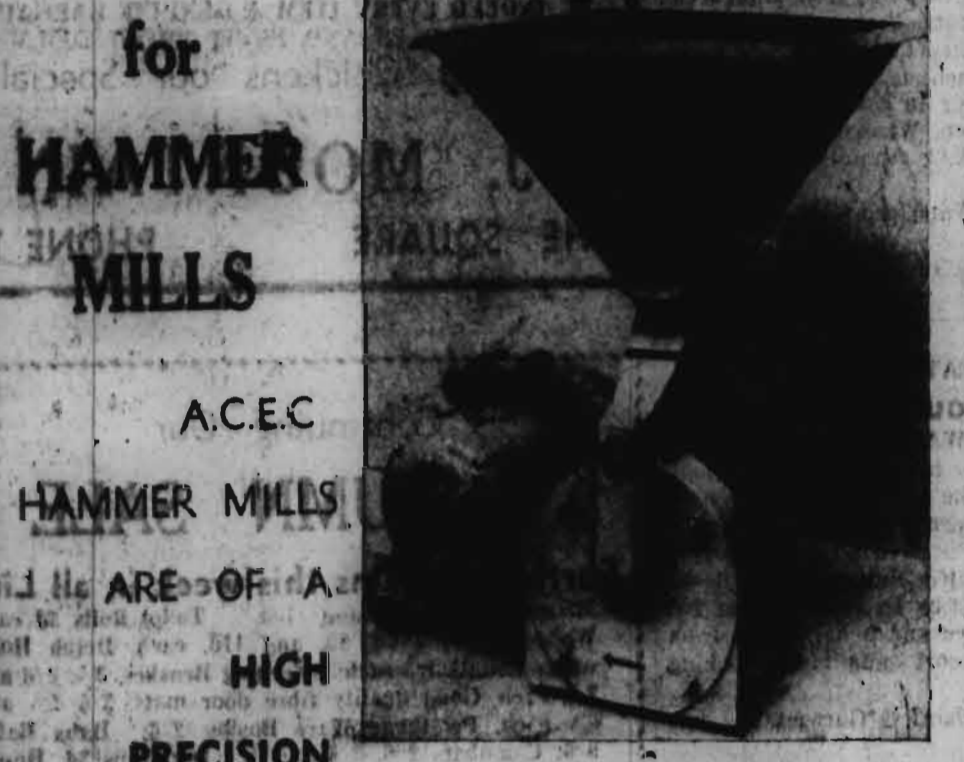

EVER since the newly inaugurated Grade 'B' Junior Hurling Championship started this year Kilgobinet had visions and no little confidence of becoming the Western Division's first representatives in the county final. That year long ambition became a reality on Sunday last at the Fraher Field when the men in green justified their favouritism by beating near neighbours Colligan Rockies 3-5 to 2-1 in the Western final.

But for the big attendance—swelled no doubt by the prospects of a battle royal this was a game best forgotten. Missing were the thrills and character of all previous games between these rival clubs, and the game ran its sixty minutes course without a ripple of excitement.

Perhaps it was the soggy conditions of the tarmac packed atmosphere that militated against good hurling, but whatever the cause, there can be no denying the substandard nature of the play. Both sides seemed uninterested in the idea of opposing each other and consequently the game suffered.

Kilgobinet were thoroughly deserving of success. Of that there can be no doubt, yet the scoreboard is a trifle unkind to a Colligan side that for three-quarters of an hour proved the equal of the more fancied Kilgobinet men.

GREATER EXPERIENCE
In the end the greater experience of the winners came to their rescue. Yet supporters weren't relieved of their anxiety until shortly before the end and the winners then will have to show improvement if they hope to account for Ballygunner in the county final on Sunday.

For one however, refuse to accept this form as a complete

Tom Drummy kept the burly Paddy Fitzgerald well in check and Jim Hurley completed a rock-solid line. Anthony Hayes held the half-line together splendidly and later proved dangerous in attack.

Mid-fielders Jim Dee and Bernie Loneragan both had their moments of prominence. Loneragan must surely be best becoming one of the best "second half" performers in the division. Against Ballinacorney he hurried himself to a veritable standstill after half-time in playing a vital role in victory and again on Sunday his second-half display was beyond reproach.

Contrary to expectations Kilgobinet's attack failed to come up to scratch and had seemed to beat their top this sector

EXCEPTION

Colligan pinned most of their hopes on full forward Paddy Fitzgerald, but his failure to master Tom Drummy hardly helped their cause. The stylish working McGrath were the pick of the sides.

FIFTH MINUTE GOAL
The Rockies opened the scoring in the fifth minute when McGrath forced the ball over

THE INQUEST

The tragic story of how a 40-year-old local plumber, Denis James Mullins, 9 Dunally Row, Dungarvan, fell to his death from a 20-foot high scaffolding, was told at an inquest on Friday last, when the coroner, Mr. J. J. Conroy, A. verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to shock and haemorrhage and laceration of the brain, was returned by the eight-man jury.

THE INQUEST

Fifteen and a half years old Timothy Mullins, son of the deceased, said on Wednesday, September 27th last at about 2.30 p.m. he was working with his father at Flemings, The Spaite. He (witness) was on a flat roof in Mr. Liam Fleming's backyard while his father was standing on the platform of the scaffolding. His father was loosening the coupling (potted) of the scaffolding and it was quite alright then. His (witness) didn't take much notice but then heard deceased saying "oh" and he saw him fall down on to the concrete yard. He later saw the plank he (deceased) had been standing on and it was then tilted on its edge. "I saw the body afterwards and I identified it as my father," he said.

THE INQUEST

To Mr. A. R. Farrell, Solicitor (for Mr. E. Fleming) witness said the coupling was down at deceased's feet when he was loosening it and he stood with his back to it. He (witness) didn't take much notice but then heard deceased saying "oh" and he saw him fall down on to the concrete yard. 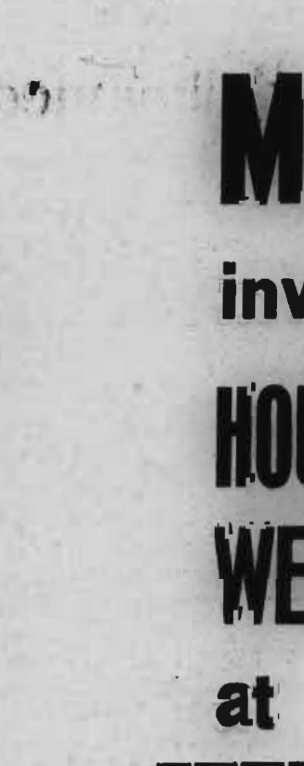

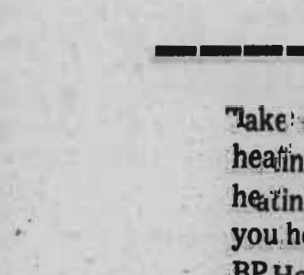

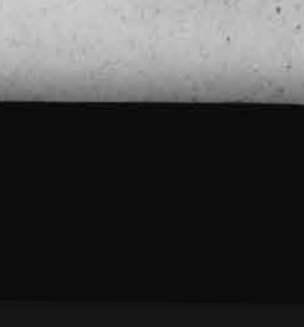

Late Mr. James Mullins CONNOLLY ROW, DUNGARVAN

Dungarvan and the County at large were shocked at the tragic death of James Mullins which occurred on Wednesday, Sept. 27th. He was a most popular figure and general favourite in all parts of the county where he was employed at his trade of plumbing...

In reply to Mr. A. R. Farrell, Sr., witness said deceased used a spanner to do the work but could not say where it was left after that. The scaffolding was checked by a County employee, John McGrath before the work was started and he passed it. He (witness) and deceased had worked on it for two days before the accident and in his opinion was in perfect order.

Continuing Dr. O'Connell said on examination he found deceased had lost a great amount of blood. He had a large wound in his right temple and a fractured dislocation of the lower jaw. He died in about five minutes. Late witness saw the body at the hospital and besides a fractured fracture of the right temple deceased also had laceration of the brain.

In his opinion death was due to shock and haemorrhage. The witness would be consistent in saying he had fallen from a height, he said.

THE INQUEST

THE tragic story of how a 30-year-old local plumber, James Mullins, fell to his death from a 30 feet high scaffolding, was told in an inquest on Saturday last, before Dr. D. Healy, Coroner. A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to shock and haemorrhage after a fall from the scaffold, was returned by the eight-man jury.

When he (witness) arrived there were four sections of scaffolding and the witness saw a man at the top of the scaffold bar to the top of the vertical bar was missing. He later found it on the ground underneath. He saw no blood in the yard at that time.

Witnessed by Mr. Farrell, James Mullins said the scaffolding was held by two separate bolts. The bolts of the coupling moved quite freely when he picked it up.

Mr. John McGrath, Mitchell Street, Dungarvan said he was employed by Dungarvan Co-operative Creamery Ltd. The scaffold scaffolding from which deceased fell was owned by the Creamery and he was engaged to erect it. Deceased was standing on the platform of the scaffolding and was quite alright when he (witness) didn't like the work and he (witness) heard deceased saying 'oh' and he saw him fall down in to the concrete yard. He later saw the plank he (deceased) had been standing on and it was then filed on by him. 'I saw the body afterwards and I identified it as my father's', he said.

Mr. A. R. Farrell, Solicitor, Mr. E. Fleming, witness of the coupling was shown a 12 feet long plank when he was looking at it and he skipped over it to look at it. Fleming, Mr. Farrell (witness) said 'On Sept 27th I was with deceased on the scaffolding. I was employed by Mr. Fleming and was a helper with Mr. Mullins and we were carrying out repairs on the roof of Mr. Fleming's house. There were roughly six sections of the scaffolding from the top to the base and we had the first section in before dinner. After dinner deceased went to dismantle the highest section but I was engaged removing slates.

Mr. Humble went on 'Timothy was beside me on the platform and the next thing I heard was a thud. I never saw deceased working on the coupling. After the body was removed I saw both planks on the upper platform, tilted on the edge and the cross-bar on which the planks were resting had gone down on one side. The scaffolding was erected by the deceased and myself and both of us had long experience of that work. Prior to the accident the couplings were perfect.
