of their task. Flynn has the bulging and experience to subdue Hayden and may also find time to urge on Moore and Browne.

**Brunt of Battle**  
On the shoulders of half-backs Liam O'Dea, Mick Kieley and Noelle McGovern may fall the heaviest brunt of the battle, and Abbeyside's hopes may well depend on how they fare. Individually they are defenders of the first water, but can they continuously contain the heavy pressure that is certain to be showered on them? Again at mid-field Barry and McGrath are promising hurlers but against another question mark must be placed beside their names, as it is extremely doubtful if they possess the experience to outwit Dempsey and Power.
