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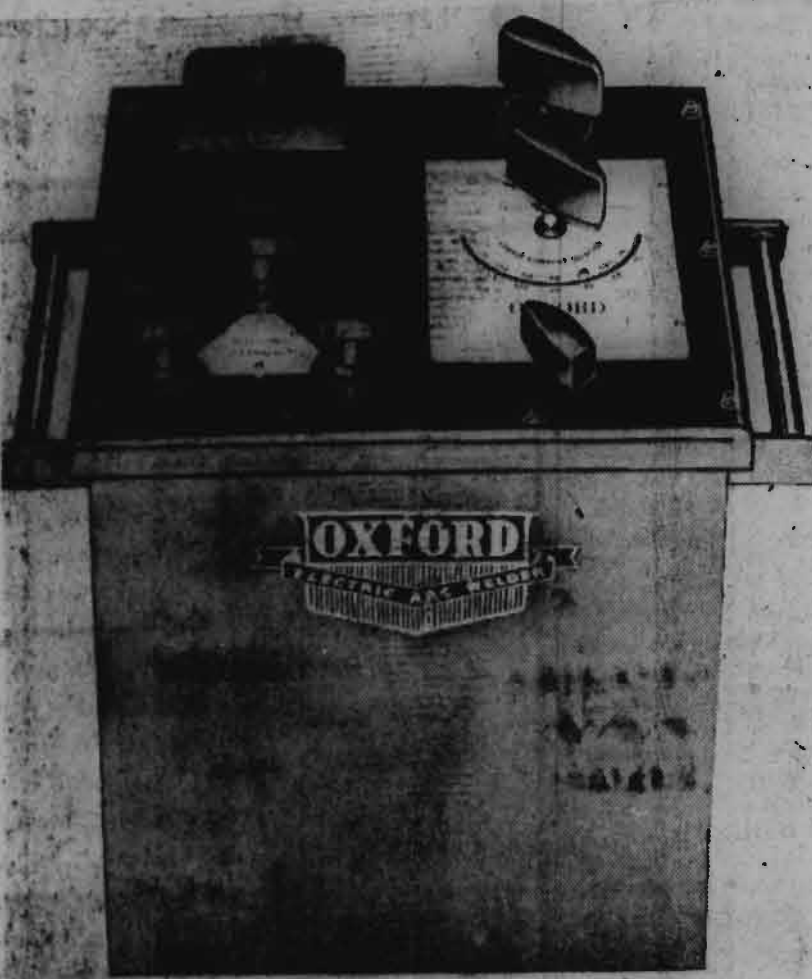

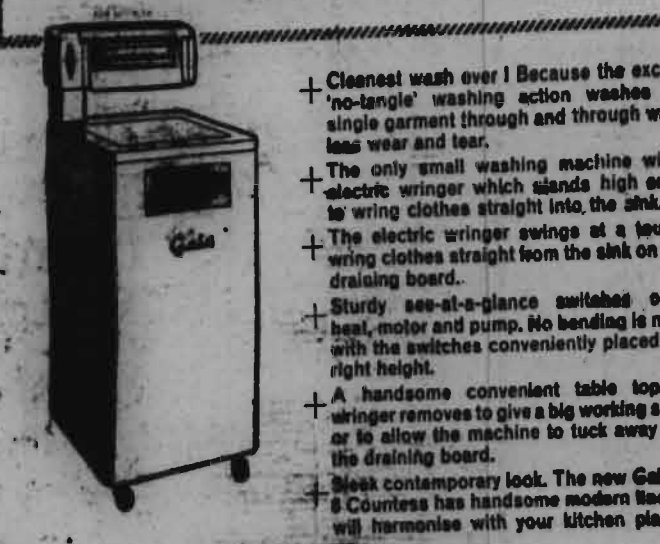

GLEESON

Ballyreen, Old Parish and Dungarvan

Widespread regret was expressed on the announcement of the death of Miss Brigid Gleeson, whose death took place on Friday, September 8th, at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan, after an illness of some duration, but at an advanced age. She was a native of Ballyreen, but she emigrated to the U.S.A. in her early days, where she laboured most of her life. She returned some years back and resided in Dungarvan. She was a fond lover of her Church and religion.

Her remains were removed to Ring Church on Saturday evening followed by a large cortege and were received and blessed by Rev. Fr. V. de Paor, C.C. Requiem Masses were celebrated on Sunday morning and the interment took place in the adjoining family plot. Another very large concourse were present. Rev. Fr. V. de Paor, C.C., officiated at the graveside. (Funeral arrangements by James Kiely and Sons, Dungarvan.)

'BIG TOP' VISITS VICINITY

The famous Bertram Mills Circus will be held in Clonmel on 20th to 22nd September and in Waterford on 23rd to 25th September. The following are the acts in the programme—
Coco—Leading the Circus Clowns is the famous Coco, whose name is known to almost every child in the country. Coco was born in Russia but has clawed his way throughout Great Britain with the Bertram Mills Circus for the past 30 years. He is perhaps the most popular figure in the circus today.
Kam—The Motoring Elephant—The only motoring elephant in the world. Kam will drive a specially adapted Land-Rover in and out of the ring assisted or hindered by the clowns.
Roman Games—An exciting act in which ten horses are used. Norman Barrett, the "Hut" of the circus, is the charioteer and rider in a spectacular number in which he stands astride two horses while careering round the ring—an act which calls for great skill and judgment on the part of the rider.
Joan's Teddy Bears—These young bears are presented by the glamorous Joan Kruse who was formerly a bare-back rider. She has now forsaken riding for the training of these likeable youngsters who have an insatiable appetite for sugar.
Little Billy and Little Nikki—These diminutive clowns will cavort in the ring from time to time throughout the show, and what they lack in inches, they make up for in nonsensical antics to the delight of all ages.
Rudi Lenz and his Chimpanzees—What appears to be a circus troupe of care-free Simians is nevertheless an act which is cleverly devised and routine. These little performers are everyone's delight and their antics, in which they often appear like human beings in miniature, are extremely funny. Rudi Lenz is a young Dutchman who has no circus background. His brother, however, trained chimpanzees and Rudi, as his assistant, became so fond of them that he decided to follow in his brother's footsteps. This polished presentation and the remarkable skill of his charges gives proof of how well he has succeeded, and the genuine affection between him and his chimps is plainly demonstrated.
Cavalcade of Danes—A display of High School riding in which the horses will perform the intricate movements of old and new dances from the Tango to the Rock n' Roll. Nadia Houcke, member of a famous circus family, rides "Erga," a Lippizian stallion which came from the Vienna Imperial Riding School, where this breed is used exclusively.
Don Saunders—The role of a magical eccentric is usually played by Continental clowns, but here we have an Englishman who excels in this art. To be able to keep an audience in continuous laughter for some 15 minutes without speaking a word is no mean feat and it is the miming genius of Don Saunders plus the drollery of his comical movements which enable him to do this. In addition to being a funny man he is an accomplished musician and can play almost any instrument. He has just returned from a tour of the Continent where he was a great success.
The Ten Carols—They are the largest troupe of bare-back riders in the world. All are members of the same family which has been performing this kind of act for generations. Their feats include a pyramid on horse-back and somersaulting from one horse to another. The Carols hail from Italy, but they have performed in every country in Europe and they all speak five languages.
Gosta Kruse and his Elephants—Gosta Kruse is the only elephant tamer in the world who has been handling and taming the trainer's commands. The fact that the animals work so well is ample proof of his complete understanding between them and their trainer. Gosta Kruse is Swedish-born and was formerly a horse rider and trainer but his love was always for elephants and after some years with horses he eventually succeeded in realising his ambition as an elephant trainer. One of his elephants plays the roof of a barrow much to the discomfort of the customer and to the delight of the audience.
Bela Roucha's Jungle Fantasy—A colourful act with a variety of animals performing in a smooth and elegant routine. Bela Roucha comes from Czechoslovakia and although young in years he has had much experience in the handling and training of wild animals. For several years he has appeared in Continental countries where he has trained and presented animal groups of various species and he comes to this country now as one of Europe's foremost trainers.
Doa Radofova—These two attractive young girls perform on a hanging perch in mid-air above the circus ring. One girl, suspended by her feet, supports her partner by hands and knees whilst the latter performs a series of acrobatic tricks. While graceful to watch, the girls' performance calls for great strength especially on the part of the "bearer"—that is the one who holds the other.
Fabula—This lovely young Austrian girl was selected by Mr. Cyril Mills as one of the most outstanding acts in Europe. Fabula presents her flock of 30 white and black pigeons in a most unique and beautifully delicate fashion.
The Francescos—The world's foremost musical clowns. The act of clowning is as old as the circus itself and clowns have always been considered an essential feature on all circus programmes. Many of the greatest clowns in circus history have been Italians as are the Francescos. Trained in the old circus tradition as tumblers and acrobats, they are capable of doing almost anything in a circus ring. They are also excellent musicians as audiences will readily appreciate on hearing them on brass and reed instruments. But it is in comedy that they excel, for all their tricks and gags are beautifully timed and they are indeed masters of their art. They have had long experience to help them to their present excellence, having performed throughout Europe, but this is their first tour in this country.
Bertram Mills' Arabian Horses—A Pot-Pourri presented by Nadia Houcke and Norman Barrett, the latter being the son of an English circus proprietor. These horses, shown as liberty, are thoroughbred Arab, each one having

been selected by Mr. Bernard Mills. For such an act as this, well-bred horses are essential, for only horses of good breeding have the necessary elegance of action and good bearing. Both these qualities will be readily apparent to horse-lovers for these horses are, for quality, unsurpassed.
Rogana—An amazing equilibrist. Such acts as this have hitherto only been attempted by men and to find a girl thus performing is exceptional. Miss Rogana comes from a family who are all circus performers and this is her first appearance in Europe. Her balancing tricks are unique and some of them are accomplished while hanging by her feet in an inverted position. An elegant and beautiful young woman who has all the traditional grace of the circus, her performance is one which will leave a deep impression wherever she appears. Only by many months of constant practice has she been able to perfect this act.
The Reddy Mey Troupe—This troupe comes from Germany and they represent the old circus tradition as tumblers and acrobats, they are capable of doing almost anything in a circus ring. They are also excellent musicians as audiences will readily appreciate on hearing them on brass and reed instruments. But it is in comedy that they excel, for all their tricks and gags are beautifully timed and they are indeed masters of their art. They have had long experience to help them to their present excellence, having performed throughout Europe, but this is their first tour in this country.

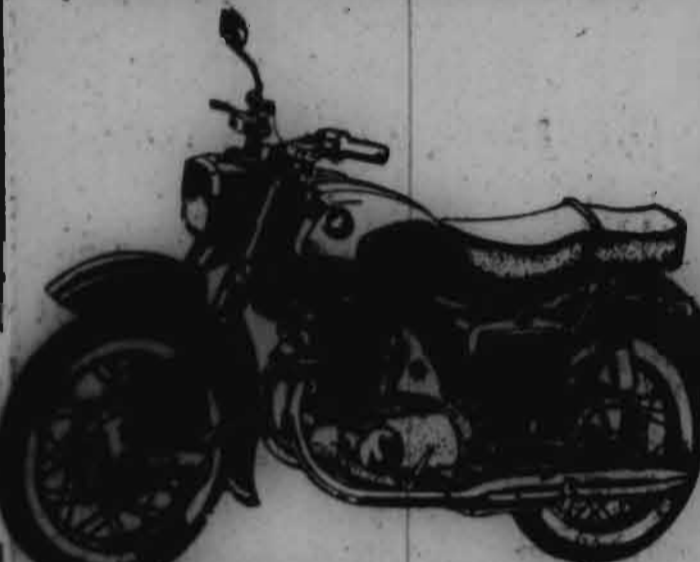

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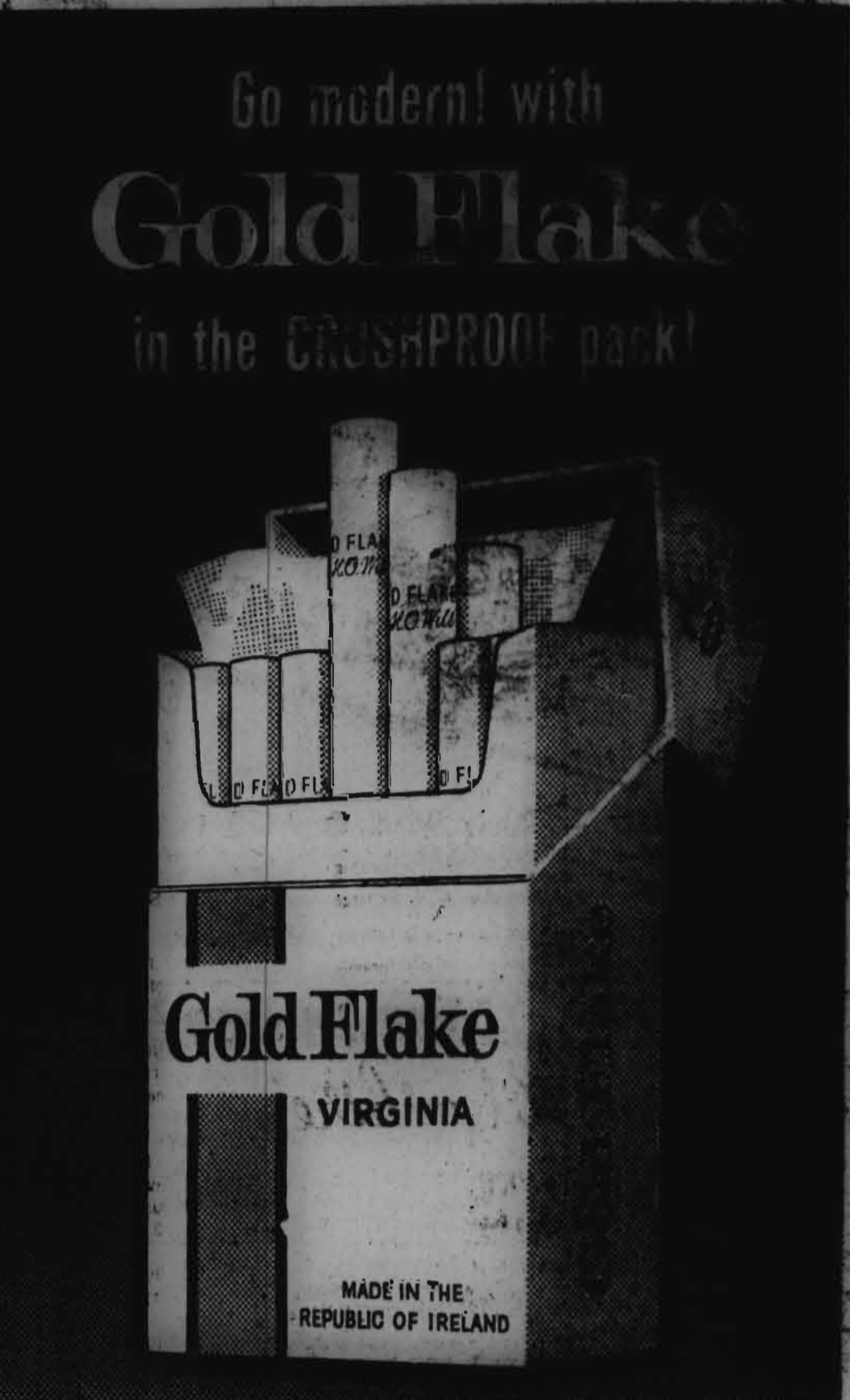

and as we go to press we see this election campaign gathering momentum at an unprecedented rate in this area. The cause no doubt is the loss of one of our four constituency seats to South Tipperary.

Due to the recent changes over 7,000 votes have gone to South Tipperary from this constituency and keen observers would roughly estimate that loss to the different parties as follows: Assuming 6,000 of the 7,000 voted—3,000 would go to Fianna Fail and 1,500 each to Fine Gael and Labour.

The voting was as follows at the last General Election in 1957:

Electorate, 44,326; total Poll, 30,883. Spoiled votes, 281; valid poll, 30,402. Quota 6,081. First preferences were cast as follows:—
Ald. W. Kenneally (F.F.) 7,416; Mr. Sean Ormonde (F.F.) 6,676; Ald. T. A. Kyne (Lab.) 5,597; Ald. T. Lynch (F.G.) 5,161; Mr. James Quirke (F.F.) 3,221; Mr. Norman Walsh (F.G.) 2,858.

Distribution of Ald. Kenneally's surplus of 1,335 was then proceeded with and resulted:—
Ormonde (plus 862) 7,044 (elected); Kyne (plus 170); Lynch (plus 58) 5,215; Quirke (plus 132) 3,353; Walsh (plus 15) 2,873.

Distribution of Mr. Ormonde's surplus of 860 left the candidates:—
Kyne (plus 49) 5,785; Lynch (plus 22) 5,237; Quirke (plus 85) 4,208; Walsh (plus 34) 3,007.

As no remaining candidate had yet reached the quota, Mr. Walsh, the lowest candidate, was eliminated and his votes distributed. This resulted:—
Kyne (plus 363) 6,148; Lynch (plus 2,280) 7,499; Quirke (plus 149) 4,403.

Messrs. Lynch and Kyne were then declared elected to the remaining two seats.

CHAMPIONSHIP REIGN WAS ENDED

Four Sent Off In Robust Hour

STRADBALLY 1-3; KILROSSANTY 0-4
SIXTEEN YEARS OF BITTER DISAPPOINTMENTS AND GALLING FRUSTRATION WERE, FOR STRADBALLY, BRIDGED FOREVER ON SUNDAY LAST AT DUNGARVAN WHEN THE REDS LAID LOW THE KILROSSANTY BOGEY AND ASSURED THEMSELVES OF A PLACE IN THE OCTOBER 15 FINAL AGAINST ARDMORE OR MOUNT SION.

In every sense of the word this was an extraordinary game, packed with tension, drama and indeed everything except the greatest necessity of all - good football. The pre-match air was electric. Everywhere excitement buzzed at the bright prospects of a battle royal between these old and respected rivals. But to and behold from an early stage, a scrambling brawl was the inevitable outcome.

Neither side seemed bent on playing the ball. Instead, there was an almost unanimous preference for the man and with flagrant and disgusting consequence. From start to finish the game was marred by frequent outbursts of fist-cuffs.

It pleased me little to elaborate on these scenes, but I cannot pass without openly condemning both sides. In the white heat of battle a flare-up is only natural but in Sunday's game would never have run its sixty minutes course.

OUTSIDERS
Despite these unruly incidents, however, one cannot detract one whit from the merits of Stradbally's victory. It was as rank outsiders they entered the fray but so diligently did they approach the task on hand that one could be forgiven for thinking it was they who were preciously guarding their county crown.

STILL BLANK
After half an hour's play their score-sheet was still blank - a position that must surely create a record for so powerful a football stronghold. Stradbally, having played against a slight breeze and binding sun were well worth the 0-2 to nil advantage and even at this early stage it was clearly visible that the champions title was slipping from their grasp.

MUST APOLOGISE
However, in the past I have been marvelled at their powers of recovery and thoroughly so too taking nothing from the Reds I expected them to come from behind. For this I must now apologise to all Stradbally. Their side never conceded an inch, and even if Kilrossanty did miss close-in tries that

might have salvaged the game Stradbally's grand defensive work fully merited victory. In the sixth minute of that second half we had the first of the enforced withdrawals when Ken Murphy and Tom Moloney became involved in an incident and both were given the line by referee Mick Whyte. Minutes later Mossy Gasey and Jimmy Maher received a similar fate, although the latter was in my opinion a complete victim of circumstances and hardly deserved marching orders.

HAS COME IN FOR CRITICISM
Incidentally referee Whyte has come in for adverse criticism for his handling of the game from many quarters. Some of his decisions I didn't agree with and at times he was far too lenient. However, it must be remembered that this was a most difficult game to referee, one in fact that would prove a nightmare for anybody to manage.

STOOD BETWEEN KILROSSANTY AND HEAVIER DEFEAT
One man who stood between Kilrossanty and even heavier defeat was their goalkeeper and Captain Sean Ormonde. On at least three occasions his uncanny anticipation saved his net and he can wash his hands clean of his unexpected defeat. T. Baldwin, T. Walsh and later Jimmen Power did everything possible in defence, but neither midfield nor attack achieving something worthwhile.

SION'S FLYING START WAS DECISIVE

Mount Sion 6-8; Abbeyside 3-7

NEVER was that oft repeated adage of "a good start is half the battle" more strikingly emphasised than at Dungarvan on Sunday last when Mount Sion blessed with the good fortune of a three-goal advantage after five minutes qualified for their ninth successive county hurling final at the expense of Abbeyside.

From every aspect this was a highly satisfactory hour. If the game lulled on a few occasions, compensation was amply made by several passages of top-class hurling. Abbeyside's pre-match pessimists who so fragrantly overlooked their challenge and the champions will be the first to concede that they may not be as hard pressed towards the retention of their title again this year.

DECEPTIVE

That final 6-8 to 3-7 score is as deceptive to the general trend of the play as it is flattering to Sion's overall superiority. To be sure the champions deserved their success; their hurling always contained that polish and finesse so characteristic of Monastery sides. But had not the Villagers succumbed under those initial onslaughts, I could now be heralding a sensational Abbeyside victory. Such was the dogged determination they applied to their hurling and let me hasten to add, with telling effect, that for a long period, an Abbeyside victory was never far beyond the realm of possibility.

DISASTROUS

Those opening five minutes proved disastrous for the Villagers—the period when the game was won and lost. The challengers despite their championship experience seemed surprisingly effected by the jitters and Mount Sion like the old dog for the long road travelled on their totally unexpected advantage to concretely lay the foundations for their hard won success.

Goal No. 1 came after only two minutes when Guinan was on hand to crash a weak clearance to the net. Two minutes later Guinan was again on the mark when he doubled on a Mick Dempsey centre and almost immediately with Abbeyside's defence in an obvious state of turmoil and bewilderment, Seamus Power delivered the third shattering body-blow when his long drive went unopposed to the Village net for a goal that Thomas Hogan might have prevented.

But for the remaining fifty-five minutes, Abbeyside gave as good as they got—and at times a little better. After those triple set-backs they gradually regained their poise and confidence and matched Sion in every phase of the game. At the interval they still trailed by a three-goal margin 4-3 to 1-3—a deficit which could have been supplied had not a few goal efforts been off target by the proverbial hairs-breadth shortly before the break.

On the resumption Abbeyside threw caution to the wind. A series of switches most notable of which was the placing of Army man Mick Farrell on Seamus Power helped them gain an undoubted territorial advantage. Johnny Hogan, originally at full-forward but now roving menacingly outfield caused the Sion defence to erect panic signals with baffling frequency. That 9-points arrears was dwarfed to four at the three-quarters mark and the huge attendance which must have constituted a near record figure for club games at the venue became fully conscious of the seriousness of their challenge.

BOTTOM FELL OUT OF GAMES

However, with tension rapidly mounting and a shock result in the offing, the bottom finally fell out of the game with a Sion goal scored through a taxi. It was the Villagers' defence (secure in the knowledge that victory was almost certainly theirs) the champions displayed all the arts and crafts of the game and were strongly dictating matters at the call of time.

But on reflection that winning margin could have been far smaller if Abbeyside's attack was not obsessed with that most common of forward diseases—squadstermania. Where as the winners continuously found the loose man and utilised practically all their chances to a proper advantage, Abbeyside sadly lacked steadiness around goal. True some scoring efforts might have met with a kinder fate, but mostly

ARDMORE MAKE BID FOR HISTORY

Semi-final is Wide Open Gaelic Jottings

WITH the current football championship producing more than its quota of shock results, one must tread with unusual caution when summarising a tie. And it is in this uncertain frame of mind that I write the preview to Sunday's semi-final between Mount Sion and Ardmore.

If anyone suggested a pair- yet truthfully the Briceys kicked themselves to defeat. Then against Geradines the Monastery men seemed to be heading for defeat until a belated goal retrieved what at one stage looked a hopeless cause. Again their display left a lot to be desired and frankly if I were to judge them on that display I couldn't go beyond the seessiders.

In the past however Sion have fared poorly in earlier rounds and yet managed to emerge with highest honours. In the championship they are truly a law unto themselves and Ardmore would hardly be acting wisely if they underestimated Sunday's challenge.

Yet, despite the contrasting form, Sion start favourites for this game—a fact that pays the highest possible compliment to their championship tradition.

Changes are expected however from the side that scored a 1-4 to 1-2 victory over Geradines. Paddy Sweeney and Larry Guinan were sadly misad against the Aghishmen, but are definite starters on Sunday.

The defence will show one change from the Geradines game—an enforcer. Jim Hurley, their corner-back, received a severe head injury against Abbeyside on Sunday last that will keep him out of the game for a few weeks. Men like Seamus Power, Mick Healy, Frankie Walsh and Tommy Morrissey however form a defensive screen that even Ardmore's ever dangerous attack will find difficult to outmanoeuvre.

On their day both are unrivalled for pure football. Ardmore, like the city men, prefer an open game, which admirably suits their stylish type of play, and the more I scrutinise this tie the greater the possibilities of a battle rare become.

Ardmore's march to this semi-final has been as brilliant as it has been unexpected. In the opening round they blighted the hopes of Rathgormack with a resounding 2-6 to 0-2 victory at Dunhill. Nevertheless despite this convincing and impressive display, few, if any, would have given the proverbial straw for their chances against Kill.

Tom McGrath and his men were in rapturous mood. With a 3-17 to 0-2 victory over Kilstosty to their credit they seemed all set to make '61 their year of glory. But Ardmore, showing all the essential qualities for a really great side caused the upset of the year, by triumphing by 3-3 to 1-7.

At last these junior champions received the recognition their displays merited, and almost overnight they became favourites "to go the distance". But following a disappointing failure to Bricey Rangers in the Phelan Cup many asked was this favouritism a little premature. Sunday will finally decide.

Sion's championship form has been far less impressive. Against Briceys they gave an object lesson in opportunism, massively built Jim Hurley and later proved a rare handful for Martin O'Grady. Tom Lander, Donal Whelan and Liam Enright did their moments and cannot be faulted for defeat. For Tony Mansfield, however, this is a same bet forgotten. He was always capable of gaining possession, but sought this approach work with atrocious shirking.

NEXT SUNDAY'S JUNIOR GAMES

Two of the most attractive pairings of the Junior championships are listed for decision on Sunday next. At Dungarvan the eagerly awaited football replay between Ring and Emmets acts as a curtain-raiser to the Ardmore-Mount Sion tie, whilst at Cappoquin Kilgobnet and Ballinmeela meet in the semi-final of the Grade B hurling championship.

Whatever venue patronage choose (although Dungarvan should be the mecca for the biggest hosting), they can be certain of an entertaining fair. However, the main spotlight will undoubtedly cast its shaft on the meeting of Ring and Emmets. Ever since drawn again on Sunday, the two contrasting opinions have been strongly voiced regarding the merits of the respective sides, and early comers to the Dungarvan venue should be well rewarded.

Prior to the drawn game, Emmets were strongly fancied to advance. But unpredictable Ring came within an ace of shocking the Colligan men and were, on the hour's play, decidedly unlucky not to have won.

That draw was as good as a win to the Gaeltacht side, however, and they enter Sunday's game with high hopes of success. Not since the all-conquering championship run of the 1955-56 minors has such enthusiasm been whipped up in the parish and with the exception of the drawn tie to all them will not hear of defeat.

In the eyes of some, this confidence may be exaggerated but consider the fact that Bobbie Curran is being drawn home from Ennis for the game. Donal Musgrave, an absentee the last day, is now available; and a former Bricey star may also be included, and you have the reason for this confidence.

The inclusion of Musgrave and Curran at least is definite and the presence of this pair is bound to make for considerable improvement. Curran may be drafted into defence, while Musgrave will bolster up an attack that has proved itself the one real weak link in an otherwise solid side.

Taking the drawn game as a yardstick Ring could well make certain on this occasion. Should Tommy McGrath and Tom Joe Hartly again assume complete control at mid-field, and if the attack has regained its errors of the drawn game, the Colligan men could well bow out of this title race.

Yet is it as easy as all that to discard the Emmets? Frankly, I don't think so. In my preview to the draw, I predicted that the vote, but somehow they appeared strangely lackadaisical and very nearly paid the supreme penalty.

For Sunday's game they have no additions in personnel. Sean Condon, Dick Tobin, Paddy Fitzgerald, Jack Kiely, Mickie Walsh and Paddy Kirwan will be their leading quintet, whom the major share of the victory hopes will rest. Their contention is that over-confidence was the root of their defeat the last day—and they will not be caught napping a second time.

To predict the winner of this tie poses a major problem. Ring could and should have won the drawn game and many now feel they may have missed the bus. However, their side now carries greater all round strength and will not surrender easily.

All in all it promises to be a tremendous battle for supremacy with the issue in doubt for most of the hour. As is the outcome? Well, your guess is as good as mine.

AT CAPPOQUIN—At Cappoquin there should be an equally epic battle when Kilgobnet and Ballinmeela vie for the right to meet Colligan Rockies in the Divisional final. Both their contestants are comparatively newcomers to this junior grade, but judging by their displays to-date and well-balanced sides, either of whom should prove worthy finalists.
