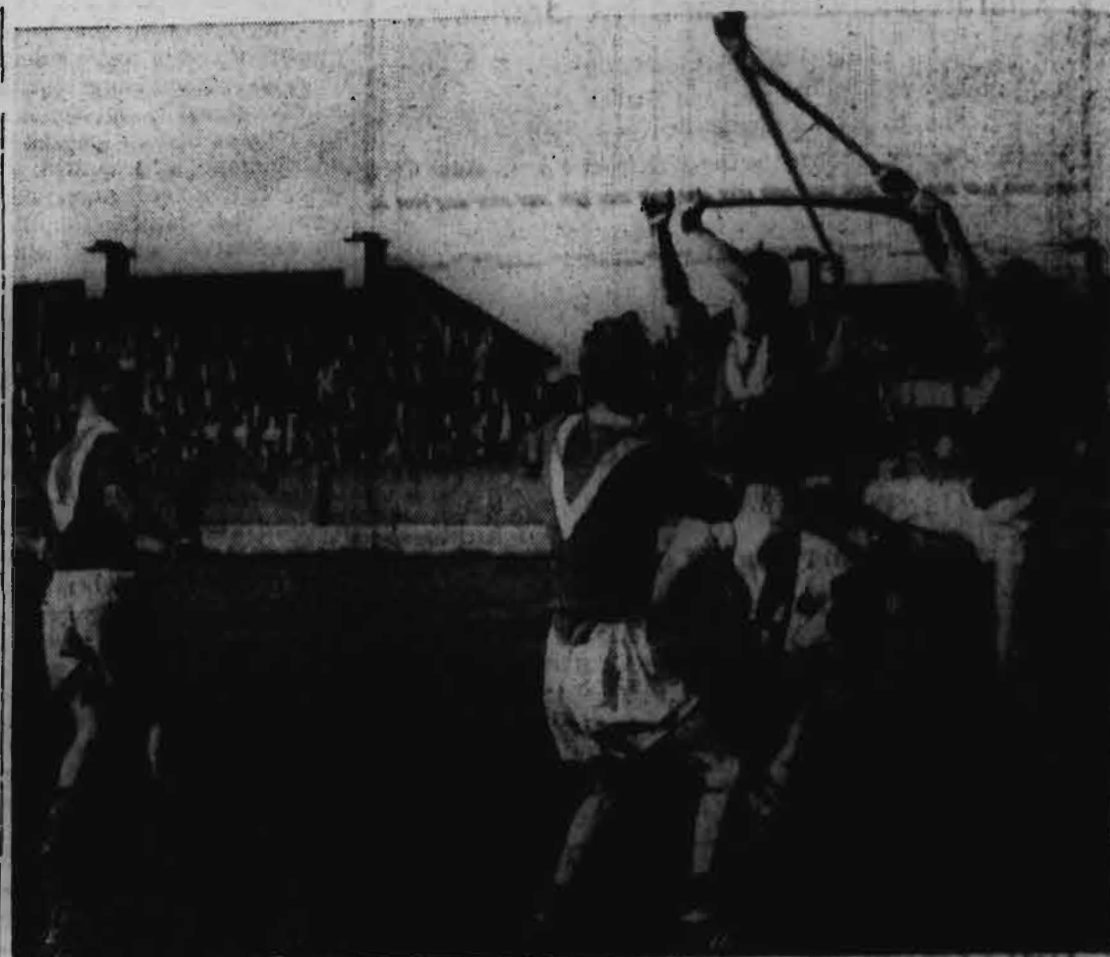

Seaweed Can Be A World-While Industry.—Around its hundreds of miles of coast, Ireland has a veritable mine beneath the sea—a wealth of seaweed which could be the basis of an important industry giving employment to large numbers. Those of the population of the Dees interested in the problem of the medical uses of seaweed and its extracts should come together and launch a combined move for the collection and handling of seaweed at a central point on the Waterford seaboard—Bonnahon for instance.

The collection of seaweed in this country has jumped from 500 tons a year three years ago to approximately 30,000 to-day, and it is a growing development. The seaweed factories at Galway, Clifden, Mallow, and Clew Bay are stated to be faring well. However, much more should be done—such as giving financial and other help for chemists, bio-chemists, pharmacists and botanists.

All the seaweed gathered around the Irish coast is exported for processing, and this is an enormous loss to the Irish economy. In the opinion of a distinguished visitor to our Emerald Isle, a gentleman who is a Milan University professor and a surgeon with degrees in chemistry: "It would be well worth while going a step further than the actual gathering of seaweed. It could be processed here, and many valuable products, such as first-aid dressings, manufactured."

YOUGHAL Trade Unions and Manager to Discuss Labour Court's Recommendations

ON the proposal of Deputy T. A. Kyne, Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan on Monday last decided to hold a meeting between the Co. Manager, Co. Engineer and other Council officials and the Trade Unions involved to discuss the Labour Court recommendation regarding the wages and conditions of employment of Road workers and supervisory grades.

Mr. J. D. Halley, Co. Engineer, said the Labour Court decision with the following points: (a) reduced hours of work; (b) five-day week (for nine months of the year); (c) increased differential for supervisory grades and engineers; (d) sick pay for road workers; (e) weekly payment of wages; (f) excess expenditure as may be involved by decisions on the foregoing.

Mr. Halley said a joint submission on behalf of eleven Counties was made and the Labour Court issued an award on all but one of these. The exception was (c) which the Court thought had not been argued sufficiently.

Deputy Kyne suggested that a discussion be held between the Co. Manager and the various unions and try and work out an agreement. He felt they could do so with the least possible impact on the rates. It could be planned in a spirit of give and take on both sides and a co-operation basis would be best.

Deputy Kyne continued: "I'm trying to do the right thing for everybody. If it's left between the Trade Union movement in this County and the Co. Manager and Co. Engineer I'm sure something proper will be arrived at. We should await the decision of that meeting before discussing it further."

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

It is with great disappointment and regret that the Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club notes the decision of the Dungarvan Vocational Educational Committee to increase the charge to persons wishing to join the Boat Building class in Dungarvan from £2.0.0 to £7.0.0 per head. It was stated that the reason for the increase was that the boats were being built by people in the higher income group and consequently they could afford the increased charge.

This statement does not tally with the facts. Of the boats already built in the class the two largest were built by two local fishermen; one was built by a local carpenter; one was built by a member of the Garda Síochána; five were built by young men working in shops and who were not in the possession of the shops. Of all that were built only two could possibly be considered as having been built by those in the higher income group. At least four others were built at private premises and it may be that the local Committee thought that these boats had in fact been built under Technical tuition. Four boats were built by people who perhaps might be considered in the low income group but these people joined the class solely to make up the number required to get the class going and surely they should have been told then that they were not wanted and not at this stage. These people counted as members of the class each subsequent year solely for the purpose of keeping the class going. Now that they have been shown the way there is no reason why many others from the low income group should not join this comparatively inexpensive pastime in Dungarvan's splendid harbour and it is understood that quite a few are contemplating doing so at the excellent charge for joining this class is reduced.

It is admitted by all that the appearance of these boats in Dungarvan Harbour has wonderfully improved the appearance of the harbour and amounts to a definite tourist attraction. It has already brought several visitors to the town and to join the Club. The facilities provided in Dungarvan for this boat building class should be considered and compared with what is provided in Clonmel, Carrick-on-Suir, Waterford and Yougal. In Dungarvan the charge was £2 per head. No power tools were provided. Two benches were provided which had two vice and which in fact did not work. One box of tools was supplied and these were in a very poor state of repair. Electric light was provided but no heating.

In Clonmel six benches were provided with tools for every bench and power tools were provided in addition. There was Calor gas for such of the work as required heat. The premises themselves were heated. The charge in Carrick-on-Suir was £2.10.0 per head; in Waterford £1 per head; and in Yougal £1 per head.

We understand that the nett cost of the class in Dungarvan was £2. A number of definitely lower income group people would like to build boats during the coming winter but will not be able to do so if the charge is kept at £7 suggested. (MR.) M. A. FARRELL, Hon. Secretary, Dungarvan H.S.C.

School in Kilmac will not be White Elephant

THAT a new Vocational School was a necessity at Kilmacthomas and would not prove a white elephant like planned projects, was stressed by a Deputation from that area at Monday's County Council meeting in Dungarvan. The Deputation was introduced to the meeting by Deputy T. A. Kynne, Abbeyside.

Speaking on the proposed school, Deputy Kynne said the matter had come before the Council a few months ago. Deputy Kynne was appointed to investigate the necessity of a new school, but nothing came of it. The matter was urgent, he said, and a decision either for or against should be arrived at as soon as possible.

Deputy Kynne went on to say he was for it and he was sure Deputy Sean O'Monroe felt the same. Kilmacthomas was endeavouring to progress and all these people involved were young people—not the people who just patronise a technical school to make cakes, or make furniture for the home. There was a secondary school in Kilmac this problem would not arise. Concluding, he asked the Council to listen to the deputation and he felt they should receive it in a favourable manner possible.

Mr. Milo Galry said he was always in favour of the young being educated. However, a Sub-Committee was appointed to investigate it and sent the Council had got no report from that Committee. "It was said to me that it was only a bluff," he said.

The Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran said the Sub-Committee had met and discussed it. It was decided to inform the clergy in the area and get their views as to the desirability of building such a school at a cost of £50,000. It would have been dealt with weeks ago only for the election campaign.

Rev. Fr. M. Walsh, C.C., said: "The Development Association in Kilmacthomas have investigated it. The cost will be £25,000 and not £50,000 as the Chairman stated. The worry of the County Council—and it is a justifiable worry—is whether or not it will be a white elephant in years to come. There are 87 in the area on an average leaving school each year; six years the average number of births was 75 a year in the district. The population will be enough for the next 14 years to provide for a school, and as far as we can see it will not be a white elephant on the Council for 14 years at least."

Very Rev. Fr. Shanley, P.P., said the view of the Technical School Masters was that it would be safe to have a school in Kilmac. The parents were willing to go hungry to see that their children get a chance of education, and they were not satisfied with a primary education. "I hate to see any wastage," he said, "but I don't think a Technical School in Kilmacthomas would be a waste."

Deputy Curran (Chairman) said he appreciated Fr. Shanley's report and he would deal with the report of the Sub-Committee first.

Deputy Kynne: Could we have an assurance it will be dealt with at the next meeting.

Mr. Curran: If we get a report from the Sub-Committee. He responsible Deputy. The Committee will have to meet and then present its report to this Council.

Deputy Kynne: We all want it dealt with the next day.

Mr. Galry: I must agree with Deputy Kynne. I think the Committee was formed to put this thing back.

Deputy Kynne: We won't have a meeting for the next month. Surely the committee can have their report prepared by then. I propose it be put first on the agenda for our next meeting.

Mr. Galry seconded.

Deputy Kynne's proposal was passed unanimously.
