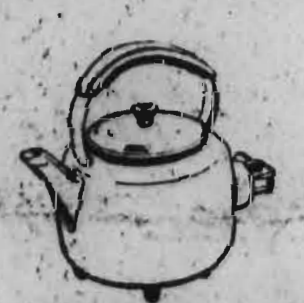

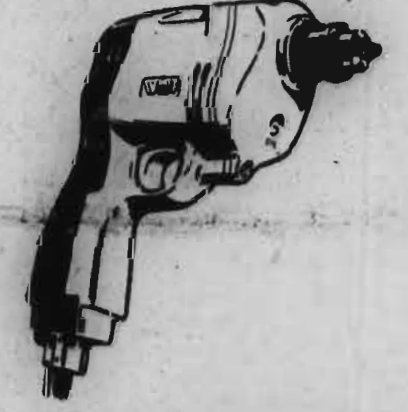



Extent of Present Incapacitation Deferred

HE was satisfied the plaintiff was partially incapacitated from August '61 but he would adjourn that aspect of the matter to the next sessions. This was stated by Judge S. MacD. Fawsitt, at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday when he heard a workman's compensation claim by Mr. Patrick J. Walsh, Mount, Odell, against James Walsh, Ballymullala, Cappoquin.

Mr. Sheridan, B.L. (instructed by J. F. Williams & Son) said the plaintiff said that his client was driving a combine harvester for James Walsh, Ballymullala, on August 29th, 1960, when he got a bad tearing and dislocation of the index finger of his right hand. It was now thought that the two top joints of the finger would have to be amputated.

The Plaintiff (Mr. Patrick J. Walsh) said he was a small farmer. At the time of the accident he was working on a combine harvester owned by the defendant. He was paid compensation to August 12th, 1961, he was totally incapacitated and was entitled to full compensation at the rate of £4-10-0 per week. From August 12th this year he was partially incapacitated but he would adjourn that aspect of it to the next sessions.

As regards the amputation it was really a matter for the doctors but from the evidence heard it would only be in the plaintiff's own interests to have the finger removed.

Dungarvan Neighbours In Water Action

'Were wise to settle it' - Says Judge

'THE parties concerned are very well advised to settle this title action,' said Judge S. MacD. Fawsitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday when a dispute between Thomas McCarthy, Ballycullane, Dungarvan, and Patrick, John, Michael and Julia Ryan, also of Ballycullane, over water rights, was settled.

The lands of the disputing parties are adjoining each other and the plaintiff, Mr. McCarthy, claimed that he was entitled to the flow of a stream which originated in a well on the defendant's land and flowed from the well to his own land. The defendants also allegedly obstructed the stream from the plaintiff's land and deprived him of the flow of water. Mr. McCarthy also claimed that the defendants dug a trench on their own side of the boundary fence and prevented the stream from flowing into his land and also diverted it across the road to a stream on the other side of the road. As a result McCarthy had no water on his lands and had to go to the expense of pumping water by hand from a well in his own yard, which was not sufficient for his requirements. He also claimed to restrain the defendants from continuing or repeating any obstruction and sought £200 damages. After lengthy deliberations between the respective Courts, the following agreement was made: (1) The defendants agreed to the plaintiff taking all the necessary steps on their land to restore the flow of water from their land to his own land; (2) all such steps are to be executed under supervision of Mr. McCarthy; (3) the plaintiff will have the right to enter defendants' land for the purpose of inspecting, maintaining and repairing any such work as may be executed under the agreement; (4) the plaintiff will be liable for any such work and will have to ensure that the flow of water from defendants' lands will not be impeded and carry out such work as may be necessary; (5) each party will have to pay their own costs in the action.

Mr. Feehan, B.L., said the agreement was very reasonable and fair to all parties concerned. Judge Fawsitt said very often similar actions were carried further and the parties were very well advised to settle them.

YOUGHAL FLOODING

To the Minister for Industry and Commerce: Whether his Department has received any proposals for the establishment of an industry in Dungarvan, and if so, what progress has been made in regard to these proposals?

REPLY— There are no proposals before my Department for the establishment of an industry in Dungarvan, Co. Waterford.

Government Policy Worries N.F.A.

SLIPPING INCOME A MATTER OF GROWING CONCERN

THE steadily deteriorating position of agricultural income is of growing and anxious concern to the N.F.A., particularly in light of stated and accepted Government policy to the effect that farm income is to be brought more in line with the income of other sectors of the community.

Government policy in this respect was put forward by An Taoiseach in a public address on August 16th, 1961, when he stated that— "In respect of prices for agricultural products, the Executive recognised that there were dual purposes to be served in keeping prices at a level which would fairly remunerate producers, while at the same time, keep them within the means of all consumers."

What action will be taken now by the Board? When they meet in Dungarvan soon (probably next Tuesday?) By rule Ballyduff are, I think, liable for suspension but only time will decide their fate.

Whatever you one looks on it, it can only be described as an unfortunate occurrence that cannot possibly be any good. Even Emmetts themselves must be greatly distressed and should they be declared champions there will be a feeling of bitterness and hollow about it.

Wage increases in the creamery industry sector, as in other industrial sectors, are being negotiated. Without compensatory increases in the prices of creamery products, this can only result in a further deterioration in the dairy farmer's income.

With regard to liquid milk, the price of milk has been increased by 4d. per gallon this winter. This increase has been imposed on the consumer because of increased wages and other expenses in collection and distribution.

Many small farmers were unable to make a living out of slow cattle raising and a little wage, started letting their land to larger farms for wheat growing a few years ago.

Waterford Lucky To Overcome Carlow

Waterford 4-7 Carlow 4-4

WATERFORD enter the close season of the National Hurling League sitting smugly and proudly at the top of their division. But not before many drops of worried sweat were shed and many moments of anxiety and unsureness experienced in one hour at Dr. Cullen Park, Carlow, on Sunday last.

There at the Leinster venue, Waterford, the certainties (as our friends of the racing fraternity would say) only by sheer grit and determination, staved off what would and could have been a sensational and disastrous setback at the hands of under-dogs Carlow.

Yes, that precisely is how close Waterford came to their first loss of league points in the current competition. They undoubtedly approached the game in a cocky and over-confident mood, and almost paid the penalty for their foolishness. True, despite the scare they received, the Deise men always displayed that extra touch of class, but Carlow, on Sunday, weren't interested in big names or reputations.

THREE CAUTION TO WINDS Before their own supporters they threw caution to the winds and their intent dedication, coupled with a highly effective rugged hurling, came within an ace of being successful. Waterford, caught unaware, never really recovered from the unexpected points in the white of the task that faced them, and it was only in the closing stages that they displayed any semblance of Limerick the previous Sunday.

But whilst in no way detracting the merits of Carlow's performance—their best for many years—in reality Waterford were disappointing on Sunday. Even allowing for the fact that Tom Cunningham, Jimmy Byrnes, Frankie Walsh, Larry Guinan and Tom Cheasty were all absent, this display was far from what supporters had anticipated.

If the game proved anything to Waterford mentors it was surely that reserve material is at a minimum in the county. Mick Dempsey and John Meaney filled the bill adequately at mid-field and centre-forward respectively, but the remaining newcomers failed to make the grade.

ENTERTAINING The game itself was a highly entertaining one and Carlow's ability to give as good as they got was an added uplift. The opening half was evenly contested and both goals had narrow escapes. Twice the lead inter-changed and at the end of the first half Waterford led narrowly by 1-3 to 1-3.

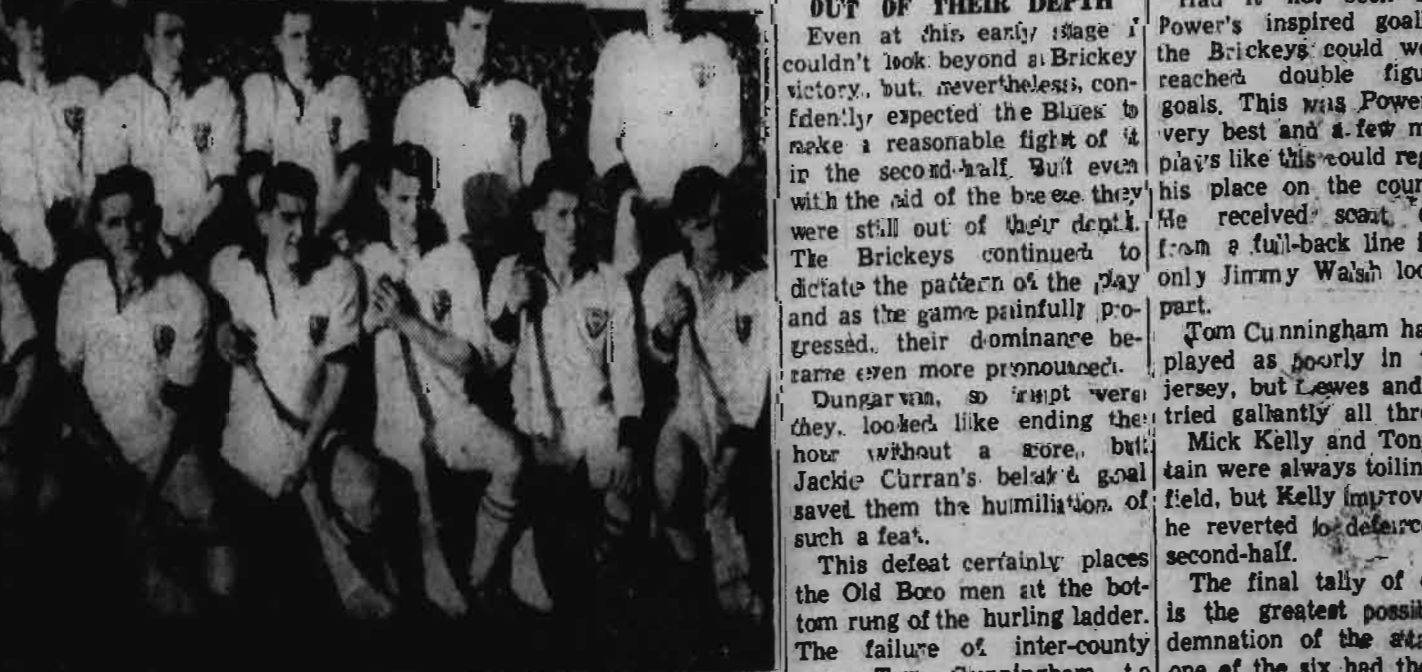
On the resumption, Carlow threw themselves into the fray with renewed vigour, and only some excellent goal-keeping by Dickie Roche kept them at bay. As the minutes ticked by and the frictions of both sides flared, tension mounted. Again the lead changed hands, but Waterford, exerting their superior skill began to enjoy a territorial advantage. They again regained the lead, which they never subsequently lost and at the end were attacking strongly.

Blues Fall Heavily in 'Sargent' Semi-Final

WITHOUT exaggeration this Sargent Cup semi-final between Brickey Rangers and Dungarvan at the Fraher Field on Sunday last was the poorest I have witnessed in the competition since its inception and was the worst possible advertisement for the game in the county.

The final score speaks for itself, but if Brickeys are deserving of a place in the final for the first time, it is only because they proved the best of two disappointing and below par teams.

Were I to use the full force of the pen on this semi-final, all the adverse adjectives wouldn't condemn it sufficiently. But taking into account the time of the year (it's the only possible salvation for the sides), one must try and restrain from "laying on the agony. For the small attendance that turned up there was little or no entertainment and in the end amused themselves by passing witty remarks about the play.

All through, the exchanges were substandard, and if the losers were the greatest offenders in this respect, the Brickeys were also far from being the complete canan welders.

DARKEST HOUR From a Dungarvan viewpoint this must surely rank as one of their darkest hours. The promise shown against Mt. Sion in the championship was as faded as the swiftness of the day itself, and where they go from here is something I wouldn't care to hazard a guess on.

If the Brickeys were likewise disappointing it must be stated in fairness to them that they never had to raise a gall to win. At 17 points they were a good way ahead of their superior, whilst they also had 17 wides to Dungarvan's 4 during the hour. In fact the Blues lone score came five minutes from the end when the winners were "home and dried" and raised the biggest if cynical cheer of the game.

NEVER HAD EASIER TIME It is doubtful if the winners defence will ever have an easier time again. Ritchie Whelan in goal hadn't one direct shot to deal with during the game, and a variety of Dungarvan packings, Terry, in particular was in top form, and his first-half point from 80 yards was a gem.

Despite shooting 17 wides, their attack always had the measure of the Blues defence and John "Spackin'" Woods, Justin Spratt and Patsy Donnelly were always dangerous.

Had it not been for Ned Power's inspired goalkeeping, the Brickeys could well have reached double figures in goals. This was Power at his very best and a few more displays like this could regain him his place on the county side. He received some coverage from a full-back line in which only Jimmy Walsh looked the part.

Tom Cunningham has rarely played as poorly in the club jersey, but Lewes and Moyan relied gallantly all through. Mick Kelly and Tony Mountain were always toiling at mid-field, but Kelly improved when he reverted to defence in the second-half.

The final tally of one goal is the greatest possible condemnation of the attack. Not one of the six had the skill to strike anything near his best. Lynn was an unexpected setback, but many of their new-

comers are clearly not fit for senior fare yet. Though never seriously tested, Brickey Rangers can only approach the final with a certain amount of trepidation. Admittedly we hardly saw them at their best on Sunday, but it will take a world of improvement on their part if the trophy is to come to the west for the second time.

THE SCORING Tommy Joe Hartly gave Brickeys the lead after five minutes with a point and two minutes later the Dungarvan net fell for the first time when the winners goalied from a make. Ned Power made a brilliant save from Justin Spratt in the 14th minute but Patsy Donnelly was on hand to drive home the rebound. Justin Spratt and Willie Terry had points—the latter from a 80 yards—before Dungarvan had their first wide after 20 minutes. Again Brickeys took up the running and a point by Pat Spratt and a goal by Mickey Hurley gave them a comfortable 3-4 to nil interval lead.

Any hopes Dungarvan had of staging a fight-back were dashed within a minute of the restart when Donnelly and Hurley scored a further goal and a point respectively for the winners. The ensuing 20 minutes were as lifeless as the Justin Spratt had the best score of the game when he soloed through the losers defence for a great goal. Five minutes from time Jackie Curran put a little reflection on the scoreboard with his sides only goal of the game.

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
